It is sometimes difficult to persuade people who want something kept out of the papers because innocent individuals (the family of a suicide, for instance), will suffer by the publicity given the story that in the long run it is better that the facts should be told better for everybody, including the innocent. For nothing is more certain than that suppression of the facts will give rise to rumors and that years afterwards, perhaps, an ugly version of the story will confront the people who have been "protected" when it is no longer possible to secure satisfactory refutation. As things are, production of the newspaper reports of an occurrence, printed at the time, are usually sufficient to still the voice of slander, but if it were the practice for the newspapers to "keep out" this or that because of pity for anybody, one of the greatest safeguards against defamation would disappear.

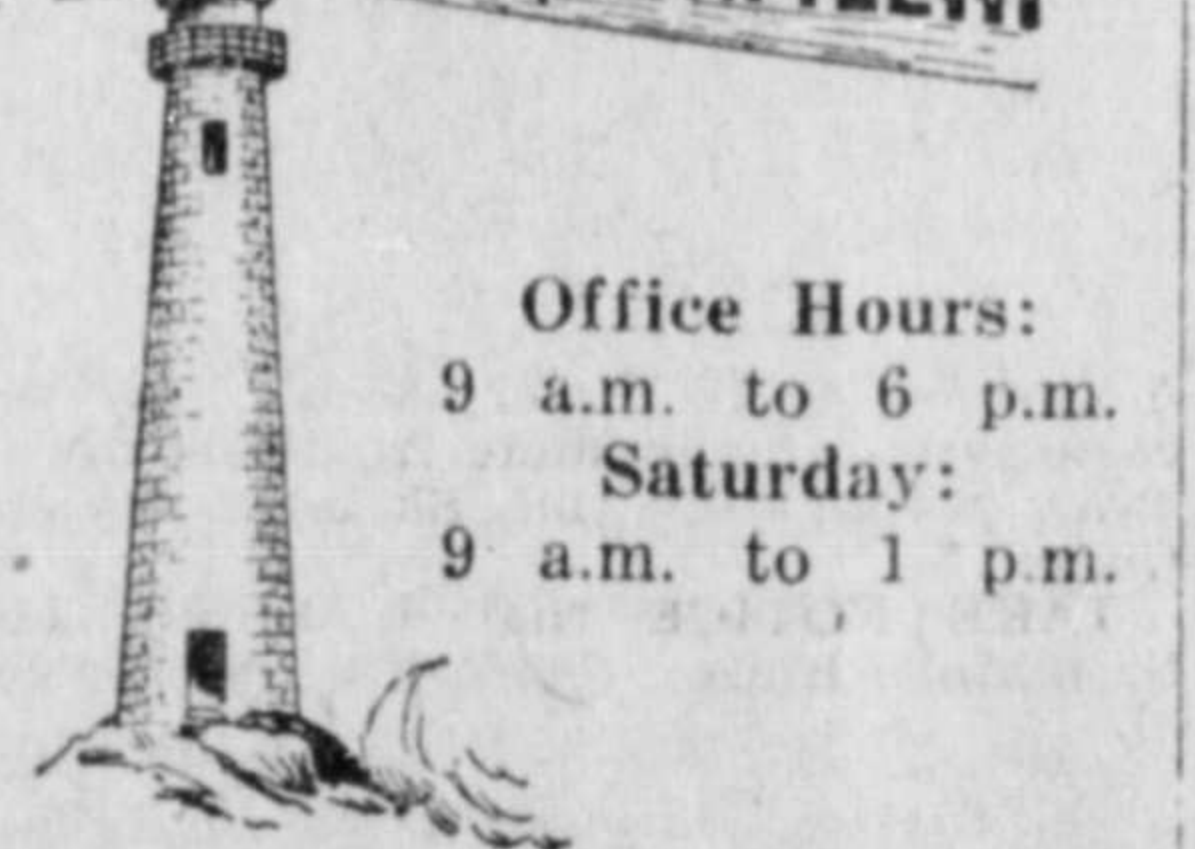

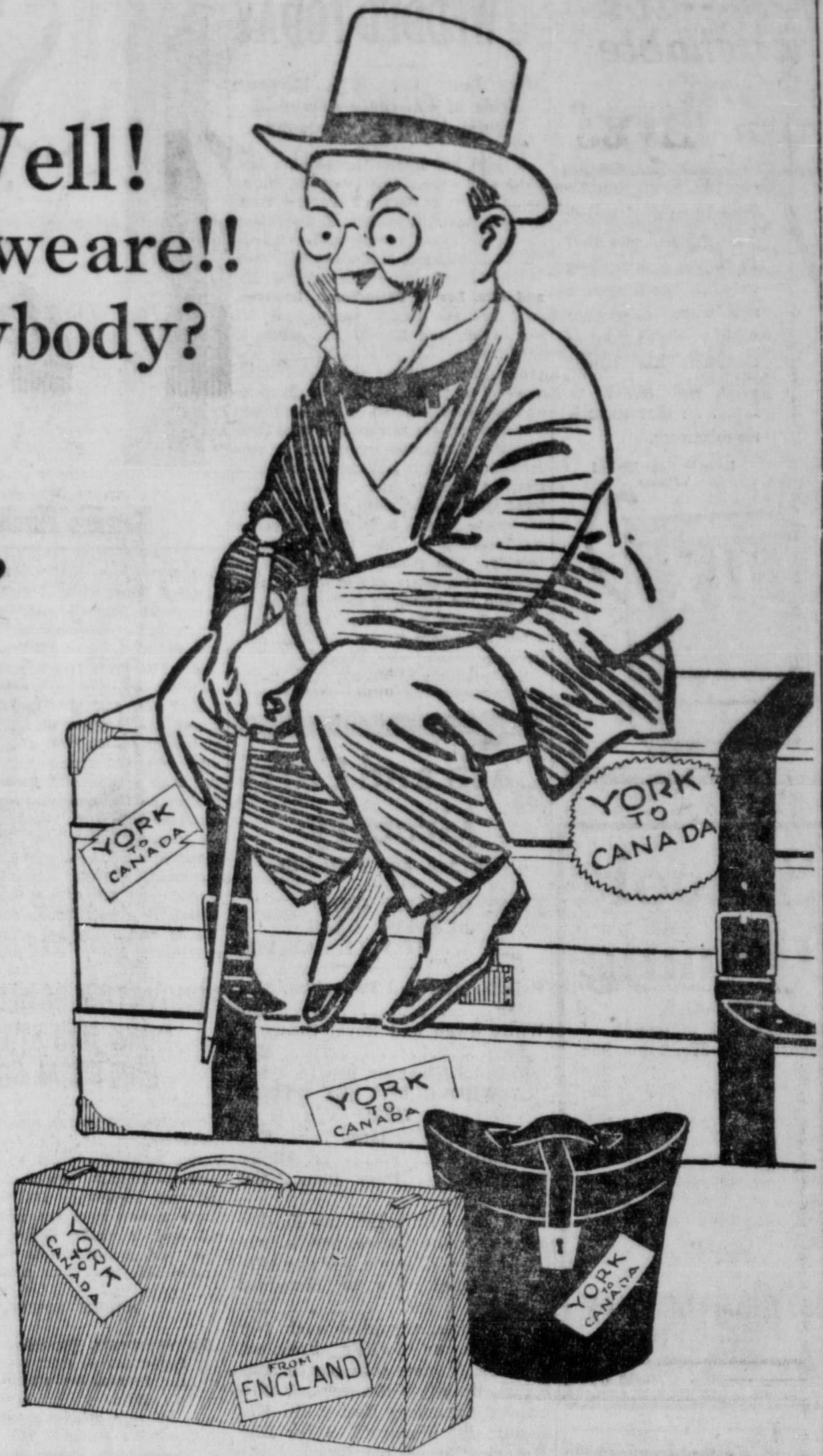

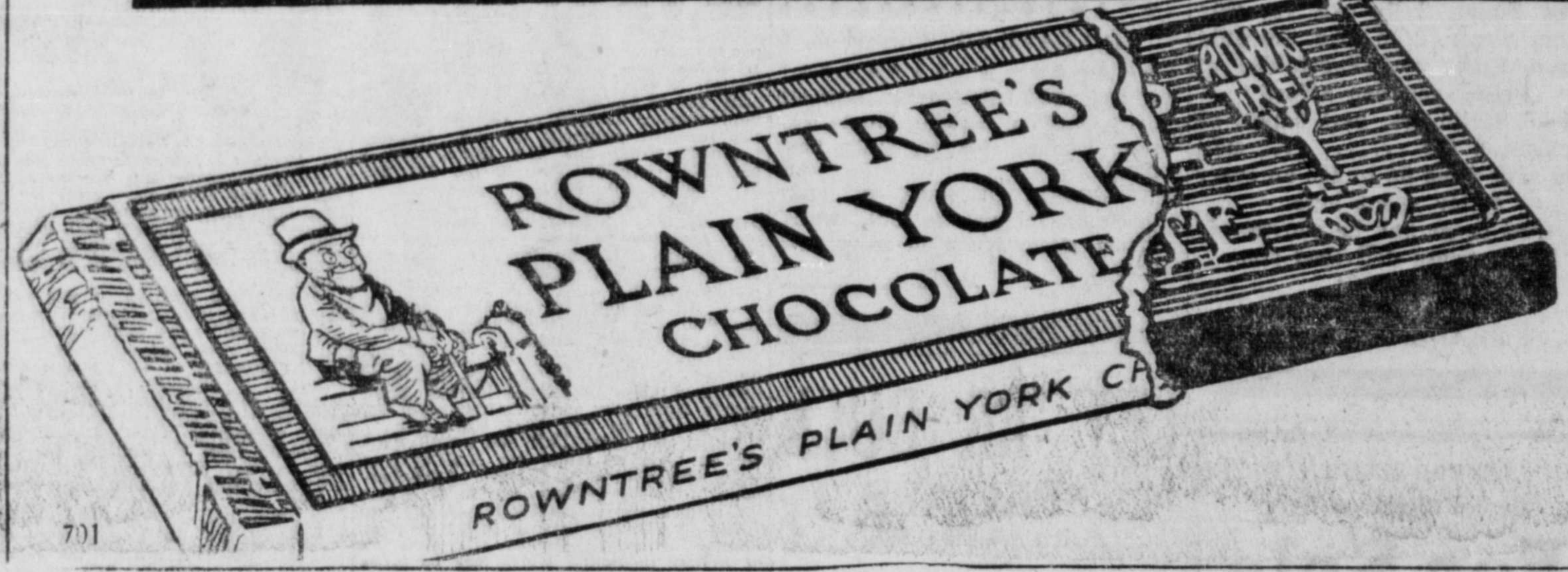
