PRIVILEGES SYSTEMATICALLY ABUSED SAYS MR. BALDWIN

Britain Severs All Diplomatic Relations with Russia as Result of Revelations from Recent Raid

Soviet deliberately and systematically abused SLUGGERS DAY privileges and trade delegation acted as red agents

LONDON, May 25.—Claiming that the Union of Soviet Republic had systematically abused diplomatic privileges, Premier Baldwin announced in the House of Commons yesterday that the Government had decided to sever all relations with Russia. He said that, unless the House of Commons disapproved, the Soviet mission and the trade delegation would be required to withdraw from London Thursday and the British mission would be recalled from Moscow if the House approved.

The Premier failed to make the expected revelations in detail in regard to the secrets of the Arcos House raid but quoted from various seized documents which showed that no differentiation was was taking shape, sluggers of both to be made between subversive propaganda by Soviet agents and the leagues were pounding the other pitchers activities of the trade delegation. Mr. Baldwin went on to say that the men employed in the trade delegation were also secret agents engaged in communicating information from the Red Internationale to communists in England and America. He alluded to a list of addresses of communist parties in various countries, including Canada, and disclosed arrangements! made for training agitators on Arcos ships with a view to their sub-

sequent employment on British vessels. Concluding his speech the Premier said that while they were breaking off diplomatic intercourse as a result of the subversive campaign they were prepared to make arrangements for necessary trade facilities between the two countries.

A note containing the British Government's final word to Soviet Russia is in the course of being drafted by the cabinet today and will be handed to the Soviet representatives as soon as possible after the House of Commons approves the Government's decision to sever diplomatic relations with Moscow.

MOSCOW, May 25 .- The rupture of relations with Russia by Britain is looked upon here as an accomplished fact since no doubt exists in the minds of the authorities that Parliament will approve the British cabinet's recommendations.



The location of the station is at the junction of 100 Street and 104 Avenue and the station site is approximately 770 feet long in this direction by about 210 feet deep. The selection ceremonies. The serving of refresh- of this site was influenced by the thought that 100 Street, with the Macdonald hotel at one end, public buildings at the sides along its length, and the station placed across the axis at the other end would form a fine civic centre. The vista along this street culminating in a dignified station front will have a very fine effect. In planning the various facilities and in order to allow as much space as possible along the tracks for use as baggage and express and still keep the station on the axis of 100 Street, the main building has been placed "end on" to the tracks, instead of in the usual position, parallel to the tracks.

This arrangement not only gives fine entrance effect, but allows the grounds at each side and in front to be developed to advantage for tramways, automobile parking spaces, street cars, etc., and these facilities, when combined with the rest of the grounds. which will be planted with trees and shrubs and grassed, will form a pleasing setting to the station and be a distinct asset to the city from both practical and aesthetic standpoints.
