PARIS, May 23 .- Referring to the airplane and himself as Captain Lindeberg, who arrived here Saturday night in his monoplane "Spirit of St. Louis," told his story of the flight to newspapermen after he had had ten hours sleep. The story follows:

"After we got away from land we ran into fog, then rain, then hail. Sometimes we flew not more than ten feet above the water while the highest altitude reached was ten thousand feet. We went up that high trying to get above a storm but the average altitude while doing the second thousand miles of the flight was less than

If we had known the weather would be as bad over that part of the COAL OUTPUT ocean as it turned out to be we should not have started but once we got into it there wasn't any use turning back." FIRST FOUR MONTHS OF YEAR WELL AHEAD OF SAME IN 1926

VICTORIA, May 23 .- The output the coal mines of British Columbia in the first four months of this year aggregated 854,236 long tons compare. with 699,307 long tons in the same period in 1926, an increase this year of 154 929 tons, according to figures compile by the provincial department of mine and issued under authority of Hon William Sloan, minister of mines. Thi increasing production is due to the increased domestic demand consequen upon the continued colder weather con ditions during the spring months. Vancouver Island collieries in the four

months produced 475,529 long tons compared with 380,613 tons in the corresponding four months of 1926, an increase of 94,916 tons. The Crow's Nest Pass district output was also higher at 310,879 tons as against 259,257 tons last year, an increase of 51,622 tons. The Nicola-Princeton district made an increase of 8,425 tons.

Coke production for the four months was 31,058 tons compared with 36,819 tons in 1926, a decease of 5,761 tons.

NEW YORK, May 23 .- A million dollar pot of gold at the end of his 36,000 mile rainbow awaited Captain Lindberg while the world acclaim continued to mark the achievement of the New York to Paris airman. There came offers within 24 hours of the ending of the epochal flight of \$735,000 in movie and commercial contracts. A fortune of more than a million dollars will be within his grasp should he be able and willing to fulfill the elaborate array of motion picture, vaudeville, advertising and testimonial writing and other contracts, but what the young captain will do is not known.
