CONVERSATION AND SINGING

Loud talking and singing of sentimental songs by those employed or in training is not in order, when the patients are trying to think of the outcome of their particular case.

The song "Lay My Head Beneath a Rose" and "When I'm Gone You'll Soon Forget Me." the thoughts of these and other sentimental songs are not conductive to the welfare of the patients who, through the advice of their physicians in their illness, are compelled to stay there.

Even Places Named Trotsky and Followers to Have New Nomenclature

LONDON, Dec. 15 .- The Soviet government has been busy formally giving effect to the recent decision of the Communist Party to deprive Trotsky, Rakovsky, Zinovieff, Kameneff, and others of all their official positions, and appointing their successors. The president of the Russian Bank for Trade and Industry, Ksandroff, has been appointed Trotsky's successor as chairman of the Concessions Committe.

As humerous places were renamed after revolutionary leaders, orders have now been issued to find new designations for places which received the names of "Renegade Leninists." With a view, apparently, to avoid future difficulties, such towns are adopting the names of institutions and dead leaders rather than those of living Communists, "who may become renegades." Thus Zinovievsk has been renamed Dzer-Scotch Tweed Suits made to | zhinsk, after the late chief of the Cheka, and Trotsky has been renamed

Krasnoarminsk. Although he was not included in the list of recent expulsions, the Soviet government has officially dismissed "for Oppositionism" the Commissar of Internal Affairs for the Russian Socialist Federal Soviet Republic (one of the con-

stituent Republics of the U.S.S.R.). Biel- and Charles G. Stimpson, Vancouver oborodoff, who gained notoriety in 1918 T. L. Williams, Massett. as head of the Administration of Yekaterinburg when the Russian Imperial Family was murdered.

Forty hours after his suicide in Moscow the Soviet government buried Yoffe, not under the walls of the Kremin amongst the greatest revolutionary leaders, but in the cemetery, Tchitcherin and other officals of the Commissariat of Foreign Affairs attended the funeral but the greatest interest centred in the presence of Trotsky. Rakovsky, and ther degraded Opposition leaders, who even spoke at the graveside.

M. Yoffe, who was born in 1883 first came into prominence as president of the Russian delegation in the Brestlitovsk negotiations, which led to Rusla's withdrawal from the war. He also ock part in the peace negotiations beween Russia and Latvia, and Russia and Poland in 1920. In April, 1918, he was appointed Soviet ambassador to Berlin, but was subsequently expelled from Germany for conducting Bolshevist propaganda. In 1922 he was appointed Soviet ambassador to Pekin. and in this capacity took part in the negotiations between Japan and the U.S.S.R. in 1923. In 1924 he was Soviet minister to Vienna. On his return from abread he was made vice-chairman of the concessions department.
