IMMENSE THRONG GREETS LINDBERGH

BRITISH WARSHIPS ARE SENT TO EGYPT AS PRECAUTION

Huge Crowd Gathered at Croydon to Welcome Lindbergh to England

APPROXIMATELY ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN WATCHED ARRIVAL OF YOUNG AMERICAN AVIATOR

CROYDON, May 30.—Approximately one hundred thousand people greeted the famous transatlantic flyer, Captain Charles Lindbergh on his arrival here from Brussels last evening. It was one of the largest, wildest and most enthusiastic gatherings of men, women and children ever assembled in England to welcome a citizen of any nation.

Breaking the barriers by which they were held back, the huge growd swarmed over the field just before the young American aviator landed and almost robbed him of a landing place. After circling until sufficient space was cleared to allow of his descent, he stopped several hundred yards from where Sir Samuel Hoare, the British aviation minister, Lady Hoare and many other officials were waiting to welcome him.

NEXT ELECTION TO SEE FIVE MIL-LION MORE WITH RIGHT TO FRANCHISE

WILL OUTNUMBER MEN

LONDON, May 30 .- (Canadian Press). The Government's promised bill giving women the vote at 21 years of age will give women a majority of more than 2,-000,000 in the next General Election. At present men have a majority of three million, because women under 30 years of age are not enfranchised. The voting strength computed last winter was: Men, 12,697,790; Women, 9,592,222. The reduction in voting age will give the vote to an additional 5,126,000 women. In addition, simplification of the voting qualifications for women voters will result in enfranchisement of a large number of women at present ineligible to vote, although they are over 30 years of age.

It is believed that in 70 per cent of the constituencies the women electors NOTICE OF INTENTION TO APPLY TO will outnumber the men. At present this is the case in five constituencies In Prince Rupert Land Recording only, South Kensington, Cheltenham, District of Prince Rupert, and situate Hastings, Glasgow Hillhead and South at Sewell Inlet, Moresby Island, Queen Edinburgh, though in a few other constituencies the women equal the men. It is not likely that such a delay would prevent the younger women from voting in the next General Election.


