

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

MUCH TUBERCULOSIS AND MALARIA NOW IN RUSSIA; OTHERS LESS

Million Cases of Malaria Estimated in Soviet Republic Today

LENINGRAD, Aug. 11 .- Malaria, tuberculosis and trachoma are ravishing Soviet Russia, it is stated by Dr. W. Horsley Gantt, a young physician from the United States, who has just completed an exhaustive two-volume work on health and sanitary conditions in Russia.

Dr. Gantt says there are more than 4,000,000 cases of malaria at present within the Soviet Union, which is four number of persons affected with tuberculcsis runs into the millions, and the disease is steadily increasing.
