## REPUBLICANS TO SIT IN IRISH HOUSE

### RESPIRE OF ELEVEN DAYS GIVEN CONVICTED MURDERERS

#### Fianna Fail Party in Ireland Will Be Represented in Free State Parliament Friday Next

Republican Party Decided That Representatives Shall Take Oath of Allegiance as "Empty Formality"

DUBLIN, August 11.—The executive committee of the Republican party headed by De Valera decided unanimously last night that the 45 members of the party elected deputies of the Free State parliament shall take the oath of allegiance to the British crown and assume their seats in the House Friday. De Valera himself joined his followers in their decision.

The meeting decided to regard the oath as an "empty formality" and declared that the only allegiance of the party "Fianna Fail" was to the Irish nation.

#### SHINGLE MILL UP IN SMOKE

Visitors to Opening of Vancouver  
Museum Have Full View of  
Blaze

VANCOUVER, Aug. 11.—Fifty thousand dollars damage resulted from a fire that destroyed the dry kiln, staining plant, and loading platform of the McNair shingle mill here last night. The blaze broke out about eleven o'clock in full view of the thousands who were attending the opening of the Hastings Park stadium. The huge crowd was attracted by it and the grounds quickly emptied when the flames spread with amazing rapidity lighting the area with a fierce glow.

#### WOMAN STEPPED ON ACCELERATOR

Powerful Car Leaped Sidewalk  
and Crashed Through Side  
of House

VANCOUVER, Aug. 11.—When Mrs. G. Armitage stepped on the accelerator of the auto instead of on the footbrake, the heavy sedan leaped across the sidewalk of a west end street corner here yesterday, crashed through the side of a frame house and severely injured Alice K. Jos, twelve years of age, who was chopping wood in the basement.

#### BALDWIN CAN'T COME FURTHER

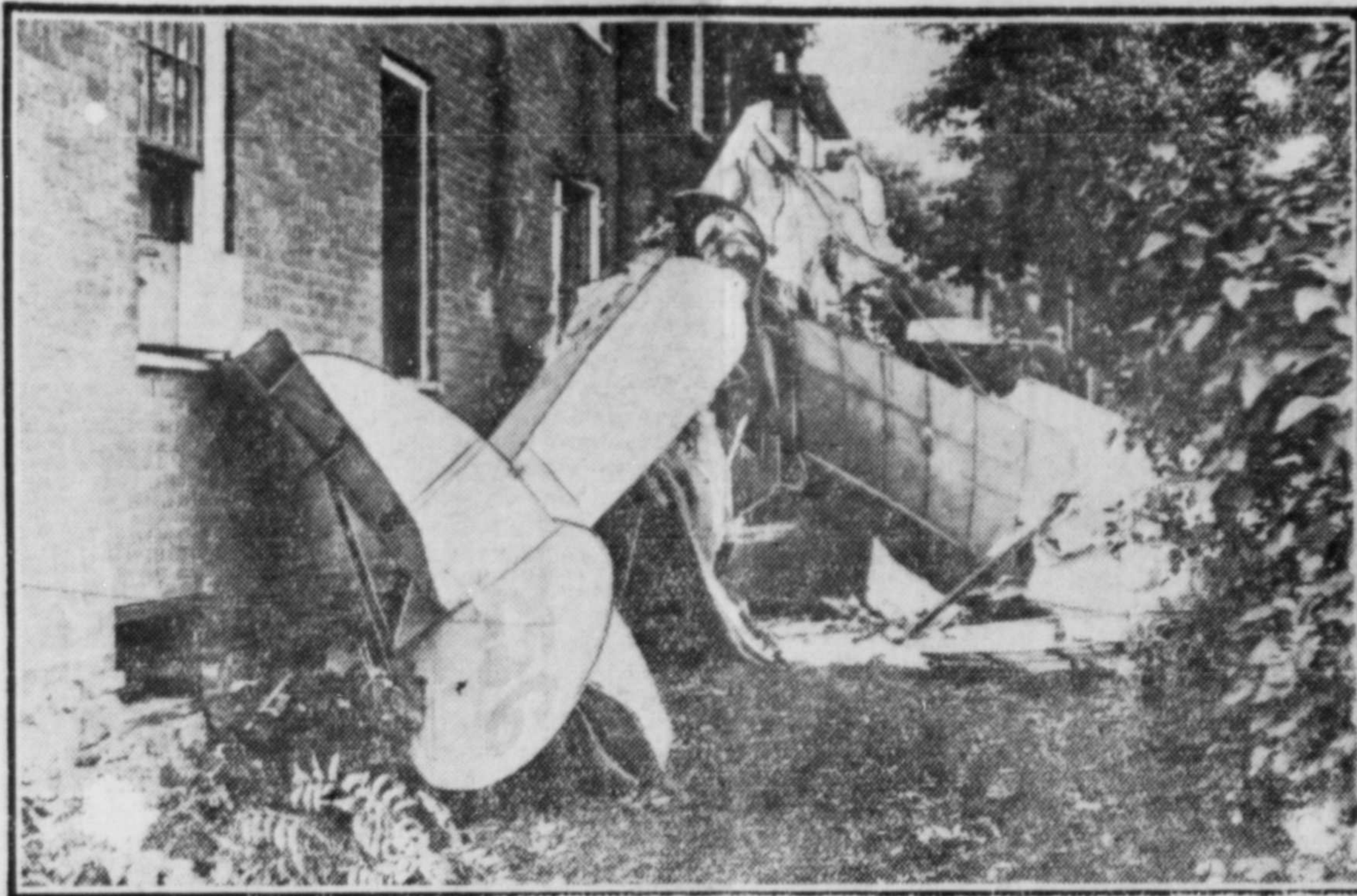
Felicitations Exchanged Between  
Heads of Imperial and B.C.

BANFF SPRINGS, Alberta, Aug. 11.—Acting Premier J. D. MacLean of British Columbia has sent a telegram to Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Premier of Great Britain, expressing his regret that pressure of public business prevented his going to Banff to personally convey the greetings of the Pacific Coast province. Premier Baldwin, replying, sent "grateful thanks for your kind message" and also expressed regret that lack of time prevented his going to the coast. Mr. Baldwin expressed the desire that he might some time see more of the province's scenery and industries.

#### OVERSEER IN PLANE CRASH

Major MacLaren's Flying Boat  
Made Forced Landing Recently  
When Engine Was Wrecked

SOCKEYE FISHING  
Increase in Boats Rather Than  
Shortage of Fish Held Responsible  
for Poorer Conditions

D. S. Cameron, fisheries overseer for the central division, who was in town today, figured about two weeks ago in a crash near Butedale of Major D. L. MacLaren's flying boat which is now engaged in patrol of the fisheries in that region.

The connecting rod of the engine broke and the Liberty motor was completely wrecked, a forced landing being made about two miles from Butedale. A fishing boat, which was nearby, put a line on the plane and towed it into Butedale.

The machine was out of commission for a few days until a new engine was brought from Vancouver. Aboard the ship were Major MacLaren, Mr. Cameron and H. Davenport, mechanic.

The plane is proving of great value in the fisheries patrol. In it Overseer Cameron has, during the past few weeks, completely covered his district several times. The machine is making its headquarters for the time being at Swanson Bay.

According to Mr. Cameron, sockeye salmon have been just as plentiful this season as they were last. Assertions that fishing conditions are not as good this year, Mr. Cameron explains through the fact that many more boats are engaged in the industry at this time and the average per boat is thus smaller than before. Some canneries are reported to have packed even more sockeye than they did last year. The run of pinks is, however, later this year in starting and the delay has caused some perturbation.

OSWOSHO, Mich., Aug. 11.—James Oliver Curwood, well known American author, is critically ill at his home here from an infection. It was reported by attending physicians that the author has been ill for several months from an infection which followed an insect bite received on an outing trip.

Curwood is the author of a number of outdoor stories, the Canadian North woods and Alaska being frequent settings.

#### BALDWIN GOES ACROSS BORDER

Visits British Columbia Today  
and Sees Fine Elk When  
Walking

BANFF, Aug. 11.—Premier Baldwin visits British Columbia today. He will motor to Lake Louise across the Great Divide to Field, returning to Banff tonight.

While walking at Banff a fine elk straggled across the Premier's path. Hon. Dr. King arrived here to meet Mr. Baldwin and welcome him to B.C.

The Rotary Club at its luncheon this afternoon at the Commodore Club was entertained by the Westholme Orchestra. Several visitors were present.

#### Respite of Eleven Days Given Three Convicted Murderers by Governor of Massachusetts

BOSTON, August 11.—A respite to and including August 22 for the condemned men Sacco and Vanzetti and Celestino Madeiros was granted by Governor Fuller and the executive council last night.

The Governor's statement accompanying the announcement says in part: "The courts of the commonwealth are actively engaged in the work of considering and deciding various motions and citations filed by counsel in these cases. The courts themselves have no power of respite. To afford the courts the opportunity to complete consideration of the proceedings now pending and to render their decision thereon, I have recommended the executive council that the sentences of Sacco, Vanzetti and Madeiros be respited today."

Judge Sanderson of the Supreme Court announced today that he would allow a bill of exceptions to go before the full bench of his denial of a writ of error in the case.

DEMONSTRATIONS OVERSEAS  
LONDON, Aug. 11.—All was quiet this morning after an exciting night during which the police, riding four abreast, had to charge a Sacco-Vanzetti demonstration. Scores were injured and bruised in disorders which took place in front of the American embassy.

BERNE, Switzerland, Aug. 11.—A bomb exploded in a telephone booth here last night, injuring fifteen, one gravely. The station was left a mass of ruins. The police have no clue but they attribute the bombing to Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers. There were hours of strike earlier in the day.

#### DAMAGE TO SEINE BOAT

Azurite Struck Rock in Eddy Pass  
Yesterday Afternoon and is  
Badly Shaken up

Badly shaken and leaking, the well-known local seineboat Azurite, Capt. Ole Skog, arrived in port last night in a sinking condition under tow of the Anna S., Capt. Elias Skog. The vessel had run on Ettrick Rock in Eddy Pass, hitting aft at her deepest part. The boat was on its way out to the seining grounds and the Anna S. was running alongside so immediately gave aid and brought the damaged craft into port.

The Azurite is now at the dry dock where it is known that a broken stern shaft is part of damage which may be extensive.

The accident occurred yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock and it was last night about 8 when the boats arrived in port.

#### TIMBER WELL AHEAD LAST YEAR SO FAR

Total Amount of Logs Scaled This  
Season is 71,495,265 Board  
Feet

MANY POLES MEASURED  
Piles and Ties Also Greater Num-  
bers Than up to End of July,  
1926

The log scale for the month of July was about seven million board feet more than for the same month last year and the total for the year so far is over twelve million board feet ahead of the first seven months of 1926. There was also a greater cut of poles, piles and ties in the Prince Rupert forestry district than last year at the same date.

The total cut of logs so far since January 1 is 71,495,265 board feet, of poles 573,273 lineal feet, of piles 384,000 lineal feet and of ties 441,289. Details of the scale for the month of July follows:

INFLUENCE OF WEATHER

The influence of weather on people is very great. During bright weather people tend to be exhilarated and happy and in dull weather they become languid and gloomy.

As it is at present impossible to control the weather, the next best thing is to control ourselves and nullify the influence. This can be done by making ourselves superior to weather conditions.

There are people who under those conditions take to drinking intoxicating liquors and the result is temporarily beneficial in some cases but the best method is to refuse to be influenced by exterior forces and to control our own destinies. We may possibly counteract the weather influence by arranging to visit friends or having them visit us. We may enjoy music, go to the theatre, attend some function, or get an interesting book. The main thing is to refuse to be blue when weather conditions begin to show their influence.

Some people are too hasty. Others deliberate when they should be taking action. No rule holds good for all cases.

FLUCTUATION OF STOCK PRICES

The recent slump in the price of Dunwell mine shares is one of the periodic fluctuations that are common on the stock market and that give scope to those who gamble in stocks to get in their work. Often these fluctuations are brought about through the circulation of rumors and may be the result of not dealing openly and fairly with the public.

In regard to this particular case we have no information except what is contained in the despatches coming through. From them we gather either that full information was not given the investors or, what is just about as bad, the investors thought they did not have full information.

In carrying on business in connection with public corporations, it is wise always to deal openly and frankly with the public and to avoid any appearance of being secretive.

A lame excuse won't carry you very far in this country.

UNWARRANTED PUBLICITY

Unwarranted publicity has been given the two men Sacco and Vanzetti, largely because there has been so little of interest in the world that the public are ready to seize upon anything from which they may get a thrill. Had there been a big strike, a war, or even a presidential election going on, these two men would have been forgotten. As it is their case came up at a time when a sensation was needed and they provided it. They really deserved to get off because of their service to the public in providing them something to think about and being a fit subject on which to expend their emotions.

People who want to get a kick out of everything, will eventually find themselves kicked out of existence.

SWIMMING RECORDS

In Alaskan waters some of the young people have been making swimming records and now in Prince Rupert we see a beginning of the effort to popularize the sport. At the Salt Lakes this year the long spell of warm weather made it possible for swimmers to attend regularly and improve their condition and now comes Douglas Frizzell and does some rather good swimming in the harbor. We congratulate him on the record he made. While it is rather difficult to estimate the distance covered by him and while the tides are always a factor, still it was in a small way an endurance test that was very creditable. Possibly there will be others following it up who will do even better.

Bringing up parents still continues as one of the chief problems agitating the younger generation.

Stirring Address by Prince Rupert's Member on Subject of Liberalism and Progress

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Declares That Government of Which he is Member Has Administered Affairs of British Columbia Well

VICTORIA, August 11.—While the Liberal Government has been building up British Columbia's prosperity on the solid basis of accomplishment, Conservative party leaders are talking about greater development without a single suggestion as to how this may be achieved. Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, declared in a spirited address before Saanich Liberals.

He challenged Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Conservative leader, to advance some plan for industrial progress which the present government had not already put into effect with beneficial results.

"We are all sorry that we have not with us today our great leader, Hon. John Oliver," Mr. Pattullo said. "We exceedingly regret his illness, and we are sincerely hoping and praying that he may recover his former health. His great brain, his great courage and his great energy have been in the service of this province for a generation, and during the past ten years of the war period and the post-war period, he has been leader of the government of British Columbia. All the people of British Columbia greatly honor him.

"It is well that in all parts of the country the banner of Liberalism should be kept flying, not as a challenge to those who may not ally themselves with us, but as a signal to all people that within its folds lie liberty, equality and fraternity. We must not forget, nor allow anyone else to forget, that Liberalism is not mere partyism. Liberalism gradually evolved until it is not only the bulwark against oppression and special privilege, but is a vitalizing force in constructive development.

FOR MASSES

"Liberalism is essentially a principle for the guidance of the masses of the people. It knows no race or creed. There is room for every opinion within its ranks. It is fundamentally bound up with the welfare of all the people. Those who care to definitely ally themselves with the Liberal party may do so with pride. The traditions, aims and aspirations of Liberalism have always been uplifting.

"In the fight to maintain its principles, Liberalism must be militant. It must be ever on the alert. Forces are constantly at work to vitiate its principles. It is a matter of great gratification that the Liberal party of Canada has lived true to the traditions and principles of Liberalism.

A BOLD GOVERNMENT

"In this province of British Columbia you have a Liberal Government. I am so bold as to say that no country, province or state has ever had a government that has striven more earnestly, both by its policies and administration, to so conduct the public business as to insure the greatest possible benefit to the people, both individually and collectively; and I venture the opinion also, that no government has succeeded in greater degree in carrying out its aims and aspirations than has the present provincial government. We are leading all the provinces of Canada in the matter of our social legislation—looking to the happiness, comfort, and well-being of all our people—while in the development of our resources we are in the very forefront. During the last ten years every field of activity, whether it be timber, agriculture, mining, fishing or manufacturing, has doubled, trebled and quadrupled.

CONSERVATIVE PROPAGANDA

"I notice that our friends, the Conservatives, use occasions of this kind to criticize the Liberal government. They are loud in their lamentations as to the condition of affairs, and are almost pitiful in their attempts to lead the people to believe that all that is necessary to waft this province into a wonderful and greater affluence is to put into office some of the hungry office-seekers who are bemoaning their present fate.

ANSWERS TOLMIE

"The new leader of the Conservative party, the Hon. Dr. Tolmie, has coined a few trite phrases, such as 'We want more smok-stacks.' 'Keep your dollar at home and get another chance at it,' and such like. 'In order,' he states, 'that we may keep our boys and girls in Canada.' I would like to point out that the Honorable Doctor was a member of the Borden-Meighan administration, which was in office for ten years in Canada, during which time 750,000 Canadians left for the United States.

"What is the wonderful panacea that the doctor has in store to cure all the ills of the body politic? Why did he not apply the remedy when he had the opportunity, and keep the 750,000 Canadians at home? Instead of indulging in meaningless generalities, why not come out flatfooted and give us the benefit of some specific advice? We will listen to advice from anyone, and if we think it good advice, we will follow it. Dr. Tolmie says that he does not want any advice from Liberals. That is just the difference between Toryism and Liberalism.

"The truth of it is that what the Conservative party is trying to do is, by constant reiteration, to undermine the confidence of the people in the present administration, and to lead them to believe that by some means not disclosed, a more wonderful development will be brought about, under Tory administration, than now exists.

STAND ON RESULTS

"The Liberal government can stand upon the rock of accomplishment during the past eleven years of office. It is guided by men of experience, who are thoroughly familiar with the province from one end to the other. Problems that are still with us, such as the Pac-

fic Great Eastern, are well in hand, and there is no doubt that an ultimate solution will be found at a reasonably early date.

"The best way to judge the future is by the past. We know what the Conservative administration was prior to our coming into office, and we know what the administration of the past eleven years has been. Members of the Conservative party do not like reference made to past events under Conservative administration, but from what I have seen, I am very much of opinion that the Conservative party has not as capable men today as it had during the time of the Conservative administration preceding ours.

"Within the next two years the provincial administration will be called upon to go before the electorate of the province. Whenever it may be we shall be ready. He is thrice armed who hath his quarrel just." Conscious of the integrity of our intentions and of our earnest endeavor in their practical application, we may well exclaim with Fitz-James:

"Come one, come all,  
This rock shall fly  
From its firm base  
As soon as I."

ARMY CONGRESS TO BE HELD AT PORT ESSINGTON SOON

R. Lieut. Colonel J. S. McLean of Vancouver, territorial revivalist of the Salvation Army for Western Canada, will arrive in the city on the Prince George tomorrow morning from the south and, after conducting a special meeting in the local Citadel tomorrow evening when presentations will be made in connection with various branches of the Army, will proceed to Port Essington to take charge of the annual congress of native workers at which representatives of all corps in Northern British Columbia will foregather for meetings on Saturday and Sunday.

Major W. L. Carruthers of Wrangell, divisional commander for Alaska and Northern British Columbia, will also attend the congress.

INTERNATIONAL WORK NEAR CAPE MUZON

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 11.—Colonel E. Lester Jones, director of the United States coast and geodetic survey, department of commerce, under Secretary Hoover, will arrive in Ketchikan Monday on the steamship Yukon accompanied by a Canadian official of the marine department. The purpose of the trip is to take up the matter of an international survey in the vicinity of Cape Muzon.

The coast survey boat Explorer, now in Rocky pass or Kekeu strait, will arrive here to pick up the officials and take them to their destination.

This will be the first visit of Colonel Jones to Alaska in several years. The international work to be undertaken is considered important to the aid of navigators in Alaska and British Columbia waters.

DOMINION CROP THIS SEASON IS LARGE SAYS BUREAU OF STATISTICS

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—The crop report of the Dominion bureau of statistics based on the condition of all field crops up to July 31 states that the crop conditions in Canada are excellent. Spring wheat was numerically expressed as 105 per cent of the ten year average. In British Columbia all crops are well above the average.

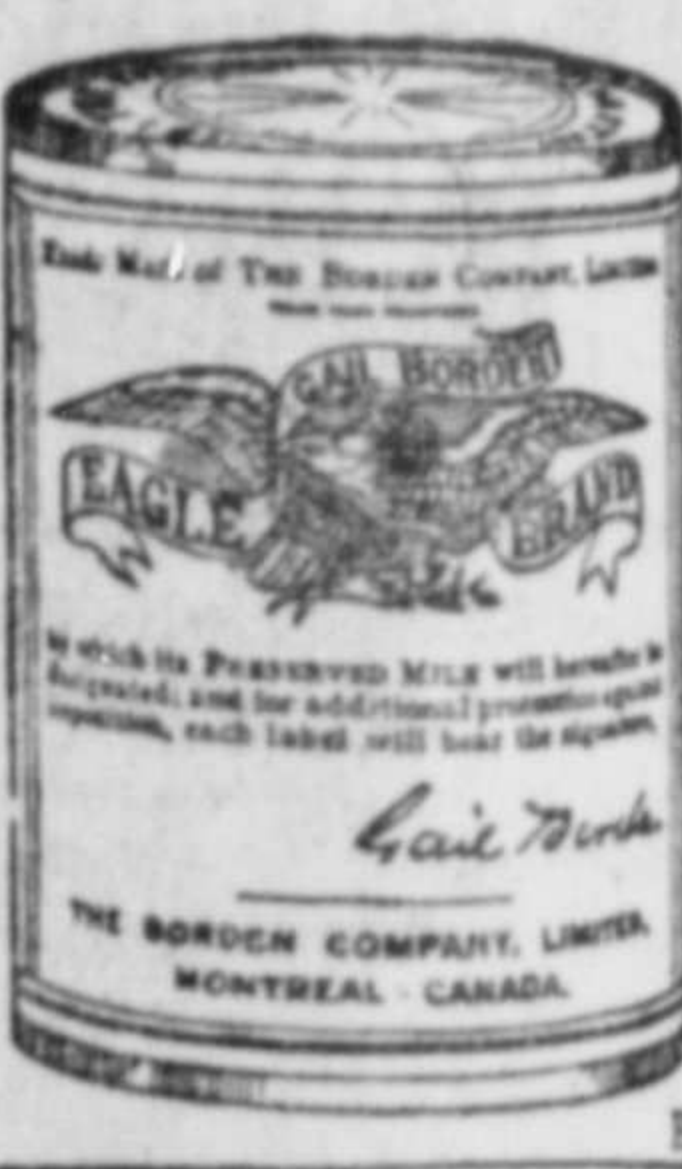

**TURKISH WIVES CHEAP LABOR**

Few Homes Have More Than One Mate for the Man

ANGORA, Aug. 11.—The once polygamous Turkish peasant is going to lose money by having fewer wives under Kemal Pasha's modernized standard of marriage and morals. The adage that "two can live more cheaply than one," is perhaps true only in the land of the Turks.

Peasant wives, even the men agree, do more work than the men. They do the housework, and the farm work and anything else. They get the small cup of strong, black, sugary coffee for their lord by the time he gets up shortly before sunrise, they out-labor him in the fields, serve him at dinner and altogether put in more and harder hours, each day than he does.

Wives, in a word, are cheap labor for the Turkish peasant. Those who have a good supply may keep them under the new laws but the code says there may be no more polygamous marriages.

Each of these wives, even in peasant poverty, is supposed to have her own

**MUCH TUBERCULOSIS AND MALARIA NOW IN RUSSIA; OTHERS LESS**

Four Million Cases of Malaria Estimated in Soviet Republic Today

LENINGRAD, Aug. 11.—Malaria, tuberculosis and trachoma are ravishing Soviet Russia, it is stated by Dr. W. Horsley Gantt, a young physician from the United States, who has just completed an exhaustive two-volume work on health and sanitary conditions in Russia.

Dr. Gantt says there are more than 4,000,000 cases of malaria at present within the Soviet Union, which is four times the number before the war. The number of persons affected with tuberculosis runs into the millions, and the disease is steadily increasing. More than half a million Russians are suffering from trachoma, Dr. Gantt finds.

On the other hand, certain other diseases which were very prevalent before the revolution, now show a distinct decrease, says the doctor, due to superior methods of prevention and hygiene. These include smallpox, typhus, cholera and influenza. Infant mortality has decreased to a point where there are only 177 deaths in every thousand births.


