LONDON, April 4 .- Protests from foreign governments over the recent Nanking outrages and demands for reparations will, it is expected, be lodged with the Cantonese government within a few days it was announced in Downing Street today. Diplomatic exchanges between London, Washington, and Tokio continued over the week-end without a hitch but it remains uncertain, however. whether the demands will be made jointly or in identical but separate notes by the three powers. There is also some difference of opinion as to whom the notes should be addressed but it is likeliest that the recipient will be Eugene Chen, Cantonese foreign minister.

## Outlook Encouraging for Troublous Country Says Lady from There

MISS SUSIE HADDOCK GIVES INTERESTING IMPRESSIONS OF REMOTE FIELD WHERE SHE HAS WORKED FOR THIRTEEN YEARS

That the situation in China today is not one of disaster and despair, but is rather pervaded with signs of hopefulness and future well being is the opinion of Miss Susie Haddock, missionary nurse, who arrived in the city at the end of the week on an enforced furlough from Tzeliutsing in Szechuan province, 2,000 miles up the Yangste River from Shanghai in West China, where, as superintendent of a United Church Hospital, she has been stationed for the past thirteen years except for one furlough of a year and a half o Canada during that time. Miss Haddock, in an interview with

a representative of the Daily News yesterday afternoon, gave some refreshing and interesting general impressions of conditions in China as well as in respect to present day afrairs in that seemingly war-r.dden country.

Admitting that the Bolshevik influence from Russia and the wars that have been going on between the different Chinese leaders and factions may have played a part in bringing about a difficult situation. Miss Haddock sees, however, as the outstanding factor in affairs and happenings of today the natural desire for national expression of people who have long been under more or less foreign dominance and control. ## BURNED DOWN

GREAT EXCITEMENT AT ATHLETIC PARK IN VANCOUVER ON SATUR-DAY AFTERNOON

\$50,000 LOSS

BLAZE CAUSED BY CARELESSNESS OF SPECTATOR AT FOOTBALL GAME

VANCOUVER, April 4.-Fire breaking out beneath the grandstand of Athletic Park where two thousand spectators were watching a football game completely destroyed the wooden structure on Saturday afternoon, the loss being estimated at \$50,000.

When the smoke was first seen issuing forth, the referee stopped the game .. but after a minute's pause, the players continued the struggle while the fans escaped safely. The heat from the burning stand finally forced the players from the field.

Hundreds of automobile owners rushing away their cars which had been parked nearby, confusion ensued as their attempt to leave the neighborhood was hampered by the approach of fire fighting equipment. The park is situated just east of the south end of Granville Street bridge and that main artery across False Creek to and from the downtown district was closed to traffic for nearly two hours.
