That this marked a substantial reduction from 1922, when the deficit reached its peak of \$487,383, is due to the careful policy of the manager, T G. Kilpatriek.

OUTLOOK FOR ROAD IS DARK.

The outlook for the P.G.E. is dark. Its future in competition with the Canadian National, even if it were pushed northward into the Peace River country, is doubtful. Its prospects financially in serving the great fertile district through which it runs are not bright, owing to the sparse population and the slow progress of settlement. The situation is certainly a most unhappy one. "It is," as Premier Oliver himself said, "more serious today than it has been from the time of the inception of the undertaking."

NEBRASKA APPARITION MAKES AN-NUAL VISIT, MUCH TO CON-STERNATION OF NATIVES

The Screaming Ghost of Blackbird Hill, near Winnedago, Neb., tribal apparition of the Omaha and Winnebago Indians, which for more than half century has not failed to wander around and do a lot of screaming on Blackbird Hill on the night of October 17 last, has paid its annual visit, and more than 1,000 Indians as well as a number of white folk, are greatly excited over the akair.

Watching for the ghost has become an institution on the reservation as well as in the surrounding towns, and regardless of wind, rain and weather, hundreds of both reds and whites grab their coffee pots and picnic baskets on the anniversary and go out to Blackbird Hill to hear the screams and see

The screams last for five minutes, they say, but the sights are extremely short-sometimes there being no "sight" at all, but the screams are always

The permanent officials of the newly formed Ministry of the "Corporazioni" agreed with "the view taken by the board of control of the newspaper trade syndicate that newspapermen, such as editors, reporters, critics and editorial writers went into the same category as the pressmen and linotype operators.

The newspapermen were up in arms at once. The decision made little practical difference to their interests, for the "corporazione" which would protect their rights and fix their rates of pay was the same as that which was created to safeguard and incorporate the interest of the manual press workers. The journalists' pride was hurt, however. They insisted on being placed in the category of "intellectuals." An appeal was made, which in due course reached Premier Mussolini, who beside running six other ministries, is also the head of the new minis-

Mussolini, as an old journalist, decided in favor of his one-time colleagues, who have since been included in the "corporazione" of "Intellectual Workers."

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age. and by aliens on declaring intention become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occapation, .nd improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge ty addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5.000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed. forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres. may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed. LEASES
