

Great crevices, designed to sacrifice the two parishes, will be opened by government engineers tomorrow.

F. A. KERR OF GEOLOGICAL SURVEY WRITES IN GOVERNMENT BULLETIN

It has long been known that a fairly broad area along the eastern contact of the Coast Range Batholith in British Columbia is geologically favorable for the occurrence of mineral deposits. This has been amply borne out by the discovery of many valuable ore deposits in areas adjacent to Portland Canal. Alice Arm, Atlin Lake, and at other points farther north and south. One of the serious chstacles to the development of the mineral resources east of the Coast Range has been a decided lack of economical transportation. At only a few places where the range is cut by long arms of the sea or great rivers, or traversed by railways, has it been feasible to develop mineral deposits profitably. This absence of transportation facilities combined with the physical character of the country has tended to discourage prospecting in areas which otherwise present considerable possibilities of reward. The Stikine River, though it has formed a highway of entry to the placer gold fields of the Cassiar for fifty-two years, has so far failed to be a means of developing that section of the zone long the contact through which it

During the Cassiar and Klondike gold rushes this area was probably tested extensively for glacer gold. The bars of the Stikine Rivers itself and of the Clearwater, a tributary which, rising to discovered and developed to a small extent. These deposits support the belief that this section of the contact zone may prove as rich as others which have already demonstrated their great worth. been done but on the whole the area is almost untouched. Between Portland Canal and Atlin, two of British Columbia's rich mining camps, lies a virgin territory nearly three hundred miles long and of undetermined width which offers possibilities of producing camps climate. 

ROYAL COMMISSION, INVESTIGAT. ING ILLEGAL FISHING, TELLS OF PROBE

Illegal fishing of salmon has in some instances been proven, according to David McKenzie, Vancouver barrister. who has been conducting a royal commission along the coast for the past few weeks into the matter and who is now in the city on his way south. One fishery overseer has been charged with accepting a bribe and his case will come up soon for hearing while other matters will be further probed at the concluding session of the commision which well be held in Vancouver next Monday. The fishermen quite freely gave testimony, says Mr. McKenzie, and frankly admitted irregularities in some instances.

Referring to the fishing industry in district Number Two, which comprises the northern part of the province, the commissioner said it was a great natural resource which must be conserved otherwise the supply would be depleted
