### Gorilla Man Identified Positively as Killer of Women at Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, June 17.—The "Gorilla Man" arrested at Killarney is positively identified by seventeen persons here as "The Strangler" who put to death Mrs. Patterson and Lola Cowan and who made a sensational escape before he was recaptured and brought here.

The man says he was born in San Francisco thirty years ago. He is of English-Spanish parentage.

### OBJECTION TO THIRD DEGREE SANKEY CASE

#### SUPREME COURT OF CANADA CRITICIZES PROOF OF GETTING CONFESSION FROM PRISONER

OTTAWA, June 17.—The Supreme Court of Canada set its stamp of disapproval on any police methods in Canada favoring of the Third Degree. In a formal judgment ordering a new trial for Sankey, convicted at Prince Rupert for murder, Chief Justice Anglin said in part:

"We feel, however, that we should not part from this case without expressing the view that proof of the voluntary character of the accused's statement to the police which was put in evidence against him is most unsatisfactory. That the statement put in writing by the police officer was obtained only on the fourth questioning to which the accused was subjected on the day following his arrest. Three attempts to lead him to 'talk' had apparently failed, why, we are left to surmise. Accused, who is a young Indian, could neither read nor write. No particulars were given as to what transpired at any of the three previous 'interviews,' and but meagre details of the process by which the written statement was ultimately signed by appellant was obtained."

### LINDBERGH OFF TO ST. LOUIS

#### GREAT RECEPTION AWAITS HIM ON HIS ARRIVAL IN HIS FAMOUS PLANE

NEW YORK, June 17.—Captain Charles Lindbergh hopped off this morning for St. Louis in his plane, "The Spirit of St. Louis," which carried him to New York and Paris. He has had four days of unprecedented receptions here and a great welcome awaits him in St. Louis.

SPOKANE, June 17.—A lone robber held up two girl employees of the Citizens Savings and Loan Society within a block of the police station and escaped with all the money on the counter amounting to \$700.

### BALL STRUGGLE STILL UNABATED

#### PITTSBURG AND CHICAGO WIN IN NATIONAL LEAGUE AND NEW YORK AND CHICAGO IN AMERICA

NEW YORK, June 17.—The race between Pittsburgh Pirates and Chicago Cubs for National League supremacy was unchanged as a result of yesterday's games. Both went one up in the standing while St. Louis, also active in the contest, fell one behind Cincinnati, the cellar dwellers, continued a rather consistent winning streak of late by defeating Brooklyn.

In the American League, the leading New York Yankees and Chicago White Sox were both victorious. Detroit Tigers defeated Washington Senators and advanced to fifth place while Boston defeated Cleveland.

With the season's record of twelve straight victories to their credit, Joe McCarthy's Chicago Cubs today are being counted in on the National League pennant party. Philadelphia yesterday was the 7-2 victim of its former teammate, Carlson, who came to the Cubs recently in a trade.

Rogers Hornsby helped to bring the Giants out of their losing streak at St. Louis by clouting out four hits in as many times at bat, one of them being a homer.

### WOULD REVIVE THE RED CROSS

#### ORGANIZER HERE WITH AIM OF REVIVING THE ORGANIZATION IN THIS CITY

In an effort to resuscitate the Red Cross Society of this city, J. R. Seymour of Vancouver is here today interviewing former Red Cross workers. He plans to call a meeting in the near future.

Mr. Seymour says that the Red Cross was formerly only a war organization but now it is realized that the peace work is just as important. They take care of crippled and deformed children and establish nursing stations to take care of lone women in the outlying parts of the country where hospitals and nursing homes are not available. They have taken care of 900 deformed and crippled children in their homes at Calgary and Regina and so far over 700 mothers have been helped over the period of child bearing entirely free of cost.

There is also the danger of further wars, Mr. Seymour points out, and it is desirable that everything should be in readiness.

### FIREMEN SCORCHED IN MONTREAL FIRE

MONTREAL, June 27.—Six firemen were scorched and overcome by smoke when fire swept through the upper floors of the customs express department of the old examining warehouse here. The loss is estimated at \$200,000.

### Noted American Authors Here in Handsome Yachts Looking for Material for Their Books

Stewart Edward White, noted American author, heads an expedition of well known San Francisco literary men who arrived in port aboard two handsome power cruisers at 4:30 yesterday afternoon and will leave tomorrow in the course of a holiday cruise to Alaskan waters. On board the former's brand new and commodious yacht Simba are Mr. and Mrs. White and Mr. and Mrs. Leland W. Peck, the latter also a writer and formerly editor of the Sunset Magazine. Mr. and Mrs. Pinkerton and daughter, Barbara, are on their own boat Triton, smaller and of different type but none the less handsome than the Simba. The two boats have been coming up the coast by leisurely stages and it is the intention of the owners to visit Ketchikan, Juneau, and probably other points before turning their faces southward.

### GRAIN SEASON CLOSES HERE

#### LOCAL ELEVATOR HAS LOADED 20 BOATS WITH 3,579,878 BUSHELS DURING PAST WINTER

The plant's shipping season closing with the departure at midnight last night of the Japanese steamer Yonai Maru for Vancouver en route to Japan with 176,962 bushels on board, it was announced this morning by Joseph Bennett, superintendent of the Alberta Wheat Pool's Prince Rupert elevator, that twenty ships had loaded through the big house since its opening last fall, taking to the markets of the world a total of 3,579,878 bushels of grain of which all was consigned to the United Kingdom or continent except 396,962 bushels which went to the Orient. All but two of the twenty boats loaded full here and the most of the ships chartered were Japanese although a few were British. The plant worked satisfactorily and the year's work, Mr. Bennett said, was just about what was estimated before the opening of the season.

With practically no grain in the big house now, it will be a slack season at the plant from now on until about the middle of September when the grain will probably start rolling again from the prairies, the movement getting volume in October. The staff of forty men employed during the winter is now cut down to about eighteen.

### CORONACH WINNER HARDWICK STAKES

ASCOT, June 17.—Lord Wollington's Coronach won the Hardwick Stakes today and Lord Beaverbrook's Restigouche came in second with S. Tattersall's Pollution third. Coronach was the winner of the Derby last year.

### DIED AT VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, June 17.—Edward Douglas, 79 years of age, a pioneer businessman, president of the Kelly Douglas Company, wholesale grocers, is dead.

### PLANS FLIGHT FROM NORTH

KETCHIKAN, June 17.—A flight alone from Point Barrow, Alaska, to Europe, by way of Greenland, is planned by Captain George Wilkins, the Arctic explorer declared here when en route to San Francisco from Fairbanks.

### Power Consumption Constantly on the Increase States Head of City Utilities Department

During the last two weeks there has been a maximum load on the city electric plant of 1600 kilowatts and it is anticipated that there will be a large increase in the load before the end of the year. That was among the information given to the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday by J. J. Little, superintendent of utilities in an interesting address on the work of his department.

Mr. Little said that with the drydock plant they ought to be able to care for all increases during the next two or three years, even if another elevator and another cold storage plant should be added. If an extra unit were added, over to a private company, in opening his address, Mr. Little said he had been connected with the plant since its inception in 1910. For the benefit of those who were strangers here he would say that the light, power, telephone and water were municipally owned in Prince Rupert. The light and power was the most important of these. The first plant put in was of 100 (continued on page two)

### Mining in Interior is Very Important and on Increase Says McGill

#### SMITHERS LAWYER AND MINING MAN TELLS OF DEVELOPMENTS AT PRESENT BEING UNDERTAKEN IN BULKLEY VALLEY

Mining development in the interior is in far better condition right now than it has ever been in the past. During the last six months nearly every mining enterprise from Hazelton to Burns Lake which has expended any money at all in the development of its showings has been rewarded by results surpassing the fondest expectations, according to L. S. McGill of Smithers, president of the Chamber of Mines for Omineca District, who was in Prince Rupert yesterday on being asked as to mining development.

At Hazelton the Harr's Bros. under the able direction of W. S. ("Duke") Harr's are active in the opening up of a number of properties including the Silver Cup and Sunrise. They report favorable progress in their work and that sufficient capital has been secured for the season's program.

Near Smithers, the Duthie Mine has just completed the installation of the new fifty-ton oil flotation mill put in by Mr. Duthie to enable him to broaden out the program carried out with such conspicuous success in the past. Mr. Duthie himself has been at the mine for the opening of the mill operation and it is now being used.

**NEW PROPERTY**  
The Glacier Gulch Group, close under the Kathlyn Glacier on Hudson Bay Mountain, and only 2½ miles from Lake Kathlyn Station, has been opened up this spring by the owners—Grover Lovell and Stuart F. Campbell of Smithers—and they are doing further work. This is a new property and it has impressed all who have seen it by the fine galena and zinc ore showings and also by the ease with which it can be got to the railway.

Another Hudson Bay Mountain property close to Smithers which is being developed just now is the Jessie Group, of which Mr. McGill is the principal owner himself. It is a comparatively little known group and this spring is the (continued on page two)

In Saskatchewan it was announced some days ago that fifty per cent of the farmers had again signed their contracts, even before the big simultaneous drive commenced on Wednesday.

### FOUND BODY OF HUSBAND

#### Wife of Harold Marling Found Him With Revolver Clutched in Hand

VANCOUVER, June 17.—The dead body of Harold Marling was found by his wife in a clump of bushes in the garden of their home in Point Grey with a bullet wound in his body and a revolver clutched in his hand. Marling had been under medical treatment.

### URGES JUSTICE FOR OFFENDERS

#### CHAIRMAN OF ANTI-CRIME CONFERENCE SAYS CRIMINALS ARE THAT FROM PURE CUSSEDNESS

NELSON, June 17.—Asserting that the overwhelming proportion of criminals who committed crimes did so because of "pure cursedness" and not because they were defective, Luke May, chairman of the international anti-crime conference being held here, advocated in his presidential address sure and speedy justice as a crime deterrent.

### LITTLE THEATRE MOVEMENT

Amateur theatrical societies have been in existence a long time, but it is only about fifteen years ago that the first experimental amateur producing groups were established in Canada. The movement grew slowly and was seriously interrupted by the war. Suddenly a real public interest developed, probably the principal reason was the dominance of the "movies" and the virtual death of touring companies. Now all over this country there are hundreds of amateur producing organizations of many different kinds, groups in colleges, schools, and churches. Their name is legion, and their methods of organization, their strength, their equipment, the quality of their productions vary exceedingly.

Hart House Theatre, Toronto, the Ottawa Drama League, the Vancouver Little Theatre Association and the Winnipeg Community Players are at present the four best known groups in Canada. They own their own theatres, and Toronto and Ottawa both employ professional directors.

No citizens of Toronto ever think of Hart House Theatre without associating with it the name of Vincent Massey. Not only has Canada's minister to the United States given very generously to our country's most perfectly equipped Little Theatre, but he has also acted with considerable success in some of the major productions. Hart House Theatre is on the University of Toronto grounds, but its charter gives it practically complete freedom of action and it is liberally patronized by the general public as well as the University students.

The Ottawa Drama League, which has grown from a small reading circle of fifty-two in 1913 to a producing group with one thousand five hundred and two members in 1927, is numerically the largest Little Theatre group in Canada. Duncan Campbell Scott, Deputy Superintendent General of the Department of Indian Affairs, and well known Canadian poet, is the active president, and Rupert Caplan, formerly prominently associated with the Community Players of Montreal is the producer. Among the various authors whose plays have been presented by the League are the following Canadians: Mao de la Roche, Merrill Dennison, Donald Guthrie, Stephen Leacock, Marion Osborne, Lloyd Roberts and Duncan Campbell Scott.

### VANCOUVER'S PART IN THEATRICALS

The Vancouver Little Theatre Association, though only in existence since 1921, has already gained quite a reputation on the Pacific Coast for its artistic productions and its strict adherence to the four main objects of the association which are: (1) To promote the study of the drama; (2) to produce high-class plays by British and foreign dramatists not ordinarily given by travelling companies; (3) to encourage and provide facilities for the production of plays by Canadian dramatists; (4) to develop the arts of costume scenic design and stage lighting.

The Winnipeg Players made a very wise move when they added "Community" to their title. They have lived up to the true meaning of the word in its fullest sense and their public realize that in the Community Theatre they have an outlet for whatever artistic abilities they may possess.

### PRINCE RUPERT ORGANIZATION

In Prince Rupert the little theatre movement has commenced in the organization of the Prince Rupert Players' Club. This organization, thanks largely to the expert work of Alex. Connon, who is himself a finished actor, has done wonders in the few years it has been organized. Plays have been put on here that would put to shame many professional organizations. The club has had the support of the people of the city, who have recognized the uniformly good work done, and it is the general hope of the citizens that its activities will be continued.

There is no doubt that general interest in the Little Theatre movement will increase in the years to come. The wave is not yet at its height. Interesting experimentation will go on throughout Canada, and doubtless some significant contributions will be made to the theatre arts.

### MINING IN INTERIOR IS VERY IMPORTANT AND ON INCREASE SAYS MCGILL

first time that any extensive development has been done upon it. The chief vein so far exposed has been developed a length of 350 feet by surface stripping and open cuts and it now shows good ore throughout the entire length. Arsenopyrite carrying gold values and also galena and zinc-blende are the minerals found, and the width of mineralization is from 2 1/2 to 7 feet. Another vein of smaller size but higher grade shows 6 to 18 inches of high-grade ore and is opened up on the surface for over 200 feet. Douglas Lay, Resident Mining Engineer for the district, made an examination of this group only last Saturday and following upon his examination the program of development is being extended.

#### BABINE DISTRICT

The Little Joe property in the Babine Range has been taken under option by Vancouver capital from Martin Cain and Thos. King, prospector-owners, both of Smithers, and it is expected that development will start as soon as weather conditions warrant. This is one of the best known high-grade properties in that district. Another Babine property showing up well under recent work is the Harvey Group, a high-grade silver-copper prospect only twelve miles from Smithers.

#### TOPELY DISTRICT

The Topley District has been the centre of attention for the mining men of the continent ever since last summer. The sensational find near there, made by Frank H. Taylor in June of last year and now known as the Richfield Mine, showing far better than anyone at first imagined. Since they took the option in December last the Standard Silver Lead Mining Co. has expended some \$50,000 in opening up the property and are now so well pleased with the progress made that they are installing better machinery so that greater depth may be attained. Present workings are at the 100 foot level below the surface. It is now proposed to sink a shaft to the 300 foot level and then explore the ore body there. In all of the work so far done the drifting and cross-cutting at the 100 foot level has not reached the outside walls of the deposit, which was exposed at the surface for 288 feet in width. High grade ore to the value of \$300 and \$400 per ton was encountered in some of this work, while the general result has been to prove the ore body richer on this level than at the surface.

The other outstanding property at Topley is that of the Topley Consolidated Mining Co., a new organization started by Frank H. Taylor this spring and financed chiefly by Smithers and Vancouver capital. Mr. Taylor is himself in charge of the work, which has been going for two months and great results already obtained. A vein showing up to twenty feet wide on the surface has been traced for 6,000 feet on the company's holdings and is of similar character to that on the Richfield, of which it seems likely to be a continuation. This vein has been opened up by surface stripping and a number of open cuts, and high-grade ore is found at a number of points. Three tunnels are now being driven at different places on it, and one of these cut a body of high-grade ore just a few days ago which, when samples were brought into Smithers last Sunday made all the Smithers people open their eyes in astonishment. They had been expecting large size to the showing but when high-grade was combined with it a most agreeable surprise was given them. Practically every one in Smithers is putting all the money he can spare or borrow into this company and among the directors are E. E. Orchard, the mayor, and L. E. Warner, the president of the board of trade. If Prince Rupert people do not get the benefit of this opportunity to profit through the mineral wealth at their door, they will have no one to blame but themselves.

Other properties being opened up in the Topley District include two by Gale & Litton, one near the Richfield and the other close to Perow Station. The latter is a huge deposit carrying good values. It may be low-grade, but the size will offset this.

In addition to the above many new discoveries are being made from day to day in different parts of the district, and more genuine new prospecting has taken place in the district within this past twelve months than for the ten or twelve years before. Several new companies are investigating different properties this summer and it is hoped that by fall several new operations will be under way.

kilowatts and was used for street lighting. This was followed by several more economical plants. Then came the installation of the hydro-electric, which was put in to help out with the overhead on the water supply. Gradually the demand had grown until the drydock plant with a capacity of 2,000 kilowatts had been added.

#### CHIEF FUNCTION

The chief function of his department was to produce a continuous service at a low cost and that he thought they were doing. The difficulty was that high capacity machines were thrown on the system and that upset their arrangements. They had to provide for this and doing so was where the added expense came in.

Mr. Little explained that the contract with the Cold Storage plant had proved a decided advantage, especially

at the present time when the elevator was shut down. Their plan was to load the Hydro-electric to its capacity and provide the remainder from the dry dock plant. A wholesale rate was given the cold storage plant and this added income had made it possible to avoid a deficit this year. They had thought it might be possible to shut down the drydock plant for a few months but it had proved impossible to do so as the load was constantly climbing and could not be carried by the Shawatians plant.

#### GOOD SURPLUS

Mr. Little went on to show that they were making a good surplus even in the light part of the year. The telephone was also well ahead. In the near future he anticipated there would be a great increase in the load. There was a lot of talk of companies coming and developing the water power at the Estell River but he did not think this would be likely unless some big source

of consumption was in sight. If a pulp mill should be started it would be a good thing for the city as it might provide surplus power for the city.

At the close President Nicholls thanked Mr. Little for his interesting address.

These dishes entice the appetite

# AMALGAMATION STEWART MINES

B.C. SILVER AND PREMIER STILL  
TALK OF MINING WORLD HERE  
AND ELSEWHERE

## FORECAST IN LONDON

A forecast in connection with the Premier Mine and other nearby properties in the Stewart district appears in the Canadian Mining and Financial Review of London, which will be read with interest by mining men. The article in the magazine was written to clear up uncertainty among investors in the Old Country as to the relations of various concerns and the likelihood of other transactions taking place. It says:

"In view of the haze of doubt which enshrouds the situation as between the Selukwe-Sebakwe B.C. Silver National Silver interests on the one hand, and the Premier and Guggenheim interests on the other, some statements published recently in a contemporary London journal, and made in the course of a discussion on this matter, are of particular interest. The writer, a mining journalist well known in Canada, after visiting Vancouver, where he appears to have discussed the Selukwe-B.C. Silver-Sebakwe situation, both with Mr. Banks—the consulting engineer to the B.C. Silver Corporation—and with Mr. Bush—the head of Bush Mines, Ltd.—believes that the Premier people will propose that Premier's capital be increased from \$5,000,000 to \$7,500,000 and that the new stocks be issued in payment for certain claims of the B.C. Silver and Sebakwe groups.

### MAY BE \$5,000,000 ISSUE

"Presuming that if a deal is made for cash and Premier shares, the Premier shares will be distributed pro rata among B.C. Silver and Sebakwe shareholders by way of return of capital, this forecast would suggest that with Premier shares at their current market value of rather over \$2 there may be something over \$1,000,000 to divide between the shareholders of the various companies interested in the properties concerned.

"Selukwe and Sebakwe shareholders are apparently not basing extravagantly optimistic anticipations on this surmise, judging by the market price. It is, of course, quite possible that the Premier Company may increase its capital to any reasonable amount, and in view of the situation which exists we do not think that Selukwe shares at their current price are overvalued, a remark which applies even more strongly to Sebakwe shares, but all that we have heard on the matter leads us to doubt very much whether the Premier Company is making, or will make, an offer representing the amount mentioned, or anything near it.

"In the same article the writer describes as an extraordinary condition the agreement that the development of the Bush property purchased by the Sebakwe Company should be in charge of a mining engineer acceptable to the minority interest, that is, the vendors, and he appears to infer that this condition might confer upon the minority interest the control of the spending of money and control of news issued from the property. Surely it is not intended to suggest that the engineer in charge was giving, or would give, information to others than the head office of the company?

### TO OVERCOME CRITICISM

"The writer of the article cannot have followed the long and tedious history of B.C. Silver from 1919 onwards and the controversies which have centred upon it, or it would have been apparent to him that the reason for this condition was nothing of the sort alluded to above, but was simply due to the dissatisfaction which the minority shareholders in British Columbia rightly or wrongly felt in regard to the past development of B.C. Silver.

"It may be mentioned here that under the agreement for the sale of the Bush Mines Ltd., the holders of the majority of the shares which formed part of the purchase consideration were given the right not only to be consulted in the appointment of the mining engineer, but to nominate and elect a director to the board of the purchasing company, a provision which the latter undertook to make good by securing the necessary amendment to its articles of association. It is obvious that this body of shareholders must be looking to realize their interest either through the development of the property into a dividend earning mine, or and this, of course, is the more probable contingency, the sale of the property to their active and highly prosperous neighbor, the Premier Company.


