OTTAWA HOUSE IS PROROGUED

SEVENTH HOUR BRINGS SESSION TO CLOSE IN TIME FOR EASTER

OTTAWA, April 16.—Chief Justice Duffin, in the absence of Governor-General Willingdon, on Thursday night formally prorogued the first session of Canada's sixteenth parliament. The end of the session came after a ten-day session with the House sitting morning, noon and evening and, during the present week, well into the early morning hours. Legislation was swept through as well as many millions of dollars of appropriations which remained. The actual sitting days of the session numbered only fifty-four. In the last vote on Thursday night, the House divided on an appropriation of \$500,000 for the Washington legation building. Hon. Hugh Guthrie, leader of the opposition, again moved an amendment which was introduced when the House was in committee to supply that the vote for the legation be reduced from \$500,000 to \$25,000 but it was defeated by 89 to 48.

MORRISON IS NAMED PROBE

PREMIER COURT BENCHER WILL TAKE ON TASK OF LOOKING INTO CARLOW-GAUTHIER CHARGES

VICTORIA, April 16.—Mr. Justice Duffin has been appointed to investigate the Carlow-Gauthier charges pending in the legislature by H. D. Twigg, M.P. It is announced today. There will be two hearings, the Carlow charges opening at Victoria on April 21, and the Gauthier allegations on April 22. Both, it is expected, will be brief. The Carlow charges deal principally with an alleged scheme whereby Frank Carlow was to secure an agency for the sale of liquor to the government, using his position as a member of the House of Commons for Liberal party work. Gauthier charges concern an alleged scheme whereby he was to buy liquor in London, splitting the commission with a member of the cabinet. The commission will direct an enquiry into whether or not public business was improperly transacted and whether the government or any member resorted to improper methods to obtain campaign funds.

PUNISHMENT FOR HOCKEY PLAYERS

JUDICIAL COURT OF BOSTON IS EXPELLED FOR LIFE FOR HITTING REFEREE—OTHERS ARE FINED

MONTREAL, April 16.—For assaulting referee Lafflamme after Wednesday's Stanley Cup hockey game, President of the National Hockey League expelled Billy Coutu, Boston defence player, for life. Oliver of Boston was fined \$500 and Smith of Ottawa was suspended for one month, commencing the opening of next season, and was fined \$100 for rough play. Hitchcock and Herberts of Boston and Gauthier of Ottawa were fined \$50 for rough work.

HEAT SHIP, SEDGE POOL, WILL ARRIVE MONDAY FOR LOADING

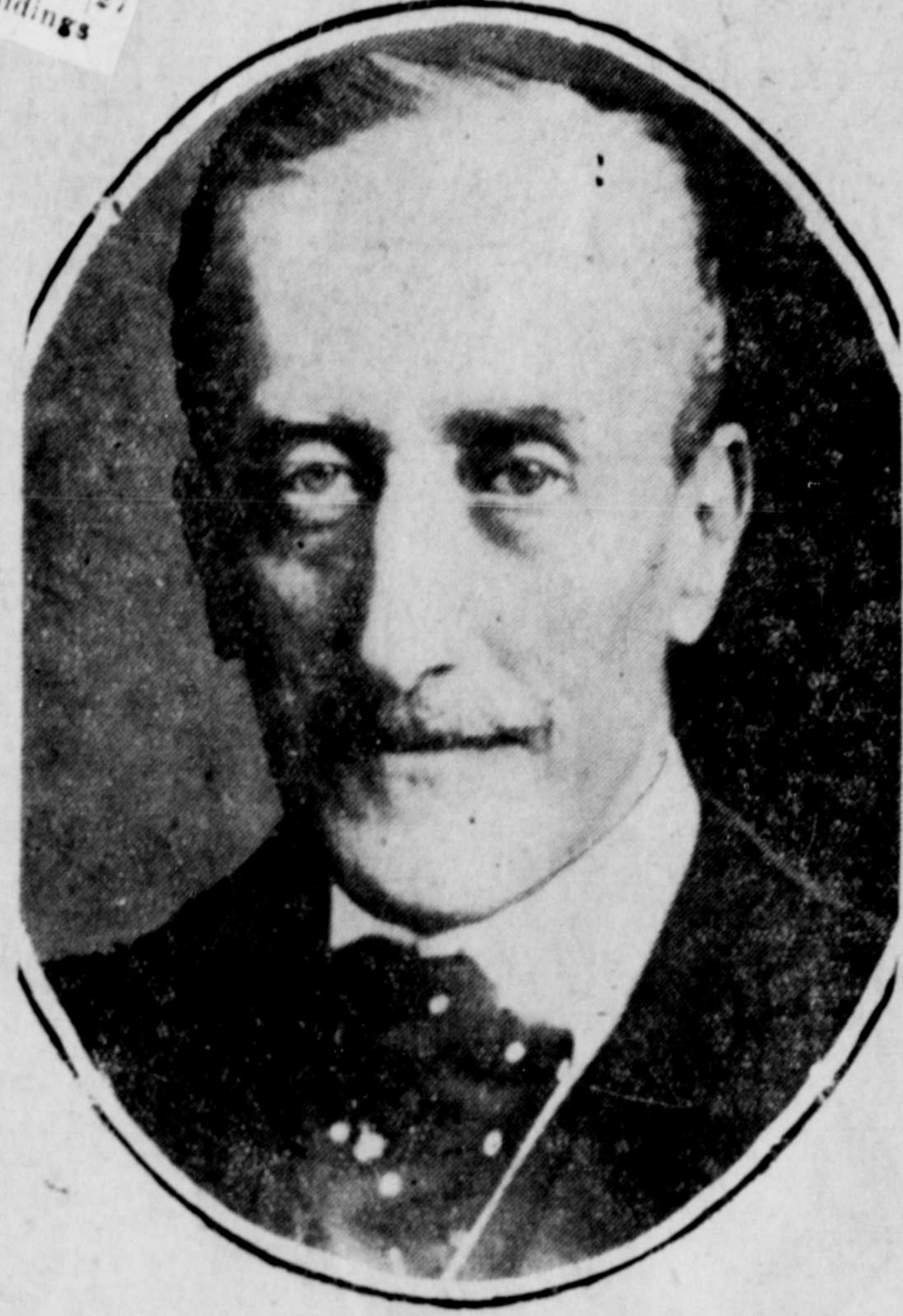

Lord Willingdon and Lady Arrive and Are Given Warm Reception

FULL PROGRAM IS MAPPED OUT FOR VISIT OF FIRST GENTLEMAN AND LADY OF LAND — VICEROY EXPRESSES OPTIMISM FOR PORT

Though a bleak southwest wind did blow and an unseasonal snow flurry made weather conditions somewhat frigid, Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Willingdon found a warm welcome awaiting them when they arrived in the city this morning at 10.30 aboard the steamer Prince George, Capt. Harry Neddin, to pay their first visit to Canada's most northerly and westerly seaport of importance. The Governor-General who is on the first of what he hopes will be annual tours of Western Canada, has a full program booked out for him during his visit here and arrangements have been made to adequately entertain him and his lady on their two-day stopover in Prince Rupert. The vice-regal suite will proceed East by special train leaving the city at 1.30 tomorrow afternoon. In spite of weather conditions, an expectant throng of hundreds of men, women and children gathered at the Canadian National Railway docks and yards to greet Their Excellencies as they arrived from the south. Wind, rain and snow did not a whit dampen their enthusiasm and determination to give the prominent statesman of Empire, together with the first lady of the land an adequate reception. After Mayor Newton had gone on board the steamer to formally receive Their Excellencies, the vice-regal party came ashore and treaded over carpet to the reception stand on the C.N.R. tennis court where one of His Excellency's duties was to inspect the three guards-of-honor—one consisting of officers and men from the First North B.C. Regiment under Major S. D. Johnstone, another from the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve under Lieut. R. P. Ponder, and the third consisting of members of the Canadian Legion under President Sidney Bird—a detachment of Sea Cadets under Lieut. Robert Blance and patrol of Boy Scouts under Scout Master Ben Ferguson. Aldermen Jos. Greer, G. P. Tinker, and P. H. Linzey, as members of the civic reception committee, were then presented to Their Excellencies, as were also Mrs. J. C. Brady, Mrs. S. P. McMordie and Mrs. R. Blance who occupied seats on the platform.

FORMAL WELCOME
The Mayor, in his address of welcome, referred to the part which the distinguished guest had played in various sections of the Empire and expressed, on behalf of the citizens, his great pleasure, in which all shared, in welcoming to the city Canada's Governor-General and Lady Willingdon. In a very happy speech, His Excellency referred to the history of the city and in accordance with information which he had gathered believed that his arrival might be called a "coming of age party" as it was in the year 1906 when the first piles were driven along the waterfront for the construction of piers. He showed a familiarity with the city's history and referred to the growth and development which had taken place during that period. The fishing industry had contributed largely to the growth of the port while lumbering was

responsible for much of the port's activity. It was true that regular trans-Pacific service had as yet not materialized but His Excellency expressed the belief that the port's trade would increase with the development of the hinterland and transportation. He congratulated the citizens on the achievements during the brief history of the city and said that he would look forward with a great deal of pleasure to another visit to the city. At the conclusion of the address, His Worship Mayor Newton called for three hearty cheers which were given with enthusiasm by the assembled citizens. The party then proceeded to the headquarters of the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve for a brief inspection. Lady Willingdon addressed the Women's Canadian Club this afternoon while His Excellency opens the new electrical power system at the plant of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. In the group of visitors are Lord and Lady Willingdon, Mrs. Osborne, lady-in-waiting, Capt. the Viscount Hardinge, Capt. the Hon. J. C. Jervis, Capt. C. Price-Davies, Major H. Willis-O'Connor, and James F. Crowley, secretary to His Excellency.

LADY WILLINGDON SPEAKER TODAY

ADDRESSED WOMEN'S CANADIAN CLUB WITH MRS. McMORDIE IN CHAIR

Lady Willingdon, wife of the Governor-General of Canada, addressed a large assemblage of local women at a luncheon today under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club. Mrs. S. P. McMordie presided in most capable manner over the event which was held at the Prince Rupert Hotel and introduced the guest of honor. The meeting opened with the singing of "O Canada" and there was a vocal blessing before luncheon. Mrs. McMordie introduced Lady Willingdon as follows: "Ladies of the Canadian Club and guests from the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire, today is indeed a happy day for all Prince Rupert, having with us the Governor-General of Canada and Her Excellency Lady Willingdon. We are pleased to think our little northern city was not forgotten during this wonderful tour and we welcome them most heartily. "Our guest of honor and our speaker, Lady Willingdon, needs no introduction from me, but I would like to say that she was so esteemed in India that she was made a Lady of the Order of the Crown of India, and so beloved by the people that they affectionately called her, 'The Lady of the Golden Heart.'"

LADY WILLINGDON
Lady Willingdon said: "Madam president and ladies of the Prince Rupert Canadian Club: It gives me very great pleasure to meet you all. The warmth of your welcome and your generous hospitality to His Excellency and myself on the occasion of this our first official visit has touched us deeply. "I have been amazed since we arrived in Canada at the energy and devotion of the women of this country. In the Canadian Clubs you have a great asset to the community. In a country of such wide spaces as is this great Dominion of ours there is always a danger of parochialism and I know of nothing better than the Canadian Club to sustain the interest of one community in another and to make members realize that, while their hometown means much to them, first of all, they are citizens of that Dominion that we all hope some day to see in the front rank of the nations of the world in influence and power. "It is most interesting to come to your City of Prince Rupert, named centuries later after the leader of one of those great trading companies that have made the British Empire the Company of Gentlemen Adventurers trading in the Hudson Bay. Chen Places Blame for Nanking Incident Upon Gt. Britain and States

BOMBARDING OF "DEFENCELESS" PORT WAS CAUSE FOR ANTI-FOREIGN DEMONSTRATION HE SAYS — NEW NOTE RECOMMENDED

SHANGHAI, April 16.—Cantonese Foreign Minister Chen has replied to the five-power note regarding the recent Nanking incident. He blames Great Britain and United States for bombarding "defenceless Nanking" and suggests the creation of an international commission to settle the responsibility for the anti-foreign outbreak there. He refuses to admit that the Cantonese troops were responsible for the trouble and asserts that such incidents are likely to occur there so long as present "unequal treaties" exist. The moderates within the Cantonese regime yesterday definitely broke with the Communist element that has been controlling the civil government of Hanko. Resolutions of impeachment against a score of the radical leaders have been adopted. Foreign Minister Chen was not mentioned in the resolutions.

PARIS, April 16.—Representatives of the five powers have recommended that their governments authorize them to draw up a new and identical note on the Nanking incident in reply to Chen. They consider his answer unsatisfactory.

LATE PREMIER OF NEW FOUNDLAND WILLS PROPERTY TO STATE

ST. JOHNS, N.F., April 16.—The will of Sir Robert Bond, former premier of Newfoundland, who died on March 16, provided that his land and buildings near Whitbourne, 60 miles from this city, should become the property of the Newfoundland government as the site of a model farm. The terms of the will were made public today. To the colonial museum, Sir Robert left documents giving him the freedom of various British cities. The residue of the estate was bequeathed to a nephew and niece, with the proviso that should they die without issue, the bequest be used to establish an industrial school at Whitbourne. The estate was estimated at \$90,000.

CHICAGO, April 16.—Eight persons, members of two families, were killed this morning in a terrific explosion which virtually demolished a block of shops and dwellings on the west side. Fire followed the explosion the cause of which is unknown.

Another Halibut Boat Lost in North; Majestic Strikes in Snowstorm and Founders

JUNEAU, April 16.—Eight men narrowly escaped death on Friday when the halibut vessel Majestic struck a rock in a driving snowstorm and sank. Capt. C. P. Peterson, better known as Peter Kaloo-gan, was master of the boat which also carried the owner, Karl Abrahamson, and six fishermen. The men swam for several hundred yards through a choppy sea to the north shore of Douglas Island. The Majestic was built in Seattle in 1923 at a cost of \$20,000. Continued storms are hampering halibut fishing along the Alaskan coast. The tempests have been on since the season opened two months ago and wrecks have been more numerous than in years.

CHARGE AGAINST VANCOUVER MAN

FRANK PARSONS ARRESTED ABOARD STEAMER TAHITI OUTSIDE OF FRISCO FOR LIQUOR CONSPIRACY

SAN FRANCISCO, April 16.—Government agents on Friday boarded the steamer Tahiti outside the Golden Gate and arrested Frank Parsons of Vancouver, B.C., and held him on a charge of conspiracy to violate the United States tariff and prohibition laws. Federal officials state they have evidence connecting Parsons with an alleged million dollar liquor plot which, the officials allege, includes a shipment of liquor to Papeete Island, Tahiti, to be transferred to vessels bringing it directly to the Pacific Coast. Parsons is alleged to have declared that he went to Tahiti because a client, one of the largest insurance companies in Canada, put up a million dollar bond, guaranteeing delivery of a cargo there.

DARING THEFT IN PORTLAND

BANDITS ROB BANK MESSENGERS OF \$23,000 AT ENTRANCE OF BIG STORE FRIDAY AFTERNOON

PORTLAND, April 16.—With a gallery of probably one hundred gaping on-lookers gathered in a circle about them, four gunmen robbed two United States National Bank messengers of \$26,000 at the entrance of the Olds, Wortman and King store Friday afternoon. It was the most daring robbery in Portland's history. Waiting outside in a touring car, three men leaped on Joe Bigelow, 22, bank messenger, and George Bailey, guard. Bigelow dropped the money satchel when the bandits jumped into an auto and escaped.

MAN DROWNED AT VANCOUVER

LAWRENCE MURPHY LOST HIS LIFE AND JOHN ROBINSON IN HOSPITAL FOLLOWING ACCIDENT

VANCOUVER, April 16.—Lawrence Murphy was drowned and John Robinson is in hospital suffering from shock and exposure as a result of an accident on the waterfront Thursday night. The men were employed by the C.G.M.M. loading a vessel when Murphy missed his footing on the gang plank and plunged into the water. Robinson being thrown overboard in the attempt to save him. The body of Murphy has been recovered.

ANNUAL MEETING OF RIFLE ASSOCIATION

The annual meeting of the First North B.C. Regiment Rifle Association was held Thursday evening in the Armory when officers for the coming season were elected and reports presented covering the past year's activities. It was decided to close the Market Place miniature range, where shoots have been held during the winter, and to open the McNicholl Creek range, up which the first weekly shoot will take place on May 1. Officers were elected as follows: Honorary President—Col. S. P. McMordie, D.S.O. President—R. W. Cameron. Secretary—Treasurer—William Brass. Executive—M. M. Lamb, R. Wilson, A. Rix, G. V. Wilkinson, A. Wylie and Frank Russell.

DROWNING OCCURS AT MILL BAY ON NAAS RIVER FRIDAY

Word was received at provincial police headquarters this morning from Mill Bay that P. Pederson, who comes from Alberta, was drowned there yesterday and that the body had been recovered. Details of the fatality are lacking at present as to how the unfortunate individual came to his death but Constable W. Smith of Anxox has been despatched to make an inquiry.

MONS, Belgium, April 16.—Ten miners were killed and twelve are missing as a result of an explosion in a coal mine near here.

WELCOME, LORD AND LADY WILLINGDON.

Now that they are here, Prince Rupert reiterates its welcome to Governor General and Lady Willingdon. We hope their stay here for two days may be a pleasant one and that it may prove beneficial to the vice-regal party and this community.

Those who saw the Governor General this morning were impressed with his democratic air in spite of his high position and titled name. We have heard that he is a pleasant and approachable gentleman. Now we know that what we have heard is correct.

Prince Rupert extends its best wishes to this noted British statesman and his gracious lady.

TORIES WAVY FLAG AGAIN.

The Tories are busy waving the flag again. The Canadian legation to Washington, which they themselves proposed and while in power favored, is they say but "a part of the doctrine of separation from the Empire fostered by the present government." What an allegation to issue from the mouth of such a clever politician yet such a bitter partizan as Hon. R. B. Bennett of Calgary West.

One thinks the Conservative patriotism is a very changeable thing designed essentially for party emergencies.

The Motherland gives its sanction to and assists Canada in establishing its representation at Washington yet the Tories now see such action fraught with danger of disintegration of Empire. What foresighted people are these patriotic Canadian Tories!

MOST MEN BUT FLEETING IDOLS.

There is a wide distinction between mere company and the companionship that banishes loneliness. One may be in the midst of congenial company and still be lonely, for true companionship presupposes understanding and sympathy.

True companionship is akin to hero worship. An individual fashions an ideal and sets out to find it in the flesh. Frequently one thinks he has found that hero. With all the enthusiasm of the votary one sings the idol's praises, unobscured himself of all his hopes and fears and rejoices that at last he has come upon his cherished ideal.

But how often does man discover that his enthusiasm is unwarranted and that the dream so carefully nurtured must be shattered by disillusionment! By word or gesture, or even by silence, the hero reveals some prejudicial trait, be it conceit, cowardice, selfishness, narrowness, coldness, disloyalty, ignorance or plain stupidity, and the idol falls. And once fallen, all the king's horses and all the king's men cannot put it together again.

Some, to avoid these crushing disillusionments, attribute only one virtue to each of a number of friends and realize their ideal through a composite picture. This is possible where one can overlook the hundred other glaring faults in each part of the picture.

Others may feel that the price of disillusionment is not too much to pay for a moment of idol worship, for brief surcease from that loneliness which comes from not having a confiding and trustworthy friend in the world.

One is most critical of his best friends, otherwise friendships would not be such fleeting things. That old proverb "I love my friends well, but myself better," explains many broken friendships.

Waterfront Whiffs

Another Alaska-Prince Rupert Steamboat Service Projected—
 Well Known Tow-Boat F. H. Phippen Bought by
 Bushby—Activities at Dry Dock

Establishment of a subsidized steamship line, to operate between Alaska ports and Prince Rupert, is proposed in the Alaska legislature at Juneau.

In line with a recommendation by Attorney General Rustgard in his biennial report, Representative Worth introduced a bill which provides for the establishment of a subsidized line of steamers, or a single vessel, between Juneau and Prince Rupert, making calls at Petersburg, Wrangell and Ketchikan, fixing the subsidy at \$40,000 per year, and appropriating \$85,000 for the biennium.

"It is required that at least one vessel having a cargo space for 500 tons of fresh fish packed in boxes in ice, shall make weekly round trips over the route between March 1 and November 30. The measure also provides that 'The Board of Control' shall make the necessary arrangements for the subsidy, fix rates for freight and fares for passengers. It is understood that this Board is the one sought to be established in the Controller Bill which was defeated in the Senate earlier and which was also introduced in the House but has not been reported out of Committee.

Few and broken catches featured this week's list of halibut arrivals at the port of Prince Rupert. The total was small at 347,750 pounds of which American vessels landed 251,500 pounds and Canadian, 96,250 pounds. Prices were high throughout the week ascending from a minimum of 15.1c and 8c for American Fish last Saturday to 19c and 9c on Wednesday which the boat Chum received for 6,000 pounds. The Canadian low was 14c and 8c last Saturday and the high 16.9c and 8c which the Nuba received on Tuesday for 1,400 pounds. The Easter market was receptive for fish but, unfortunately, the arrivals were unusually light. There was no sale held at the Exchange yesterday, Good Friday.

Landings at this port to date for the season total 4,127,050 pounds as compared with 5,760,050 pounds at a similar date last year. American landings so far total 2,189,300 pounds as compared with 4,367,600 pounds and Canadian 937,750 pounds as compared with 1,392,450 pounds.

HERRING RUN OVER

The herring run is now apparently over although there may yet be a resumption, all boats for the present at least have discontinued seining operations. While all objectives may not have been accomplished, the crop may be said to have been fairly satisfactory. There was a run in the harbor the early part of this week but it did not amount to much as far as seining was concerned. The Azurite tried it out across the bay for a short time but only got a few hundred pounds which was hardly worth the trouble.

Having taken a course while at Victoria recently, Capt. Alex Saint of the good ship P.R.H. 28 is to become official compass adjuster at the Prince Rupert Boat House which is now in a position to include such work as one of its activities. Alex has been wrestling with the tanks on the 28 this week, some replacements being made.

The brand new power cruiser Red Arrow arrived in port from Vancouver last Sunday and spent the most of the week here on its first call to Prince Rupert in the interests of its owners, the National Biscuit Co. Three commercial travellers were on board and the party proceeded on the boat Thursday morning to Anxoy and Stewart. The new Red Arrow which replaces a former and smaller boat bearing the same name, is a new craft, forty feet long and powered with a 90 h.p. Hall-Scott engine which gives her plenty of power.

After coming in from Triple Island where she picked up Capt. Elfert, harbor master, who had taken the grain boat Otter Pool out to the open sea, P.R.H. powerboat Pachena, Capt. Harvey Dumas, sailed Thursday night for Anger Island, some seventy miles down the coast, to pick up a boom of telephone poles for delivery to Inverness Cannery. The Pachena is expected to return to port tomorrow or Monday.

GENERAL JAIL DELIVERY
 With a gang consisting of city jail birds on the job, painting and a general campaign of cleaning up went merrily on aboard the provincial police boat Adanac during the sunny days at the first of the week, operations being under the supervision of Chief Engineer Tommy Camm's eagle eye. Thus Miss Adanac looks fit as a fiddle and it didn't cost Honest John much for the

work. Some of the boys of Caledonian extraction are wondering if they couldn't themselves get such a gang of laborers from the Hotel Hannah.

His many friends will regret to learn that the illness of Doc Clapperton, which was reported in these columns last week, necessitated his admission to the Prince Rupert General Hospital early this week. All hope that the fair mechanics at the "dry dock" will fetch him around to an early recovery. Sympathy is also extended to Mrs. Clapperton who has been a patient in the hospital for the past few months. Porsooth, the popular Doc's troubles are not coming singly.

A Delco electric light system is being installed at the Flewin & Brown trolling camp in that part of Warke Channel which has recently been designated with the more delicate though perhaps less effective cognomen of Victory Cove. The plant arrived here from Vancouver aboard the Princess Beatrice last Saturday and was transported to Warke Channel during the week.

Most of the halibut boats operating out of Prince Rupert have by this time made at least one return to port with product although there are one or two stragglers for which some anxiety has been expressed. The American schooner Yukon, Capt. Paulsen, and the Canadian boat P. Dorreen, made port during the past week with the first catches of the season. Word has been received that the American boat Sitka, about which some alarm was expressed recently, has landed a catch in one of the northern ports.

The McLean yard has been awarded, in competition with the dry dock, the only other tenderer, the contract for the rebuilding of the forestry patrol boat, Alpine Fir, recently damaged by an explosion on board at Butedale. Judging by the look of the Alpine Fir, which had her upper works almost completely blown off and which will also have to have her hull gone over pretty carefully, it may be estimated that, if Mac bid below a couple of thousand iron men, he stands to lose a few quid on the job. The vessel was towed from the dry dock to the Cow Bay floats by Capt. Jack Cook, with the Joy Bird, on Wednesday, and will be taken into the shop as soon as one of the new seine boats for the Gosse Packing Co., nearing completion there, gets out of the way.

Mac announced this week that, after long drawn out negotiations with the Canadian National Railway, a twenty-year lease had been signed for the waterfront site, immediately west of the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., where he will soon start the construction of a fine boat building and repair establishment which will have no rival on the coast. It is expected that the move will take place about July 1 and we hope Mac will install a strong main line telephone for the Waterfront. Whiff man hates to think of extending his Thursday afternoon beat to such

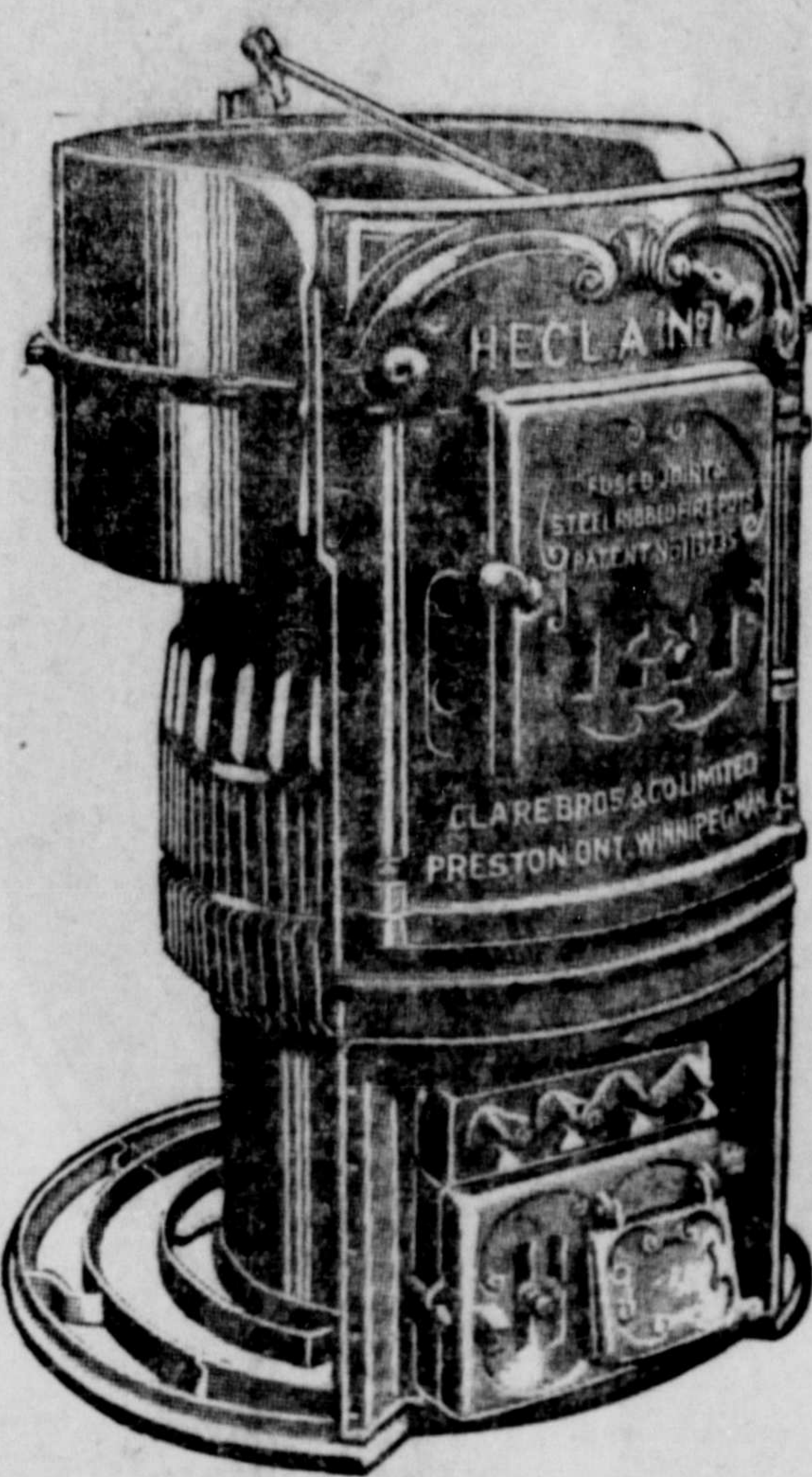

TERRACE ASKS ORE SAMPLING WORKS RUPERT

RECOMMENDATION MADE BY BOARD OF TRADE—OTHER BUSINESS DISCUSSED

TERRACE, April 16.—The monthly meeting of the Terrace and District Board of Trade was held in the G.W.V.A. Hall Tuesday evening and was attended by about thirty members.

The committee on public works reported that the provincial department had already started repair work on the roads, also that department officials had stated that work would be commenced upon the Terrace to Usk and the Hazelton to Cedarvale sections of the Pacific Highway as soon as the appropriations were received and that these portions of the road would be completed this season.

The board adopted the report of the mining committee. This report emphasized the value of the mining industry to the community and showed that, while it was as yet only in the prospecting and development stage, it represented an annual expenditure of \$100,000.

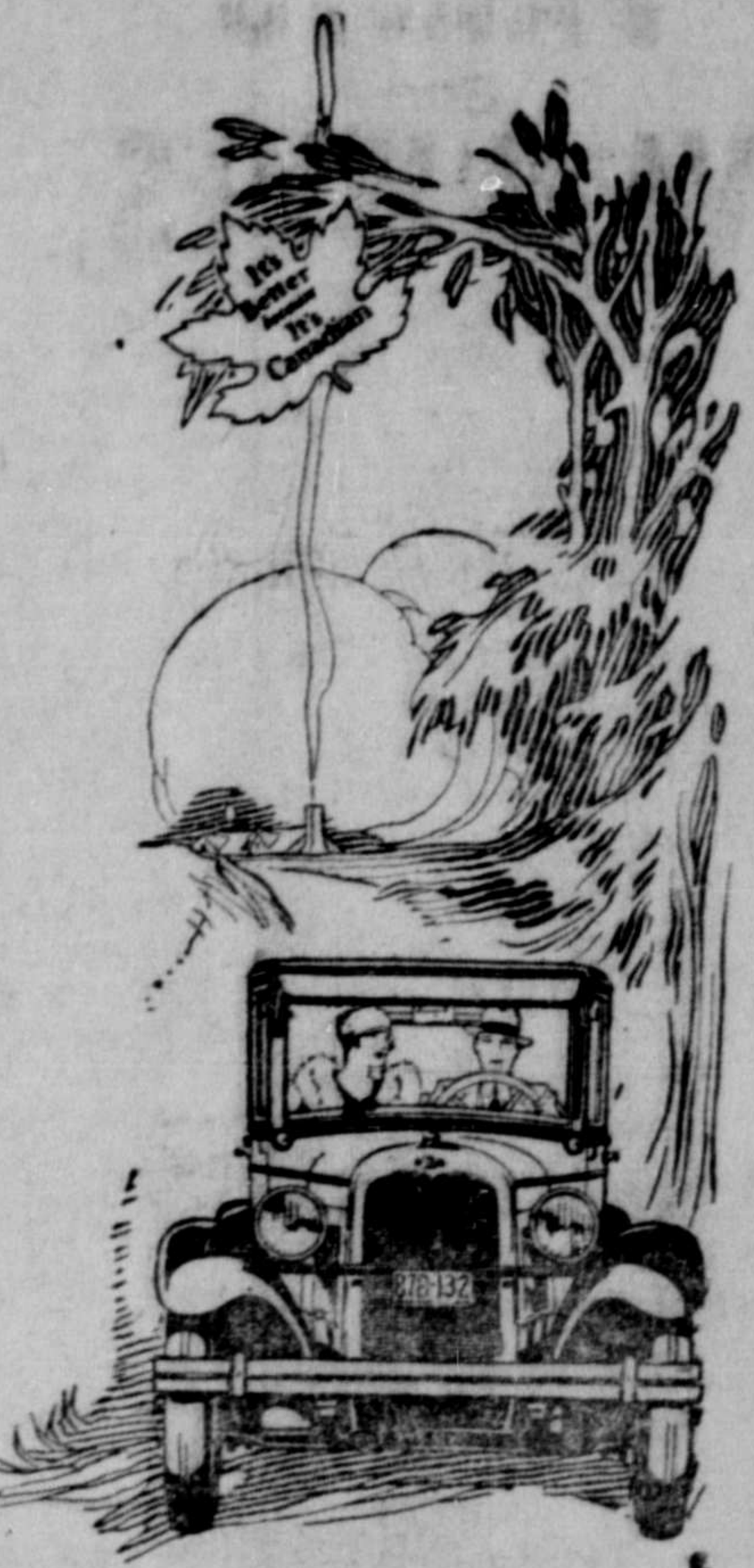

NEW GRANBY BOAT

Undoubtedly the finest production along the powerboat line which has ever been turned out at Prince Rupert is the new Granby Co.'s service boat "Granby" which is now nearing completion at the dry dock and should be turned over to her owners about the end of next week. Of sturdy construction not unlike a California tuna boat in appearance and elegantly fitted within and without, the new vessel is proving quite the cynosure of all eyes and on all hands remarks are heard of a most complimentary nature.

The vessel is 78 feet long, with beam of 17 feet and moulded depth of 9 ft. 6 in., and derives her power from a 120 h.p. Washington-Estep diesel engine, one of the first of its kind to be installed here, the putting in of which has been supervised for the past few weeks by Ben Fox of the Vancouver Machinery Depot British Columbia agents for the motor.

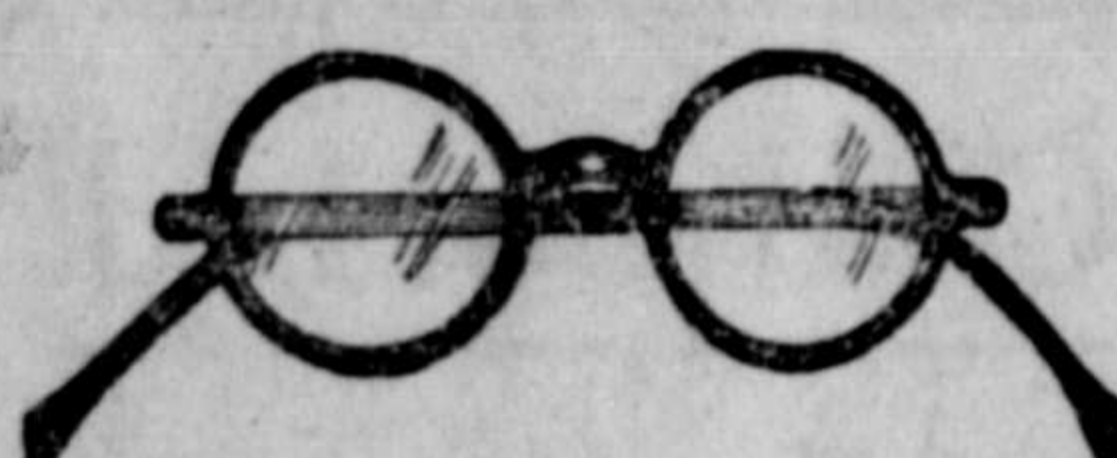

SCHOOL BOARD HAS MEETING

REPORTS FORMED PRINCIPAL ITEM OF BUSINESS — FIRST YEAR UNIVERSITY DISCUSSED

GIFT IS RECEIVED

The principal business at the meeting of the school board on Thursday night was to consider the reports from the various schools for the month of March.

While there had been a certain amount of illness during the month, the reports showed that the attendance at the various schools had been good.

The report of Mrs. Lisney for the Seal Cove school showed that there had been 62 pupils in attendance during the month with an average daily attendance of 83.8 per cent.

A total of 430 scholars attended Booth School during the month according to the report of D. H. Hartness, of whom 238 were boys and 192 were girls.

The percentage for the month was 92.11. During the month about \$170 had been received for deposit in the school banks from the children.

Miss Mills, in her report for Borden Street School, showed an average attendance during the month of 94.8 per cent with a total enrollment of 300 scholars.

There were 147 boys and 153 girls. During the month the boys had organized football teams and the girls had formed a baseball team.

The report of principal Thomas Peddle of the High School commented upon a laxity among certain of the pupils in getting to school on time.

An improvement had been noted although the practice seemed to be due to carelessness, and efforts were being made to correct the fault.

The attendance at the high school during the month totalled 183 with a percentage during the month of 93.5. The report referred to the boys' team winning the Heilbroner cup in their shoot with the team from the First N.B.C. regiment and also to a very helpful address delivered during the month by G. G. Bushby.

PRESENTATION MADE A letter to D. H. Hartness from the Women's Canadian Club was handed to the secretary of the board to read and conveyed the information that the club was donating twenty framed pictures of the Fetters of Confederation for use in the schools.

The offer was accepted and the secretary of the board will convey the thanks of the board to the club for the generous and timely gift.

The board discussed informally a suggestion to again have the first year university work form part of the course of the high school for the next year and while no definite decision was reached in the matter, it seemed to be the opinion of the different trustees that there would scarcely be a sufficient number of pupils to make the course worth while.

Various minor matters in connection with the different schools were brought to the attention of the board by the principals and will be attended to in the near future.
