LONDON, August 27 .- It is understood that Viscount Cecil has resigned from the cabinet but when seen today he refused to either confirm or deny the rumor. He holds the portfolio of Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster. The differences, it is understood, arose over a difference of opinion in regard to the League of Nations.

ALBERTA'S WORK IN MENTAL HYGIENE IS FAVORABLY MENTIONED

EDMONTON, Aug. 27.-That Alberta is leading the whole dominion in some phases of mental hygiene work, is given in a recent bulletin of the Canadian national committee for mental hygiene, as the opinion of Dr. C. M. Hincks, medical director of the organization, who made a five weeks' tour of the western provinces last spring. Dr. Hincks refers in particular to the appointment and work of a visiting committee to the mental hospitals and penal institutions, the establishment of a training school for mental defectives at Red Deer, and the introduction in the legislature by PRINCE RUPERT TIDES the minister of health of a sterilization bill, which is thought likely to past at the next session. 
