WOULD REDUCE FISHING GEAR

Meeting at Vancouver Makes Recommendation in Regard to Operation

VANCOUVER, Oct. 3.-Because the salmon runs showed a fifty per cent decrease, a decrease in the amount of gear used in British Columbia waters was recommended at a meeting here Saturday of cannery operators and fishermen. A representative delegation will be sent to Ottawa to urge upon the department of fisheries the passing of legislation putting into effect the recommendations approved.

The meeting asked that the number of seines be cut fifty per cent and gill tots thirty per cent; that the coast be divided into areas and that seine nets be allowed to fish only in the areas for which licenses are taken out, a certain amount of gear only to be allowed

to operate in each area. Ottawa will be asked to investigate fully before issuing licenses for new canneries to see that the run of salman in the area is sufficient for the new plant.

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.
