British Government Imposes Demands Upon Cantonese for Recent Outrages at Nanking

Punishment of perpetrators, indemnification and apologies called for in note---blockade may force compliance--more troops going

LONDON, April 2.-The draft note of the government to the Cantonese authorities, which was yesterday approved by the cabinet is understood to contain demands for punishment of those who were responsible for the Nanking outrages, indemnification to the victims' families and apologies to the government whose consulates were looted and officials attacked.

Contradicting the sworn statement of A. J. Watkinson, Dominion constable. Prince Rupert, Charles I hinholt, German boatbuilder, Port Essington, was a witness, and testified that he never had a conversation with the officer and that he remained for an hour in his boathouse after an Indian, who had been girl, had passed.

Notes made by Watkinson within versation with Reinholt on May 28. five days after murder, recorded that the German boatbuilder said that he left for a sawmill, in which direction Miss Chisholm walked, ten minutes after the Indian went by.

HALIBUT LANDINGS

Halibut landings at Prince Rupert took a decided jump during the past week, due, no doubt, to greatly improved weather conditions that have recently been prevailing on the grounds. In point of landings here, the week was the heaviest since the season opened. a total of 822,850 pounds being landed -680,200 pounds from American vessels and 142,650 from Canadian. This brings the total landings at the port since the season opened to 2,958,500 Aurania pounds of which American boats have landed 2,342,100 pounds and Canadian 616,300 pounds. It may be noted that in the Waterfront Whiffs figures on halibut landings only those boats that sold and landed their catches here are credited to the port.
