Accepting the suggestion of the Chief Justice, Bird subsequently applied to Mr. Justice Morrison, who consented to hear the application Tuesday.

Motion for a change of venue had been refused by Mr. Justice Morrison, August 3.

In arguing the case this morning Mr. Bird said "Sankey had been publicly referred to in the News of Prince Rupert as the murderer of Loretta Chishelm. He added that it would put him in a very unfortunate position if he had to go there and challenge the whole jury on grounds of unfairness.

### Terrace Farmer Shoots Two Grizzlies and Wounds Third Near Shore of Lakelse Lake

TERRACE, October 31.-Matt Allard, well known rancher and prospector of Kalum Lake, had a thrilling experience last Wednesday while hunting in the Lakelse Valley. At the mouth of Blackwater Creek on Lakelse Lake he encountered a large grizzly cub which he shot at close range. Suspicious that there would be others in the vicinity, he was not surprised to quickly see a huge chap bearing down upon him at some distance. Being too far from it to be sure of hitting to kill, he was looking for a tree to climb to get better aim, but the animal travelled so quickly that he had to shoot from the ground and was successful in felling it with the first shot. Immediately afterwards a third bear, supposedly a two-yearold, appeared on the scene, and he shot again but the gun jammed and before he remedied it the bear had turned into the brush. He shot again and from the howls knew that he had wounded it, but it got away.

For some days, the wounded bear has been heard around the lake but so far has evaded capture by the few who have had the courage to attempt it.

The hides of the two grizzlies shot by Mr. Allard are on display at the Terrace Club.

Author Defends Himself for Approving Work Done by Head of Fascists

thor, playright and socialist defends ais action in commending the work of Mussolini, dictator of Italy. He says: I am very sorry my comment on the "Daily News" articles on Mussolini which the sub-editor headed "A Defence" distressed you as it did. You were not the only one who jumped to the conclusion that I must have been unaware of the Matteotti affair and of Le other revolting incidents of the Fascist Terror. This is quite a mistake. I knew about them. Even if the Liberal press in Britain had been reticent on the subject, which it certainly was not. I have been in touch with the Italian refugee whose letter you have sent, and already knew all that letter told me, hesides a great deal more that I can infer from my experience and historical knowledge just as certainly as if I had witnessed it.

But you cannot dispose of Mussolini by simply repeating in a tone of virtuous indignation on the admitted and even vaunted fact that he owes his power to a coup d'etat. Since Augustus founded the Roman Empire with himelf as Emperor by the coup d'etat, which began with hie assassination of Cæsar, until Lenin became dictator of Russia by a violent overthrow of Kerenskyist Liberal Democracy involving the very unpleasant operations of the Cheka, there have been dozens of great usurpations effected by coups a'etat, and every one of the coups have een a filthy business, in which honest beaten, torored, and murdered out of it by gangs of infernal blackguards.
