

FAIRBANKS, January 11.-An airplane and a veteran Alaska aviator played a final part in an Arctic rescue mission in which the lives of two prospectors were saved through the intelligence of a malamute dog.

The two prospectors, J. S. Shaw and Andy Dunlop, who were seriously injured in a premature powder explosion some time ago, were rescued as a result of the dog carrying a note for help over four hundred feet mountain passes in four below zero weather from Lobing Creek. HON. VINCENT MASSEY WILL BE ES-TABLISHED IN OFFICE NEXT MONTH

The opening of the Canadian legation at Washington will probably take place some time in February. Preparations are being rushed in order to enable the new minister, Hon. Vincent Massey, to cope with the flood of communications already being received from all parts of Canada and the United States. The British Embassy at Washington reports a steady stream of callers seeking the Canadian minister, and a flood of comnunications for the Canadian legation. The External Affairs Department of Ottawa and Mr. Massey's private residence in Toronto are also being inundated by the communications which are arriving. In addition, American public bodies are sending their secetaries to Toronto to invite Mr. Massey to represent Canada at forthcoming functions, while the mails carry further requests. It is expected that the Canadian Legation will be the busiest office in Washington. It is pointed out that Canada and the United States have the largest trade o any two countries in the world. British Ambassadors have stated in the past that over half the business at the Embassy has been Canadian. In addition to this business being transferred to the Canadian Legation both Canadians and Americans are displaying an unusual inerest, and many matters are being submitted to the new minister seeking his good offices.

TRADE QUESTIONS

Trade questions are being forwarded to the new minister as well as enquiries on matters of importance berespondence which is arriving. Mr. Massey has for several days been confined to his bed, but the work has gone had to be carefully thought out.

The size of the staff will be governed by the work to be done and the initial business indicates this to be of considerable volume. In addition to the clerical staff which is dependent on clerical routine, there will be a secretariat of at least five senior officials. This personnel has not yet been selected. though there has been no lack of applicants. The senior official will probably act for the minister in his absence.

LEGATION BUILDING No legation building has yet been decided upon. It is generally understood that Canada's first legation must be in ency. 

"The company went ahead with the new unit, which is completed. They are selling newsprint to British Columbia papers at the eastern price, and an area of government timber on Queen Charlotte Islands is not up for sale at public competition.

"Every timber sale held by the Depantment is treated on its merits as regards upset price. This sale requires a heavy investment of capital for development, and heavy transportation charges. It is obvious, therefore, that the stumpage price must be lower than that received for more accessible tracts which have been sold by the Forest, Branch from time to time for immediate operation in various parts of the province. There are areas of private timber in British Columbia at the present time, and areas of timber in Alaska, just as accessible or even more so than the Queen Charlotte Island timber, that can be purchased at lower figures than the upset price placed on this area. The Tory administration preceding our administration sold better located timber than the Queen Charlotte Island timber for ten cents.

OLD STATUTES RIGID

When the present administration took office, the statutes in respect of the pulp and paper industry were so rigid and inelastic that it was evident that no further development would take place in the province other than existing concerns. One of the objections raised was that the investor must spend a lot of time and money-investigating his proposal, only to find that he must go to public competition, and might thereby lose both his time and money. Under this administration the Forest Act was amended, maintaining the competitive principle, but making wider provision in

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


