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CHRIS MOELLER LIQUOR DISAPPEARS

BRITISH RESIDENTS ABANDONED HANKOW CONCESSION

Women and Children Put on Ships While Military Evacuates

Chinese troops and pickets take possession of besieged city, disperse mobs of angry coolies and soon restore order

HANKOW, January 6.—British residents of Hankow abandoned their concession shortly before midnight when the women and children were put aboard ships in the Yangste River and British sailors, marines and volunteers left the place and boarded a British warship. Three hundred armed Chinese troops and two hundred Chinese pickets immediately occupied the concession. On their entry, the Chinese troops dispersed the angry mob of coolies and restored order. The streets, which immediately became quiet, were cleared of all Chinese except troops and pickets. All the British police were withdrawn from the streets and the Chinese were left in complete control.

VANCOUVER HAS 137,197 PEOPLE

HAS BEEN INCREASE OF NINE THOUSAND IN PAST YEAR SAYS REPORT OF CITY ASSESSOR

VANCOUVER, Jan. 6.—Vancouver's population increased by almost 9,000 during the past year. The annual census taken by the city assessment commissioner shows Vancouver's population today as 137,197. This time last year the figure was 128,366. An increase of \$11,000,000 in the total assessment is shown. Of this \$2,000,000 is in land values and the remainder in improvements, due to the heavy construction of the past year. The total assessment of land is now \$128,518,860, and of improvements \$98,763,960. On the 28.5 mill tax rate which has prevailed for the past year the increased assessment will produce \$190,000 more in taxation revenue for the city than last year.

DUKE OF YORK SAILED TODAY

LONG VOYAGE OF ROYAL COUPLE COMMENCED AT PORTSMOUTH THIS MORNING—BROTHERS AND OFFICIALS PRESENT

PORTSMOUTH, Jan. 6.—The Duke and Duchess of York left this morning on the battle cruiser Renown for their 34,000 mile globe encircling voyage designed to tighten the bonds between the Mother Country and the Dominions of Australia and New Zealand. During their tour, the Duke, who is the King's second son, will open the new Australian capital at Canberra. A large assemblage witnessed the departure of the Royal couple and their travelling companions. Among those present were the Prince of Wales, Prince George, Premier Baldwin and other government officials.

IS SAVED FROM TIMBER WOLVES

ONTARIO LUMBERMAN HAD RACKING EXPERIENCE IN ALGONQUIN PARK—RESCUED BY GAME WARDEN

HUNTSVILLE, Ont., Jan. 6.—Alone and unarmed and surrounded by a pack of sixteen howling timber wolves on Canoe Lake in Algonquin Park, Elwood Bloss, lumberman, was saved from death by a game warden who attracted by the howls of the animals, came to the rescue, killing seven of them. Bloss was on his way to Huntsville from camp when he was pursued and surrounded by the pack. He put up a desperate struggle before the warden arrived.

Representatives of labor, farmers, merchants, students and soldiers have already formulated demands to be presented through the Cantonese government to the British consular service demanding indemnity for Chinese alleged to have been killed and wounded in Monday's disturbances, the withdrawal of gunboats and an apology to the Chinese government.

LONDON FEELS EASIER LONDON, Jan. 6.—Great Britain today was breathing a little easier over the tense situation at Hankow where seething crowds of Chinese coolies have overrun the British concession. The slightest provocation by the British, however, it is felt is likely to turn the ugly crowds there into uncontrollable mobs. The Foreign office this morning said that no further sensational developments had occurred in Hankow since the British marines were withdrawn on Tuesday when the British volunteers were disarmed and the Chinese population was allowed free entry to the British quarters.

Premier Baldwin and Foreign Secretary Chamberlain have been in frequent conference but there was no indication this morning that the cabinet had yet been summoned to discuss the grave outlook. Meanwhile, naval forces are being concentrated in Chinese waters.

VETERAN MINING RECORDER PASSES AWAY IN CAPITAL

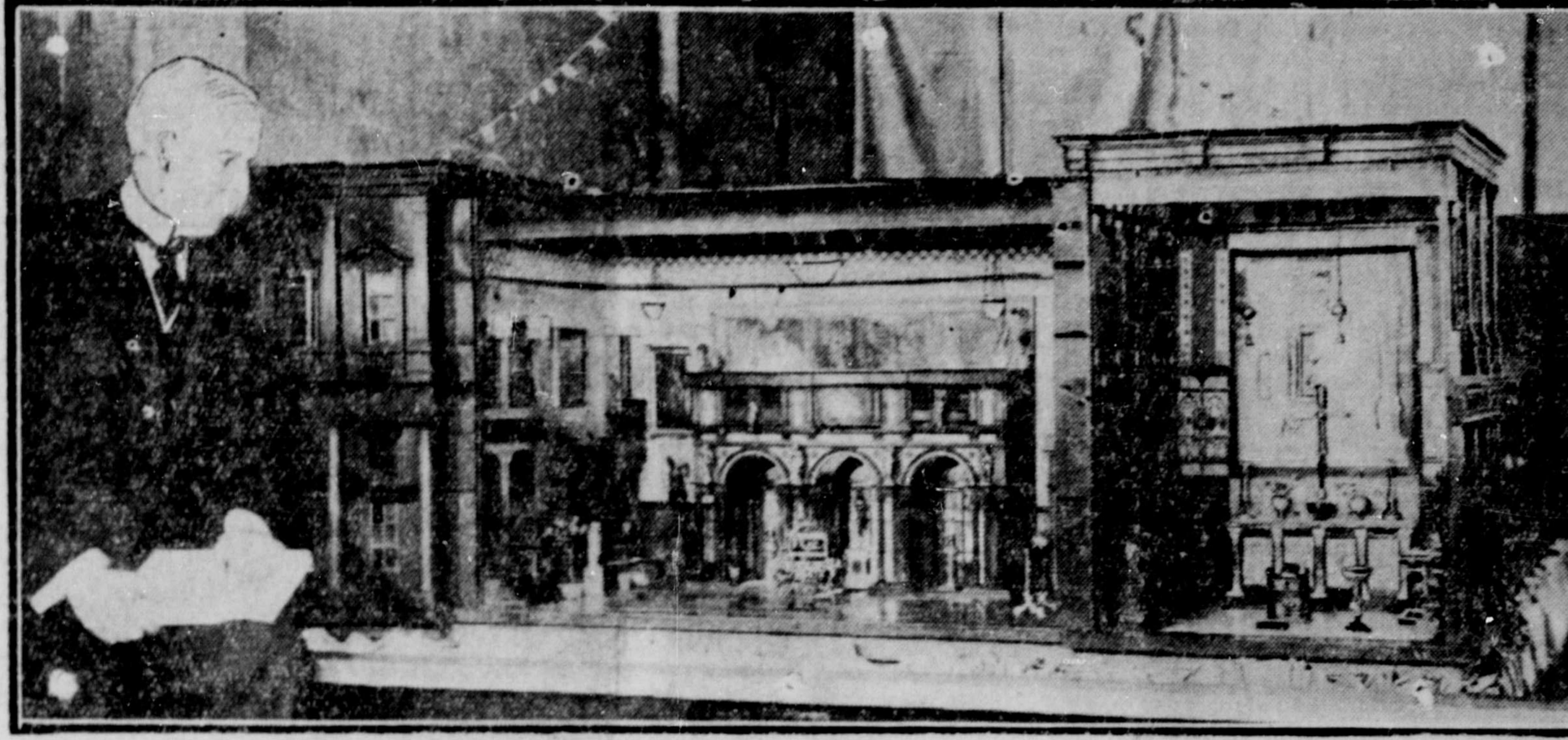
Late James Porter Was Mining Recorder at Dease Lake and Government Agent at Telegraph Creek

VICTORIA, Jan. 6.—After 73 years of eventful life as hunter, mining recorder, government agent and magistrate in the province of British Columbia, James Porter is dead here. Coming around Cape Horn in the ship Norman Morrison, as a two-year babe, Mr. Porter spent all his life since in British Columbia. He was a former mining recorder and government agent at Dease Lake and acted as magistrate at Telegraph Creek. He was engaged as a hunter with the survey party which laid out the first transcontinental railway through the Yellowhead Pass.

MORE EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS ARE FELT MEXICAN BORDER

CALEXICO, Jan. 6.—Six more sharp earthquake shocks were felt here and in the town of Mexicali across the Mexican border this morning. Several walls of buildings previously damaged were shaken down but otherwise there was no loss. Brawley and El Centro also felt the tremors.

England splashed through the wettest November on record. Five inches of rain fell instead of the average two. Total sunshine was 41 hours. Ten thousand automobiles and trucks will be made in England during 1927 and sent to Melbourne, Australia.

QUALITY OF ACHIEVEMENT

WHAT CANADIANS MUST LEARN INSTEAD OF QUANTITY SAYS WINNIPEG PROFESSOR BEFORE KIWANIS CLUB

WINNIPEG, Jan. 6.—(By Canadian Press)—Depicting the prevalent fashion of measuring achievement by a material prosperity, Prof. W. F. Osborn, speaking before members of the Winnipeg Kiwanis Club, declared that Canadians must learn to think of achievement in terms of quality rather than quantity if they would realize for their country the glorious destiny of which every true Canadian dreamed.

"We speak with satisfaction of increased railway construction, of a favorable balance of trade, of bank profits, and wheat crops, and think to measure our greatness thereby. But greatness is measured primarily by mental and spiritual achievement," Prof. Osborn said.

Referring to the glory of the ancient world, the summit attained by Egypt, Babylon and Chaldea, by Greece and Rome, and later by Great Britain, the speaker declared that in each case their greatest glory had been realized in the mental and spiritual field. The golden age of Great Britain had been the days of Shakespeare, Marlow and Jonson, of Bacon and Spenser. The reason for the lack of Canadian literature, Prof. Osborn attributed to wrong standard of achievement. Men wrote to make money, not to make books, he stated. Not until the baser motives of writing to sell, was driven out, could we expect a Canadian literature to flourish. Books that lived were books drawing their inspiration from the heart of the writer and not merely from his brain.

LANDSLIDE AT PORT ALICE

RESULTS IN DEATH OF ONE MAN, TWO HOUSES DEMOLISHED AND ANOTHER CARRIED INTO SEA

VICTORIA, Jan. 6.—The provincial police reports that two houses were demolished, one house was carried into the sea and J. Clark, a mill employee at Port Alice, was drowned in a landslide from recent heavy rains on the north end of Vancouver Island.

TWENTY-TWO KILLED

When Avalanche Engulfed Military Barracks of Khakanski District in Siberia

Detectives Attempt to Find Where Portion of Schooner's Cargo Went

VICTORIA, January 6.—Detectives are attempting to solve on behalf of the customs authorities and the Liquor Control Board the mystery of the disappearance of a portion of the liquor cargo of the schooner Chris Moeller which was being detained here at the instance of the customs commission according to the Victoria Times. "One hundred cases of whiskey are put in reports as having been dropped overboard or having left the ship in some other manner," says the newspaper. "Just how much of the cargo will be missing before all is unloaded and put in one of the government warehouses here will likely never be known. Officials explained today that no complete cargo manifest had been discovered although customs figures showed there were 17,779 cases on board beside about 5,000 cases on deck.

BOAT COMING FOR REPAIRS

CANADIAN RANGER OF C.G.M.M. DUE HERE NEXT INTERCOASTAL SERVICE WEDNESDAY

C.G.M.M. freighter Canadian Ranger is due here on January 12 to enter dry dock for repairs and overhaul. The vessel, which is in the company's intercoastal service, will come up from Vancouver where she arrived early this week from Montreal with cargo. It will be her first visit to this port.

The first C.G.M.M. to be completed under the Canadian government's shipbuilding program, the Canadian Ranger was built in Montreal in 1918. She is one of the C.G.M.M. largest class ships, being 109 feet, 4 in. in length with beam of 32 feet, 3 in.; depth 28 feet, 4 in.; gross tonnage, 5,752; registered, 3,551.

RUSSIA TAKING CANUCK BRONKS

SOVIET GOVERNMENT HAS BOUGHT 1,000 PRAIRIE HORSES AND WANTS MANY MORE

REGINA, Jan. 6.—(By Canadian Press)—Satisfied with the first shipment of 1,000 prairie bronchos, the government of Soviet Russia plans to purchase between 3,000 and 5,000 western Canadian horses in 1927, stated Jack Byers, representative of the Dominion Livestock branch, who with J. C. Hargrave, of the Dominion Health of Animals branch, delivered the shipment at Leningrad. General Bolinny, Cossack hero of Russia, inspected the horses and expressed satisfaction with the majority of the animals. Leaving Saskatchewan in September, the horses were landed at Leningrad late in October. Five hundred of them came from Saskatchewan and the remainder from Alberta and British Columbia.

"We received courtesy and consideration practically all the time during our stay in Russia, Mr. Byers said. "Our opportunities for observation were of course limited, but our movements were at no time hampered. From what we saw of the life of the people and of their industrial activities, it would appear that many of the reports we sometimes read, the alleged chaotic conditions in the Soviet cannot be based on authoritative information."

Powerful searchlights, sunk below ground level in a concrete trough, with flat glass cover, have been installed at London's air port, so that airplanes can land directly on the lights if necessary.

TWO BOATS BEING LINED SAME TIME

Two grain boats are being lined here at once. Work on the Ocean Transport Co's freighter Ryoka Maru, has been done at the dry dock pier, and the vessel will be finished and ready to move down to the elevator tonight. The Smith line vessel Welsh City, is being lined at the ocean dock and the vessel will not have to go to dry dock. Work on both the boats is being carried out by the dry dock staff.

JOHN BUCKHAM NEW CHAIRMAN HARBOR BOARD

SPEAKER OF LEGISLATURE WILL HEAD VANCOUVER HARBOR COMMISSION IN SUCCESSION TO COL. KIRKPATRICK

VICTORIA, Jan. 6.—Hon. John Buckham of Golden, speaker of the British Columbia legislature, will be chairman of the new Vancouver Harbor Board according to Ottawa advices. He will succeed in that position Lieut. G. H. Kirkpatrick who, with other members of the Vancouver Harbor Commission, has just been asked for his resignation by the minister of marine and fisheries. It is not known whether Mr. Buckham will have to resign from the legislature, of which he is member for Columbia riding, when he accepts the appointment.

THREE BODIES ARE RECOVERED

TWO ARE YET TO BE FOUND OF VICTIMS OF NEW YEAR MORNING DROWNING ON ARROW LAKES

NAKUSP, Jan. 6.—The bodies of six-year-old Sarah Rogers and Albert Marslund, 27, two of the five victims of the drowning on the narrows of the Columbia River across from Arrow Park were recovered on Wednesday. The others who were drowned were Mrs. Daniel Rogers, whose body was recovered on the day of the accident; Mary Kelly, aged 20, and Fanny Graham, 19. The tragedy occurred about 3:30 New Year's morning when the party were returning in a small boat from the other side of the lake after having attended a dance. Their boat capsized and all five were drowned. Arrow Park is about half way between Upper Arrow Lake and the Lower Arrow Lake on the narrows of the Columbia River. Constable W. A. Jupp of Nakusp has been in charge of search parties for the bodies.

JAP FISHERMEN MAY BE DROWNED

FEARS EXPRESSED FOR SAFETY OF SEINE BOAT WHICH LEFT CHEMAMUS FOR WEST COAST VANCOUVER ISLAND ON DECEMBER 24

VICTORIA, Jan. 6.—Anxiety is being felt by West Coast fishermen for the safety of the crew of the seine boat Jessie Island No. 4 which left Chemamus on December 26 en route to Barkley Sound with a cargo of herring nets. The name of the owners of the vessel, which is now long overdue, is uncertain, but it is believed to have been operated by Japanese and manned by a crew of from three to five Jap fishermen. In fair weather, the trip would take from thirty-six to forty-eight hours but mishap is feared from the severe storms that have been sweeping the west coast off and on for the last two weeks.

TRANSFERS IN NAVAL SERVICE

PAYMASTER COSSETTE GOES FROM ESQUIMALT TO HALIFAX—LIEUT. COMMANDER KING TO ESQUIMALT

OTTAWA, Jan. 6.—Announcement is made by the Department of National Defence that Paymaster Lieutenant Cossette R.C.N., of the naval establishment at Esquimalt has been transferred to Halifax. Lieut. Commander G. H. King, R.N., will be loaned by the British Navy to the Canadian government to replace Cossette at Esquimalt.

INDIANS MAKE GOOD PROGRESS

IMPROVEMENTS NOTED IN AGRICULTURAL LINE—LIVING CONDITIONS GREATLY ADVANCED

REGINA, Jan. 6. — (By Canadian Press). — "The year 1926 shows a marked increase in all branches of activity by the Indians of the west," according to W. M. Graham, commissioner for Indian affairs.

"Production of livestock and grains, has shown a gradual increase, but this year we have to report an untoward condition in the northern sections which reduced the yields to some extent. Even with this reduction, we are able to show almost as large an output as last year. The production of more than one million bushels of grain (wheat, oats and barley) is an indication that the Indians are busy themselves and making a success of farming. In fact, I can truthfully say that you will find many Indians farming, just as successfully as white settlers in Saskatchewan and Manitoba, and pro rata producing equally as fine crops.

"Their living conditions have been ameliorated to the degree that in many homes of Indians now, enjoy similar conditions to those in the homes of the better class of white people. Less than five per cent of the children of school age on all reserves, are not attending school and for this there are various causes."

During 1926 the department experienced some difficulty in putting up the required quantity of hay, but with not too severe a winter, it is expected that the supplies will hold out without having to provide extra fodder for the livestock, Mr. Graham said.

"Livestock has been the one point where most progress has been made. Off one reserve, \$15,000 worth of cattle were marketed. In 1925 carloads of Indian raised cattle, took first and third prizes in open competition on the Winnipeg market.

"We pride ourselves on having the finest range cattle in the West, and that is not only our opinion, but that of men who buy on the markets of the world.

"Every year we buy anywhere from 70 to 100 registered bulls, and the constant breeding for better stock, has resulted in making of our herds the best that are ranging in western Canada," Mr. Graham added.

Indian farmers during 1926, he said, had 6,000 acres of breaking on which some cropping was done. There were 27,000 acres of summer fallow, 600 acres of gardens and 800 acres of potatoes. Approximately 70,000 tons of hay were put up for winter feed.

The old time log shacks, Mr. Graham says, are disappearing and in their places are to be found modernly constructed houses. There are still some of the old Indians living in their beloved wigwams, but they also are going out of use.

"The report of Inspector Christianson, who has just returned from the Fisher River Indian reserve in Manitoba, is one of the best indications of progress that the department has received," the Commissioner, concluded.

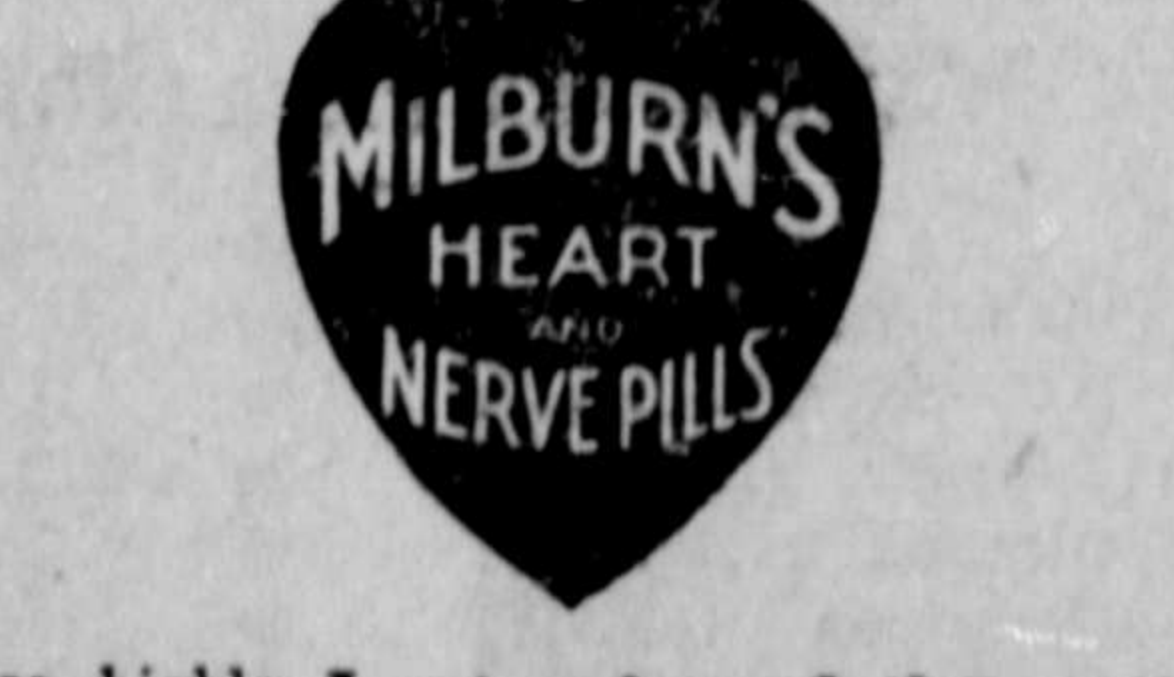

BRITISH STILL UNDER WAR ECONOMY RULES

LONDON, Jan. 6.—Britons never will be slaves to prohibition, boast many of King George's subjects who, nevertheless, still put up with anomalous restrictions imposed during the war as a precaution against air raids and to save fuel and coal.

The Daily Mail, which has revived its campaign to abolish these restrictions, imposed by "Dora"—Defense of the Realm Act—lists examples:

Sponge cakes may be sold until 9.30 p.m., but the sale of buns has to stop an hour earlier.

Potatoes must not be sold in their skins after 8 p.m., but can be sold as a salad.

Eggs cannot be sold after 8 p.m., unless boiled or made into mayonnaise.

Chocolates can be bought in theatres until 9.30 o'clock, but not cigarettes or cigars.

Apricots, green figs and loganberries can be bought at any hour, but apples, bananas and lemons are forbidden for four hours before midnight.

A shop may keep open after eight to give change to people to buy cigarettes from an automatic machine, but not for the sale of cigarettes from the store itself.

If a chemist is asked to sell a headache powder after 8 p.m., he must be provided with proof that "reasonable grounds exist for believing" that the purchaser or some other person has a headache.

LIBRARY AIDS MOVIES WITH AUTHENTIC DATA

This is turning out to be, as was predicted in this column a couple of weeks ago, the only absorbing issue of the campaign if we may call it that. Supporters of both systems—provincial police or city police—have been doing some quiet campaigning during the past week or so and there is a certain amount of keeness. The provincial police have been here long enough now for the people to judge whether their system or the old system of city policing was the more effective. Without expressing its feeling one way or the other, this paper would urge the voters to consider the matter carefully and vote for the system which it deems best. It is to be hoped that no ulterior motives will be brought into play in settling one's own mind or in advising other people how to vote on the question. Some people think that the result of the referendum may be construed as the choice for an "open" or a "closed" town.

For those who may not be familiar with municipal law, it might be stated that voters of all classifications are entitled to ballot on the police question, a majority vote deciding which system is favored.

On the sewer bylaw as on all money bylaws, only property holders or taxpayers may vote and it will require a sixty per cent vote in favor to carry.

NO TIME LOST BY CUSTOMS MINISTER.

One of the recommendations made by the chief counsel to the customs inquiry has been acted upon promptly by the department says the Edmonton Journal. The minister of customs announces that a hard and fast ruling has been laid down that ships clearing from Canada with cargoes of liquor must prove beyond doubt that these have been landed at the points for which clearance has been granted. Where evidence is available that papers are made out for fictitious trips, the cargoes will be seized.

The officials believe that by this arrangement they will put an end to the shipping of liquor to the United States. That they will succeed entirely is open to reasonable doubt, but nothing should be left undone to accomplish the result that they have in view. The treaty entered into with the American authorities demands this.

Objection has been taken to these measures on the ground that Canada has enough to do in enforcing its own laws without undertaking to help the adjoining country in making its laws effective. But the claims of good neighborliness cannot be overlooked and the situation that has arisen cannot but be in the interests of friendly relations between the Dominion and the Republic. Besides, it has been shown that such steps are imperative for our own protection.

The evidence brought out at the inquiry has demonstrated that liquor valued at millions of dollars that was supposed to have been shipped out of Canada never left our borders, but was sold here. The government has been thus robbed of very large revenues and the problem of enforcement in the Canadian provinces has been made much more difficult.

HAM AND EGGS IS FAVORITE DISH OF HOUSE OF COMMONS

LONDON, Jan. 6.—Ham and eggs is the favorite dish of the British law makers when the House of Commons has an all night sitting. On these occasions says the parliamentary restaurant manager the members frequently consume about 1,500 pounds of salt meat and about 300 eggs. The favorite time of eating, when the House is in for a long seige, is between 1 and 3 a.m.

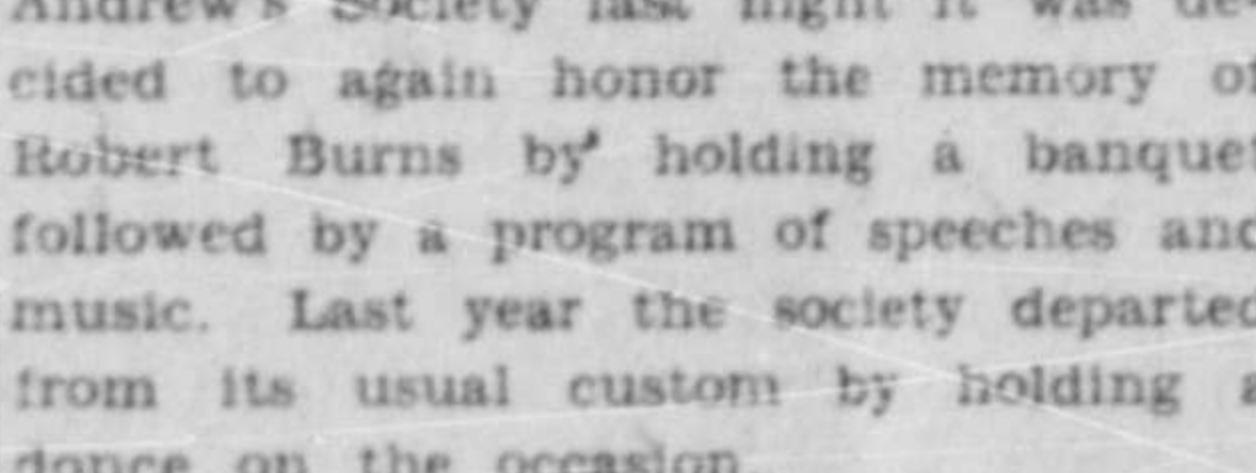

OPPOSITION TO UNITED STATES IN SPORT WORLD

REVIEW OF VARIOUS ATHLETIC COMPETITIONS DURING 1926

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(By the Associated Press).—In a year of sports competition plentifully splashed with the color of international competition, America's complete domination of the golf world, France's smashing individual triumphs in tennis and the return of Germany as an important contender for athletic honors have been outstanding.

Summing up the international campaign on various fronts of activity it is apparent that the United States, while maintaining its traditional all-around leadership, has come face to face with a rapidly widening range of opposition.

Where Great Britain and Finland, in several branches of rivalry, have been among this country's keenest foes for some time, France and Germany have left forward to be in the thick of the fight. The log of 1926 competition shows America victorious in 29 international engagements, France next with 16 triumphs—all in tennis, Germany third with eight and Great Britain fourth with seven.

The noteworthy feature of this tabulation, however, is that both France and Germany, the new threats, won more contests from America than they lost. Except for the Davis Cup, France's young tennis stars swept nearly all before them on the courts here, while Germany registered victories in swimming, billiards and tennis over the United States to add to record-breaking triumphs at home by the newest star of the track firmament, Dr. Otto Peitzner.

Britain's royal and ancient golfing branches have been badly shaken for at least five years but 1926 capped the climax. Bobby Jones won the British open crown—thus giving it an ocean voyage for the fifth time in six years. The Atlanta wizard failed to lift the British amateur title, being eliminated after putting out the defending champion, Robert Harris, but this coveted prize also fell into American hands when Jess Sweetser of New York overcame physical handicaps to capture it.

ON FOREIGN LINKS.

In another battle on foreign links, the American Walker Cup team, with Jones and Watts Gun in stellar roles, successfully defended the amateur team trophy. The British club was close to a rout for the native club swingers. Trailing Jones was Al Watrous, young American home-bred, in second place with Walter Hagen, twice former titleholder, and George Von Elm, American amateur, tied for third position.

Britain's only solace was the victory of her professionals in a team contest with a squad led by Walter Hagen, and resulting in the lop-sided tally of 13 1-2 to 1 1-2 points. Bill Mehlhorn was the only American to win his match. Hagen scored another bull's eye for Uncle Sam, however, when he staged a characteristic finish to beat Abe Mitchell, 2 and 1, in a hotly contested 72-hole match.

As a sensational tennis climax, America witnessed the bewildering spectacle of an All-French final in the national singles championship, with the solemn-visaged Rene Dacoste lifting the trophy from his team-mate, Jean Borotra, while the six-year former titleholder, William T. Tilden, sat on the side-lines.

In the Davis Cup team contest, "Big Bill" Tilden and "Little Bill" Johnston started off apparently as invincible as ever and, aided by Williams and Richards, quickly clinched the famous trophy for the seventh straight year. But Tilden twisted his knee, lost to Lacoste in the final match and then, in spite of a gallant stand, met his Waterloo a week later in the national singles tournament against Henri Cochet. Johnston, his strength unequal to the occasion, fell before Jean Borotra on the same day—an epochal overthrow of America's two super-stars, who had combined for seven previous years to repel all other rivals.

HEROIC W.O.K.

Earlier in the year, Suzanne Lenglen defeated Helen Wills in a closely fought match on the French Riviera, 6-3, 8-6, while Lacoste had given a hint of what was to come outdoors by trimming Tilden as well as Vincent Richards indoors and taking home the American indoor singles championship. Only some heroic work to measure up to the brilliancy of his countryman enabled the United States to capture an indoor "Davis Cup" series.

France's conquests were equally as impressive at home and in England, where Borotra lifted the prized Wimbledon championship. Suzanne Lenglen, finding Helen Wills out of competition through an operation for appendicitis, found no trouble disposing of the remaining American woman threat, Mary K. Browne, in the Paris championship. The temperamental French star withdrew later from the Wimbledon tournament. Kitty McKane Godfree, the English star, triumphed in this event.

Germany furnished substantial evidence of all-around athletic revival but attracted particular attention in track and field sports. Here the Teutons furnished an international sensation in the person of Dr. Otto Peitzner. This blond young middle distance runner shattered Ted Meredith's world record for the half mile, in the British championships, and later conquered Paavo Nurmi and Edwin Wide, the Scandinavian stars, in a record-shattering 50-meter race at Berlin.

Peltzer's rise has been phenomenal

as that of Nurmi, although the Teuton star apparently does not possess the running range of the Phantom Finn. Nevertheless, with Germany's re-entry into the Olympic Games in 1928, Peitzner will be a formidable contender for middle distance honors now held by Lowe of England and Nurmi.

Erich Hagenlacher, the billiard star, added to Germany's prestige by unexpectedly dethroning the young American, Jake Schaefer, as world's 18.2 ball-line title holder.

Norway sent over a super-star in the slim, wiry person of Charley Hoff, who smashed all American pole vaulting records indoors and lifted the scales of two of his country's most versatile performers, Harold Osborn and Emerson Norton, in an all-round test. But the Vaulting Viking, essaying a countrywide tour, encountered an ineligibility storm-cloud and withdrew from amateur ranks to accept professional engagements.

BRITAIN AND AMERICA

Rivalry between Great Britain and America spread to many branches of sport besides golf. In tennis, the American women's team regained the Wightman Cup in a close contest at Wimbledon, while Howard Kinsey and Vincent Richards teamed to defeat England's best in a special match abroad.

American fencers also won back the Robert M. Thompson Trophy from British swordsmen while Yankee riflemen were victorious in an international shoot at Bisley, England, in June. The Oxford-Cambridge lacrosse team, touring this country, lost 12 out of 13 matches to American teams but some amends for this disaster were made when the English universities combined to beat Princeton and Cornell at track.

International boxing interest picked up toward the end of the year with the addition of Harry Persson, the tattooed Swede, Franz Diener of Germany, and Paulino, the Basque Woodchopper, to the list of heavyweight contenders for Gene Tunney's title. In the amateur boxing field, South American countries scored the year's outstanding triumph by defeating a picked team of Americans in five out of eight classes at Buenos Aires in May.

SPORT CHAT

While at the present time there is no use made of the sports ground on Acropolis hill yet, in a few more weeks, there will be the usual rush to have the grounds placed in good shape for the summer's athletic contests. The grounds were only partly finished last year and were left in an unsatisfactory state so that at the present time they are not inviting for any class of sport. To put them in proper condition as a good athletic field will cost considerable money and yet, in their present condition, are really a menace to the various players who are obliged to use

them. After each winter the rocks begin to appear through the surface and in addition to being very uneven the grounds are not level. Just what will remedy the situation is of some concern to all followers of sport.

Duke Keats, former Edmonton hockey star, but now with Boston in the National Hockey League, is all "het" up over the ignorance of the fans who attend the games in the United States. According to Keats there isn't the "bite" in ye olde hockey game in the NHL—at least not in the western section of the loop—that was evidenced in the old Western Canada circuit. In a letter sent to a friend in Edmonton, Keats says that the fans there have but a hazy idea of what it's all about, and 99 per cent of them don't know a good play when one is worked. "The hockey business is just somewhat of a spectacle for the Yanks and the game lacks the driving urge that surcharges the air during the heat of a game in Canada," Keats writes. The Duke thinks that most of the real hockey in the NHL will be played in the rinks on the Canadian side, where the fans know all the wrinkles and pull hard for their home teams. First of all it is a novelty for the Yankee spectators, he says and furthermore the rinks are too warm to give "the players the right kind of conditions."

According to J. McGovern, writing in the Minneapolis Journal, ice hockey was first played in the United States in 1896, when the Canadian residents of Pittsburgh played their first regulation game. The success of the game was slow, due principally to public

WEEDS HELPED THIS FARMER

ALBERTA MAN TELLS HOW WILD OATS AIDED HIM IN GROWING MUCH CULTIVATED SUGAR BEET

RAYMOND, Alta., Jan. 6.—(By Canadian Press).—Since land operations have ceased, farmers here are now discussing among themselves topics relative to crop returns for the year just passed. During the course of these conversations, many interesting figures in connection with sugar beet crops, were made known.

A. J. Walton, whose beet acreage for 1926 covered an area of 25 1-2 acres, from which he produced an average of 12 1-2 tons. Fifteen acres of this plot yielded an average of more than 15 tons. The most interesting feature in connection with this crop, was the startling statement made by the grower that wild oats were the cause for the excellent yield.

Mr. Walton stated that his beet field was infested with wild oats, that for a time threatened destruction of the beet stand and it was due to the persistent method of cultivation, throughout the season, in an attempt to destroy the wild oats that resulted in the fine crop of sugar beets. Now he claims that frequent cultivation, during the growing season, is the secret of success in the growing of beets.

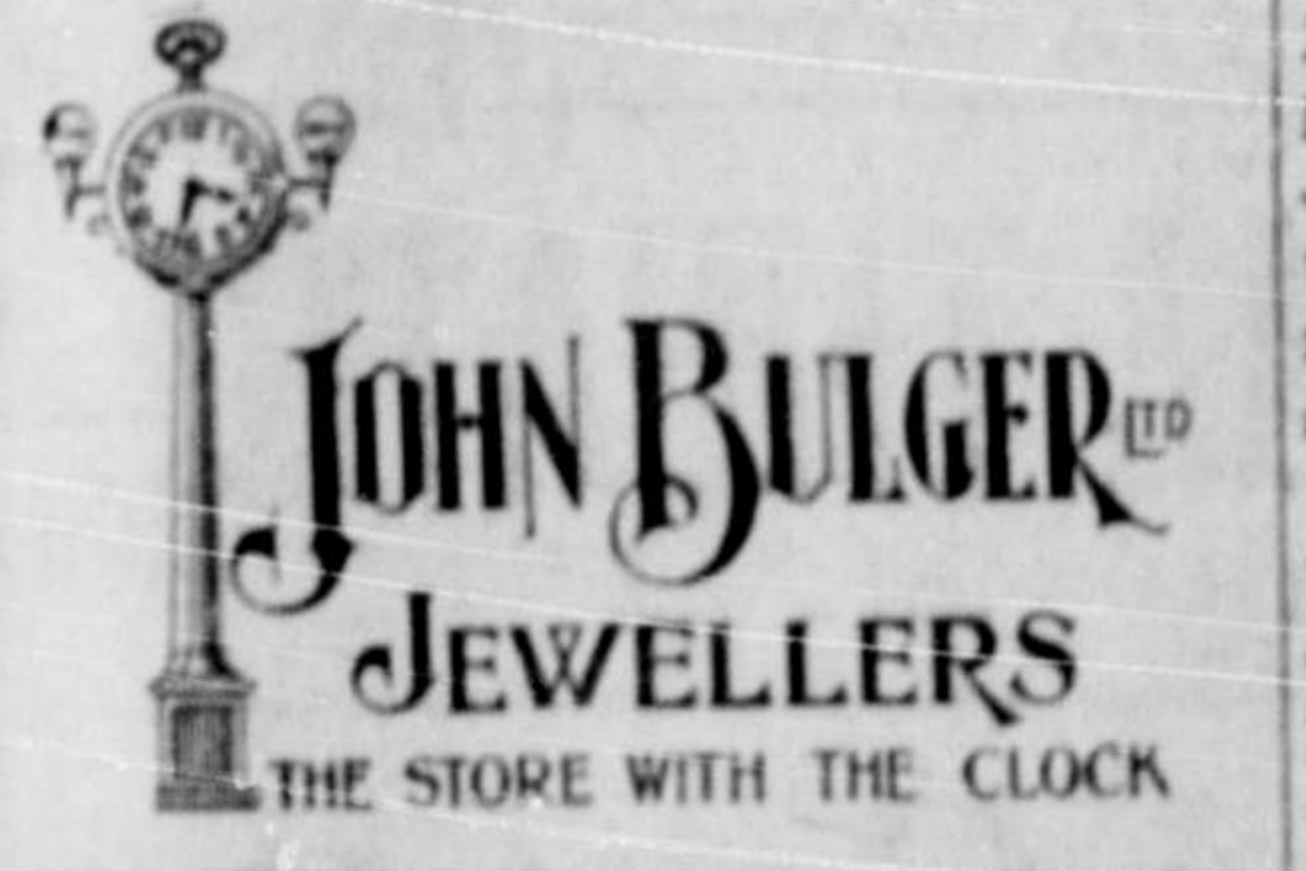

ABOLITION OF JURY SYSTEM

MANY VISITORS NATIONAL PARKS

MATTER WAS DISCUSSED AT ANNUAL MEETING OF EDMONTON LAW SOCIETY

EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 6.—(By Canadian Press)—Abolition of the existing jury system in favor of trials before a single judge was urged at the annual meeting of the Edmonton Law Society, by Neil D. MacLean, K.C.

"The jury system started in Britain to replace the trial by combat and it carries out the spirit of the same dark ages," Mr. MacLean said. "More especially" he added, "if the admiralty law were adopted in damage actions should the civil jury be abolished, because it is only a judge who gives the defendant a fair show."

Mr. Justice Hyndman favored the jury system for criminal trials as carrying on a British jurisdiction and civil juries were often better than trial by judge alone. The call of the public provided a "safety valve." Nor did Mr. Justice Ford agree that the jury system should be abolished for he had found at times that he welcomed their assistance in difficult cases.

A resolution favoring a reduction in the cost of a civil jury trial was endorsed. Sponsors of the resolution pointed out that in Ontario no fee was charged while the other provinces of the dominion had a lower rate than the fee of \$200 charged in Alberta. Under prevailing conditions it was asserted a poor litigant was often prevented from obtaining justice.

HERE WAS REALLY SCOTTISH GREETING

Moose Jaw Man Wondering if Christmas Card was not Practical Joke

MOOSE JAW, Jan. 6.—(By Canadian Press)—Unique among Christmas cards received this season, was one addressed to Frank S. Hall, a resident of this city. It was a Scotsman who sent the card and the verse on it read: "A Merry Christmas t' Ye and a Gude New Year for 1927, 1928, 1929 and 1930." On the reverse side, was written: "Please return when through with the card."

The card was delivered to Mr. Hall in an unstamped envelope. He suspects a practical joker.

NEW RECORDS MADE BY MOST OF CANADIAN SCENIC SUMMER RESORTS

CALGARY, Jan. 6.—(By Canadian Press)—The 1926 summer season witnessed the establishment of new records in the number of persons visiting the Canadian National parks.

While this increase has been general it has been most noticeable in the matter of motor tourists. Advances made in the automobile industry and in the construction of good roads, have brought corresponding advances in the growth of motor travel, until this traffic has become of great importance in the development of the country.

Highways play an important part in drawing a large number of the tourists who visit Banff and Kootenay National parks by motor. Through the Kananaskis gateway, which is the eastern entrance to the Banff park and the Radium Hot Springs gateway, which is the western entrance to the Kootenay park, there passes each year the greater part of the motor traffic to the Canadian parks in the Rockies.

The volume of travel which poured into these two parks by motor is shown by the registrations. At the Kananaskis gateway at the end of October of this year 18,069 motor cars had been registered as incoming; at Radium Hot Springs gateway, 6,593 entries were recorded, making a total of 24,662 cars entering the two parks. This number shows an increase of 5,760 over the number recorded in 1925.

Waterton Lakes, National Park, in Southern Alberta on the International boundary drew an amount of tourist travel far in excess of the previous year. The possibilities of this scenic wonderland are accentuated by the plans for extensive development announced in 1926.

The opening in June 1926 of the motor road extension from Lake Louise to Field, brought Yoho National Park for the first time into prominence in the motor tourist world. The further extension of this road which will enable motorists to proceed through Golden, is expected to be opened to travel early in 1927.

Jasper National Park, in the northern part of Alberta, had a most successful season, nearly 7,000 hotel registrations having been recorded prior to the end of October.

The National Buffalo Park at Whitecourt, Alta., drew more visitors than in former years. A very keen interest is being taken in all countries, particularly in Canada and the United States, in the efforts of the Canadian government to preserve the buffalo and also in the experiments that are being conducted at Buffalo Park in cross breeding.

DUKE OF YORK GETS WARNING

KING'S SECOND SON GETS LITTLE CONSOLATION FROM OLDER BROTHER'S EXPERIENCE

LONDON, Jan. 6.—On the eve of departure of the Duke and Duchess of York for their Australian tour today it was calculated that the Prince of Wales had shaken the hand of more than 85,000 persons in the last five years and handshaking was a strain which no longer should be imposed upon Royalty.

It was pointed out that the Duchess though young and perfectly healthy may not be able to withstand the exertions required at receptions during the six weeks the couple will be touring Australia and New Zealand.

Medical experts have recalled that Queen Victoria and before her the Georges, the Stuarts, and in fact the entire company of kings and emperors, knew nothing of the practice, and that it was King Edward who instituted the custom.

MANITOBA ASKS BEER BY GLASS

Already 80,000 Names on Petitions Started by Canadian Legion

WINNIPEG, Jan. 6.—(By Canadian Press)—Petitions still are in circulation throughout Manitoba which will be presented during the approaching session of the provincial legislature, asking for the passage of an act which would permit the sale of beer by the glass. Already about 80,000 names have been subscribed, it is officially stated.

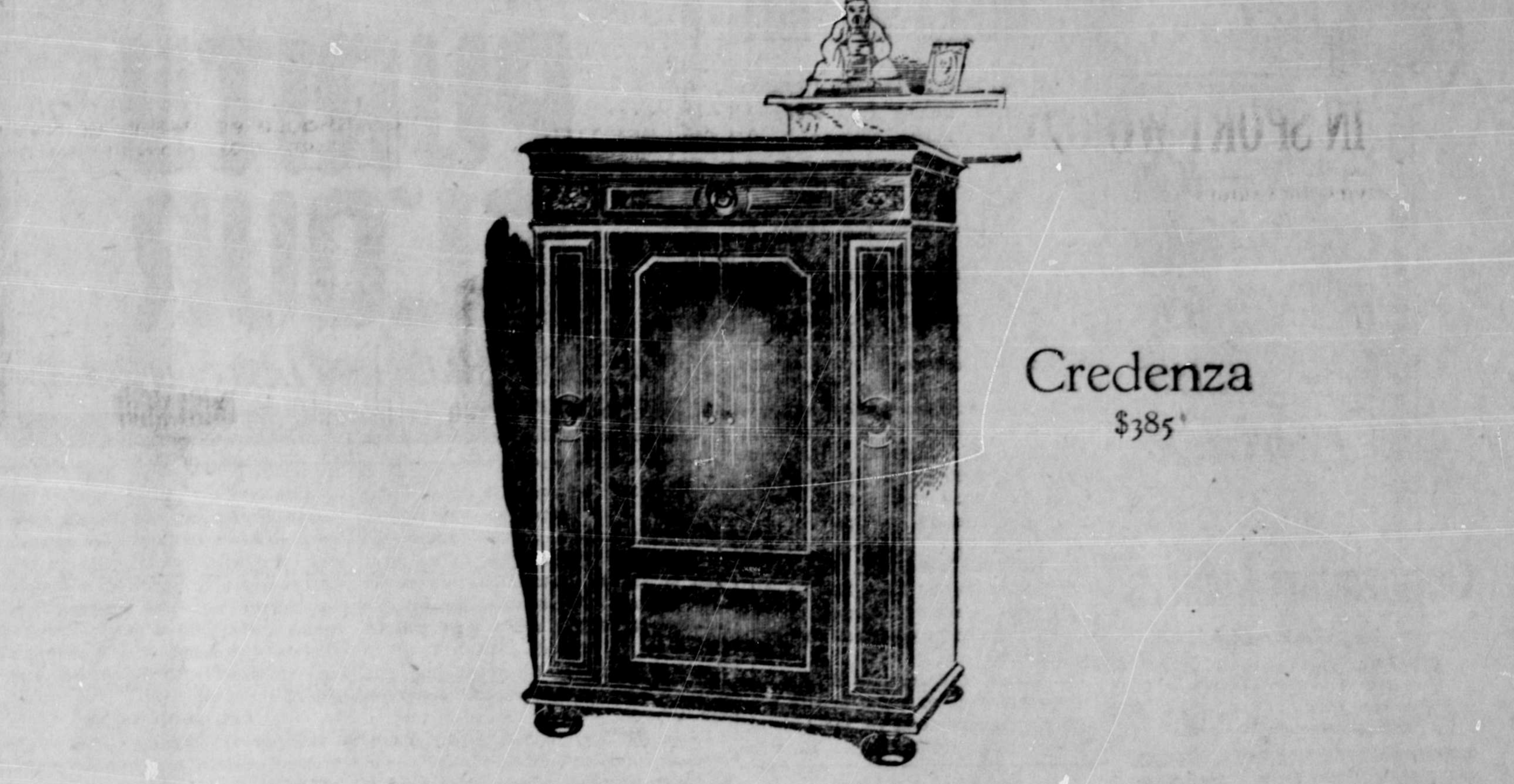

HOUSE PLANTS DURING WINTER

SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR KEEPING VARIOUS SPECIES IN GOOD CONDITION

(Experimental Farm Note.)

It is rather difficult to keep house plants in good condition throughout the long winter, hence a few hints may prove useful. Some house plants make little growth during the winter and, while they are thus at rest or nearly so, they should be given just enough water to prevent the roots from drying up. This applies particularly to palms, hydrangea and fuchsia, the two latter being kept in a cool place. Plants which are growing should be kept well watered but it is important to see that no water accumulates in the pot or in the jardiniere in which the plants are sitting, otherwise the roots will rot and the plant not thrive. This often happens to large ferns. Plants should be watered only when the soil is becoming

OIL BURNING BATTLESHIPS

NEW ERA IN UNITED STATES NAVAL HISTORY HAS FULLY DAWNED; ARCHAIC COAL BURNERS DISAPPEARING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—A new era in United States naval history will have fully dawned at the end of the year 1927 when the archaic coal-burning battleship, born more than a century ago through the inventive genius of Robert Fulton, will be a thing of the eventful past.

Three dreadnaughts, the Utah, the Wyoming, and the New York which in their days have consumed unknown quantities of coal, remain to be modernized. They will have a new set of in-burners—namely, oil-burning furnaces to place them on a par with other first-rate ships of the fleets.

FIRST USED IN 1919 Disappearance of the coal burner is a sequel to the fading of the romance which the full-sail-rigged frigate imparted to the main. In 1815 Robert Fulton built for the navy the first "fire-eating monster" which churned its magical course out to sea spelling doom to the historic wind-jammer.

OIL BETTER ALL ROUND USE Advantages of oil are found by Navy officials in its concentration of power in less mass than coal, its cleanliness, and adaptability for handling. Oil has a higher combustion efficiency and gives all ships greater cruising range.
