

Women and Children Put on Ships While Military Evacuates

Chinese troops and pickets take possession of besieged city, disperse mobs of angry coolies and soon restore order

HANKOW, January 6 .- British residents of Hankow abandoned their concession shortly before midnight when the women and children were put aboard ships in the Yangste River and British sailors, marines and volunteers left the place and boarded a British warship. Three hundred armed Chinese troops and two hundred Chinese pickets immediately occupied the concession. On their entry, the Chinese troops dispersed the angry mob of coolies and restored order. The streets, which immediately became quiet, were cleared of all Chinese except troops and pickets. All the British police were withdrawn from the streets and the Chinese were left

-in complete control.
