CROSSED OCEAN WITHOUT SEEING IT

FESTIVITIES TURN TO MOURNING FOR AMERICAN FLYER

Flight of Commander Byrd and Companions Was Arduous Passage

FOG, LOW CLOUDS, DARKNESS, DRIVING RAIN AND FAULTY COMPASS CAUSED FAILURE WITH GOAL PRACTICALLY IN SIGHT

PARIS, July 4.—During the entire time the plane America was flying over the Atlantic Ocean, there was no glimpse caught of the water on account of fog and low clouds. This, combined with darkness, driving rain and a faulty earth induction compass, resulted in the navigators losing their way when they reached the coast of France where they made a forced landing in the water.

Commander Byrd, head of the four-man expedition, estimated that he had travelled 4,200 miles when he was forced down. It was 42 hours after they had left New York that the landing was made.

The winning 25 taxi car represented Canada from 1853 until 1927. The railroad and train represented the first railway and train in Canada, when the first part of this Grand Trunk road was opened in 1853 between Montreal and Portland, an event of great importance, as it gave Canada an outlet to the sea.

Queen Victoria was represented signing papers on March 29, 1867, which became the British North America Act. By Royal Proclamation it came into effect on July 1, since called Dominion Day.

The gold chair, robe and crown, represented His Majesty, King George.

The flags, flowers, maple leaves and girls represented Canada. Canada's Capital Does Honor to Goodwill Messenger Whose Death Marred Festival There

OTTAWA, July 4.—From national thanksgiving, Ottawa turned yesterday to national mourning for Lieut. J. T. Thad Johnson, American army flier, who was killed on Dominion Day when his plane, escorting Col. Charles Lindberg here, was struck by another plane in landing. The body was borne through the streets on a British gun carriage under the Stars and Stripes, the funeral being of full military nature. Thousands of people lined the streets as the cortege passed. As a special train bearing the body home to Selfridge field, Michigan, moved through the Ontario countryside, Lindberg's plane, "Spirit of Louis," in which the Atlantic Ocean was crossed, led seven other United States army machines, circling overhead and dropping flowers.

FIRE CAUSES LOSS OF WORK

Many Indians Thrown out of Employment by Destruction of Vanarsdol Mill

VANARSOL, July 4.—The loss by fire last week of the Vanarsdol lumber mill just below the mouth of Kitselas canyon will throw out of employment Indians of Newtnow, the descendants of the totem pole Indians of the "Gibraltar of the Kitselas" who recently gave encouragement to the Canadian government totem pole committee to preserve the totem poles of the Usk vicinity. George Kitselas, the direct descendant of the great chief of the south side of the Skeena at this place, was sawyer at the mill. It is fortunate that at this season of hot days—although cold nights—the Indians who can no longer find employment in the mill will be able to get work on the coast in the fleets of the salmon canneries.

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SUCCESSFUL CELEBRATION

Prince Rupert's celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of Canada's Confederation was an unqualified success. If every community's celebration in the Dominion was as creditable, Canada indeed did herself proud. It was planned to be the biggest demonstration ever attempted in the history of the city and so, no one will deny, it turned out to be. Weather conditions were ideal and the arrangements for every feature went off without a hitch. The committees in charge are deserving of much congratulation.

The United States government went out of its way to help at least two Canadian cities celebrate the Diamond Jubilee. Ottawa got Lindberg and Prince Rupert had the "Reno."

OUTSTANDING FEATURE

The outstanding feature was undoubtedly the street pageant on Friday morning and its illuminated repetition on Saturday night. Various organizations entered with zest into the spirit of the affair and much energy and originality was expended with the result that Prince Rupert, in the first attempt of this kind, made a showing that might have put many a larger community to shame. The pageant was a spectacular success again reflecting much credit upon those who arranged and participated in it.

THE BOYS' BAND

The Boys' Band did more perhaps than any other single organization in enlivening the four days of festivity. If at no other time, it fully demonstrated its value and the place it has taken in the life of the city. Bandmaster Wilson and his boys fully earned any stipend they may have been given and this unique body of musicians, of which the city may well feel proud, incidentally indicated that it is making most satisfactory progress under its energetic and skilled instructor.

RELIGIOUS THANKSGIVING

The united service for prayer and thanksgiving on Sunday was a timely climax to the festivities. It was the occasion for quiet reflection and rejoicing at the blessings which have been bestowed upon and the progress that has been made by this fair land in its comparatively brief sixty years of corporate history. This part of the program might well have been more substantially attended.

It is to be hoped that the success of the Dominion Day celebration may be repeated in the city's next big event—the Fall Fair. If everybody gets behind it, as they did on July 1, there need be no fears about the bills being paid.

The visit of U.S.S. Reno for the occasion was a happy indication of the United States government's desire to assist Canada and the city of Prince Rupert in the celebration of an important milestone in its history. This friendly gesture on the part of the great neighbor to the south is deserving of great appreciation. Some day Canada may be able to return the act of courtesy.

ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATED

Protestant Ministers Unite in Final Feature of Diamond Jubilee Celebration

A congregation numbering some two or three hundred assembled Sunday afternoon at the corner of Second Avenue and Sixth Street for the prayer and thanksgiving service in connection with the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation celebration in this city. The service was conducted from the flag-draped balcony of the Prince Rupert Hotel by Protestant ministers of the city with Archdeacon G. A. Rix presiding and delivering the address of the afternoon. Mayor Newton and A. J. Prudhomme, chairman of the celebration committee, were also on the platform.

The Boys' Band was in attendance and played for the singing of "O Canada" at the opening of the service and "God Save the King" at the close. During the proceedings "The Last Post" was sounded by Bandmaster Wilson in commemoration not only of the early builders of Canada but of the Canadians who laid down their lives in more recent stress. The congregation stood with heads bared and bowed.

Hymns for the service were "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" and "From Ocean Unto Ocean." Psalm 72 was read by Rev. J. R. Frizell, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, with responses by the congregation. Rev. Prof. Barfoot offered thanksgiving prayers for the Empire, Canada's heritage and Confederation. The scripture lesson, Deuteronomy 8, was read by Rev. T. D. Rinde, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church; Capt. J. Stobart of the Salvation Army led in prayer, and the benediction was pronounced by Rev. J. R. Frizell.

The feature of the afternoon's proceedings was an eloquent address by Archdeacon Rix. In opening, he referred to the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee which had been held in Prince Rupert. For its size, he felt Prince Rupert had done as creditably as any other city in the Dominion could have done. Congratulations were due the committees whose energy and organization had been rewarded with such splendid success. The speaker referred to the assistance that had been given by the Boys' Band. It had done a great deal to enhance and enliven the proceedings. The service now being held was a fitting and all-important part of the program.

CANADA'S ASSETS

Introducing his subject, Archdeacon Rix related briefly the history of the North American continent leading up to the Confederation of Canada. Many assets had contributed to the building up of the Dominion since that time. Important among these assets were the fine type of men who had made up the Fathers of Confederation and those who had carried on the work. The speaker referred particularly to Sir John A. Macdonald and Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Another important asset had been the British connection. Canada had been growingly British and so, if it were to prosper, it should continue to be. This did not mean that immigrants from other lands were not welcome but it did mean that Canada expected those people to adopt and cherish the British ideals and traditions.

Still another asset was the greatness of the land with its enormous extent from ocean to ocean, its fertile fields and teeming lakes, rivers and seas and its vast natural resources. It was a wonderful land with great development and prosperity in store; a land, as rich as any alluded to in scriptures.

The asset above all others, however, was the firm foundation of the Dominion in a faith and sentiment big and clean, its belief in God who bestowed all good things upon it. Canada should be greatly gratified to God for all its benefits and, while mortal things might be patriotically honored, the hymn above all for Canadians should be the "King of Kings and Lord of Lords."

HIGH TAXATION ON CIGARETTES ROBBING CANADA OF REVENUE

Immense Quantities Brought Into Country and Smuggling is Rife

(Edmonton Journal)

ASTOUNDING figures were given to the tariff board with regard to the smuggling of cigarettes from across the border. The president of the Imperial Tobacco company put the number thus brought into the country at 600,000,000, which would mean a net loss of revenue to the Dominion of \$2,500,000.

The stamp duty on manufactured cigarettes in Canada is six dollars per thousand as against three dollars in the States. There is thus a large inducement to engage in smuggling operations. What the manufacturers want is reduction of the duty to the American level. They would then be able to make a large cut in the prices that they put on their products. This would be welcome to the purchasers of these, but it is the effect on the public revenues to which chief consideration has to be given.

There is no object in keeping the duty up if the federal treasury as a consequence suffers such a loss as that claimed. Whatever one thinks of the habit of cigarette smoking, there can be no disagreement about the desirability of having it yield as large a revenue to the coffers of the Dominion as possible and the present high taxation, there is little reason to doubt, is defeating its purpose. From the first it was predicted that it would. If the tariff board finds that the situation is as described by those urging the change, it should not hesitate to recommend that the stamp duty be made the same as in the neighboring country.

HIDDEN CREEK BECAME ANYOX

Natives Told of Mountain of Gold in That Neighborhood in Early Days

STORY OF MINING PROGRESS

Was Sold in 1910 to Granby Company by T. Hodgins, a Butte Banker

(Granby News)
Anyox is the Indian name for the little stream emptying into Granby Bay near the headwaters of which, about the year 1899, Luke Nelson and Max Collison, of Kincolith, staked two mineral claims, calling them Alpha and Beta. The English for Anyox, as far as can be gathered, is Hidden Creek, the name by which the group of claims surrounding the original locations on Mammoth Bluff are now known to the mining fraternity.

Like most mining centres, Anyox has had its share of romance. Wherever prospectors have their existence, strange tales have a habit of finding believers; and it was because of wondrous stories whispered in the older days to eager-listening white men by the natives of this North Coast that indirectly led to the finding of the body of ore which has since been developed into an industry of considerable magnitude. Some of those colorful-speaking Indian narrators even told a real "mountain of gold" at a far away spot near the shores of Observatory Inlet; and many attempts to prove those stories were made from time to time; but while no mountain of real gold ever materialized to dazzle the sight of the seekers, the claims back on Hidden Creek have proven veritable store-houses of hidden wealth.

The original locators of the ground did not come to affluence by virtue of their discoveries, however. Shortly after the claims were staked, Messrs. Nelson and Collison disposed of them to M. K. Rodgers, representing what was then known as the Daly Estate, for \$6,000, taking a modest cash payment of \$300 to bind the bargain. On taking the bond, Rodgers planned certain development work and proceeded for a year, at the end of which time, acting on the advice of their field expert, the Daly interests abandoned the property.

It was then restaked by the Rev. J. B. McCullagh, a clergyman stationed at Alyansh, on the Naas River, some adjoining ground surrounding the Alpha being recorded by Messrs. Rudge, Robinson and Flewin, of Port Simpson. Later, McCullagh allowed his claim to lapse, when it was restaked and consolidated with the Flewin-Rudge-Robinson group.

Just two years after this consolidation had been effected, J. T. Hillis, scouting through the district, obtained an option on the claims for \$35,000. He spent some \$50,000 with fairly satisfactory results, but the panic of 1907 interfered with his financial plans and he was forced to offer the property for sale. Hearing that it was on the market, and having great faith in its possibilities, Rodgers, having in the meantime left the Daly interest, secured another option on the property, this time for \$135,000. This option was completed, the money being put up by T. Hodgins, a banker of Butte, Montana. The exercising of the bond, together with certain development necessitated by the agreement meant an investment of \$250,000. It was then that Hodgins, not wishing to risk any more money in a mining venture, asked Rodgers to look for a purchaser. This he did, interesting the Granby Company, and it was sold to its present owners in 1910. Since that time the story of Anyox may be read in the mining history of British Columbia.

PORT SIMPSON IN EARLY DAYS

Important Part in Early History of Development of British Columbia

Soon after the establishment of Fort Langley the Hudson's Bay Company decided upon the construction of a second trading post on the British Columbia coast as a place to which the Indians could resort for trade, and thus check the advances of the Boston Traders, says the Vancouver Province.

Accordingly in 1830 the schooner Cadboro, Captain Aemilius Simpson, and the Eagle, Captain John Costello, were despatched to the northward to locate a suitable spot upon which to build. On August 30, 1830, they determined that the best location was where the Indian village of Ewen Naas, on the Naas River, stood.

In May, 1831, Captain Simpson returned to the place in the Dryad accompanied by the Vancouver, Captain William Ryan, and established the post, which became known as Fort Naas.

Captain Simpson, operating from Fort Naas, became ill while trading at Skidegate in August of the same year, and the following month died at the fort.

MOVED SITE

Three years later, in 1834, it was decided to move the location of the post, and this was effected to McLoughlin Bay, where the new post was named Fort Simpson, in honor of the captain.

Captain Simpson had the reputation of being an excellent but eccentric officer. He is said to have insisted on wearing kid gloves while on the quarter deck of his vessel, and if a storm was brewing or blowing would change those which might be encasing his hands for white ones.

Fort Simpson became the centre of white man's civilization on the northern coast and remained so until Prince Rupert was decided upon as the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway twenty years ago.

HOSTILE NATIVES

The trade of the Tsimpshans of the Naas and Skeena Rivers, and the war-like Haidas from the Queen Charlotte Islands centered at Fort Simpson, and often battles between these hostile natives originated as a result of their rivalry for the trade of the white man. On one occasion the Haidas and Tsimpshans took up the dispute of two women and waged war on the beach outside of the stockade of the fort.

A number of braves on each side were killed, but eventually the Haidas, being the weaker party, were driven to their canoes and made their escape to their island home, only to seek reinforcements and descend upon detached parties of their enemies. It was some time before this war was brought to an end by the scattering of swans' down.

PARTY LINES ARE NOT FOLLOWED STRICTLY IN THE PRAIRIE PROVINCES

(Manitoba Free Press)

Party lines do not cut much ice today in the prairie provinces of Canada. No party or group can survive here on its reputation or on its traditions. If it does not possess a certain definite angle toward western problems and show a willingness to submerge its party leanings in order to bring about the fullest co-operation of all the people, it has no chance of getting anywhere. The people will not stick to it. They will jump the party traces overnight. This may present a situation that is a vexation and an amazement to the old party disciples who cannot understand why the shaking of the old party oat box does not hold the animals within the fold, but at the same time it reveals a healthy and highly desirable state of public opinion. It reveals a public alertness that is one of the signposts to progress and development.

STRANGE METHOD OF EASTERN POLITICS

(Edmonton Journal)

Strange things are happening these days in New Brunswick. The action of the Conservatives of Victoria-Carleton in deciding to offer no opposition to the candidate of the King government, though they had carried the seat by large majorities at the last two elections, is unique in Canadian politics. The explanation, quite evidently, is that they hope by this course to make sure that the government will take over a railway in the future of which the constituency is much interested.

MOTOR CAR LICENSES IN ALBERTA INCREASE

EDMONTON, July 4.—Motor car licenses of the 1927 variety have been issued thus far to the number of approximately 59,000, with the year only half gone. This is considerably ahead of last year's figures for the same period and promises to make a new record for automobiles in Alberta before the year is out. The 1926 total was 70,000, and according to present prospects that figure will be well outdistanced when the next six months' business is all in. July is ordinarily the heavy month of the year in the issue of new licenses, and it is expected that its reputation will be fully sustained this year.

OXFORD OPEN WIDE DOORS TO WOMEN

OXFORD, England, July 4.—Oxford University has promulgated a statute admitting women to all professorships, readerships, and University teacherships. The principle has hitherto been recognized by the university, but the statute puts it on an official footing. In future the administrative posts may also fall to women. A woman chancellor and vice-chancellor now are possibilities.

EIGHTH OF INCH OFF BRITISH CIGARETTES

LONDON, July 4.—An eighth of an inch has been chopped off British cigarettes since Winston Churchill taxed a few pence onto the tobacco tax as an aid in budget balancing.

Popular brands are still sold at 20 for a shilling, and the fact that they had been shortened was not generally known until revelations were made in the House of Commons by Labor members, who have opposed the tobacco levy in their fight for a free breakfast table.

CLUB FOR WOMEN LEARNING TO FLY

CHICAGO, July 4.—Six women flyers of Chicago have organized a club for women who wish to learn air navigation under competent—and masculine—tutelage. There are no dues and the club will have no profits, explained Mrs. E. Lewis Campbell, president.

The sole purpose of the club is to recruit aviatrixes. Mrs. Campbell's husband heads the Chicago Flying Club.
