### TO CONSIDER TAKING OVER PROV. LINES

Dominion Considering Proposal to Merge all Railways in C.N. System

OTTAWA, Dec. 21.-As a result of the recent conference of premiers. it is understood that the Dominion government is considering the problem of taking ever all provincial railways and merging them in the Canadian National. New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have been trying to unload two rallways for some time past and Alberta is also keen to get rid of the northern lines. British Columbia has the P.G.E.

In each case much depends on the terms demanded by the provinces and the amount of pressure brought to bear to have the policy carried out. The management of the C.N.R. does not want some of the lines, especially the P.G.E., but it is well known that Sir Henry Thornton would like to have the grain from the Peace River country routed over the National.

The matter is likely to come up for discussion again early in the new year, but nothing has been said to indicate what will be the result.
