Farewell Message of Premier Coates Given in Vancouver Address

Urges British Dominions to take advantage of heritage and meet responsibilities--speaks of trade

VANCOUVER, January 24 .- "We have an extraordinary heritage and tremendous possibilities. We should make the best of it and value the freedom that is ours after centuries of struggle. If we are loyal to ourselves, we will be loyal to the Empire, which means equal opportunities, safety and security for all who live in it."

This was the farewell message of Premier Coates of New Zealand to the Canadian people delivered at the conclusion of an address before the Canadian Club here Saturday night prior to his departure on Sunday for San Francisco whence he sails for home this week.

Referring to New Zealand's adverse* trade balance with Canada, Premier Coates said: "Don't think for a moment that I think Canada is to blame. Perhaps, our own business is at fault and. if we can map out a way in which better business relations can be established, we will try to do so. On our present trip. we met with most sympathetic consideration at Ottawa and your government has shown its willingness to give practical assistance. TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 24 .- (By Canadian Press).--Urging a universal of rules for professional and amateur hockey in Canada, James T. Suther and, Kingston, Ont., former president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and the Ontario Hockey \s- said that he had undoubtedly hockey throughout the country.


