SILVER ORE STRIKE AT ALICE ARM

FRENCH CANADIANS OUTNUMBER ENGLISH TWENTY YEARS

Cost of Shipping Coal to Ontario is Decided

Railway Commission Reports on Cost Which Operator Says is Too Great to be Overcome

OTTAWA, September 14.—The proposal to ship Alberta coal to Ontario received a bad jolt today when the Board of Railway Commissioners reported on the cost of the scheme. The majority report finds that the out-of-pocket cost of moving Alberta coal to Ontario is \$7.20 a ton. Inclusive of the cost of transportation, overhead and superintendence the cost is \$10.07 a ton and the cost "plus an element of profit" would be \$12.20 a ton.

LOCAL CANNERY CASE ARGUED

Sommerville Cannery Appeal Being Heard by Supreme Court Judge

VANCOUVER, Sept. 14.—Prince Rupert figured in the Vancouver courts again yesterday. On a stated case for appeal by Magistrate Alexander, who acquitted accused in the police court, A. B. Macdonald, counsel for the Dominion Fisheries department, asked Mr. Justice Macdonald of the supreme court to find the Somerville Cannery Co. guilty of the charge of operating a cannery at Seal Cove, Prince Rupert without obtaining a Dominion license. The right of the federal authorities to license a cannery is at issue.

The Magistrate held that Parliament had no power to enact Section 7A of the fisheries act compelling a fish cannery to take out an annual license. Mr. Justice Macdonald's judgment will be final in the matter but the Ottawa authorities have arranged for a reference on the constitutional question to the supreme court of Canada.

OLD GLORY IS PICKED UP BY STEAMER KYLE

Wing and Tanks Found But Engine and Body Gone Says Message From Vessel

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—A message from the steamer Kyle says Old Glory wreckage has been picked up consisting of 34 feet of wing containing three tank sections, glass, fuel, gauges and feed pipes. The fourth tank was missing. The other three contained gasoline. The engine and body had evidently been torn from the wings.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 14.—Charles Wright has been arrested charged with "breaking and entering" in connection with the robbery Sunday of \$2,750 from the Cordova Street, liquor store and liquor of about equal value.

ROUND WORLD PLANE HAS REACHED JAPAN

TOKIO, Sept. 14.—The round the world plane Pride of Detroit landed at Kasimugaura naval field 45 miles north-east of here this afternoon from Omura.

French Canadians Will Soon Outnumber English Speaking Declares Prominent Speaker

VANCOUVER, September 14.—With the French Canadian population doubling every twenty years, J. A. Paulhus, vice-president of the Chamber de Commerce de Montreal in an address to the Canadian Chamber of Commerce yesterday, predicted that they would outnumber the English speaking part of the population by 1950. He said the habitant had assisted in Canada's great problem of underpopulation by raising large families of healthy and vigorous sons and daughters and by teaching them to settle on the farms and lands of the Dominion.

Rich High Grade Silver Ore Strike is Made on Kitsault River on Silver Cord Group

A new strike of high grade silver-lead-zinc ore has been made on a big quartz vein which has been traced for a distance of 2,000 feet on the Silver Cord group on the northeast fork of the Kitsault River which is under development by the Kitsault-Eagle Silver Mines Ltd., stated W. G. McMorris, head of the company, who was a passenger bound from Alice Arm to Vancouver on the Catala last night. The assay value of the ore has not yet been determined but similar appearing ore encountered on No. 1 level of the mine assayed 258.8 ounces of silver to the ton. The new find is a continuation of this high grade ore and the latest exposure shows ten feet of ore, two feet on the footwall side being almost solid galena-zinc while the balance is good milling ore. Development work will be continued on the surface showings as well as driving a No. 2 tunnel.

MUST PAY FOR FIGHTING FIRE

VANCOUVER, Sept. 14.—In default of the appearance of either of the defendants, Mr. Justice Macdonald in the Supreme Court yesterday awarded the Attorney General of B.C. judgment against the Trincomalee Fishing Company and Colonel Charles Flick for \$1805, the expenses involved in fighting a thirty acre bush fire on Galiano Island in 1926.

MINING CONGRESS MEMBERS ARRIVE

VANCOUVER, Sept. 14.—Representing the mining industry in all parts of the British Empire, three hundred and ten members of the Empire Mining and Metallurgical Congress arrived in Vancouver this morning, immediately proceeding to Victoria.

W. J. Rooney, plant superintendent of Canadian National Telegraphs with headquarters in Edmonton, arrived on the Prince George this morning from Vancouver and proceeded by train to Smithers whence he will return to the city tomorrow afternoon on periodical duties.

REGINA MAN DEAD
REGINA, Sept. 14.—Hon. George A. Bell, provincial treasurer from 1912 to 1917, is dead.

Storm Struck Coast of Mexico Taking Big Toll of Life and Property

NOGALES, Arizona, September 14.—A cyclone of intense severity which whipped up a tidal wave is believed to have extended over a thousand miles of the coast line last Wednesday spreading death and destruction over the west coast of Mexico. The first information of the disaster reached here Tuesday. Meagre reports are that the death toll might reach into hundreds while other hundreds, maybe thousands, have been made homeless. Shipping suffered heavily.

Three seaports Guaymas, Salina Cruz, and Manzanillo are reported to have suffered property loss while two vessels are missing. The storm is described as one of the worst hurricanes in the history of western Mexico.

The hurricane which swept the west coast of Mexico for three days last week was one of the worst experienced in that district, said a wireless report received by the Panama Mail Steamship Company from Captain Holland of the liner City of Panama from Mazatlan. He said that his own ship put out to sea and rode out the storm for four days.

WRECKAGE WAS PROBABLY THAT OF MONOPLANE

Bright Yellow Wood With Several Wires Dangling From it Seen off Flattery
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—A piece of wreckage painted a bright yellow with several wires dangling from it and thought possibly to be part of the monoplane Golden Eagle missing from the Honolulu flight contestant, was sighted in the ocean several miles off Cape Flattery on September 1 by members of the crew of the four-masted fishing schooner William H. Smith, Captain Gustav Schmidt, master of the vessel, reported Tuesday. The vessel was not equipped with wireless and no one on board had any knowledge of the airplane race. The ship was four days out from the Aleutian Islands. It was thought to be a piece of another vessel and no attempt was made to pick it up.

SEES PORTS OF COUNTRY BUSY

Route of Saskatchewan Says Japan Shortened 1,000 Miles
VANCOUVER, Sept. 14.—Addressing the Canadian Chamber of Commerce last night, Premier Gardiner of Saskatchewan said that because of the changing trade routes and development of the wheat land Vancouver must eventually become the metropolis of Canada. The route from Liverpool to Japan would be shortened a thousand miles by the Hudson Bay railway. The Premier believed that if Canada were fully developed there would be more trade than all the ports could handle.

LOCAL CATTLE QUITE FREE OF TUBERCULOSIS

J. D. Macdonald, provincial veterinarian, who has been on a visit to the district inspecting cattle, before leaving for the south on the Catala, told the Daily News that everything here was quite free from tuberculosis. "Last year when I was here everything was all right and today I find the same condition," he said.

DOLLAR IS PRESIDENT CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

VANCOUVER, Sept. 14.—A. M. Dollar, past president of the Vancouver Board of Trade, was chosen president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce at the closing session today.

AERIAL SURVEY FOR ROAD

An aerial survey is being made for the highway between Prince Rupert and Terrace and it is possible that as a result some other than the Skeena River canyon may be found. If such should be chosen it is to be hoped that it will be investigated thoroughly because the river road has many features to commend it. It is to be a scenic highway, the scenery on the river cannot be excelled. That also is probably the shortest route. At any rate what is wanted is the best route and the most easily built and maintained.

PREMIER BRACKEN'S PROPOSAL

There is a good deal of sense in the proposal made by Premier Bracken in regard to the fiscal policy of the country. Today there is no possibility of free trade between Canada and the rest of the world. The tariff is here to stay. No political party talks about free trade. Premier Bracken is a little out of date in mentioning this fact. The weakness in his policy is in suggesting to relegate the setting of the duties to a committee of unbiased economists, because there is not any such thing. Unbiased people have not yet been born. Even on the judicial bench we find bias, so how are we to expect anything else from economists.

The method of relegating work to people who have not made a study of politics has been tried and failed. The step between an economist and a politician is a very short one.

COST OF LIVING COMING DOWN

Is the cost of living coming down? Wheat is dropping in price. Potatoes are cheap and seem likely to be. Vegetables are plentiful and clothes are being sold at low prices. The staples on which a good many people depend are costing less. Of course the demands of a good many people are daily becoming more expensive and that is what chiefly constitutes the high cost of living.

The other day a visitor to Prince Rupert wanted to buy a cheap watch. He found what he wanted at a local store and in a call at the Daily News stated that it cost him fifty cents less here than he would have paid for the same in Vancouver. That is a little item but it is one that indicates what is happening in many other lines.

PRODUCING FOOD FOR OURSELVES

In an address before the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Premier MacLean pointed out an improvement that has taken place in British Columbia in the past ten years. A decade ago the province imported 35 per cent of its food supply whereas last year it imported only 22 per cent and at the same time exported large quantities, the total food exports being valued at eight million dollars. That is making progress. It is an indication of the trend of the times. We are naturally a producing province. We export quantities of lumber and shingles, fish, minerals and it seems now that we also export farm products. For instance we sold a number of horses the other day to the Soviet government. We export poultry and livestock, grain and fruit.

BILLION BUSHELS OF GRAIN

According to figures prepared by the bureau of statistics it is shown that Canada this year is raising about a billion bushels of grain. That is an immense production for a population of nine millions, especially when it is considered that part of the country is devoted almost wholly to mining and lumbering and fishing. It is this wealth of grain that makes the country prosperous. With a good price paid to the farmers, each producer becomes a good customer for the luxuries of life. That makes the manufacturers happy. It is to be hoped that the Pool will be able to keep the wheat price stable so that the farmers may continue to prosper.

PARTY SHIBBOLETHS PASSING

As a proof that party shibboleths are passing, the following little paragraph is from the Edmonton Journal, a newspaper that has consistently supported the Conservative candidates in the past: "Canada was undergone a vast change since the National Policy was adopted. The west was then just coming into being. Those who hold that it is sufficient to reiterate the principles on which Sir John A. Macdonald attained power in 1878 and continued in office for so long a period, are blind to the altered conditions that have been brought about in the interval."

JINX FOLLOWED FIRST SEAPLANE

Ungainly Craft Never Rose Into Air and Firm Went Bankrupt

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 14.—The present epidemic of long distance flying attempts has recalled here that the hope of negotiating a transatlantic hop prevailed as long as 15 years ago in the mind of at least one man, who went so far as to build an airship for the venture, only to have it fall because the craft would not rise.

It was at Savannah, Ga., several years after Glenn Curtiss and the brothers had been successful in their balloon experiments, that Captain Matthew A. Batson, a retired officer of the army engineering corps, conceived the idea of an air voyage from St. John's, Newfoundland to Ireland via the Azores.

With this objective, he formed the Batson Air Navigation Company, early in 1913, with a factory on Dutch Island, near Savannah.

Associated with Batson was Israel Elmgren, a boat builder of Thunderbolt, near Savannah and, with a force of eleven men they completed a hydro-aeroplane for the flight in November 1913.

ODD LOOKING CRAFT

Accounts of it at that time described the ship as "by far the oddest looking flying vessel the country had seen, at first glance being not unlike the type of government dredge used in harbor improvement work." But Captain Batson and his co-workers were confident it would skim through the skies at from 40 to 65 miles an hour.

Weighing 9,000 pounds, it was powered by three Emerson, 100 horsepower, two cylinder engines and had two eleven-foot propellers, one in front and one behind, capable of 1,000 revolutions a minute. There were six pairs of wings, with a spread of 39 feet. The ship itself measured ten by twenty feet. Quarters were provided for a crew of six men, and the central pontoon was fitted for wireless apparatus.

But the ungainly craft never rose into the air. Day after day, its motors roared up and down the Wilmington river and desperate efforts were made by its designer to take off.

Finally, the failure was credited to a "jinx" brought on by the number of men—13—who participated in the construction of the plane and attempts to make it fly were abandoned.

SMALLER SHIP

Work on a much smaller ship, carrying only one engine, was immediately started and its conception was crowned with certain success.

By this time, however, the resources of both Captain Batson and Elmgren were exhausted, and with no more capital available, the project was given up and the Batson Air Navigation Company became bankrupt.

Soon afterward, Captain Batson returned with his family to their former home in New Jersey. He died a year or two later, when more than 50 years of age.

SIGNALLING SCHOOL FOR FIVE WEEKS TO BE HELD IN CITY

C.S.M.S. I. Read is expected to arrive from Victoria on September 21, to hold a five weeks school of instruction in signalling. The Morse Code will be taught also the sending of messages by the Lucas lamp, flags, heliograph, buzzer and telephone.

A cup has been put up for competition this year by the Infantry Association of Military District XI to be awarded to the Signal Section obtaining the highest number of points at the test examination. The local section headed the list last year and a determined effort is to be made this year to again top the list and bring the cup to Prince Rupert.

Sgt. Major Read will also hold a school for instructing the High School Cadets in Semaphore and Morse signalling while he is here. A few more men can be accepted in the regimental signal section but application will have to be made before September 20.

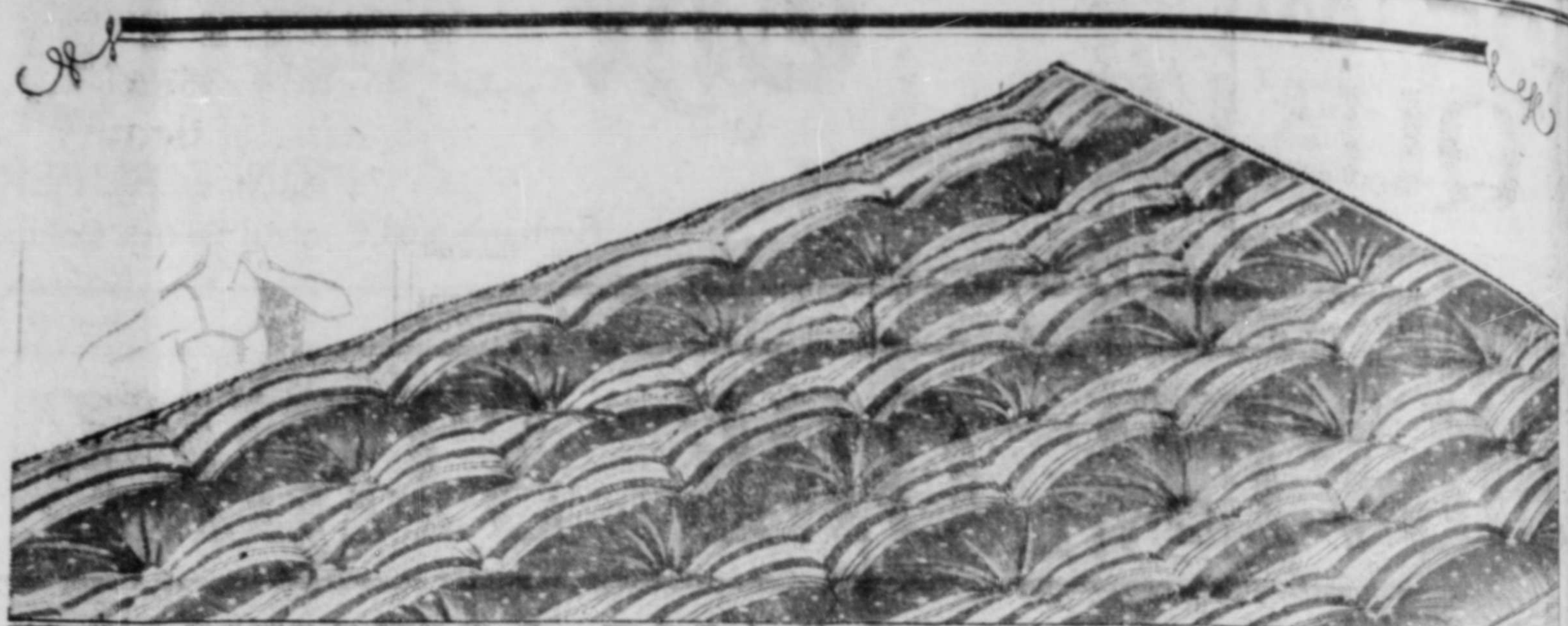
EATING COFFEE IS COMMON IN TURKEY

VORONEJ, Russia, Sept. 14.—The Usman locality of the Voronej province with a population of some ten thousand people appears to be the "wettest" spot in the Soviet Union. It is reported that during the last year it has consumed 100,000 gallons of state produced vodka, representing a sum of \$440,000—equalling the yearly budget

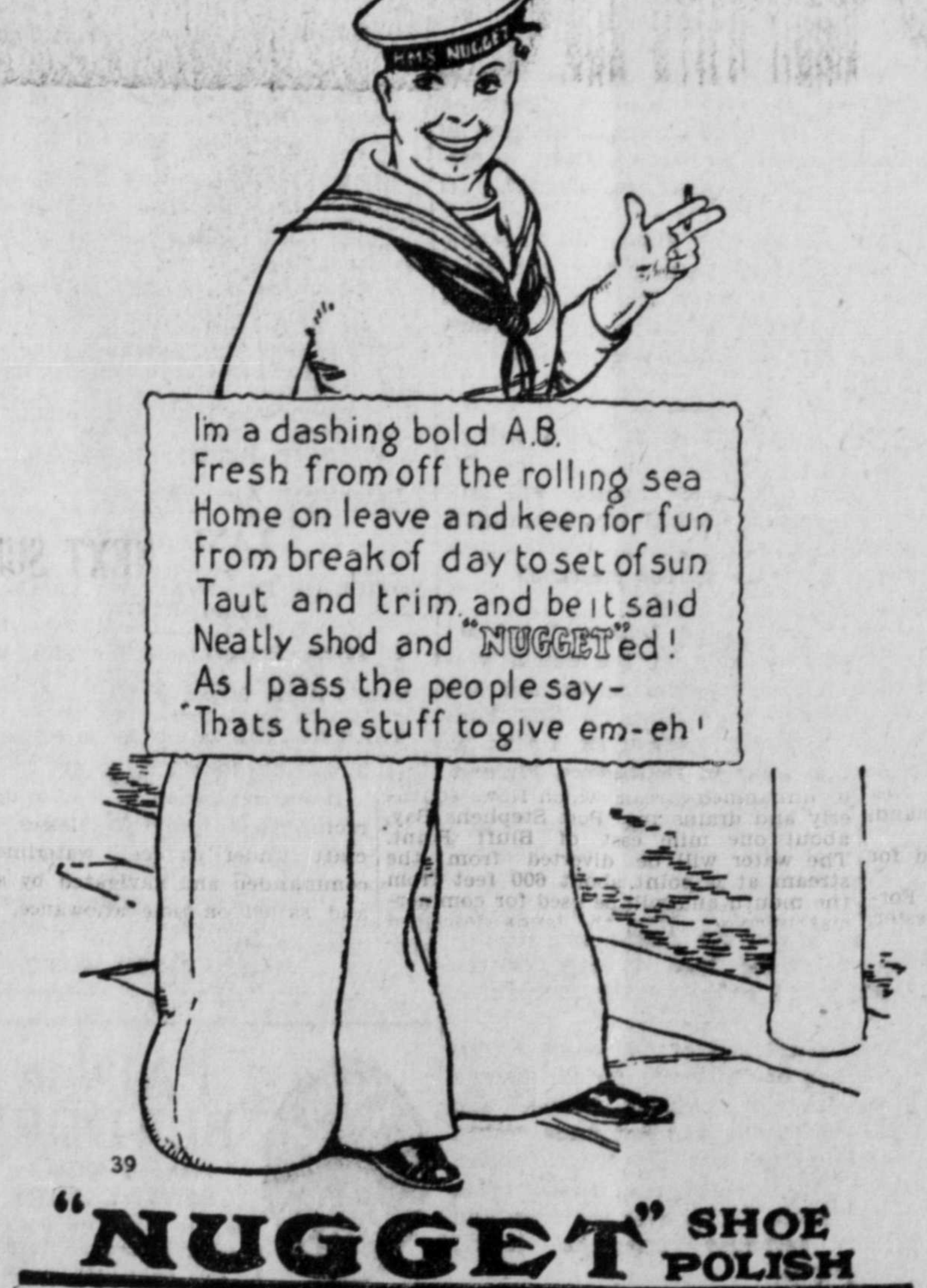
SPORT CHAT

LAZY RIVIERA NOW RESORT OF TIME KILLERS

Those Awaiting Divorce by French Courts Pass Time at Gambling Tables

CANNES, France, Sept. 14.—The Riviera, long pictured a dawdling and gambling ground for gay tourists is becoming a rendezvous for sufferers of marital woes, in the opinion of divorce lawyers and income tax experts.

Many of the well-dressed women and men who foregather nightly at the green baize-covered gaming tables are really gambling for stakes of the heart and not the purse, they say. The games of chance in which they indulge sometimes recklessly, are merely the turning of wheels of the divorce courts of Paris then they do the roulette wheels of the Casino.

On the tables they place sums of money, but in documents filed in Paris courts they have placed their emotions, and they are far more concerned to win there than here. The stakes are high here, at times, the income tax experts calculate that between \$50,000,000 and \$200,000,000 was risked on the decisions of gaming instruments here last year. The divorce lawyers point out that regardless of the amount of pecuniary hazards of the gaming tables here, larger stakes are being played for in the Paris courts.

When a distinguishedly-gowned woman nonchalantly rakes in a pile of bank notes shoved toward her by a deft croupier, she oftentimes wishes it were a decree of divorce she were receiving, the lawyers say. And when a gentleman in evening clothes loses a few thousands, he frequently wishes it were an unwanted mate that the croupier's rake was taking away from him.

Fear of the publicity given foreigners seeking divorces in Paris helps to account for the popularity of the gaming tables here, the lawyers say. The Casino at Juanles-Pins reported \$70,000 profit last year, while the Casino here, always a lodestone for English people, reported a gross return of \$2,000,000 during the same time.

Proof of the desire of divorce seekers to "hide out" is seen in the number of queries received by provincial lawyers asking for information about ideal spots for husbands and wives to be properly separated with undue publicity boredom.

During the necessary "unmating" period, instead of establishing legal residence at Paris, divorce seekers have adopted the custom of registering themselves here, at Deauville, Nice, Vichy and other resorts. In their advertisements for the 1928 season, some of the resorts feature the slogan "get your divorce at your favorite resort."

"We would have been taking the Mann Cup home with us again had it not been for bad luck at Winnipeg when three of our star players were put out of commission," declared H. H. Hudolph, prominent Toronto lumberman and president of the Toronto Westons lacrosse club, who arrived in the city this morning on the Prince George from Vancouver, accompanied by the nineteen members of the team. After travelling four thousand miles and playing five games in nine days, the Westons at the end of last week lost the Mann Cup, emblematic of the Dominion lacrosse championship, to New Westminster in the finals, both of which games they were beaten by scores of 6-3 and 5-6 respectively. On the way west they had played semi-finals at Winnipeg, Edmonton, etc. Some of the players when here today were still on the casualty list suffering from various injuries.

The Westons are known as one of the finest body of amateur sportsmen

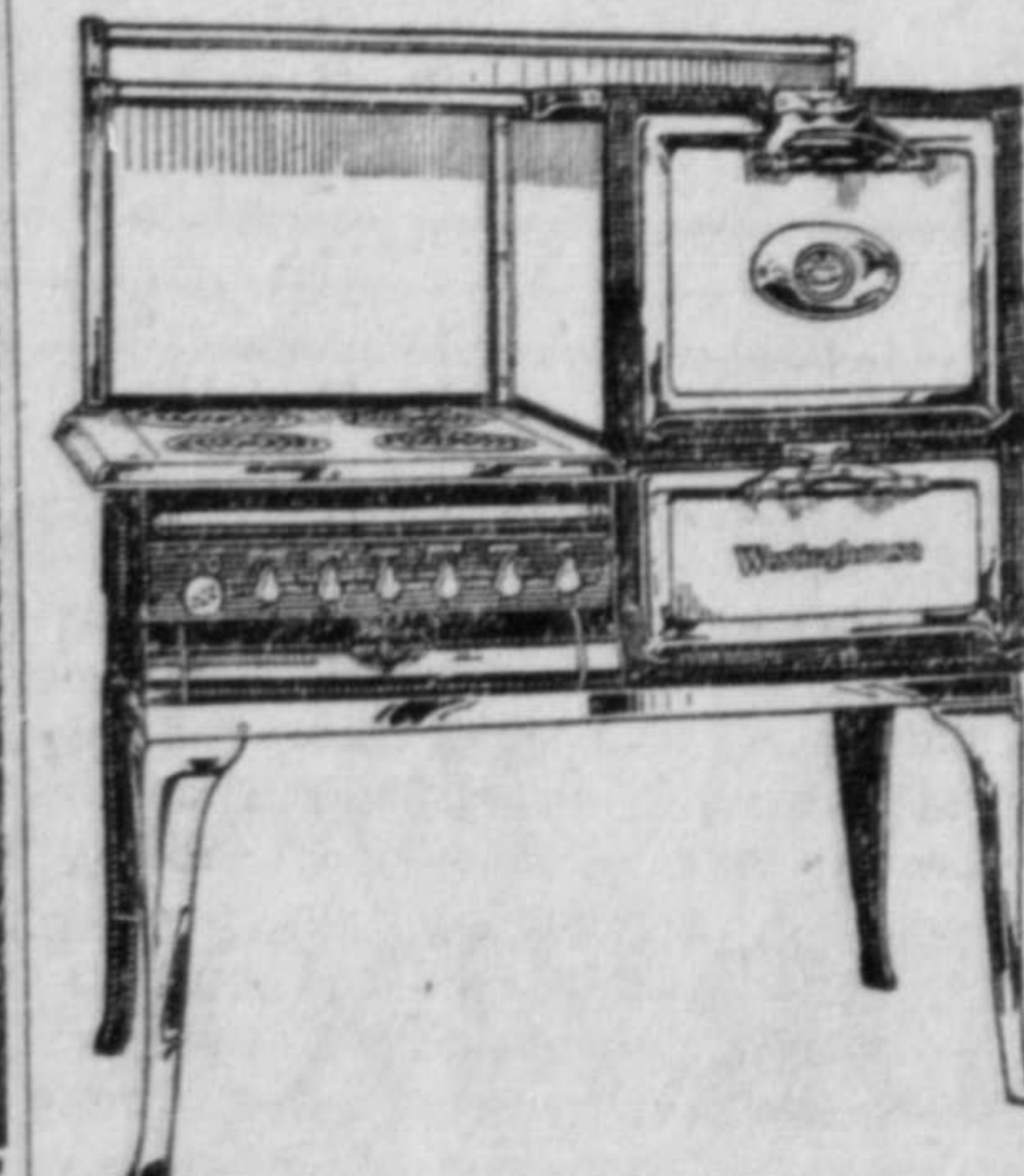

LONDON, Sept. 13.—British radio fans had no difficulty in recognizing the voice of the Prince of Wales when he spoke at the recent opening of the Peace Bridge across the Niagara river.

The British Broadcasting Corporation picked up the speech from the short-wave station at Schenectady, and relayed it through all their stations.

Relaying of programs from the United States is likely to become an important feature in the British programs in the coming season, it is now said.
