VIENNA, July 23 .- A strange tribe whose women, like the men, are bearded, and which is voluntarily isolated in the Voralberg Mountains, has been "discovered" by tourists. This tribe, the Walsortal, has long been known to exist but was almost fotgotten as no outsiders are allowed to settle in its valley, and the people shun contact with the world. One person is chosen to do whatever business is necessary with civilization and this "contact" job descends in the family.

Marriages are made within the tribe and economicaly, also, the people live by themselves, raising their own cattle and grain and weaving their own cloth. Their language is a dialect unintelligible to German-speaking Austrians. Outsiders they regard as "beggars" and so describe them, because the only persons who ever venture into their region are those seeking something, if only information about roads.
