As late as early December, an al-

most unprecedented date for mackerel catches of any size, 126,000 pounds taken off Highland Light were brought into Massachusetts ports. The total of the season is estimated at more than 300,000 barrels, far the bigsince the record season of 1885. In 1923 there was considerable improvement, with a catch of 125,000 barrels, but in 1925 it jumped to 216,000. Captains of some of the larger Portland schooners are planning to start early next spring and stick with the mackerel right through the year, in the hope of a repetition of this year's run. A veteran mackerel fisherman on the New Dawn scouts the idea that there is anything mysterious about the way

"They stick around," he said. "until the feed gets scarce and then they begin to drop off. When it's all gone in the near shore they'll just go off into deep water like a good many other fish. 
