### Crucial Stage in Conference at Geneva to Try to Reduce Naval Strength of Nations

GENEVA, July 6 .- A crucial stage was reached at the tripartite naval conference, but whether events will push the pourparlors toward an actual rupture or an actual treaty undoubtedly depends chiefly on Great Britain. The United States, it is said, is actuated by a conciliatory desire to understand the British cruiser needs and to meet them as far as possible. Yesterday, in fact, the American representative really told the delegates that his country would go to the extreme limit of 400,000 tons which was 100,000 more than the maximum for cruisers contained in the original American proposal but strongly indicated that his country
