SPECIMENS FOR FIELD MUSEUM BEING SOUGHT

Ashley Hine Joining Expedition to Secure Additions to Already Large Collection

VANCOUVER, July 6.—One of the leading ornithologists in the world, Ashley Hine, a Canadian, retained for special work by the Field Museum at Chicago, leaves Vancouver tonight to join the John Borden Field Museum Alaska Arctic expedition in northern waters.

In an interview here Hine said it was planned to work along the Alaskan and Siberian coast and return to Los Angeles late in the year. Northern Canadian specimens would be sought for the museum to complete what is already one of the finest collections in the world.

NEW YORK, July 6.—Pittsburg Pirates, leaders of the National League, continued their winning streak yesterday by defeating St. Louis Cardinals 14-2 but have not improved their frail half-game margin for supremacy as the Chicago Cubs again defeated the Cincinnati Reds 8-5. Philadelphia beat Boston 5-4 in the only other game played in the league.

The Yankees continued their victorious stride in the American League by defeating Washington Senators again by 7-6. The cellar dwelling Bostonians spoiled Philadelphia's chances for going into second place by beating them 6-5.

The Yankees, with a lead of twelve and a half games, are now off for their second western tour of conquest. Tony Lazzeri went the game for the American League leaders yesterday with a home run with two out. Hoyt is laid up with a lame arm and shoulder and injured ankle and Koenig is still out but the Yanks are still winning games. Gehrig got a homer with the bases full. NEWSPAPERMAN AS EMISSARY FROM WEST TO CITY OF TORONTO

TORONTO, July 6.—Acting as an emissary for Mayor Louis D. Taylor, of Vancouver, E. H. Scott, news editor of the Vancouver Province, arrived this morning on the "Confederation" bearing a return greeting from His Worship of Vancouver to Mayor Thomas Foster. The letter reads in part as follows:

"With the inauguration of the Canadian National Railways new train 'Confederation' operating between our cities, I take this opportunity of extending hearty greetings from myself, aldermen and citizens of Vancouver to yourself, aldermen and citizens of Toronto. I am sure you will agree with me that during this, Canada's Diamond Jubilee year, it is, perhaps, more fitting than ever before, that we should contribute our share to bind more closely together the confederation of the provinces created sixty years ago."

EDMONTON, July 6.—T. M. Kirkpatrick, government engineer, who has returned from an inspection of the flooded area of 9,000 acres of hay lands between here and Lac Ste. Anne, estimates the crop loss at \$90,000.

OTTAWA, July 6.—Maxwell Graham, head of the wild life division of the North West Territory branch of the department of the interior, died here last night following a stroke.

Crucial Stage in Conference at Geneva to Try to Reduce Naval Strength of Nations

GENEVA, July 6.—A crucial stage was reached at the tripartite naval conference, but whether events will push the pourparlers toward an actual rupture or an actual treaty undoubtedly depends chiefly on Great Britain. The United States, it is said, is actuated by a conciliatory desire to understand the British cruiser needs and to meet them as far as possible. Yesterday, in fact, the American representative really told the delegates that his country would go to the extreme limit of 400,000 tons which was 100,000 more than the maximum for cruisers contained in the original American proposal but strongly indicated that his country would exert continued effort to put the limitation well under 400,000 tons.

RUSSIA NOT COMPETITOR

SASKATOON, July 6.—Russia will not be a serious competitor with Canada on the world wheat market for five years to come, says Dr. W. W. Swanson, professor of Economics at the University of Saskatchewan, in a letter from Moscow. Dr. Swanson is chairman of the Saskatchewan Overseas Livestock Marketing Commission which left Canada in February to study production and marketing problems in Europe.

VICTORIA, July 6.—The congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, supplemented by representatives of other denominations in the city as well as a number of personal friends and those associated with the minister in other phases of his semi-public work, paid honor to Rev. W. Leslie Clay, D.D., at a public reception held at the church last evening to mark the occasion of his election to the Moderatorship of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Announcement was also made of the gift to the church by an anonymous member of a set of sixteen tower chimes.

SALE IS DISRUPTED BY CAR SHORTAGE
Total of 193,000 Pounds of Halibut Sold at Fish Exchange This Morning
The shortage of refrigerator cars caused delay in the session of the Fish Exchange this morning, the buyers not rising until 1 o'clock this afternoon. Six freezers are due to arrive on this afternoon's train and there will be another half-dozen tomorrow.
A total of 192,000 pounds of halibut was sold at the Exchange not including a catch of 26,000 pounds offered by the American schooner Murla and which was held over until tomorrow. Five American vessels disposed of 104,500 pounds at bids ranging from 12.7c and 6c to 13.7c and 6c, while eight Canadians sold 88,500 pounds at 11c and 6c to 12.7c and 6c.

NEED OF MAIL SERVICE

Every day there are more evidences of the need of a better mail service. Mail comes here from the East on Fridays and not another letter can get through until the following Monday afternoon. Trains come every day during that time. They carry express but the postmaster-general does not allow letters to be carried on the train except through the post office department. He will not allow the express companies to carry letters and he will not carry them himself. He is the dog in the manger.

Of course the postmaster-general knows nothing about this. It is purely a departmental matter and has not been brought to his attention. Hon. P. J. Veniot would not allow such a condition to occur down in New Brunswick, we may be sure, but this is away out West and the people here stand for anything.

As we were saying, Mr. Veniot does not know about this personally. What we need to do is to make him know about it and impress it so hard that we shall get the needed reform. During the months when there is a daily train service, sacks of mail could be given in charge of the baggage car at Edmonton containing all letters from that city and eastward. Then other sacks could be thrown on at principal points and on the return, sacks could be put off at the same points. That would not be an ideal service but it would be much better than we are getting today. It would be the beginning of a better state of things and would for the present satisfy the people here.

All we need now is lots of business and we shall be the most important city in northwestern British Columbia.

LAST IS HEARD OF GAUTHIER

Vancouver Paper Dilates on Findings in Report of Commissioner

NONE ARE BLAMELESS

Credit Given Attorney General Manson For Acting Promptly in Matter

(Vancouver Star)
It requires a careful perusal to grasp, to the extent deserved, the penetration disclosed in the report of the Hon. Mr. Justice Morrison on the Gauthier case, the sanity of his exposition of the state of affairs that made possible the attacks brought in the House, and the clarity of the language in which he analyses the evidence and draws his conclusions. Obviously, it required some courage to write a document that leaves few concerned in the matters investigated quite unscathed, but, in view of the high judicial position occupied for many years by the commissioner, the public has taken it for granted from the first that, no matter to what conclusions he found himself obliged to come, he would not hesitate to state them fully and explicitly.

The report is the last of a series. In brief, it had been repeatedly charged in the House last session, both as a general allegation and as having occurred in particular instances, that there were improper relations between the Government, Liquor Department and persons concerned in raising campaign funds for the Liberal party. So long as nothing specific was alleged, the government exhibited some reluctance to order an investigation, a course that, while it appeared to give point to the accusations, has been shown to have been unnecessarily defensive. In the sequel, commission after commission sat, and in every case the verdict was a complete acquittal of the ministers of the crown—usually followed by hasty assertions on the part of those who had taken on themselves the role of the prosecution that they had never intended to disparage in any way the members of the government.

ROOT OF MATTER

Mr. Justice Morrison's findings in the Gauthier case will appeal to the common sense of the great mass of unprejudiced people. His criticism of those who have associated with undesirable characters goes to the root of the matter and will make many pause and think who have been inclined to view with levity party associations of a dubious character. That several men prominent in public life have believed that they could touch pitch without being defiled is now evident. Mr. Justice Morrison does not hold them guilty of corrupt motives, but he does believe, and says, that, considering the positions of public trust they hold, they have been indiscreet. He finds, and in the face of the evidence there was not the slightest ground for any other finding, that what they have done has not caused any loss to the public treasury.

They have, however, done what, in view of its far-reaching results, may be worse. They have enabled unscrupulous men to shake public confidence in governmental institutions. It is not in their power to make full amends for this. For many a long day, thanks to them, the leer and sneer will be evoked in certain quarters when reference is made to the probity of ministers and officials. But they may make their offense less by facing the issue frankly in their future relations with the public.

90 PER CENT IN CANADA

Ninety per cent of the St. Lawrence lies in Canada, he said, and the cost of the scheme would be between four and five hundred millions. Canada was invited to go into the project on equal terms with the United States, but she had no money to put into such a huge undertaking. She could only do so by borrowing from the United States. Ultimately, he said, the money would all come from the United States and the whole course of the St. Lawrence would be under American control.

NATIONAL LIFE ENDANGERED

"The internationalization of our great waterway," he said, "would cut through the aspirations for national unity and independence which we are striving to foster at the present time. The provinces of the west, being removed from the position of Quebec, do not realize that the whole destiny of Canada and her national life are endangered by the canal scheme. They think that Quebec is opposing it in a selfish manner in the interests of the river ports of Quebec and Montreal, but the people of this province realize that the interlocking of Canada's supreme interests with those of the United States is of significance to the whole country and would cut at the root of the true spirit of national independence that we are trying to conserve."

It is further pointed out that some deer on the outskirts of the city would be a great attraction but with the large number of dogs now running unrestrained, this seems almost an impossibility.

FEARS UNITED STATES CONTROL

Archdeacon Scott Says Canada Trying to Foster National Unity and Independence

QUEBEC, July 6.—(Canadian Press)—Claiming that construction of the St. Lawrence Waterway, as at present projected, would endanger Canadian nationalism, the Rev. Archdeacon F. G. Scott of Quebec has written a letter to the Quebec Division of the Navy League of Canada pointing out his fears in that connection. The Navy League has distributed his letter throughout the various branches in the Dominion. Interviewed with regard to his letter, Archdeacon Scott said that he was pleased at the opportunity to reiterate his "warning" to the grave danger to Canadian national aspirations by the internationalization of the St. Lawrence.

"When this question is boiled down to its original significance," said Rev. Archdeacon Scott, "it means that the United States is going to buy the St. Lawrence and use it in the interest of Chicago by making a waterway to the sea and also in the interest of the New England states which would get their supply of electric power from the damming of the rapids on the course."



VICTORIA MAY GET ELEVATOR

Another Effort Being Made to Secure Grain Handling Facilities at Port

VICTORIA, July 6.—Another effort is being made here to induce the building of an elevator at this port. A number of farmers on the prairie have taken shares in the Panama-Pacific Grain Terminals, Ltd., which is proposing to erect a house at the Ogden Point docks owned by the Canadian National Railways.

The elevator company is now coming back to the city and asking for still better terms than those given formerly and the Board of Trade and city council are co-operating in an endeavor to have the work proceed.

Muddy Gulch. From there the trail to the George Copper property is being generally improved.

A large number of trails are also being built in the Portland Canal region.

STIKINE RIVER

In the Stikine River district, the department is completing the road from Telegraph Creek to Dease Lake, work being mainly on the Dease Lake end.

A bridge is being built across the Tooya River, 25 miles in from Telegraph Creek, with Ernest Woodworth in charge of the work. All the material has to be shipped from Vancouver as there is no suitable timber in the vicinity.

In the Atlin region, the most important work being carried out is the construction of a new road from Atlin to Indian River and thence to the Atlin Silver-Lead property.

SKEENA DISTRICT

In Skeena district, large forces are at work on the construction of the highway between Terrace and Hazelton. Camps have been established at Copper City, Usk and Skeena Crossing and, at the last mentioned point, a gas shovel is in operation. Clearing work is principally left by contract.

The main highway between Hazelton and Hubert, the eastern boundary of the district, is being improved, work including widening, ditching and graveling. Seven auto trucks owned by the department are being used on the work.

BELLA COOLA

In the Bella Coola district, the road is being extended up the valley to Stule, a distance of about forty miles from Bella Coola. The existing road is being widened and gravelled.

After spending a couple of days at the dry dock loading large tanks which were lightered from her sister ship Challamba when she stranded down the coast from here recently, the American motorship Culberrra sailed last night at 6:30 for Alaska.



SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 3,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes, minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOME-SITE LEASES
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as home-sites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commission. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partly free permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten

CHARM IS ATTRIBUTE OF YOUNGER WOMEN

Age Not Matter of Years but of Changes in Tissue

LONDON, July 6.—(Canadian Press).—The effect of age on women's looks is discussed by Sir Thomas Oliver, Professor of Medicine, University of Durham.

"A man or woman is as old as he or she feels, and not as he or she looks. It has been said that a woman who conceals her age is a benefactor to her sex, for through her determination to remain young she has set up a superior standard of health, she herself being aware of the fact that by shortening her hair and adopting modern methods of dress she has, so far as personal appearance is concerned, temporarily modified the visible marks of time.

"Age is not, however, a matter of years, but of changes in the tissues, so that so long as woman does her best to keep her mind and body young, she is young.

"Probably the middle period of life leaves more outward signs upon women than men. Fortunately the change is not universal, for many women are just as handsome, attractive, good-looking, and of well-proportioned figure as in the years before the middle period of life, and those much-admired qualities are carried on into old age when the women retain those attributes which charm all who are brought into contact with them."

SWAN SANCTUARY ON BORDERS OF VICTORIA

WOMEN WORKED VERY HARD ON PIONEER FARMS

PEGGY WATSON TELLS HOW THEY SLAVED IN EARLY DAYS

LONDON, Ont., July 6.—(Canadian Press).—Writing from the viewpoint of a farmer's wife Peggy Watson refers in the local press to the fact that "The World's Butter Review" shows by chart that every man, woman and child in the Dominion eats 27 pounds of butter a year; in the Argentine, in contrast, two pounds per year per individual is the record. An interview with a famous butter-maker in this district is quoted. "The farmers' wives today are busy women," commented this cheery body, "but we used to work too hard, too, when I was young, and we didn't have the nice things around you have today. Now, when milking's done it goes to the cheese factory or dairy, or else the cream is separated and the cream man takes it away once a week. But years ago there was none of that. The men usually helped to milk, but after that the women of the farm had charge of the milk. There were no separators either, and the milk had to be strained into pans. When the cream rose it was quite a job lifting the heavy pans and skimming them. Many of us hadn't even wells and pumps at the kitchen door.



DAKAR, Senegal, July 6.—Lip-stretching, nose-piercing, and teeth-filling, long practised by the beauties of France's African colonies, have at last fallen under the ban of the law.

From now on the government of the Third Republic will punish such disfigurements with jail sentences ranging from two to five years. A decree to that effect, duly signed and sealed, has just been promulgated.
