## ALBERTA WHEAT CROP LARGEST YET PROMINENT VISITORS PASSED THROUGH CITY TO ALASKA

### Wheat Crop of Prairies Undoubtedly Large This Year State All Reports

**Free Press More Conservative Than Government Bureau of Statistics But Yet Sees Big Yield of Wheat**

WINNIPEG, September 17.—All are now agreed that in spite of the considerably reduced acreage, the crop this year will be large and especially so in the western section of the prairies. Various estimates are made by more or less competent authorities. These are based on the reports of the railway officials and independent observers and on the elevator returns so far from the areas threshed.

The Winnipeg Free Press crop report issued today places the wheat yield of the prairies at 424,312,000 bushels which is eight millions less than the government estimate.

### ANGLICANS AT GENERAL SYNOD

**Bishop of Cariboo Says West not Putting Wealth to Service of Church**

KINGSTON, Sept. 17.—In a discussion which followed the presentation of the report of the missionary society at the annual meeting of the general synod of the Anglican Church, Bishop of Cariboo said he thought the wealth of the west was not being put to the service of the church as it should be. This was because the church had not been strong enough 15 or 20 years ago to mould the character of those who were making money there.

Bishop Adams said the church should not repeat the mistakes of the past. It should get busy now on new-comers who in a few years would be wealthy. He also urged that delegates look after their own people first before going to foreign fields.

The yield of Alberta is given as 175,000 bushels, the largest in the history of the province.

Oats are estimated at 208,300,000 which is 52,000,000 bushels lower than the government report.

The barley yield is set at 82,600,000 bushels or six millions higher than the government estimate.

Rye is expected to give 14,871,000 bushels, a million higher.

Flax seed estimate is 3,871,000, or 1,200,000 higher than the yield set by the government bureau.

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### HALIBUT PRICES TAKE SLUMP TODAY

Total of 135,500 Pounds Sold at Fish Exchange This Morning

A total of 135,500 pounds of halibut was sold at the Fish Exchange this morning for prices considerably lower than have been prevailing earlier in the week. Canadian fares got the best of the bidding, from 14c and 7c to 14.6c and 7c being paid for a total of 23,500 pounds, while three American vessels with 112,000 pounds received from 12.4c and 7c to 13.4c and 7c.

### WUSUNG MARUS ARRIVES SAFE

**Lost Nine Sailors Washed Overboard in Terrific Storm off Kuriles**

TOKIO, Sept. 17.—Reports received here today state that the Japanese steamer Wusung Maru reported last with 900 cannery helpers arrived safely at Hakodate with nine sailors washed overboard in a terrific storm off the Kurile Islands on August 31. Delayed official reports now indicate that 70 fishermen are missing from 114 fishing vessels off Amakosa Island in a recent typhoon.

### PREMIER'S DISCUSS QUESTIONS OF POLICY

WINNIPEG, Sept. 17.—An average increase of five dollars was granted Canadian National clerks, freight handlers, and other classes according to R. Dykes, general chairman of the western region Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees. Eight thousand people are affected.

### TREATY OF COMMERCE WITH POLAND PROPOSED

WARSAW, Sept. 17.—The Canadian government has proposed to Poland conclusion of a treaty of commerce and it is understood that negotiations will begin shortly.

### ST. LOUIS DROPS TO THIRD PLACE

**New York Giants Jump Into Second With Victory Yesterday—Pirates Win Again**

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—The New York Giants at last broke their tie for second place in the National League with St. Louis Cardinals, whom they defeated yesterday by a score of 6 to 3. The Pittsburgh Pirates retained their four and a half game hold on the league supremacy by defeating Boston 4 to 3. The hopes of the Chicago Cubs of getting into the pennant picture were further dashed with a 4-3 defeat, the third straight, at the hands of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

New York Yankees, Philadelphia Athletics and Detroit Tigers continued their winning streaks in the American League by defeating Chicago with the aid of Ruth's 53rd homer. Gehrig was held to one hit and is now eight homers behind Ruth.

### CANADA AND THE LEAGUE

Hon. Ernest Lapointe Says Her Contribution is Always Toward Peace

OTTAWA, Sept. 17.—Some timorous Canadians seem to be afraid of the influence which Canada wields in the League of Nations, declared Minister of Justice Lapointe, at the annual banquet of Canadian Clubs. "They do not realize the place that their country occupies among nations of the world. They do not understand that the contribution of Canada in the work of the league is a contribution to peace and nothing else."

### ADVERTISING URGED BY NEWSPAPERS ON GOVERNMENT OF B.C.

NELSON, Sept. 17.—The desirability of selling the resources and business opportunities of the province to the people of the province by an advertising campaign in which the government and newspapers divide the cost equally is urged by many speakers at the opening session yesterday of the British Columbia and Yukon Press Association.

The idea of urging the government to use advertising space to instruct the public on important matters such as motoring and hunting regulations, was also discussed.

### PLANE LEAVES FOR ALERT BAY AT NOON

After having spent over two months engaged in fisheries patrol in this district, Major D. R. MacLaren, D.S.O., hopped off from Seal Cove at 12:52 noon today in his Pacific Airways HSSL flying boat for Alert Bay where he will remain for a few days before proceeding to Vancouver. Major MacLaren is accompanied on the flight to Alert Bay by his engineers, Harold Davenport and W. Jacquot and it is expected to make the 335-mile distance in about six hours. Departure would have been made earlier this morning had it not been for fog.

### CANADA TAKES SEAT LEAGUE OF NATIONS COUNCIL AT GENEVA

GENEVA, Sept. 17.—Canada made her first appearance today as a member of the council of the league of nations to which she was elected Thursday.

### Prominent Visitors Were Here This Morning Who Will Return Wednesday and Be Entertained

Forty-eight of Canada's leading business men, headed by W. M. Birks of Montreal, principal of the famous jewelry concern bearing his name, and accompanied by forty-five ladies, arrived in the city on the Princess Louise this morning from Vancouver, where they have been attending the convention of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, and proceeded to Skagway. Next Wednesday they will return from the north in the afternoon and it has been arranged that they may spend several hours visiting this city and accepting a program of entertainment and business intercourse that is being arranged by the Prince Rupert Board of Trade. Men from all spheres of industry and business are included in the group which is probably the most important that has or will visit the city during the present season.

Meeting the party on its arrival here were W. O. Fulton, president of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade; Col. J. W. Nicholls, vice-president; C. H. Orne, chairman of the entertainment committee, and a delegation which also included B. J. Mellish and G. W. Nickerson. No program was arranged for the visitors during their brief stay today, all local activities being deferred until they return next week when more time will be at their disposal.

The party was accompanied up the coast by Arthur Brooksbank, secretary of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade. The other local delegate to the convention T. H. Johnson will be returning to the city later.

The trip up this coast, for many of whom it is the first, has so far proven very delightful even though it is late in the season. They are looking forward with a good deal of enthusiasm to their cruise through Alaskan waters and all displayed a keen interest in the port of Prince Rupert.

### BABCOCK TELLS OF SALMON DECIMATION

Says One Hundred Sockeye in Quesnel Lake This Year as Against Four Million Past

QUESNEL, Sept. 17.—Possibly one hundred specimens of sockeye salmon entered Quesnel Lake this year whereas eighteen years ago it is estimated that there were four million sockeye in Quesnel River spawning grounds at the lake. John P. Babcock, chairman of the international fisheries commission, stated here. The same he said was true of other tributaries of the Fraser River.

**CONTRACTS FOR SHIPS**

It seems a pity that Canada cannot build her own ships but as long as the English price is only half that of Canada it is doubtful if the government should spend that much extra money in order to have the vessels built here. So far as we can see, nothing can be done about it. In the Old Country they have the organization, the workmen, and they pay lower wages and get all material cheaper than can be done here. The difference of three million dollars is so great that no one can raise much of a protest against the contracts going out of the country.

**DEER HUNTING LAW**

While the law says so, hunters must not kill female deer. But it is very commonly reported that does are plentiful everywhere whereas bucks are scarce. It has been suggested that for one season only doe shooting should be allowed, with a strict limit to the bag. In some districts dozens of does can be seen at almost any time but it is only now and then that an antlered head can be obtained. This year the police announce that they will watch carefully for infringements of the law. Deer must be brought in without being cut up in such a manner as to mislead the officers. If they are not, prosecutions will follow. Hunters cannot give the excuse that they were going to consume the animal on the spot.

**BANK MANAGER'S VERDICT**

Bank managers are usually the most conservative people in the world when it comes to finance. They learn to be very careful of their statements and not to say things they cannot back up. One of them has been speaking optimistically of the development of business on the Pacific Coast. We all knew that business had been improving, even at Prince Rupert, but it is good to hear a bank manager say so and also it is good to see Prince Rupert mentioned at big gatherings such as that at Victoria, where the Pacific Foreign Trade Congress has been meeting.

**DRASTIC ACTION OF ALASKANS**

Alaska has been taking drastic action to conserve the salmon fisheries. The failure of the pink salmon has been general and reds have also been scarce in Alaska. Canneries have had to shut down with very few fish taken. The result will be heavy losses to operators and to fishermen.

As soon as the authorities there were satisfied that there was a real shortage, they shut down on fishing in order to give the fish an opportunity to get to the spawning grounds and thus insure future supply. British Columbia fishing was also closed for long enough to insure a good supply of fish getting past the nets. The result should be beneficial.

It is claimed by those in a position to know that the small streams are the worst used. In many of them fishermen are allowed to stretch their nets practically across the channel in such a manner that very few salmon are able to pass. It is evident that only a few years of such fishing means total extinction. We cannot catch all our fish and have them too. Stricter regulations and keen supervision, it is thought by many, would be the best remedy for the present condition.

**SELLING OF HONORS**

In England prominent people are being accused of selling titles. Happily in Canada we do not favor the granting of titles, largely because of the impossibility of giving them to the right people. Those who have money to pay to keep up the funds of political parties have been thus favored in the past to a very large extent just as they are said to be in Britain. Under these circumstances titles mean nothing. Many of the best people in Great Britain have refused them. Lloyd George has remained with W. E. Gladstone one of the great commoners. They object to the system and doubtless object to the class of people among whom they would thus be placed. It is to be hoped that Canada will always stick to her present system and frown down on any attempt to set up a monied aristocracy.

Michael Strogoff is Picturesque and Full of Colorful Scenes

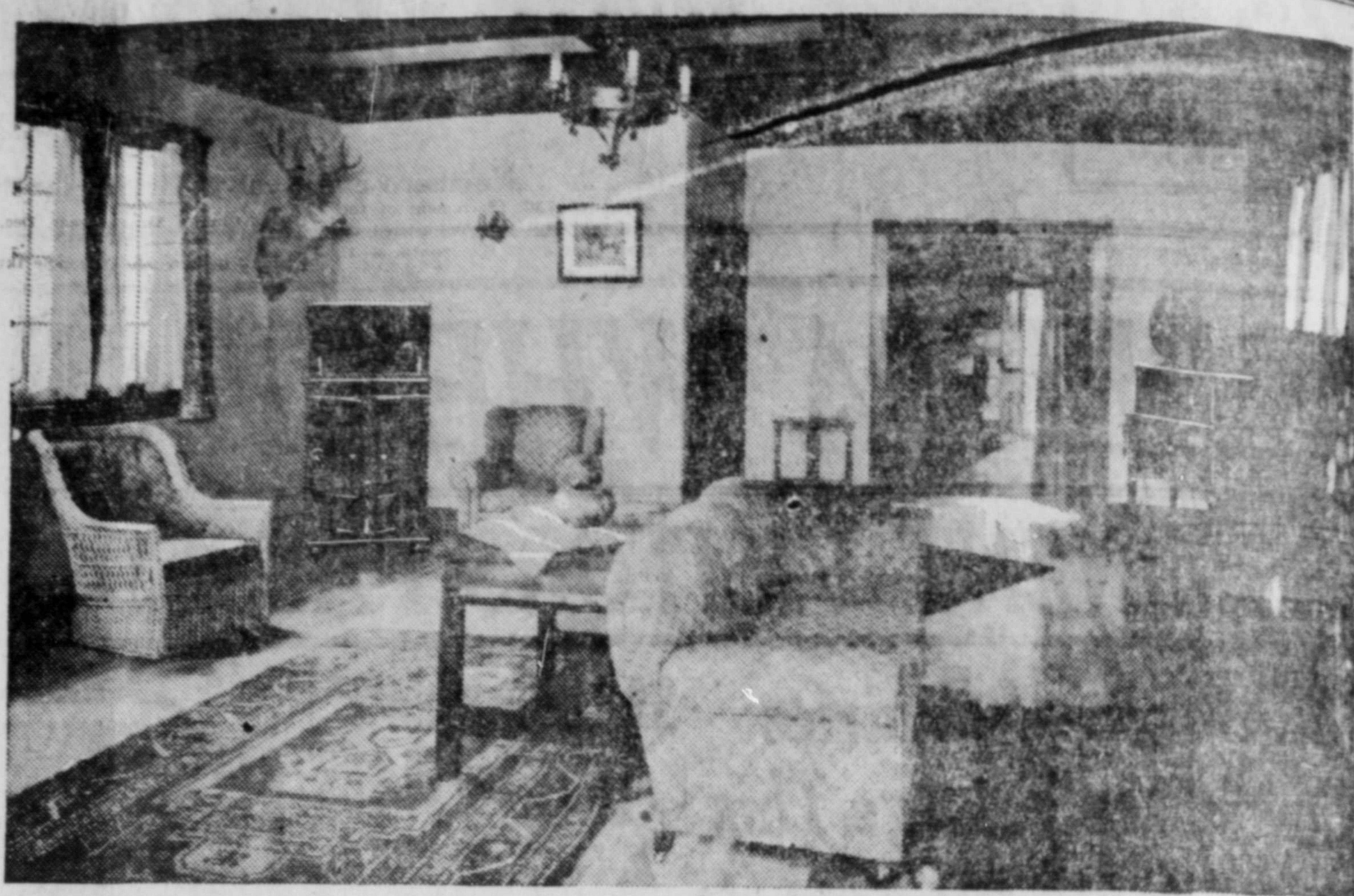

**MANITOBA PLANS ELECTION ACT CHANGE**

WINNIPEG, Sept. 17.--Drastic changes will soon be made by the Bracken government in the Manitoba Election Act as the result of a study made of the election acts in the different provinces of Western Canada by Hon. W. J. Major, attorney general. While Conservatives of Manitoba never favored the proportional representation system of election applied to the city of Winnipeg when the Norris government was in power, and the enthusiasm of some of the Liberals, has waned, it is not the plan of the government to abolish the system. The proposed revision will, rather, take the form of an overhauling of the provisions of the Act relating to registration and voting, it is said. The Act has been described as antiquated and ambiguous, and it is declared to entail unnecessarily large expenditure. The Act, also, it is stated, disfranchises many persons otherwise entitled to mark ballots, especially new citizens in the country for a considerable time.

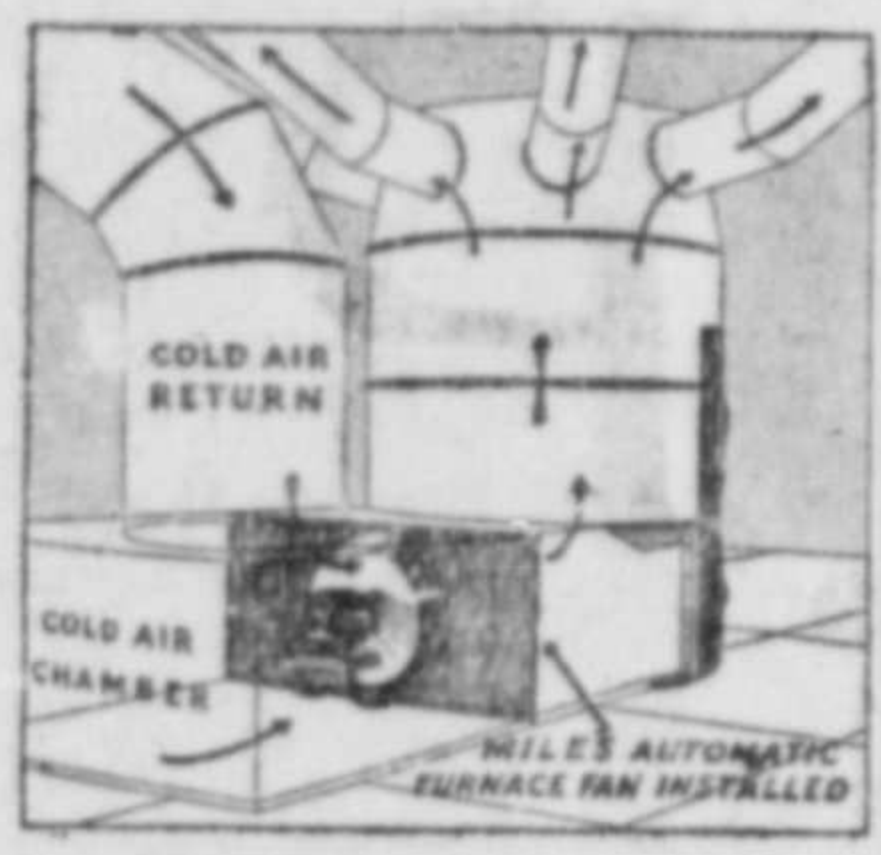


Showing fan in operation

REBUILDING OF GREATEST BANK

Work Expected to Take Ten Years and Cost Five Million Pounds

LONDON, Sept. 16.—A unique procedure has been adopted to advance the building of the new Bank of England.

This novel "works committee" are exercising such infinite care over every detail of the world's most famous Bank that the building of it is expected to take at least ten years.

SUN TO INK PGTS New ideas of many sorts are being cautiously tried out, and it is typical of the committee's thoroughness that twenty shillings will be spent in preparatory work for every two or three spent upon the completed building.

One problem which the "works committee" has just solved is that of lighting. They found it impracticable to put in any significant number of windows facing the street, therefore the Bank will be lighted from windows overhead, so saving a considerable expenditure for artificial lighting.

Another new idea which they have adopted here is to glaze these overhead windows with vitrolite to admit the ultra-violet rays of the sun and thus bring health to the clerks working at their desks below.

Wherever possible the wonderful scheme of interior decoration and plastering of the old bank is to be maintained in the new building. Gypsum moulds, drawings and models of the old ceilings, rosettes and mouldings have been preserved as demolition took place, and especially selected craftsmen will carry out the work of reproducing these in the finest medium.

The most astonishing feature about the work is the almost uncanny secrecy with which it is being done. Every day thousands of inquiring spectators, many of them visitors from the United States and overseas, peer through the doorways without becoming more than dimly aware of the great monument that is slowly coming to perfection.

Within a hundred yards or so of the Bank, buildings have subsided and collapsed. The Bank itself has no fear of such a catastrophe, for its foundations are being laid as firm and solid as the Rock of Gibraltar.

The cost of the new Bank, is estimated today at £5,000,000. It will house, in addition to the ordinary offices and business of the Bank, the credit of Great Britain in the form of those big blocks of pure gold, generally known as bullion, which are stored in the long, vaulted strong rooms.

The new Bank of England will be the finest building in the British Empire and it is being built to last at least a thousand years.

CENSORS STRIKE OUT PASSAGE

Bible References Not Encouraged in British Plays as Instance Potiphar's Wife

LONDON, Sept. 16.—The Lord Chamberlain's Department, which is responsible for the censorship of stage plays, regards with no favorable eye the inclusion of Bible references in dramatic works. "Potiphar's Wife," which has just been produced at the Queen's here, was returned for revision because the passage, Genesis XXIX, 7-20, was put into the mouth of one of the characters.

Potiphar here proves to be an elderly member of the peerage, married to a young wife, and the Joseph is a chauffeur who declines without the least hesitation to become infatuated with Mrs. Potiphar. There is a scene in her ladyship's dressing room, and at the

**Waterfront Whiffs**

Some Official Figures on Salmon Fisheries—Halibut Landings Excessively Light—Cedric Wrecked in North

With the season now almost ended, it is found from compilation of official figures that the salmon pack for 1927 to date in District No. 2 stands at less than half of last year's (1926) pack at a similar date. For the whole district, according to latest available figures, the total now stands at 405,960 cases as compared with 858,411 cases at the same date last year. Only in two sections, Rivers Inlet and Smith's Inlet, are gains from last year to be reported and those are very slight. In the other parts, Naas River, Skeena River, Central Division, Bella Coola and Queen Charlotte Islands, the packs are hardly fifty per cent of last year. Coho and sockeye packs, on the whole, are not far down but it is in pinks where the great loss is recorded. Comparatively the best district as far as pinks are concerned has been Smith's Inlet where the 1927 pack has been 45 per cent of last year. Right down the line go the percentages to the southern Queen Charlotte Islands where not a single case of pinks has so far been put up whereas last year 49,532 cases was produced in that section.

Captain's Cove, Walker Lake, Butedale, Namu, Klemtu and Bella Bella in the Central Division; Bella Coola and Tallho in the Bella Coola region, and Goose Bay and Rivers Inlet in Smith Inlet and Rivers Inlet district respectively are still open.

On the Queen Charlotte Islands, where fishing ends on October 7, South Bay, Masset Cannery, Lookout, Lagoon Bay, Langara and Allford Bay canneries are still open.

Seining operations are still being carried on around the Queen Charlotte Islands, that is where the most of the fish for mainland canneries is now being brought from, but with only a shadow of the usual success. In a week perhaps 40,000 chums were taken by seventy or eighty seine boats which is far from a satisfactory average. Few, if any, seine fish are being taken on the mainland.

At Warke Channel, a considerable improvement in coho trolling has been reported. Around Dundas Island, the trolling is about over.

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. has been importing coho and other salmon from Juneau and other Alaskan points.

**SOME FISH STORY**

The Weland Telegraph make a front-page story of the near-capture of a fish in the Weland River by H. W. Maccomb, who, according to the tale, was well nigh jerked into the water when the fish took the hook, but who managed to wind the line around a black ash tree some 14 inches in diameter. Making the line fast to the tree, he sought assistance in landing the catch from a neighboring farmer, but when they returned to the scene, the fish was gone and so was the tree; a deep hole in the ground showing where the roots had been. Others getting started during the opening week-end include parties headed by Dr. Cade, Jack Lindsay, Dr. Alexander, Dave Stuart, Charlie Starr and Claude Kirkendall, most of whom are making for Forcher Island.

Aboard the powerboat Myfanwy, Capt. Alfred Swanson embarked on Tuesday for a hunting trip down the coast and is expected back this week end.

Completing the safe delivery to Sitka of another liquor shipment for the dry ones of Telegraph Creek to tide them over impending winter, P. R. H. H. powerboat "28" returned to port on Friday from the north. Capt. Alex Saint was officially accompanied on the voyage by Provincial Constable Ray-boone.

P.R.H. power tug Pachena, Capt. Harvey Dumas, is still engaged in packing from the Queen Charlotte Islands for Lowe Inlet cannery.

On Wednesday afternoon, powerboat "23" made a special trip to the Salt Lakes, having on board C. H. Orme of the Parks Board who inspected the site there on which development is planned.

Our old friend Jimmy Kelley started to row from the wireless station to the marine depot. The boat started to fill with water but still he rowed. Next day it was discovered the plug was out. **CEDRIC WRECKED**

On September 8, the diesel powered halibut boat Cedric, of American registry, but owned by Dr. W. T. Kergin of Prince Rupert and skippered by Capt. Henry Henriksen also of Prince Rupert, struck the rocks north of Petersburg, Alaska, and sank. She was raised and towed into Petersburg where it was found that rather extensive damage, including the staving in of several planks, broken ribs and keel shoe as well as mishap to the engine and electrical equipment. Repairs are being effected at the northern port.

**THE LAST FEW DAYS**

For various reasons, one of which may be the fact that extremely high tides have hampered fishing operations to some extent on the nearer banks, halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert have been exceptionally light of late. This week (Saturday to Friday inclusive) has been the lightest in the point of landings since the season opened, the total being only 332,000 pounds of which American vessels brought 228,500 pounds and Canadian, 103,500 pounds. A number of boats, having short catches which their skippers felt hardly warranted bring the fish this far south, sold at northern ports, it is reported. Those that were fortunate enough, however, to bring their fares here have reaped their reward in the way of exceptionally high prices. The highest price for American fish was on Wednesday when the Wash received 19.5c and 8c for 5,500 pounds. The best bid for Canadian fish was on the same day when the Margalice received 17.9c and 7c for 3,500 pounds.

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the season to date total 49,501,900 pounds as compared with a total of 20,740,000 pounds at a similar date last year. American landings so far this year total 14,024,850 pounds and Canadian 5,477,100 pounds as compared with respective figures last year of 15,083,300 and 5,656,700.

structure of the government wharf. This week sees the pile driving practically completed and now the bracing, decking and placing of tender piles will follow. The big job, it is expected, will be completed in about a month's time.
