B.C. Bishops' House, Not General Synod, Will Deal With Caledonia Bishop Matter

It is too early yet to make any announcement as to the appointment of a bishop for Caledonia diocese to succeed the late Archbishop F. H. Du Vernet, states Archdeacon G. A. LOCAL CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE

The Omineca Herald is wrong. We did not advocate the nominating of Mayor Newton as Conservative candidate. We only remarked that after the manner in which he had attended the big convention and taken up Prince Rupert's cause in the south it was becoming increasingly difficult for the local Conservatives not to nominate him, in view of the fact that he is already in the field as a Conservative. That may be a humorous situation but it is the Rupert. situation as it exists today. Here is what the Herald has to say about it:

"One of the most laughable of the many laughable stunts the HOSPITAL DANCE Prince Rupert News pulls was the editorial in a recent issue patting Mayor Newton on the back for his progressiveness and pointing out that the mayor should most certainly be endorsed by the Conservative party as candidate in Prince Rupert. The News knows that S M. Newton is not and has not been for a long time a member of the Conservative party. Leading members of the party say that he is not being and will not be asked to join the party. But the object the News has is to keep S. M. Newton in the field and make another three-cornered fight in that riding. The Conservative party will deal with the matter of a candidate in due course and it is safe to was just as enjoyable as ever and the say that the News will not be invited to participate in making that decision."

We were not aware before that the editor of the Herald was the oracle of the Tory party, but it is an interesting bit of news and his article shed a new light on the local situation.

So far as we are concerned we do not care who is in the field back from the point of view, of the proor who stays out. We are hopeful that a good man will be elected and when the time comes we hope to discuss the matter, but just not as large as on some former occasions. now it seems as if the provincial election was a good many moons away. But in the meantime the announcement continues to be made every day that Mayor Newton is in the field as a Conservative candidate.

MEMBER OF PARTY

To say that Mr. Newton is not a member of the Conservative party is begging the question. It is understood that he attended the recent Conservative convention in this city and that he also was at the Conservative convention at Winnipeg as a Conservative and that he voted there. If that does not make him a Conservative, what does?

We think it would be a pity to have three men in the field when election time comes but, judging by past experiences, we do not see how it is to be avoided unless it is by the local party endorsing the mayor.

PEACE RIVER WESTERN OUTLET

Prince Rupert people should not take too seriously the talk about various western outlets to the Peace River country. It is possible that if it is built by the C.P.R. it may come out by way of Stewart and if it does it will benefit Prince Rupert a great deal and we shall have no kick coming. On the other hand every effort is being made to take it to Vancouver.

Looked at from a purely business point of view, it is possible that the shortest route would be to Stewart but that city has very little as yet in the way of terminals. Prince Rupert would be the next best route, the best grade, and it has all the terminals ready and an elevator now doing business. Vancouver's advantage lies in its great population and the fact that population brings business to a railway. It is a sort of inverse ratio. Naturally Prince Rupert people wish it to come this way and there are a good many indications that it will do so.







> Word brought to port during the week indicate that most encouraging been obtained in the dog fishing operations being carried out under the aus-Commencing at a post planted about pices of the Rupert Marine Products on since the first of the month have resulted in the location of some favorable fields that are now being fished and, whereas reports last week were not very rosy, later developments have made prospects much brighter and it is now confidently anticipated that the industry, during the coming winter, will afford profitable employment not only for trollers and the like but also for the smaller gurdy halibut vessels. Since a start was made, the Rupert Marine Products has moved its fish gathering scow no less than five times and it is now located in a sheltered cove on the northeast corner of Dolphin Island at the head of Schooner Passage where, during the past few days, some very substantial catches have been landed. Productive grounds have been found in the vicinity of Kitkatla Islands and Beaver Passage and on Monday of this week the five boats operating took 3,812 pounds, following up with 17,630 pounds on Tuesday. One

Arrangements have been also made for the handling of varieties other than dogfish which are taken in the course of the operations. For such edible fish as cod, bass, etc., 21/2c is being paid while a flat rate of loe and 5c has been established for halibut. Free transportation to port is given and the ice for packing down is also supplied. Gasoline is being sold to the fishermen on the grounds at 23 1/2c per gallon and the company is also providing bait in the form of frozen oolachan without cost in the meantime. The price being paid for the dogfish is \$7.50 per ton. So far there are only two Japanese engaged in the dog fishing. The remainder are white.
