RUM RUNNERS AND SPEEDBOAT TAKEN ON PUGET SOUND

Rum Running Boat from Vancouver was Led Into Police Trap

FIVE MEN ARRESTED SATURDAY NIGHT WHEN CRAFT AND LIQUOR SEIZED BY U.S. PROHIBITION AGENTS

SEATTLE, May 2.—Five reputed rum runners were arrested, Canadian speedboat Zev, two hundred cases of whiskey and three automobiles were seized near Samish Island at South Bellingham Saturday night after a hand to hand encounter between federal prohibition agents and two alleged smugglers. The prisoners were brought here yesterday.

TO PRESERVE TOTEM POLES

THIS YEAR TO BE DONE ON ONE GROUP AT GYSEGYCUA

SEELTON, May 2.—The Dominion Government totem pole preservation party arrived at Skeena Crossing Saturday with a flat car load of hoisting machinery including the huge derrick used for raising fallen poles. This gear came from the totem pole village of Kitseena, where the Government work of totem pole preservation was carried on for the past two seasons to the interest of the tourists who are expected to walk through the Indian village while the train stops for water. This year the work of totem pole preservation will be carried on at Gysegyua, a village about a mile below Skeena Crossing, where there are several huge totem poles close to the bank, plainly seen from the windows of passing trains on the opposite side of the river between Skeena Crossing and Nash.

RESCUE PARTY MAKING SEARCH

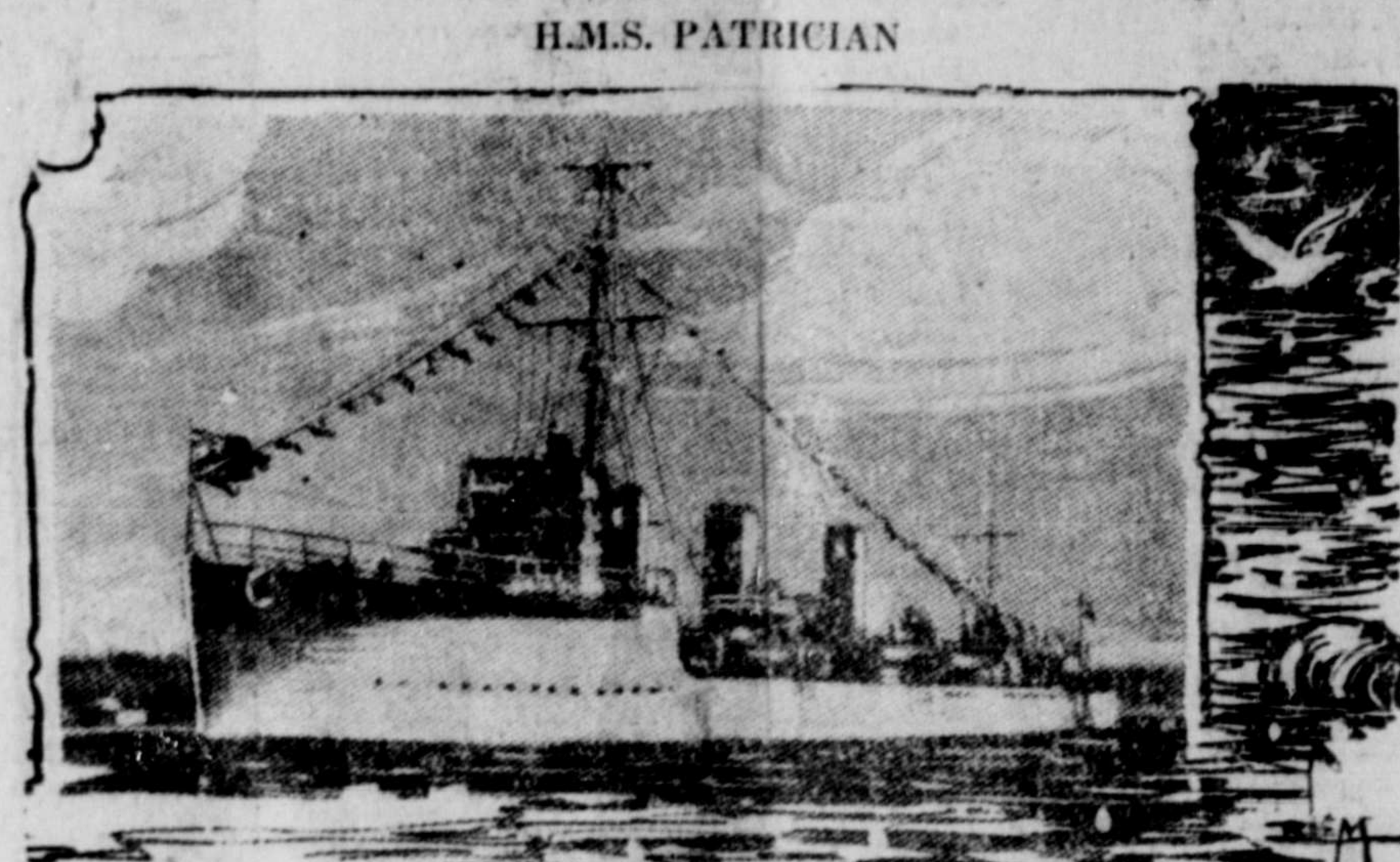
SEARCHERS ENTOMBED FOLLOWING EXPLOSION IN WEST VIRGINIA MAY BE ALIVE

Snow, Rain and Floods Usher in Month of May on Prairies

RUTH THRILLED AT BRANDON FAMILIES HAVE TO LEAVE HOMES IN BOATS AS WATERS OF RIVER RISE

WINNIPEG, MAY 2.—Snow, rain, and floods ushered in May in the western part of the prairie region of Canada, retarding for several days spring seeding throughout Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta and increasing the menace of inundations along the Assiniboine River at Brandon and westward.

AT BRANDON FAMILIES HAVE TO LEAVE HOMES IN BOATS AS WATERS OF RIVER RISE

Heavy snowfall yesterday in the Edmonton district continued throughout the night. A light fall was experienced at Calgary. At Brandon fifty families moved to the upper floors of their homes or vacated their houses in boats at the week end and others are preparing to leave today.

SEVEN SISTERS IS PROMISING

Indications are that the Seven Sisters group of claims, across the Skeena River from Cedarvale, will develop into a good mine according to T. J. Shenton, inspector of mines, who returned to the city on yesterday afternoon's train following an official visit to the property. During the winter, operations having started last November, the D. W. Mines Ltd. has sunk a 65 foot shaft and has struck a twelve-foot vein of good looking silvered ore which also contains other values. Two hundred feet down the shaft it is proposed to drive a tunnel into the ore at depth. During the winter some four or five men have been employed on the property, operations being under the direction of J. M. Hoar, who has now gone to Seattle. Ex-Governor D. W. Davis of Idaho, principal of the D. W. Mines Ltd., is soon expected to arrive on the ground.

WRECK OF SAILING SHIP IS FOUND ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE

SKIDEGATE, May 2.—E. S. Richardson, of Tiel River, reports finding part of a large sailing ship 25 miles north of Tiel River. The ship was built of fir and painted gray. Judging from the size of the hawser holes, it must have been a rather large windjammer.

BOAT IS SUNK AND MAN HURT

The well known local halibut boat Dolphin is sunk in deep water beside the Imperial Oil Co.'s wharf and Harvey Blunden, one of the crew of the vessel, is in the Prince Rupert General Hospital suffering from burns about the neck and arms and shock following an explosion aboard the boat a few minutes before noon today as she was gassing up. The fire that followed and the sinking came soon after the impact the cause of which seems uncertain. The fire department made a quick run to the scene only to find the vessel ablaze and going down by the bow. Blunden, who was tending the hose from the dock into the boat's tank, was taken in to the hospital by the police. All happened within ten minutes.

Southern Copper Mines Sold for Two Million Dollars and Purchasers Start Operations

VANCOUVER, May 2.—Two copper mine properties at Kutze Inlet and Theodosia Arm respectively have been sold for two million dollars to "Eastern U.S. capitalists" by the Revenue Mining Company, Limited, a Canadian syndicate, according to the Sunday Province. "The purchasers," says the newspaper, "have already started operations on both properties, initial work being in charge of the Revenue Mining Company until such time as the new owners complete a western organization to take over the work."

ALASKA TIMBER HAS BEEN SOLD TO NEWSPAPERMAN

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The bid of George T. Cameron, president of the San Francisco Chronicle, and associates for the purchase of 833,000,000 cubic feet of pulp timber in the vicinity of Juneau has been accepted. The amount involved in the deal is not published.

BAYONETTED BY CHINESE FORCE

MISSIONARY AND LITTLE DAUGHTER MET DEATH BUT WIFE AND OTHER CHILD SAFE

HONGKONG, May 2.—Rev. Morris Slichter of Toronto, China Inland Mission worker, who was murdered recently near Yunnan Fu with his little daughter, was bayoneted after being thrown to the ground according to mail advices reaching here. He was with the party of mission workers for Yunnan Fu with an escort of 100 soldiers. The party was attacked by a force of 250 men and the defending soldiers fled. Slichter and his daughter were knocked down and bayoneted.

NO SUBSIDY SHIP LINE

PROPOSAL TO AID SERVICE BETWEEN JUNEAU AND PRINCE RUPERT DROPPED

JUNEAU, Alaska, May 2.—Without debate the territorial House on Saturday defeated the proposed subsidy for a shipping line between Juneau and Prince Rupert. In previous debates opponents of the measure declared that the benefits which would be derived would not offset the tax increase required. While indefinitely postponing the House measure providing for the popular election of treasurer of Alaska, the Senate advanced on the calendar an Upper Chamber bill continuing the same provisions.

MISSISSIPPI STILL FLOODS

HELP NEEDED TO HOLD BACK RIVER BY PROTECTING BARRIERS IN LOUISIANA

NEW ORLEANS, May 2.—The cry for men was heard today as the flood waters of the Mississippi coursed through north-eastern Louisiana stretching from Vicksburg on the east to Shreveport on the west. The loosened waters taper down to a mere mile of racing current here as the Achafalaya and Mississippi form a junction near Baton Rouge. Hundreds of persons in various parishes were endangered as the waters from new breaks rose about them.

TOLMIE TO RETAIN THE LEADERSHIP OF CONSERVATIVE PARTY

VICTORIA, May 2.—Speaking at a nomination convention at Ganges on Saturday, Simon Fraser Tolmie stated definitely that he would retain the leadership of the Conservative party, denying all rumors to the contrary. He addressed the gathering at which Colonel Cy Peck was renominated.

TOURIST SEASON IS ABOUT TO COMMENCE

One of the Principal Parties Coming Here Will be C.N.R. Excursion on July 9

The tourist season is about to start and it promises to be as big a one for Prince Rupert as in any past years. Already steamship companies are reporting some of their boats booked out during July and August. One of the principal parties coming here during the coming summer will be, as usual, the Canadian National Railways personally conducted tour group. Consisting chiefly of school teachers, this excursion will arrive here by special train on the afternoon of July 9, sailing for the south the same evening on the steamer Prince Rupert. Another tour party will arrive the same day from the East and all accommodation on the southbound steamer that day is already taken.

Max Heilbronner sailed last night on the Prince George for Vancouver on a business trip. He expects to be away about two weeks.

DIED AS RESULT OF AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

VANCOUVER, May 2.—R. Merritt, passenger in an automobile driven by Carl Schroder, which crashed into a street car here Saturday night, died last night in the hospital, where Schroder, and a third companion also are patients. The two are expected to recover.

CO-OPERATION NEEDED IN TAX COLLECTION

At this season of the year we are reminded that there is another income tax form to fill out and another arithmetical puzzle to solve before we can hand a check to the tax collector and feel that we are free from his depredations for another year.

We all have to pay taxes. That is right and just. The cost of carrying on the affairs of the country must be met and the people who live in the country and enjoy its privileges are the ones who must pay. What the taxpayers should demand is that the taxes be kept as low as possible and that the collection method be easy and efficient.

A politician is a person who can hurl charges at his opponents without knowing whether they are true or not.

PRESENT SYSTEM NOT EFFICIENT

The present system of collecting the income tax is not efficient. The different forms have to be filled out, one for the province and another for the Dominion. Two different tax collectors have to be satisfied and time has to be taken to collate the data asked for.

If the Dominion and provincial forms were similar, there would be no particular objection but they are not. There should be either similar forms or perhaps only one form with one collector making the collection for both government. The forms cost money and the time devoted to filling them in is also an expense. If we must pay taxes, we should demand from our government that they make it as easy as possible and not try to burden us with unnecessary expense and labor.

Vancouver grain shipments are down nineteen million bushels this season and Prince Rupert is up nearly six millions. But we must not crow yet. We may do better next year.

BONDS SOLD WELL IN NEW YORK

The selling of a 15 million dollar Canadian National Railways bond issue in New York in two hours was something of a record in Canadian finance. It is an indication that the finances of Canada are sound and that the "whisper of death" calamity howlers of a few years ago have been shown to be nothing but false prophets.

Canada is prosperous and the C.N. Railway is prosperous and it is to be hoped it will continue to prosper and give the service that the people of Canada require. Much of the credit of this will go to Sir Henry Thornton and our own railway director, Fred Dawson, should get at least a modicum of praise.

Cheer up people, the worst is yet to come. Next year or the year after there may be an election.

QUIET WORK BUT EFFICIENT

Fred Dawson is out of town and the writer of this article has not seen him for months so this is perhaps a good opportunity to mention the quiet and efficient work being done by the local director of the Canadian National Railways. He gives a great deal of time in making trips to Montreal for meetings of the board and frequently he has to rush off at an hour's notice in answer to a summons from the president to give his valuable advice on matters in which this part of the country is directly interested. Report says that he is constantly pressing for things which would benefit the west and for all this he gets very little pay and hardly any thanks from the people who benefit.

In spite of a little cloud of pessimism that often hangs over Prince Rupert, it is noticed that the people in the north enjoy life just as much as do those who swelter in the heat of the south.

There are a lot of fine little cities on the coast but Prince Rupert has them all beaten a mile in things that really count.

RIN-TIN-TIN TRIUMPHS IN "HILLS OF KENTUCKY"

Love Story of Two Dogs Coming to Westholme Theatre Tonight

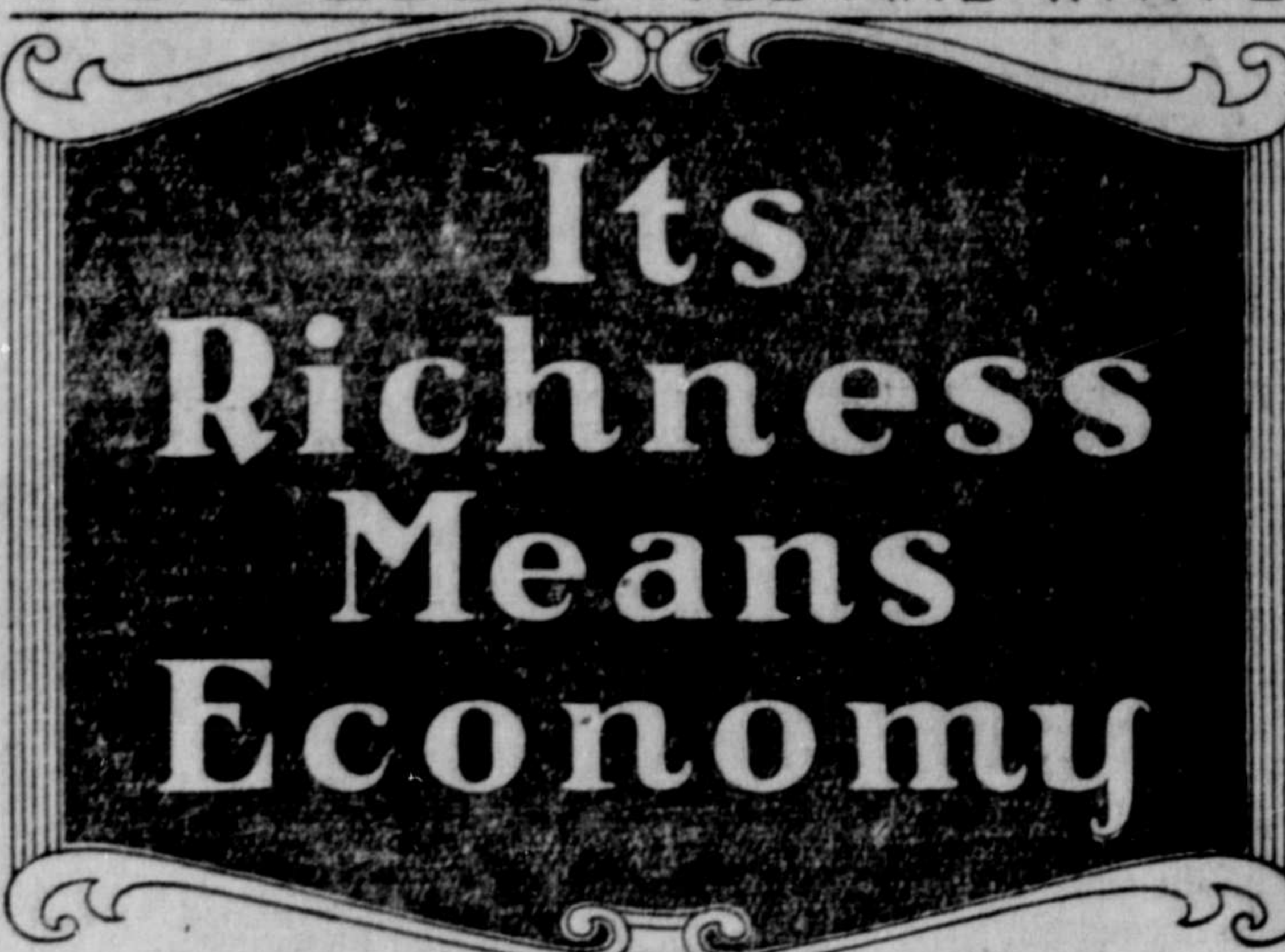

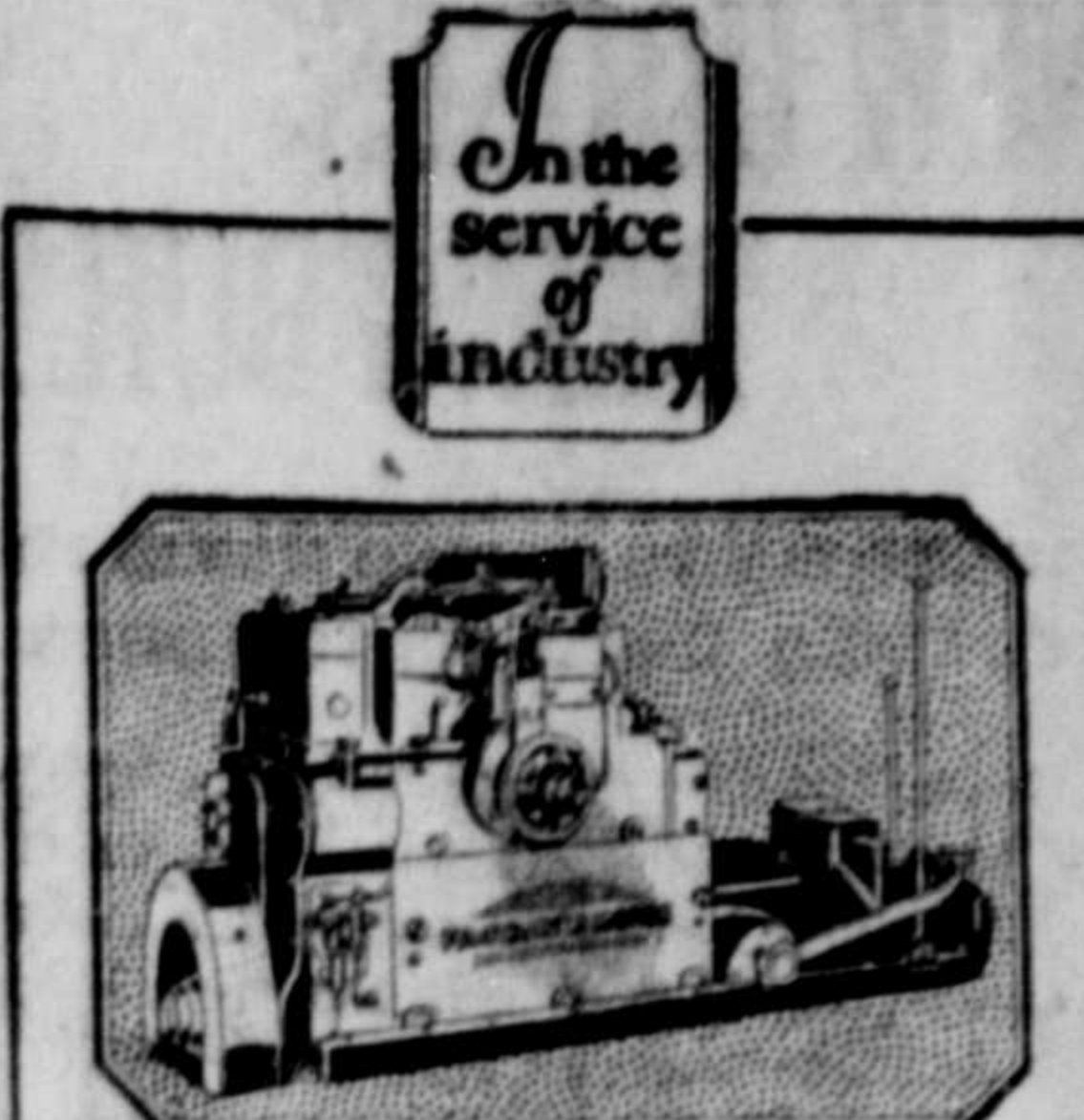

MORE SUNSHINE THIS APRIL BUT WEATHER AVERAGE WAS LOWER

Rainfall at 6.19 inches in Prince Rupert during the month of April this year was less than last year's 8 1/2 inches during the same month but there was an unprecedented amount of snowfall—31.6 inches—bringing the total precipitation for the past month up to 9.35 inches. There was a total of 100.5 hours of bright sunshine this April as compared with 65 hours last year but the mean temperature took a big drop from 47 last April to 40.6 this.

FORMER LOCAL PASTOR CONDEMNS NEW NOVEL

Prof. F. W. Kerr Declares Sinclair Lewis' Book Packed With Indecencies

"Sinclair Lewis' latest novel is the most violent attack launched against the church in this generation," stated Prof. F. W. Kerr, formerly pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Prince Rupert, from the pulpit of Knox United Church in Winnipeg recently.

"The book is so packed with indecencies," the speaker said, "that after laying it down one felt as physically unclean as one felt when passing through the scarlet fever ward of a hospital. The book was designed, Prof. Kerr stated, to besmirch the characters of ministers and to unsettle the faith of young people. This made it one of the most vicious novels ever printed. The purpose of the book was to lay hold of the very pillars of religion and level the structure to the dust, he said.

"The book is devoted exclusively to religion, all its characters are ministers, evangelists or bishops, and, without exception they are more depraved than the denizens of Hollywood," Prof. Kerr stated.

"The world is dividing into two camps," the preacher stated. "On one hand, those who are embittered against all religion, and on the other hand, the Christian forces which are drawing together in a new intensity of devotion and loyalty, while the embittered ones are becoming more aggressive, sacrilegious and insolent than ever before.

"These attacks on the church," he said, "represent an irritation that such a person as Christ should exist, because He is a standing rebuke to the faithless lives of the investigators."

MORE DETAILS SANKEY CASE

REASONS OF APPEAL COURT JUDGES IN THEIR DECISIONS GIVEN MORE FULLY

(Vancouver Province)

With two of five Court of Appeal judges favorable to Joseph Sankey, convicted murderer, his counsel, J. E. Bird, is applying immediately to the minister of justice for a new trial.

"We will move heaven and earth," said Mr. Bird, who added that he was convinced of the innocence of the 22-year-old condemned Tsampshean Indian.

No endeavor will be made at this juncture to have the sentence commuted to life imprisonment, he declared.

Falling consent of the minister of justice to a new trial, an appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court of Canada for the same object. To finance the cost of this proceeding, assistance will be sought from Indian friends of Sankey in Northern British Columbia.

The execution of Sankey for the murder of the Port Essington school teacher Miss Loretta Chisholm, on May 23, has been fixed for May 25 in Oakalla jail. Should an appeal be launched to the Supreme Court of Canada, a re-

grieve will have to be granted. The reasons for judgment of Chief Justice Macdonald who, with Justices Gallier and M. A. Macdonald, dismissed the appeal; and of Mr. Justice Martin, who, with Mr. Justice McPhillips, would have granted a new trial, have been received here.

"I am unable to find in the case any good reason for interfering with the verdict of the jury," stated the chief justice of the Court of Appeal. "I think it can not be urged successfully that there was substantial wrong, amounting to a miscarriage of justice, in taking the unsworn testimony of 10-year-old Haldis Sandahl."

He decided that her evidence had been sufficiently corroborated by evidence of Reinhold and her mother. He found that Sankey's statement to Inspector Spiller, provincial police, Prince Rupert, had been properly admitted.

CHARGE NOT UNFAIR

"The prisoner's counsel then argued, as a question of law, that there was no legal evidence to support the conviction," said the chief justice. "He argued that because the verdict was founded on circumstantial evidence alone, the jury could only convict if the evidence was consistent with guilt and inconsistent with any other hypothesis. If that were the law, a conviction could never be legally obtained on circumstantial evidence."

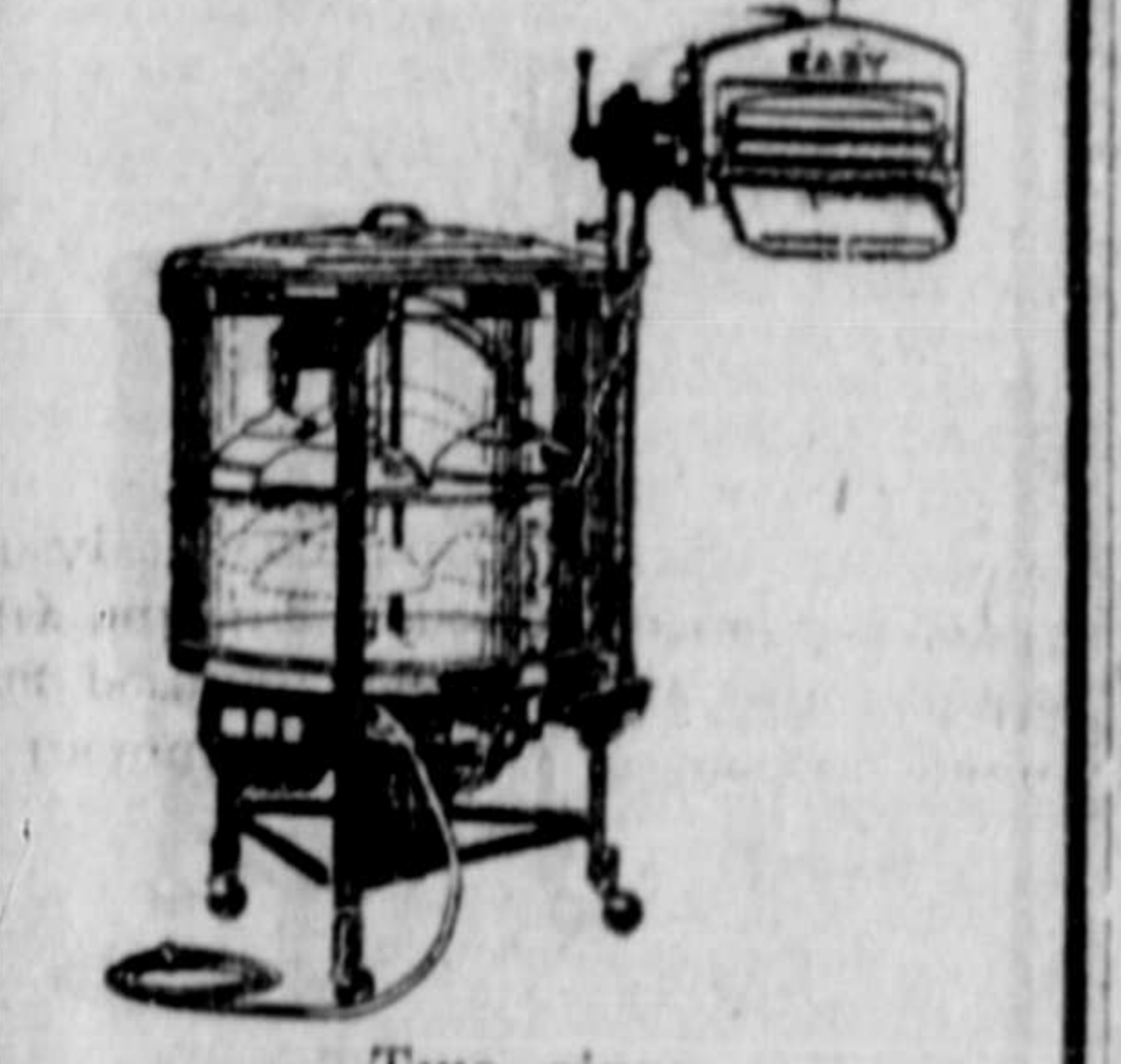

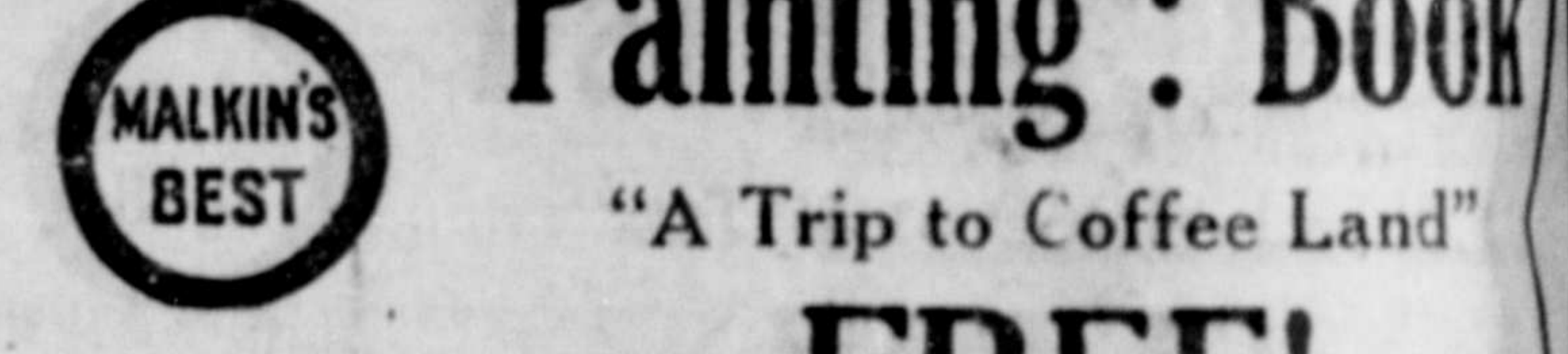
