PROSPECTOR STRONG ADVOCATE OF NAAS RIVER ROUTE

Prospector Declares No Route is Available But by Naas or Skeena

Highway he Thinks Should go by way of Naas River as it Would be Finest Scenic and Would Develop Resources

Stating that he feels confident there is no mountain pass suitable for a highway between the Skeena River and the Naas, Joe Filber, a prospector, who has roamed the hills and taken photos in the district for the past four years, strongly urges the building of the highway out of Prince Rupert by way of the Naas River Valley.

According to Mr. Filber, there is fifty miles of the road that would require very little work and the country to be opened up would be far superior to that by any other route. The only part of the route he does not know is that between the mouth of the

GRAIN SHIPPED FROM PRAIRIES

Vancouver Has Nearly Five Million Bushels in Storage Today

WINNIPEG, Nov. 10.—The snow has come to the prairies and threshing is practically completed, but the volume of grain being transported to elevators and ships is increasing from day to day. Two thousand and eight cars, loaded yesterday on the C.N.R. represent 2,064,000 bushels. Grain marketed totals 2,796,000 bushels and there were in storage 23,645,000 which is an increase of 132,000 bushels in store.

On the way to the Lakehead yesterday were 1,796 cars, while 997 had arrived and 1,990 had been unloaded. Ten boats cleared with 2,408,000 bushels more were due to arrive and 18 were loading.

Nearly five million bushels of grain are in storage at Vancouver and 332,000 at Prince Rupert, B.C. The first boat cleared from the latter point early this week with 262,000 bushels.

BURNS COMPANY BUYS RANCHES

Sum of \$750,000 Involved in Deal in Alberta for Farm Lands

CALGARY, Nov. 10.—One of the largest deals in the history of Alberta took place yesterday when ranch property involving more than \$750,000 was put through when the George Lane Company sanctioned the sale of the Bar U and Willow Creek ranches together with all the live stock and equipment to the P. Burns Company.

VALUE OF PREMIER'S CONFERENCE

The conference of Canadian premiers should do a great deal to knit the Dominion into one united whole. Take as an instance the visit to Ottawa of Premier MacLean. He is telling the people in the east of the problems of the west and the far eastern people are also airing their problems in the capital of the nation.

Canada is a difficult country to administer. The east and west are farther apart in miles than are Europe and America, yet we are trying to make a unit of the whole. We are trying to knit the whole into a real nation with national pride and national aspirations.

While doing this we are in constant and close association with the neighbor to the south. In most cases we know more of the United States problems than we do of the problems of other parts of our own country. Our young men almost always desire to cross the boundary and fight their way in the bigger field that offers in the States and many Americans come here, bringing their capital and experience and developing our industries therewith. They come from just over the fence while the other parts of the British Empire are far away. The country is also flooded with American periodic literature, which is almost the only supply we can get. Under these circumstances Canada is being steadily and surely Americanized and the time may come when she will be absorbed. The alternative is to cultivate a strong national spirit and nothing will do this better than constant inter-communication. The east and west must learn to know each other better.

VISIT OF PREMIERS TO B.C.

Another move that should benefit both east and west would be the proposed visit of the other Canadian premiers to British Columbia. The difficulty about such visits is that nearly always the visitors content themselves by spending a day or two at Vancouver and Victoria. They miss the greater part of the country and in fact learn to know only that strip of country along the boundary line. Ours is the real Canada and in years to come will be the real heart of the country. We hope that if the premiers come west they will make the trip via Prince Rupert.

BASKETBALL ONCE MORE

The season for basketball is on and it is satisfactory to know that a goodly interest is being taken in the sport. This is an excellent sport for young people as it keeps them fit and strong and able to take their part in the struggle of life. Doubtless the people of the city will be interested in watching the league games which are played in the Exhibition Hall and also they will be interested to have more of the young folks taking part in the games, at which they may not be present.

SKATING AT MORSE CREEK

The decision of the Gyro Club to provide a skating pond at Morse Creek is one heartily to be commended. Efforts to do the same thing have been made several times in the past but the dam has always leaked and as soon as the ice formed, the water was drained off and the efforts were fruitless. People still had to go to Salt Lake or to Shawatlans for their skating. A leakless dam is all that is needed.

VICTORIA POLICE AFTER PUNCHBOARDS

VICTORIA, Nov. 10.—Storekeepers and owners should know that "punch boards" with steel or money prizes are unlawful. Magistrate Jay declared when James Little, Quadra Street shopkeeper, was arraigned before him on a charge of operating such a gambling device. Magistrate Jay held that because

several convictions on similar charges had been recorded only recently, this was not an instance where a minimum fine should be imposed. He fined Little \$50.

John Clay, counsel for the defendant, urged the leniency of the court when he said that it was common knowledge that "punch boards" were in operation throughout the city of Victoria. This was the first time his client had been in trouble of any kind during his seven years' residence in this city.

PASSENGERS FROM CATALA

All Have Arrived Here After Being Generously Entertained at Port Simpson

FAST ON ROCKS

Shift Last Night Makes Ship's Position Even More Precarious

A shift during the night in the situation of the Union steamer Catala, high and dry at low tide in a precarious position on Sparhawk Reef, three miles from Port Simpson, was reported. A renewed effort to get the vessel off was planned to take place at the high tide of 24 feet at 1:00 this afternoon, but it was doubtful if much could be done before the big salvage boat, Salvage King, from Vancouver reached the scene later in the afternoon. Meanwhile, the Catala rests even more securely than she did before, no particular danger being feared provided a storm did not arise. It has been said by those who know the place that had she struck a few feet further over, the Catala might have turned over and capsized forthwith, which eventually would doubtless have been attended with large loss of life.

The last of the Catala's passengers and some members of the crew reached the city from Port Simpson aboard the Pacific Coyle Navigation Co.'s tug Lorne which arrived at 4:30 yesterday afternoon from the wreck, returning there immediately. The arrivals last night included the women passengers who had been taken ashore to Port Simpson. Apparently, they were unanimously gratified at reaching Prince Rupert safely though one of the ladies remarked that they had been well taken care of by the people of Port Simpson who extended their hospitality generously and did everything in their power to make them comfortable. The women had been lodged and fed in the Port Simpson General Hospital.

Among those arriving on the Lorne was A. L. Clements, assistant general manager of the Union Steamship Co. who was aboard the Catala when she was stranded. The officers of the ship are standing by or remaining at Port Simpson. Earlier in the afternoon, the B.C. Towage & Lighterage Co.'s powerboat Naas River arrived with the Catala's mail.

It was officially announced yesterday afternoon that the steamer Camosun would come out of Vancouver on Friday night, taking the Catala's run and arriving here Sunday afternoon. Capt. J. A. Findlay will be in command of the Camosun.

Earlier in the afternoon, the B.C. Towage & Lighterage Co.'s powerboat Naas River arrived with the Catala's mail.

Rev. and Mrs. John H. Hansen and daughter have taken up residence for the winter in the flat in the Clapp Block of Mr. and Mrs. Merrill Sollars who are away on a trip to Nova Scotia. Mr. Hansen is the new pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church.

Severin Jacobsen, local halibut fisherman, left on this morning's train for Halifax where on November 17 he will embark aboard the Norwegian-American steamer Stavangerfjord for his former home in Trondhjem, Norway, where he will spend the winter.

Hugh Kerr of Premier, who was one of the passengers on the stranded steamer Catala, has reached the city and will sail tonight on the Prince George for Vancouver whence he will proceed to Quebec to embark on the steamer Regina for a holiday trip to his former home in Scotland.

A. A. MacDonald, deputy fire marshal for the province of British Columbia, in the course of his visits to all city schools, lectured to the pupils of Seal Cove School this morning on "Fire Prevention." Mr. MacDonald, who has been here since the end of last week, will sail tonight aboard the Prince George for his headquarters in Vancouver.

W. H. Edge, rancher of Cochrane, Alberta, ten miles west of Calgary, was one of the passengers aboard the steamer Catala at the time of her stranding on Tuesday afternoon, will sail on the Prince George tonight for Victoria. His stay in Prince Rupert has been enjoyable to him for, as a matter of fact, he was here for a week before proceeding to Stewart and liked it. This is Mr. Edge's first visit this far north although fifty-two years ago he was in the south of the province when he came out from Ontario via San Francisco. Mr. Edge has two sisters in New Westminster with whom he will visit while on the coast.

URGE ACTION TO PRESERVE FISH

Duncan Board of Trade Favors
Dominion Moving in the
Matter.

VICTORIA, Nov. 10.—Action by the Dominion government to prevent the entire extinction of the salmon fisheries in British Columbia was advocated by the Duncan Board of Trade in a resolution submitted to the Victoria Chamber of Commerce directors for endorsement.

The resolution called upon the Canadian Chamber of Commerce to urge the Dominion Government to take immediate steps in this direction. The serious decrease in the salmon pack in British Columbia for 1927 following a marked decrease in the preceding years was drawn attention to. "The recent Babcock report on the salmon fisheries of the Fraser River gives cause for alarm regarding the depletion of this important natural resource," the resolution stated. It was essential, the Duncan board claimed, that this important industry be guarded for future generations and a real policy of fisheries conservation was imperative at this time.

J. L. Beckwith moved that the resolution be adopted. The resolution was much in line with the sensible views taken by Mr. Babcock and others. The only fault he might find was that perhaps it was confined too much to the Fraser River. The need for conservation existed throughout the province. Reginald Hayward seconded and the motion was endorsed.

C.P.R. Said to be Aroused From Lethargy by Activity of Sir Henry Thornton

ACCUSED OF PROPAGANDA

National Railway Head Moves on His Own Initiative in Building at Halifax

A rather unusual despatch from Ottawa is published by the Vancouver Star in a recent issue in which that paper tries to show that there is propaganda against Sir Henry Thornton and the minister of railways, which emanates from the C.P.R. The despatch follows:

The recent attack on Hon. Charles Dunning and Sir Henry Thornton is just the latest phase in a subtle railway war being waged between the two Canadian railways, in the opinion of well informed railway men of Ottawa and Montreal. They say that if the Canadian Pacific Railway is not directly responsible for the recent propaganda it is not unsympathetic.

It is said that for the past two years the Canadian National Railway had assumed a position where it was getting the cream and much of the milk of the passenger and freight traffic in Canada. Six months ago at a board meeting of the C.P.R. it is said that a very prominent Montreal director read the riot act over the Canadian Pacific system. Special efforts were put forth to recapture lost business and get new. Divisional superintendents were speeded up and a ten million dollar hotel was authorized for Toronto.

Simultaneously a subtle propaganda against the Canadian National started to show. A furor was raised in the maritime over the closing of St. Rose Junction and Ste. John as Canadian National transfer points. The matter went before the railway commission and the Canadian National was put upon defensive.

Then the C.P.R. sought entry into Halifax, which had hitherto been considered Canadian National territory. The C.P.R. prior to 1927 had running rights into Halifax but these were cancelled when Cochrane was minister of railways. Recently, however, it evinced an interest in a Halifax hotel project. A Halifax man started the project and the Eastern Steamships Company, a subsidiary of the C.P.R., became interested to the extent of \$50,000. The C.P.R. though it had no lines and no terminals at Halifax went in to the tune of a quarter of a million dollars. Later the C.P.R. interest was raised up to \$400,000.

600. The next move would have been application to the railway commission for running rights into Halifax.

Sir Henry Thornton watched the situation closely.

WOULD HURT BUSINESS

If the C.P.R. gained a foothold in Halifax it would cut into the National's business there. A new station was badly needed at Halifax, so Sir Henry decided that a hotel and station combined was the answer to the problem. Such a combination had proven popular elsewhere. The Chatbau Laurier at Ottawa with its underground tunnel to the Union station had become exceedingly profitable since Sir Henry reorganized the system. Other hotels had been raised to the same state of efficiency. A businessman usually stays at the best hotel near the station. He gets his passenger transportation over that line and his freight business usually follows his travelling inclinations.

The C.P.R. had come to the same conclusion about Toronto. The C.N.R. directorate had always felt that there should be a C.N.R. hotel in Toronto, but lacked the money to build. The C.P.R. has beaten them to the Toronto business in this respect and will also have it's tunnel from the station to the hotel. It is said now to be seeking to prevent the C.N.R. doing the same thing at Halifax. It is plain that there is propaganda against the Halifax project.

Hon. Charles Dunning, minister of railways, is said to be entirely sympathetic with Sir Henry's plans at Halifax but cannot himself sanction the expenditure before submitting it to parliament. Sir Henry, being a man of action, took counsel with his law officers and found that he could go ahead

FARMERS WANT CHEAPER RATE ON GRAIN FEED

Interesting Figures Prepared by Department of Agriculture at Victoria

VICTORIA, Nov. 10.—The farmers of the province and especially those engaged in dairying and other avocations in which imported feed is freely used, have been asking for lower freight rates on grain coming to B.C. from the prairies for domestic use. The co-operation of the department of agriculture here has been asked and an investigation has elicited some interesting facts.

On the importation of prairie grain for domestic use last year, the excess paid by British Columbia agriculturists over the amount payable on an export basis was \$232,000, the new figures reveal.

RATES VARY

Under the Railway Commission's new ruling, grain moves to this coast from the prairies for export at a rate of twenty cents per hundred pounds. Grain covering the same distance, but intended for use in this province, moves on a rate of forty-one and one-half cents. Before the recent revision, the domestic rate was forty-six cents and the export rate twenty-one cents.

The figure of \$232,000, representing the total spread between the two rates on last year's business, is based on an importation of 1,080,000 hundred-weight of grain for domestic use. If domestic rates had approximated export rates the consumers of grain here would have saved this amount.

FUR FARMING IS BIG VALUABLE INDUSTRY

ALASKA, Nov. 10.—"Blue fox farming is past the experimental stage and is now down to an exact science, meaning the survival of the fittest," said Frank Fruesschoff, one of the pioneer fox farmers, whose ranch is on Lung Island, near the mouth of Duncan Canal.
