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





BISLEY MEET OPENS JULY 4

CANADIANS ELIGIBLE IN TEAMS AND INDIVIDUALLY FOR NUMEROUS GREAT SHOOTING EVENTS

BISLEY CAMP, Eng., June 22. -(Canadian Press) .- A thousand and more picked marksmen from all parts of the Empire and the British Isles are gathering at this camp for the great two-weeks' shoot of the National Rifle Association, which opens July 4. Canada's team of 18 shooting members, including two former King's prize winners, will face again selected marksmen from the four corners of the world in competition for historic trophies. Greatest of these is the King's Prize, feature of the meet since its establishment in 1860, and emblematic of the Empire's marksmanship championship.

As the Canadian team includes promising newcomers as well as veteran marksmen and two previous King's Prize winners (Company Sergeant Major W. A. Hawkins, Toronto, and Lieut. Desmond Burke, Ottawa), the Dominion marksmen have high hopes of one of their number winning the King's Prize KING'S PRIZE

The King's Prize is shot in three stages on different days; with service rifles. The first is the qualfiying stage, and competitors fire seven shots at each of three distances-200, 500 and 600 yards. The 300 best scorers in the qualifying stage go into the second stage, when each fires ten shots at each of 300, 500 and 600 yard distances. The best 100 scorers in the second stage go in the final stage, the long-distance shoot. This is of 15 shots each at the 900 and 1,000 yard ranges. The winner is the one with the highest aggregate score in the second and third stages, the scores in the first stage serving only the purpose of qualifying the competitor.

The highest scorer in the first stage CANADIAN AT receives the N.R.A. bronze medal and bronze badge. The highest scorer in the second stage receives the silver medal and badge.


