



Bank of Montreal Weekly Summary of Conditions Says Warmer Weather Needed

With ample moisture and favorable weather, crops in Prairie Provinces are growing rapidly says the Bank Montreal weekly report. No damage has been reported during the week. heavy hay crop is assured. In Quebec good growing weather has been beneficial to all crops. In Ontario a decided Warm dry weather is now needed. In British Columbia weather generally is favorable, but warmth is now required. Grain and field crops are doing well. PRAIRIE PROVINCES

In Alberta, while conditions generally are favorable and moisture ample, warmer weather would be welcome. All crops are progressing rapidly. Western area-Crops are still about ten days late, but growing rapidly. Winter wheat is heading out. Sugar beet thinning is nearing an end. Alfalfa is ready for first cutting. Range is excellent. Northeastern area-Conditions are satisfactory and all crops are making rapid progress. Southeastern area - Conditions continue favorable and all crops

are making satisfactory progress. Saskatchewan-Northern area- Rains have been frequent and all grains are growing rapidly, with much of wheat in shot blade. Southern area-Rains have been general and crops are advancing satisfactorily, although growth is still about ten days behind last year Manuitoba-Weather conditions continue favorable and growth rapid.

(Pacific Fisherman) The following comment on conditions the Pacific halibut fishery has been written by Capt. Harold Nesland of the

schooner "Seattle," a prominent master and vessel owner of the halibut fleet: "I wish to draw attention to the outrage of slaughtering young halibut that has gone on for years and is going on

"There are boats that have been fishing off Timber Island and Cape Addington for years in June. July and August . They have worked on a schedule of from 10 to 12 days, and brought back only small halibut. The majority of the catch has been landed at Ketchikan, though some has been sold in Seattle. In 1926, one trip of 60,-000 lbs. was sold at Ketchikan, o which only three fish in the whole lot weighted over ten pounds each.

"The writer fished on this bank on August 14, 1923. I made three sets on this fishing ground in one day. Weshifted around on the bank hoping to find larger fish, but in vain. Our catch was 9,000 lbs. for the day, and out of the entire lot there were only 300 lbs. of fish weighing over 10 lbs. each. I do not know how many fish the men threw overboard from the dories when they were hauling. I am ashamed to say there must have been from 400 t 600 thrown overboard, all small halibut I have not fished on this ground since, but judging from all other banks the fish must be much smaller today.
