WITNESSES AT EGGERS TRIAL FEAR VIOLENCE

REFUSE TO COME TO CANADA TO
TESTIFY IN FAMOUS HI-JACKING
CASE

SEATTLE, May 28.—Troy Martin and Joseph Edwards, former rum runners regarded as the principal witnesses in the forthcoming piracy trial of Milo Eggers, inform the B.C. authorities that they will not testify in the case, it was announced here last night by T. H. Patterson and Bert Ross, special Crown counsel. The statement says: "We were told by the witnesses some time ago that they were afraid to go to Canada. They declared first that they feared the publicity they might get from the trial involving their liquor operations. Now the witnesses inform us they won't go. They say they have been threatened and fear they will be killed if they testify and then return to the United States. They say they were first offered as a bribe to keep out of Canada a piece of property, but they would not accept it and then they were threatened if they testified against Eggers."

SALVAGE FIRM COMING HERE

WILL OPERATE POWERFUL TUG OUT
OF THIS PORT WITH CAPT. PAUL
ARMOUR IN COMMAND

The B.C. Towing & Lightering Co., recently organized in the south, is to establish a branch here and about the end of next week a powerful tugboat (just built in Vancouver) will arrive, under command of Capt. Paul Armour, to be established at this port. The concern will engage in salvage and other work here. The tugboat, which will be a decided acquisition to the local waterfront, is named "Salvage Princess," and is under Prince Rupert registry. She is 75 feet long with beam of 18 feet and 8 feet draft. The vessel is powered with a 120 h.p. Fairbanks-Morse full diesel engine with powerful pumping equipment, radio, etc. She will take up her station at Prince Rupert after fulfilling a 120-day charter for the B.C. Packers at Lowe Inlet.

CONSERVATIVE LEADER COMING

HON. DR. S. F. TOLMIE WILL BE
HERE ON JUNE 24 IN COURSE OF
TOUR OF PROVINCE

Hon. Dr. S. F. Tolmie, M.P. for Victoria and Conservative leader for British Columbia, will arrive in the city on Friday, June 24, in the course of a tour of the province, according to word received at local headquarters of the party. Arrangements will be made for him to address the public during his stay here. While particulars of Dr. Tolmie's itinerary have not yet been received here, it is understood he will go from Prince Rupert through the central interior en route to Williams Lake where he will attend a stampee on July 1.

\$20,000 FOR HER HUSBAND

MRS. DAGSLAND GETS JUDGMENT

VANCOUVER, May 28.—For the loss of her husband, Erik Dagsland, a fisherman, who was drowned at the mouth of the Skeena, July 31, 1925, by the steamer Catala on her maiden voyage, Mrs. Dagsland was awarded \$20,000 by an admiralty court judgment. The Catala collided with the Dagsland, a fishing boat, and Dagsland was lost.

CANADA'S THREE SCORE YEARS OF NATIONHOOD.

The production of foodstuffs must always remain Canada's basic industry. This is ensured by her very immensity, the fertility of her soil, and the bounty of Nature which decreases the variations of frost and snow, sunshine and rain necessary for the growth of fruit, grain and vegetables unrivalled the world over. In the item of wheat alone the year of Confederation saw a crop of 10,323,873 bushels for the entire territory now known as the Dominion of Canada; last year the total production of wheat was 406,269,000 bushels!

In the last 60 years the development of machinery has made farm work much less laborious. In 1867 cutting of grain by machinery was comparatively new, and the machines then in use were crude and unwieldy. In that year a Canadian company produced the hand-rake reaper, shown in Mr. Jeffery's sketch, which was far superior to any manufactured before. On many a farm of that day the entire grain crop was cut by the old-fashioned cradle. An expert cradler, followed by a man with a wooden rake, who raked the windrows into sheaves and bound them with a wisp of straw, could harvest from three to four acres a day. Nowadays a power-driven reaper-thresher which cuts a 15-foot swath and carries a crew of two men, can cut and thresh forty acres in a day! The artist shows the old and new methods, together with another labor-saving device—a modern tractor.

Women in Beer Parlors Are a Menace Declares Commissioner Davidson

LICENCE OF COMMERCIAL AT VANCOUVER IS SUSPENDED
FOLLOWING ONE WEEK OF BEING OPEN TO LADIES

VANCOUVER, May 28.—Commissioner Davidson attributed the indefinite suspension of the beer parlor license at the Commercial Hotel here, he announced yesterday, to "undesirable conditions" which were followed by the readmission of women patrons by the parlor since last Saturday night. He said: "About a year ago the presence of women in beer parlors was leading to undesirable conditions. The board had no power to exclude them but there were regulations to prohibit the presence of undesirable. Those regulations it is my duty to enforce."

"We were at that time faced with the prospect of wholesale closings but conditions immediately improved. A few days ago one hotel, the Commercial, decided to admit women. The same undesirable conditions ensued at once. The disorderly conduct at this beer parlor in my opinion is owing to the difficulty in deciding at the entrance who are all right and who not. No hotel man can admit women to beer parlors without running serious risk of bringing about a violation of the regulations against the presence of undesirables."

**NO PESSIMISM OVER
CROPS AS YET SAYS
FREE PRESS REPORT**

WINNIPEG, May 28.—"The individual farmer and individual district will suffer without doubt but up to the present at least there is no excuse for pessimism," declared the agricultural editor of the Free Press in that newspaper's first general crop report of the season. "While far from a cheerful statement corresponding with the report for 1926, the outlook is better than the weather during the last few weeks has led people to expect."

Although pastors of both Prince Rupert United Churches are being moved and new ministers are coming to take their places, changes in the church clergy in this district will be comparatively few as a result of the recent conference in Vancouver according to Rev. G. G. Hacker, pastor of First United Church, who returned this morning from attending the convention. Mr. Hacker himself is going from here to Vernon and will be succeeded by Rev. A. Wilson from Trail, a man, who Mr. Hacker says, the congregation here is fortunate to obtain. Rev. Evan Baker goes to Cowichan Station, Vancouver Island, and Rupert East United Church pulpit will be taken by a student from Knox-Victoria College, Toronto, who is, as yet unnamed. Rev. Victor Sansum is transferred from Kispiox to Oak Street Church, Vancouver, and will be succeeded by Rev. J. E. Burnett who has recently returned to the province from mission work in South Africa. Rev. J. H. Matthews from Milner, who was formerly at Kitimaat and Hartley Bay, will come to Skidegate in place of Rev. S. S. Feat who is transferred to Victoria. Rev. Alexander Mogege will come to Kitimaat to take the place of Rev. H. R. Goodridge who is retiring from the ministry to go farming. Rev. McLellan from Union College, Vancouver, will come to Burns Lake for the summer months to assist Rev. W. R. Ashford in that field.

CANADA INVITED GENEVA CONFERENCE

OTTAWA, May 28.—Canadian representation at the coming Coolidge naval disarmament conference at Geneva will be considered at the next cabinet meeting Tuesday. Minister of Justice Lapointe is returning from Australia via Suez and may be invited to act as the Canadian representative.

SOVIET CONSULATE OFFICIALLY CLOSED

LONDON, May 28.—The consulate general of the Union of Soviet Republic is closed. It is announced by a sign posted today at the gates of Chessham House, but privileged persons are admitted. The officials are preparing to leave the country at Chamberlain's request within ten days.

METLAKATLA MAN IS TO BE ORDAINED AS CHURCH CLERGYMAN

The first native of Southeastern Alaska to be ordained as deacon in the Episcopal Church will be presented to the Right Rev. P. T. Rowe, D.D., bishop of Alaska, in St. John's Church, Ketchikan, on May 29, says the Ketchikan Chronicle.

Paul James Mather is a member of the Tsimshian tribe and was born on August 11, 1878, at old Metlakatla, a village of 2,000 inhabitants situated near Port Simpson in northern British Columbia.

He moved with his father and the Duncan colony to new Metlakatla on Annette Island, Alaska. This is situated 15 miles from the city of Ketchikan. Baptized into the church by a priest of the Church of England, he has always maintained a close identification with it. He was later confirmed by Bishop Rowe who will now ordain him to the work and office of deacon.

Fought With Devil Fish to Recover Body of Cook Which Was Lost from Tug Warren

PORT TOWNSEND, May 28.—An octopus bearing in its tentacles the body of a member of the crew of the tug Warren yesterday yielded the human prize after an hour's battle fifty feet under water with A. E. Hook, a diver, who related the story on his arrival here with the body.

The diver said he was repairing a fish trap when he sighted the devil fish making its way along the bottom of the sound embracing the body. Seizing the pike pole he thrust and lunged at the octopus which warded off the blows by flinging its arms in the water which became cloudy.

Centering his attack on the middle portion of his adversary, he cut the creature to pieces before it collapsed on the sea bed. The diver then pried loose the tentacles from the body which was partly identified when he brought it to the surface as that of H. Healey, the cook on the Warren.

It is supposed that the site of the sinking of the Warren was a short distance from the scene where Hook recovered the body.

Rattenbury to Test Validity of Land Settlement Board and Its Land Expropriation Scheme

VANCOUVER, May 28.—A special despatch from Victoria to the Province states that the validity of the expropriation rights of the Land Settlement Board of the Provincial Government is the subject of attack in a writ issued out of the supreme court registry at Victoria in an action brought by F. N. Rattenbury, architect, and owner of 40,000 acres of land in the Omineca and coast districts against the land settlement board.

If correct in its contention, the cause of the plaintiff affects all lands over the province where the board has put the provisions of the Act into force.

Mr. Rattenbury formerly had a land office at Telkwa from which settlers were placed. His lands in that neighborhood were valued by the land settlement board and sold at a low price, much lower than that he was asking for them.

CONTRACT TO LOCAL FIRM DOCK REPAIR

STEVEDORING COMPANY TO RE-
BUILD PART OF PROVINCIAL
GOVERNMENT WHARF

VICTORIA, May 28.—The contract has been let for extensive repairs to the Provincial Government wharf at Prince Rupert to the Prince Rupert-Stevedoring Company.

About half the wharf was repaired a year or two ago and the work now contracted for on the remaining portion of the dock is to be of a permanent character. The contractors are a Prince Rupert concern with J. H. Pillsbury, manager.

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BURNT OUT ATHLETES

A serious indictment of the American athletic system has recently been made, with all courtesy, by two distinguished visitors from England. One is young Lord Burghley, the gifted hurdler from Cambridge University, who came over to participate in the annual track meet held a few days ago in Philadelphia under the auspices of the University of Pennsylvania, says an esteemed contemporary. The other is Sir Herbert Barker, the celebrated "bloodless surgeon," or osteopath, whose services through manipulative surgery during the war aroused a storm of controversy with the regular medical profession in England and who was finally knighted as a form of public and official recognition. Lord Burghley charges that American participation in athletics is too intense, with the result that young athletes are "burnt out" before they reach the age at which they should be at their best. Sir Herbert declares that the same process results in injuries to the heart and shortened lives.

INDICTMENT PROBABLY CORRECT

Some followers of American athletics will cherish a strong suspicion that the indictment which Sir Herbert brings is correct and will expect confirmation to come from the statistical investigation into the after health and life experience of college athletes in which the Carnegie foundation is now engaged.

Curiously enough, at the very time at which the two English visitors were making their criticisms, the sporting pages were carrying comments upon "Young" Stribling, a prize fighter who, a few years ago, was hailed as the coming heavyweight champion because of his phenomenal showing while still a boy in his teens, but who is now regarded as having passed his prime, when still under 25, because of having been "burnt out." It should, however, be said in defense of the American system of athlete development that this danger is more and more clearly recognized by athlete supervisors in our preparatory and public schools. One of the chief functions performed by the more intelligent among them is that of preventing youthful athletes from being betrayed by their own ambition into overexertion.

CURIOUS ACTION OF BRITISH LABORITES

From the rather meagre information supplied here it seems rather curious that the members of the Labor Party in Great Britain should object to the action taken by the Government in checking the activities of the Russian Soviet. It would be an impossible thing to allow such a condition to continue. It would be like allowing a friend to visit your house and have him conspire to ruin your home. The natural thing would be to kick him out. That is what Britain did to the Soviet envoys. No matter if the Labor representatives of Britain believed in the Soviet form of Government, in the need for a change in Britain or in the injustice of the present Tory Government of the United Kingdom, they could not believe in the methods of the conspirators who entered the country under a solemn agreement to abstain from propaganda and then set out to take advantage of their position in the country to conspire.

True, the Laborites asked only for a full inquiry but a full inquiry is what the Government seems to have been making although of necessity it could not be a public inquiry. Canadians generally, we think, will agree with the British position.

WILLISON WAS ONTARIO MAN

WROTE WELL KNOWN BOOK ON SIR WILFRID LAURIER AND EDITED GLOBE

One of the best known newspaper men in Canada, an author, public speaker and magazine writer of note, Sir John Stephen Willison, K.B., LL.D., of Toronto, was a native born Ontario man of whom his province has reason to be proud. His book on the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier, published in 1903, under the title of "Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberal Party, a Political History," carried his name throughout the Dominion. His published works include, "The Railway Question in Canada," "Lessons From the Old World," "Anglo-Saxon Amity," "United States and Canada," "The New Canada," and "Reminiscences, Political and Personal."

Sir John Willison first became known to the public as the editor of the Globe, Toronto. One of his proud moments was when he was appointed Editor-in-Chief of the Globe after a series of rapid promotions on the staff, with only ten years' service on that paper. He joined the Globe staff in 1883, when newspaper promotions were of slower growth than in these days. His first newspaper experience was gained on the staff of the London Advertiser, in 1881. He left the Globe in 1902 and became Editor-in-Chief of the Toronto Daily News, which position he continued to fill until 1917.

REPRESENTED THUNDERER

Sir John was appointed Canadian correspondent of the London Times in 1906, and after his retirement from the Toronto Daily News in 1917 up to the time of his death, his newspaper connection was practically confined to "the Thunderer." He was elected president of the Canadian Press Association in 1900.

Sir John Willison was a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, a Governor of Upper Canada College for fifteen years, and a trustee of Queen's University, Queen's conferred on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. He was knighted in 1913.

Among the public positions held by Sir John was that of Chairman of the Ontario Commission on Unemployment, 1914-1916, and Chairman to the Ontario Housing Committee, 1918-19.

During the Great War Sir John Willison gave with fervent ardor of his abilities, experience and time to performing valuable service for the Allied cause, and after the war, as President of the Canadian Reconstruction Association, which was formed in Toronto in March, 1918, with offices in Montreal, Toronto, and Winnipeg, he devoted himself wholeheartedly towards assisting in Canada's recovery from the effects of the world conflict. He lost a son in the war, William Willison, who enlisted early in the war, being killed at Courcellette, September 15, 1916.

BORN HURON COUNTY

The little village of Hills Green, Huron County, Ont., was the birthplace of Sir John Willison. He was born on November 9, 1856. His father was Stephen Willison. The future editor, orator, publicist and knight had not the advantages of a college education. He was primarily educated in the public schools, but he gained his vast store of knowledge through native studiousness and through his newspaper experiences and his contact with the world. Sir John married Rae Wood Turner, daughter of Mrs. Margaret Turner, of Tiverton, Ont., in June, 1885. Two sons were born to them, William, who was actively engaged in newspaper work when the war broke out and enlisted and was killed in action, and Walter, who was also a newspaperman and served for a time as a Canadian Press correspondent in the Great War.

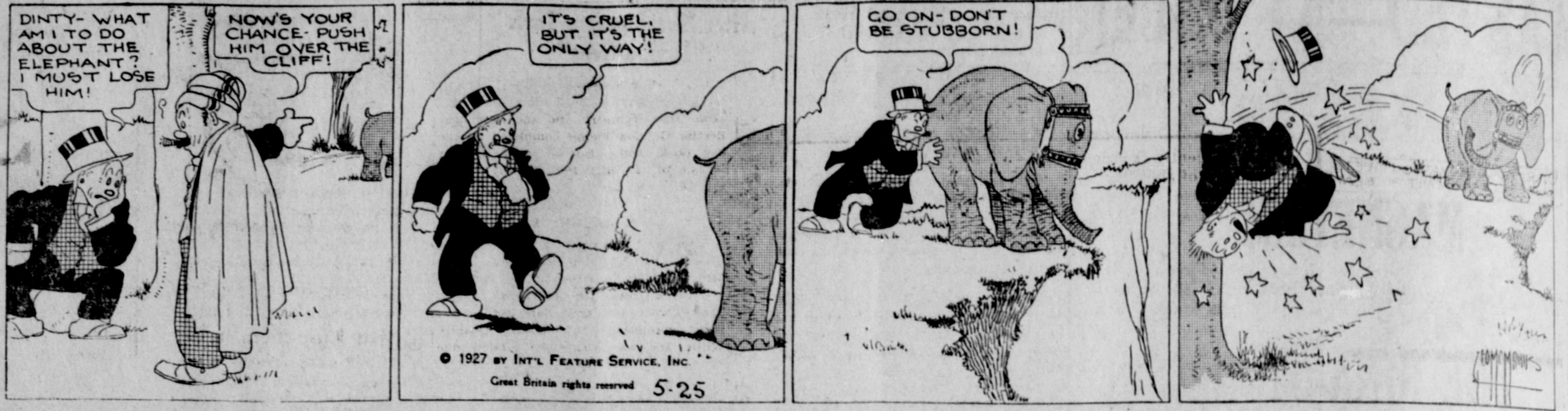

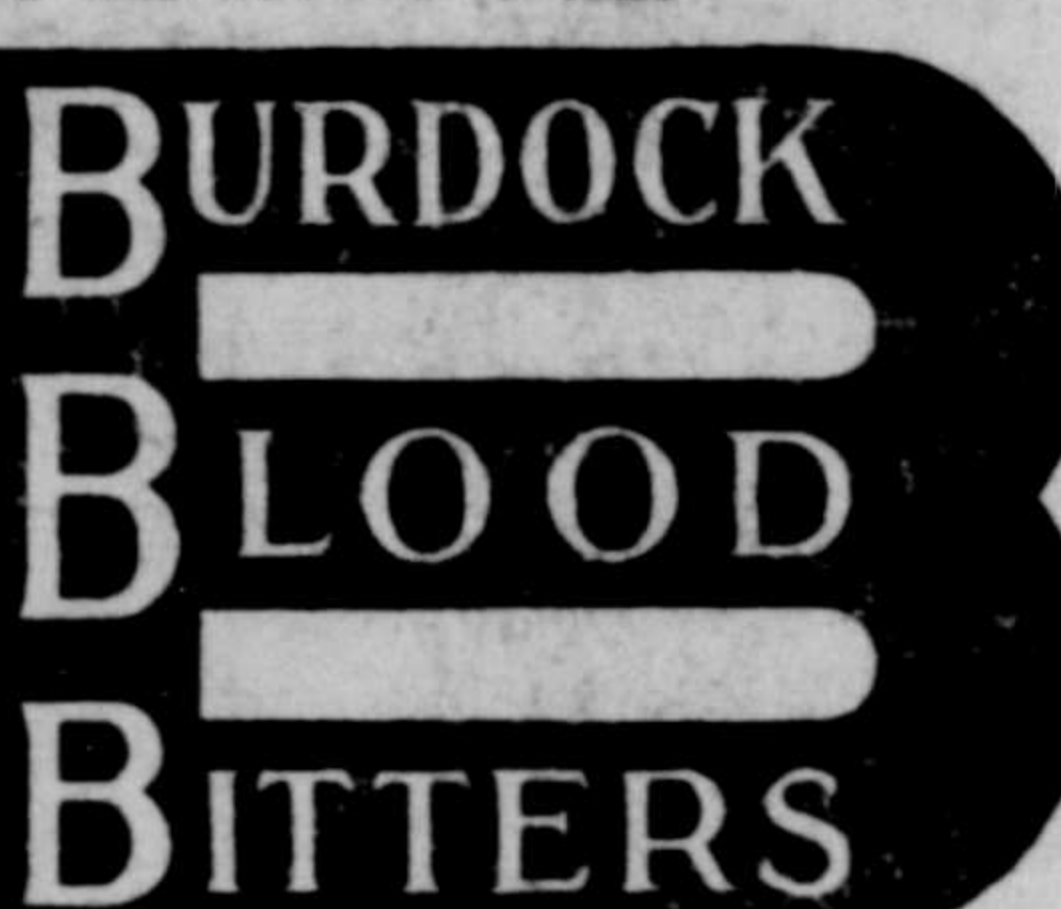

Waterfront Whiffs

Field's Plans on Queen Charlotte Islands—Preparations for Approaching Canning Season—General Doings Along "Front"

The recently incorporated Crescent Packing Co. Ltd., of which James Field of this city is the principal, plans putting in a one-line cannery with a vacuum double seamer on Crescent Inlet near Lockeport, Moresby Island. The location includes an excellent water power site which will be developed to operate the plant. The company has also leased a location on Tasoo Harbor which is only a short distance away. A tram connecting the cannery with this location will give access to the extensive fisheries on the west coast of the island which have formerly been very much isolated while there are said to be a good supplies of pinkies and chums on the east side. There are also large beds of hardshell clams in the district which it is intended to can next fall. Associated with Mr. Field in the new venture is W. J. Jefferson, formerly with the Western Packers Ltd. and more recently with the Somerville Cannery Co. Ltd. The latter will be the active manager of the Island plant.

Some necessary redecking is being done under the overhead railway at the east end of the Canadian National docks. It is to be hoped that the railway will take a leaf out of the provincial government book and continue the work. A little fixing and cleaning up would be a convenience to the citizens as well as something better to look at on the part of the tourists who will shortly be here in force.

The United States Bureau of Fisheries plans an extensive campaign of salmon tagging this season. Such operations, besides at other points, will be carried out in Dixon's Entrance around Cape Fox between July 16 and 20. Rewards are offered for the returned tags which are used by the Bureau of Fisheries in assembling data as to movements of the fish.

An increasing number of return halibut tags is reported by Norman Freeman, local representative of the International Fisheries Commission. They are coming in now at a rate of anything from one to three a day and are from various banks.

COMMISSION TO MEET

It is understood that a meeting of the International Fisheries Commission will be held in June when a preliminary report on the condition of the North Pacific halibut fisheries will be presented by Dr. W. F. Thompson who has been directing investigations during the past several years. Dr. Thompson is compiling a history of the various banks and classifying the landings at the various ports according to their sources. There will be a great mass of data, both biological and statistical, in the report which will show clearly the more essential facts as to the condition and immediate needs of the fishery. Dr. Thompson points out that the information obtained is still far from complete but it is expected that it will probably provide a fair working basis for the avoidance of early depletion. The meeting will probably devise means for the continuation of the commission's investigation work.

The Prince Rupert Cannery at Tucks Inlet, although the season is not yet opened, is already a hive of industry. Considerable renovation work is being undertaken following the purchase of the plant by the Somerville Cannery Co. and in the warehouse a number of boats are being repaired and rebuilt.

The Pachena of the Prince Rupert Boat House fleet will leave here on June 10 to take up a packing charter out of the new B.C. Packers' cannery at Walker Island near Bella Bella. The Myfanwy is going into fishery patrol.

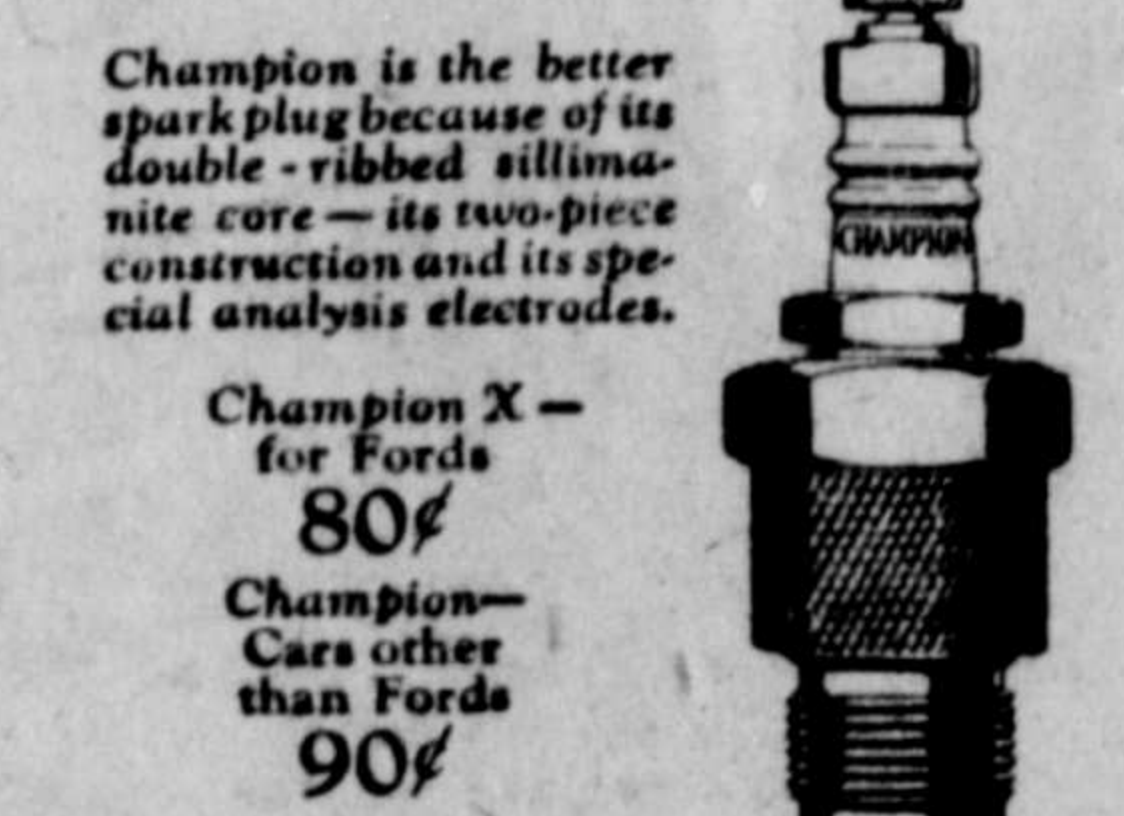

TOPLEY STILL IN LIMELIGHT

LENGTH OF VEIN ON TAYLOR MINE DISCOVERED TO EXTEND THROUGH FOUR CLAIMS

(Interior News)

Most encouraging results have followed the first week of work on the Topley group of Topley Consolidated properties and this still further increases the bright prospects before the company in their enterprises at Topley. Frank Taylor spent Saturday in Smithers after superintending the work on the road, in the building of camps and in work on the claims, and he is very enthusiastic as a result of the first week's work.

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STOLE LIQUOR AND CORKSCREW

ENGLISHMAN WHO ENGAGED IN HAZARDOUS SCHEME IS BANKRUPT AS RESULT

LONDON, May 28.—Pirates operating off "rum row." Sandy Hook, were described as being solely responsible for the financial difficulties of Lieut. Col. John Allan Rule, of Carlton Mansions, Pall Mall, who appeared in the London bankruptcy court for examination.

Accounts had been filed showing liabilities of £37,021, of which £30,008 was unsecured, and assets of £1,157.
