SEE IN ACTION OF BRITISH GOV. ERNMENT POSSIBLE PRE-PARATION FOR WAR

MOSCOW, May 26,-Maxim Litvinoff, acting Soviet foreign secretary, told newspapermen that the Anglo-Russian breach was the logical outcome of the British Conservative Government's anti-Soviet policy. It was not an unexpected event connected with the Soviet House raid or the alleged disloyalty of the Russian trade organizations. He said:

"The only reason the British Government delayed the rupture until now is that it hoped to find allies for the joint attack on our When this hope did not materialize, the British Government decided to act alone, hoping it would signal similar action by other states. A characteristic fact is that the Argos raid was carried out the day after the Midland Bank agreed to finance Soviet orders to Great Britain to the extent of £10,-000,000. He declared the breach was an energetic preparation for war since it could hardly have been the intention to deprive British in-

Minimum Wage Act Discussed With Labor Representatives by Members of the Commission

Not Yet Decided if One General Minimum for all Callings-Effect in Lumber Industry is Beneficial

At a round table conference with a number of representative labor men at the Court House last evening, J. L. McNiven, deputy minister of labor, sitting with Frank Foster as minimum wage commissioners, said it had not yet been determined whether to make one general minimum wage for all industries or to particularize as to the minimum wage to be paid in each. The operation of the minimum wage in the lumber industry had affected nine thousand employees who before it became operative were working for less than forty cents an hour which was at present the minimum set.

TITLED HURDLING STAR

British Athletes but "Burn Out."

NEW YORK, May 26.—United States college athletes take their competition nuch more seriously" than British rivals, in the view of Lord Burghley, titled hurdling star and captain of the Cambridge Univer-Penn relay carnival.

"Your fellows go at their games much more intensely than we do," he said, "perhaps that accounts for the fact that so many of your American college stars 'burn out' after brief competitize careers," hewent on. "They put all they have in three or four years of keen action. In England we take track and field sports less serliously. We do not train so sharply, either. One of my leading rivals in the hurdles, for instance, is a man of 32, getting better at an age when nearly all of your Americans have retired from competition."

Lord Burghley, an affable youth of 21, has improved steadily as a timber topper in the past three years of competition here and abroad. He counts on being a contender for Olympic honors at Amsterdam next year.

POSSIBLE CAPTAIN Despite his youth, Lord Burghley has been mentioned as possible captain f the British Olympic team but the Cambridge star feels this honor should go to Douglas Lowe, famous half-miler and Olympic 800-meter titleholder.


