TOKIO, March 8 .- Reports trickling in over crippled wire communications indicate that the casualties in an earthquake which yesterday visited central Japan include dead and injured which may reach five thousand. These figures, however, are only speculative. One report from Kyoto stated that there were thousands of

casualties in Nineyama and four other nearby villages which were destroyed. At Nineyama, the quake was followed by a fire. Deaths at Osaka are placed at twenty-two and in Saki eighteen.

Originally the Ko Lao-hui may have had high aims. Today it exists for the purpose of brigandage and blackmail, and of securing mutual protection in the commission of almost every kind of crime. Active members eccasionally fall into the hands of the law but the society sees to it that they are not severely punished, and they have many comforts while in prison. The magistrates who try them are most likely themselves members who have joined up to secure immunity from molestation. If they are not members they are speedily terrorized.

Banditry, piracy, highway robbery and the like are the pursuits of the more active members. For them the laws of the land have no terrors, though the laws of the society have many. Offenses against the rules are dealt with most rigorously, and members are specially selected to deal out adequate punish-Death is sometimes the easiest of the punishments meted out. Mutilation, so horrible that it cannot be written of, is a favorite choice, and the lesser offenses are met by such a comparatively trifling punishment as gouging out of eyes.

NOT EASY TO RID

A society of this kind, whose adherents are drawn from every class, which has many aliases, and whose more energetic members may be soldiers and rebels and brigands in turn, will not be easily got rid of. There is no hope of an administration in China, for many years to come, that will be strong enough to impose its will on the west. where the provinces must continue to be administered largely by the most undesirable of their populations.

The present outbreak of brigandage is almost certainly a Ko Lao-hui outbreak, and is about the most sinister feature of the present situation.

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of uge, and by aliens on declaring intention become British subjects conditional upon residence, occapation, and improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, 'How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent Records will be granted covering

only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed 35c forms, copies of which can be tobtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be




