Cessation for One Month is Ordered by Commission of Fisheries

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 15 .- Henry W. O'Malley, United States commissioner of fisheries, on Saturday ordered the cessation of commercial salmon fishing in the southern district of Southeastern Alaska until September 14. 


