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## PULP AND PAPER MILL AT KITIMAT

### FOREIGNERS EVACUATING WHOLE YANGSTE RIVER VALLEY

#### New Industrial Plant Close to Prince Rupert Will Be Started Shortly According to Promoter

Another Ocean Falls is to be established in abundantly timbered valley ninety miles south of city, timber dealer announces

VANCOUVER, March 28.—Announcement is made by C. P. Pretty, Vancouver timber dealer, that construction will be commenced shortly of a pulp and paper mill with a daily capacity of two hundred and fifty tons in the Kitimat Valley, ninety miles south of Prince Rupert.

Mr. Pretty is understood to have taken options lately on large privately owned timber stands on the Kitimat and Wadina Rivers which are tributary to Kitimat Inlet. There is an abundance of timber available for such a mill on the inlet which is adequately

#### WHEAT VESSEL SAILED SUNDAY

YAYE MARU LOADED 328,062 BUSHELS  
WHEAT—OTTER POOL AND KOFUKU  
MARU COMING

With a full cargo of three Northern wheat aggregating 328,062 bushels, the "K" Line freight steamer Yaye Maru sailed from Prince Rupert at eight o'clock Sunday morning for the United Kingdom or continent. The vessel will receive orders at Norfolk, Virginia. The Yaye Maru, which was piloted by Triple Island by Capt. Larry Thomson, made good time in loading her cargo at the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator.

The next vessel to load wheat at this port will be the British steamer Otter Pool which will take a full cargo to United Kingdom or continent. This ship left Balboa in the Panama Canal zone on March 21 and should arrive at Prince Rupert about April 11. She is to be lined here before she starts loading.

The Otter Pool will be followed by the "K" line freighter Kofuku Maru coming on about the end of April to load for the United Kingdom or continent.

#### JAPANESE DIES UNDER TRAIN

SATEMATSU SAKAOKERA WAS RUN  
OVER NEAR PORT EDWARD  
YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

When yesterday afternoon's westbound passenger train was nearing Port Edward, Engineer F. Lackey and fireman E. Ireland observed a form lying on the track between the rails and immediately applied the emergency brakes but were unable to halt the train before the engine had passed over the body. When first seen, the man was lying in such a position with a sack alongside him that it was not possible to distinguish the form of a human being, being partly concealed by the sack. The emergency brakes, however, were immediately applied and the train came to a stop about thirty feet after the man had been struck. It deceased was alive at the time he was hit by the engine death would have been instantaneous as the nature of the wounds were such that it was impossible for him to survive any length of time after the accident. When the body was removed from between the engine and tender by the train crew life was extinct.

The remains were brought to the city, and this morning an enquiry was held by J. R. Tannoch who decided after hearing the evidence of the engineer and fireman that an inquest was unnecessary.

A Japanese at Port Edward identified the remains as those of Sute Matsui Sakaokera who had been employed at the cannery. The sack, which the deceased had evidently been carrying, and which was found by his side, contained a small deer which had evidently been killed some little time before.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers.

#### SANKEY CASE IS GOING ON

HEIGHT AND WEIGHT OF DE-  
CEASED AND ACCUSED ARE  
COMPARED IN COURT

VANCOUVER, March 28.—The height and weight of Miss Loretta Chisholm and Joseph Sankey were compared before the British Columbia Court of Appeal here this morning by J. E. Bird, counsel for Sankey, in the attempt to show that Sankey could not have committed the murder of the girl. After giving the weight and height of the victim and the condemned man, Mr. Bird pointed out that deceased had been dragged off the trail at Port Essington one hundred feet over rough ground into the bush. He contended that these questions had not been explained sufficiently to the jury by the trial judge.

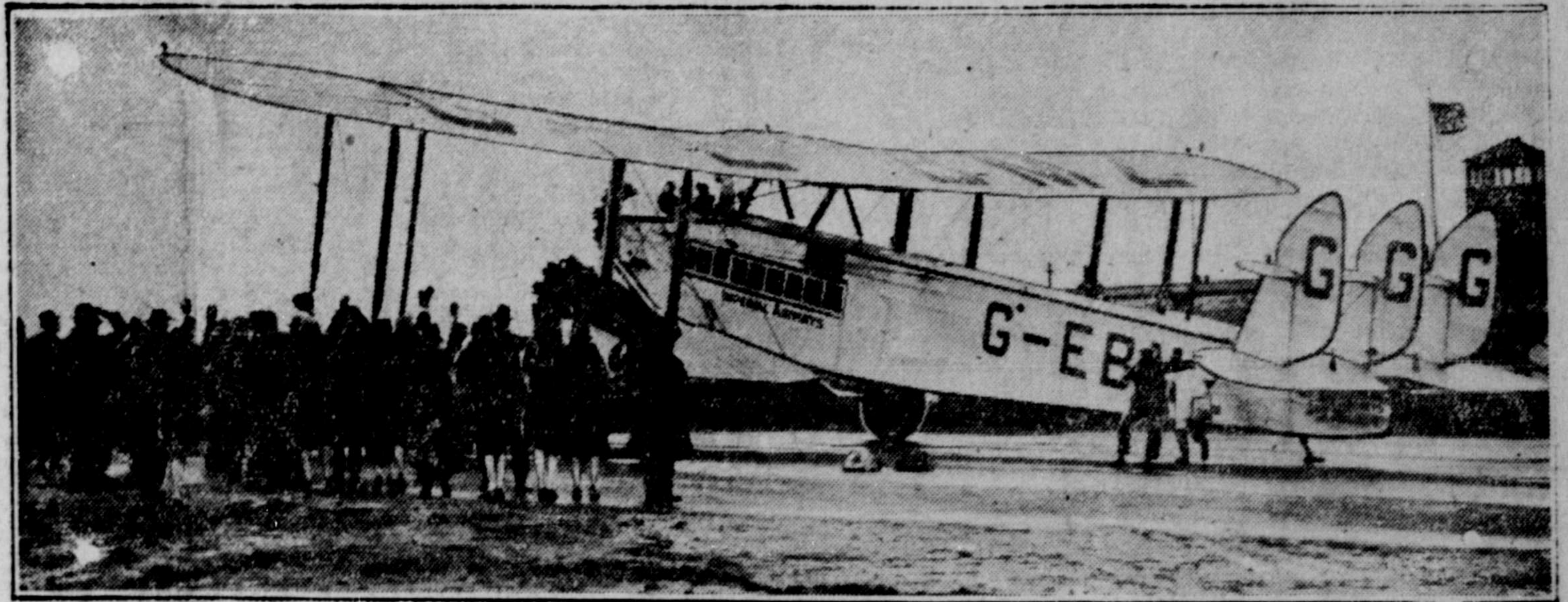

#### BIG INFUX IMMIGRANTS

APPROXIMATELY 3,500 BRITISH  
AND CONTINENTAL ARRIVED  
AT HALIFAX OVER WEEK-  
END

HALIFAX, March 28.—Approximately 3,500 British and continental immigrants reached Halifax over the week-end from five liners which docked Saturday night and Sunday. It was the largest influx of settlers since the Great War. Nine special Canadian National trains were needed to carry the immigrants and their possessions to Western Canada.

#### ARCHBISHOP OF OTTAWA PASSES

RT. REV. JOSEPH EMARD D. D. OF  
OTTAWA CELEBRATED GOLDEN  
ANNIVERSARY OF PRIEST-  
HOOD LAST YEAR

LOCAL BISHOP ATTENDED

OTTAWA, March 28.—Archbishop Joseph Emard, head of the Roman Catholic Church diocese of Ottawa, died this morning at the age of 84.  
Rt. Rev. Joseph Emard, D.D. was one of Canada's most prominent Catholic clergymen. Born at St. Constant, Quebec, on March 31, 1853, he was educated at St. Therese College, Montreal Seminary, and Gregorian and Apollinare, Rome. Becoming a priest over fifty years ago, he was made the first bishop of the diocese of Valleyfield on June 9, 1892. A few years ago he was promoted to the rank of an archbishop and assumed the direction of Ottawa diocese. He was the author of many pamphlets on religious subjects, education and temperance.

The late Archbishop Emard was well known by Bishop E. M. Bunoz of Prince Rupert who was grieved today to hear of his death. Last May Bishop Bunoz attended deceased's golden anniversary celebration in the priesthood.

GREAT WAS REJOICING IN SHANGHAI

VANCOUVER, March 28.—"When I first saw the British troops march through Shanghai, I said, 'Thank God they're here,'" said Stirling Fessenden, an American and chairman of the Shanghai municipal council, who was one of the passengers aboard the Empress of Asia arriving here last night after a rough passage across the Pacific.

#### Rising Tide of Anti- Foreignism Observed Throughout District

REACTION FROM BOMBARDMENT OF NANKING ASSUMES  
LARGE SCALE—MASSACRE OF FOREIGNERS FORECAST—  
POSITION BECOMING DIFFICULT EVERYWHERE

SHANGHAI, March 28.—Under protection of the muzzles of British war vessels, almost complete evacuation of the great Yangste valley is under way in the midst of a rising tide of anti-foreignism all along the river. From virtually all Yangste ports and from many inland stations, waterways and land ways are dotted with groups of foreigners fleeing from the Nationalists' territory to the now uncertain haven of Shanghai. The evacuation, which is under official supervision, is impelled by fear of the anti-foreign wave now sweeping the Yangste valley as a reaction from the Nanking bombardment to protect foreigners on Soocny Hill.

During the past forty-eight hours up to last night, more than five hundred refugees, most of them missionaries, had reached Shanghai.

The Cantonese propagandists are circulating reports that two hundred thousand Chinese were killed by the British and United States bombardment of Nanking and that an ugly anti-foreign situation has thus been stirred up.

On Sunday huge mass meetings were held in the vicinity bordering on the French concession. Resolutions were adopted demanding immediate repossession of foreign settlements and advocating another general strike.

Anti-foreign posters are beginning to appear on the streets and students are taking an active part in street demonstrations.

Sunday passed quietly in the foreign settlement.

Refugees of all nationalities arriving here from Nanking declare that they are convinced that the Cantonese have perfected a plan whereby, at a given signal, groups of soldiers will proceed to all foreign consulates and residences to slaughter the inmates. The soldiers are said to have openly declared that they have been ordered to kill foreigners. The plan was evidently being carried out when the bombardment by the warships began.

#### FOREIGNERS IN DANGER

LONDON, March 28.—Many foreign communities in China beside the Nanking and Shanghai areas are in a precarious position according to British government advices. The position of the foreign subjects in Chang Sha Huan province is stated to be difficult, the local Chinese commissioner having made demands upon the British consul following a trivial incident between two British bluejackets and a Chinese farmer.

The British minister at Peking has not advised all his countrymen to take refuge at Shanghai but has left the matter of evacuation to the discretion of local British officers.

An Exchange telegraph despatch from Shanghai said that refugees there from Nanking had reported that about twelve foreigners had been killed there in the last week's disturbances. Several others, whose fates are unknown, are still missing.

One vessel sank, carrying with it seven members of the crew. The other boat is missing and is believed to have gone down with twenty fishermen aboard.

## A SPLIT IN TORY RANKS.

Apparently there is a split in the Conservative party in Skeena. His Worship the Mayor is said to be out on his own hook for the Skeena seat while the party which he is supposedly espousing is not willing to have him as its standard bearer.

Perhaps the split in Prince is indicative of a split throughout the province. There is good reason to believe that the leadership in British Columbia is in just as unsettled a state as is the party's candidature in Skeena. Perhaps another election will find the Conservatives again fighting among themselves instead of fighting the Grits. The prospect is not very promising for a party that cannot even have agreement within its own ranks.

From the looks of things, there are liable to be some interesting developments within the ranks of the Conservative party before the much-mooted election rolls around.

## NO ELECTION THIS YEAR.

If Premier Oliver announces that there will be a by-election in North Okanagan this June it will put aside any possibility of a general provincial election this year. As important for political organizers as the announcement of the by-election itself will be the unstated announcement that the government is going to live out its term until 1928 without an appeal to the people.

There has been considerable talk of an election this year but, as far as can be learned, such talk has emanated other than from the Liberal party where an official announcement of an election might, under the circumstances, be expected to originate. Election rumors this year look more and more like the propaganda of Conservative to bolster up their wayward forces.

## INFLUENCE OF SMALL PAPERS.

The power of the weekly and small daily newspapers is sometimes discounted. Perhaps this is because they are considered individually and not collectively as that imposing assemblage of newspapers which serves the 6,000,000 Canadians who live in communities of less than 5,000 population and on the farm.

Call them "only a little country newspaper" but remember they fill a need in their communities as great as that of the large city dailies. The weekly and small daily are as impatiently awaited by their readers as the metropolitan editions.

Because these weekly and small daily newspapers are in the majority and because they are inseparably linked with community thought and action it is of them that E. W. Howe speaks:

"Give me a newspaper to operate in and I can raise the devil, or pacify him, every day. Clergymen hold great councils to discuss world betterment, but editors and reporters do not, although much more powerful than clergymen; indeed, editors and reporters are easily our most powerful public men."

It is only when the army of small newspapers are mobilized behind one cause that their irresistible influence in public affairs is fully appreciated, although the influence each exerts in its own community is always sensed.

Inadequate space and facilities forbid the little home-town paper from combining within itself all that large volume of matter now offered by itself and the metropolitan dailies, but the average reader finds his local journal more indispensable than his city paper. That the weeklies and small dailies are a force in their respective communities is fully established.

## STIRRING BRITISH WAR ROMANCE IS "GREAT DECEPTION"

Non-resident persons	(only) \$1,000.00

Assessors will make the necessary corrections on returns where rebates, as revised, have not been claimed. An individual whose income does not exceed \$900.00 is not required to file a return except upon demand of the Assessor.

Returns should be made promptly in order to avoid penalizing penalties. The necessary forms and full information may be obtained upon application to any Provincial Assessor or to the Commissioner of Income Tax, Victoria.

**EDUCATORS TO MEET TORONTO**

FIVE THOUSAND DELEGATES. LEADERS IN EVERY NATION'S EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES. VISIT CANADA IN AUGUST

TORONTO, March 23. — (Canadian Press).—For a few days this summer, Toronto will be the educational centre of the world. Between August 7 and 12 the city will be host to an army of leaders in the world's educational activities, representing practically every country on the globe. These are representatives of the large number of national educational associations affiliated with the World Federation of Education Association. In addition there will be representatives of education in countries whose teachers' unions are not yet members of the Federation. Officially it is the third general meeting and second biennial session of the World Federation of Education Association and 5,000 or more delegates will attend the meeting.

One of the federation's aims is to relieve through education the old tendency toward national jealousy and race hatred. The gathering will be truly international, and its cosmopolitan nature is evidenced in the assurance given by the executive, that "persons who have messages to give will not be seriously handicapped on account of language." Each may speak in his own language, and a number of interpreters are being secured. World distinguished men and women who will bring messages of wide interest, will be on the general program, open to the public.

**DISCUSS MANY QUESTIONS**

Almost 30 discussion groups will be organized, and the questions taken up indicate the broad scope of the federation's activities, including as they do such subjects as health, recreation, nursery, kindergarten, adolescents, older children, college education, library service, science in relation to understanding, illiteracy, administration, adult education, student and teacher exchange, international scholarship, moral education, modern language, teacher preparation, parent-teacher associations, education for peace, correspondence, periodicals, geography, history viewpoint, music and art as universal languages, country youth, educational co-operation and guidance and vocational education.

An important part of the federation's program will be the presentation of reports by several committees and commissions which have been at work on special investigations. These reports

**OLD FRENCH MANOR MAY BE PRESERVED**

Residence of the Madeleine de Vercheres to be Restored

THREE RIVERS, March 23. — (Canadian Press).—The historic Manor de la Perade in the village of that name, at one time the residence of the early Canadian heroine, Madeleine de Vercheres, may be restored. It was recently burned with only the walls left standing. The historical society of Three Rivers, however, have urged on the provincial commission on historic monuments that the relic of early French Canada should be preserved.

Some years after the 14-year-old Madeleine had made her name immortal in Canadian history by her defence of her father's chateau against Indians at Vercheres, on the St. Lawrence River, she married M. de la Perade and went to live at the village named after him. They occupied the old residence, which was practically intact until a few weeks ago. Many notables of the seigniorial days were entertained by the couple, including Laval, first Bishop of Canada.

**SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS**

**PRE-EMPTIONS**

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

**PURCHASE**

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

MILL, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commission. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranked, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for cattlemen, campers and travellers, up to 100 head.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

All Trades, Businesses and Professions must be registered before April 30th.

Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to sub-section (3) of Section 52B of the Taxation Act, every person who engages in, carries on, or practices any Trade, Business or Profession within the Province is required to obtain from the Commissioner of Income Tax a Certificate of Registration before April 30th, 1927. Application should be made to any Provincial Assessor, from whom full information may be obtained. Certificates will be issued without the payment of any fee therefor.

Default in complying with the provisions of this section renders the person liable, upon summary conviction, to a fine of \$10.00 for each day during which his default continues.

Application forms may be obtained from any Provincial Assessor, Government Agent, Provincial Police Officer, or from the Commissioner of Income Tax, Victoria, B.C.
