





Opening of Scottish League Takes Place Today

LONDON, Aug. 13.—(By Canadian Press).-The Scottish Soccer League swings into action today, and the English season opens two weeks later. For the past few weeks the professional clubs have been busy recalling their players, while the soccer fan is having plenty of excitement in the post-season practice matches. The money derived from these games annually goes to charity, and each year an amount of half a million dollars is realized for worthy institutions.

ENGLISH LEAGUE Leeds United and West Bromwich Albion have been relegated to the Second Division, and the vacancies thus created In the First Division will be filled by Middlesbrough and Portsmouth. With regard to Middlesbrough it is a case of renewing acquaintance with a division of which in former years they achieved some distinction, but Portsmouth will be in the upper circle of the League for the first time.

The clubs that have lost their places in the Second Division are Bradford City and Darlington, and the relegation of Bradford City means that the great Yorkshire industrial centre, which has had both of its clubs in the First Division, will have to be content next season with Third Division fare.

Queen Elizabeth gave the ring to the Earl of Essex, who sharted her heart with the Earl of Leicester, as a pledge that whatever he might be accused of. she would either pardon him or admit him to her presence to justify his con-

Late in Elizabeth's life Essex rose in rebellion. The revolt was a fiasco; Essex was taken and condemned. After condemnation he gave the ring to the Countess of Nottingham to deliver to Elizabeth.

The ring, however, did not reach the Queen, and she, deciding that Essex was obdurate, permitted the execution. After the death of the Earl, the Countess of Nottingham confessed to Elizabeth tha to the Queen, but that she had not carried out her request.
