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PREMIER SPEAKS AGAIN ON CHARGES.

CITY MAKES DECISION ON RAILWAY TAXATION QUESTION

Fabrication of False Statements Are Given Castigation by Oliver

EVIDENCE PRODUCED IN LEGISLATURE TO GIVE LIE TO GAUTHIER'S ALLEGATIONS — BUCKHAM WAS NOT EVEN THERE

VICTORIA, February 23.—In the Legislature on Tuesday, Premier Oliver moved that a royal commission under the Public Enquiries Act be appointed to investigate the alleged irregularities set out in the affidavit of J. A. Gauthier relative to liquor purchases in the province as read to the House by H. Despard Twigg, Conservative member for Victoria, who asked for a royal commission to investigate the charges. The premier declared that, with the appointment of a commission such as he proposed, there would be the latest opportunity afforded the mover, and seconder of the motion to present their views and to back up their allegations. He also said that they would be held responsible before the people of the province.

TAHITI IS SOUTH SEAS NEW LIQUOR PORT

WILL SUCCEED VANCOUVER AS DISTRIBUTING POINT ON PACIFIC COAST FOR LIQUOR SHIPMENTS

VANCOUVER, B.C., Feb. 23.—The port of Vancouver ceased today to be the main outlet for liquor traffic on the Pacific Coast, and Papeete, the capital city of Tahiti, the French possession in the southern seas, has succeeded her, according to a story published in the Province newspaper. With the arrival in port this morning of the British steamer "Falterbo" work commenced at the Ballantyne Piers loading cargo, which ranged from choicest Scotch whines to oriental intoxicants, all consigned to the South Sea

liquor men declare that the Royal Commission on the Customs matter has named Vancouver as an in-transit point and after searching the Pacific for a suitable point from which to conduct operations, Papeete was chosen. There bonding charges and other regulations are satisfactory. They estimate that Vancouver will lose \$100,000 annually, which hitherto has been paid out by the liquor interests in purchasing supplies for their ships and ports. Both while the numerous officers and the crews of the ships will lose their jobs which will go to Frenchmen as soon as the ships reach the South seas.

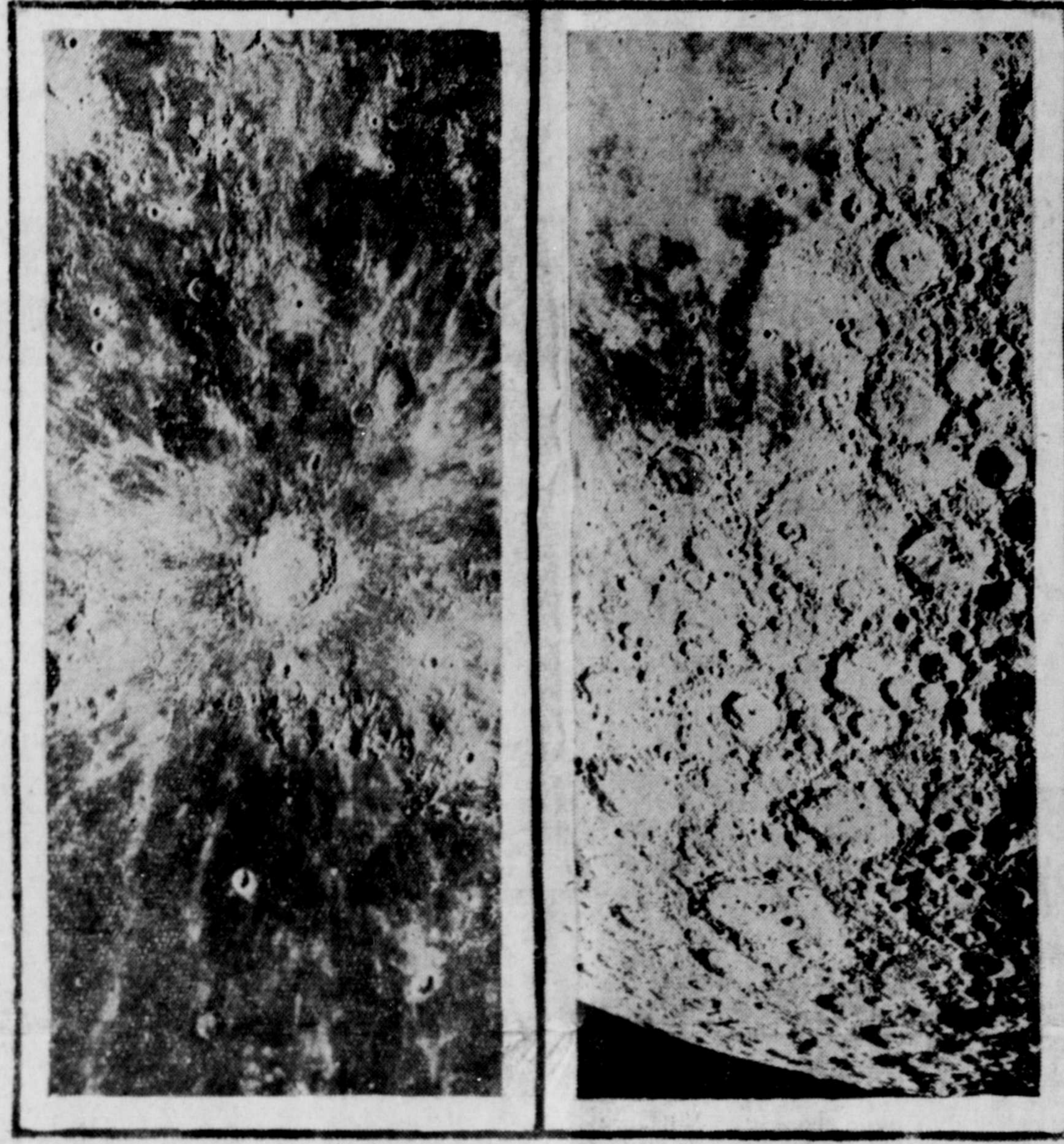
CHOONER BLEW UP IN ATLANTIC

MEMBERS OF CREW OF NOVA SCOTIA BOAT RESCUED AFTER SPENDING TWO DAYS IN SMALL BOATS

BOSTON, Feb. 23.—Nine members of the crew of the Le Havre, Nova Scotia schooner, Kathleen Conrad, were rescued at sea and landed here today. The schooner which was loaded with 200 drums of alcohol, caught fire and an explosion followed. Previously all the sails and running gear had been carried away by a terrific storm. The crew drifted on hardtack for two days in small boats.

LIQUOR CONCERN CHANGES HANDS

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—Announcement made by the Reifel interests that the control of the Joseph Kennedy Limited, import liquor house, has passed into the hands of eastern buyers. It is stated that this move was made necessary owing to the continued illness of Harry Reifel, manager of the concern, who is away on an extended tour in search of health. O. D. Lammman, it is stated, will be in charge of the Kennedy company as manager for the new interests.

Canadian National to Pay Much More New Basis for Assessment

On the basis approved by the civic court of revision last night, the Canadian National Railway will pay approximately \$120,000 to the city in taxation as compared with the flat rate of \$45,000 which they have been required to pay under an agreement which has been in force for the past five years and which expired in February of this year. After an extended consideration of the various appeals which came before it, the court of revision finally reached decisions in the various cases and concluded its sittings last night in the City Hall. All appeals made by citizens against the assessment were rejected and the assessor's values confirmed with only minor corrections in the roll to rectify errors.

REFUGEES POUR INTO SHANGHAI

INHABITANTS BECOME AFRAID OF LOOTING OF CITY BY DESERTERS FROM NORTHERN ARMIES
SHANGHAI, Feb. 23.—The general strike situation is little changed this morning with a hundred thousand workers still reported idle. Meantime foreign powers are rapidly concentrating troops and warships to provide for any eventualities. Another thousand British marines from England arrived at Hong Kong this morning en route to this city. It has been learned that the Cantonese army includes fifteen hundred white Russians. A near panic prevailed in the native quarter of Shanghai today as deserters and stragglers from the broken army of Marshal Chuan Fang, the northern commander, continued to arrive in increasing numbers and rumors arose that they were planning the wholesale looting of the city. Thousands of refugees poured into the French concession from the native section adjoining as the situation outside became more tense.

LOCAL WOMAN'S SISTER IS SAFE

MISS SUSIE HADDOCK, MEMBER OF MISSIONARY PARTY REACHING SHANGHAI, SISTER OF MISS HADDOCK OF THIS CITY
TORONTO, Feb. 23.—A cable received at the United Church offices from Shanghai reports the safe arrival there of a large party of missionaries from the west China mission in Szechwan province. They made the trip down the Yangtze River to the coast without mishap. Included in the party was Miss Susie Haddock, sister of Miss Isabel Haddock, United Church deaconess at Prince Rupert.

YOUTHS ESCAPE FROM CUSTODY

LOWER MAINLAND POLICE ARE SEARCHING FOR THREE BOYS IMPLICATED IN THEFT CASE
VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—The police of the lower mainland are searching for three youths who escaped from police custody in Greater Vancouver. Leslie Hunt, aged 19, and a juvenile boy, who were being held on charge of burglary, made a successful jail break from North Vancouver city prison. Scott Spirey, aged 19, sentenced to two years in penitentiary on charges of theft, eluded his police guard at the Vancouver General Hospital and regained his liberty. NAMES ROYAL COMMISSION

MR. JUSTICE MORRISON, W. H. MALKIN AND REV. J. HENDERSON WILL INVESTIGATE CAMPAIGN FUNDS

VICTORIA, Feb. 23.—Mr. Justice Aubrey Morrison, W. H. Malkin and Rev. J. Henderson were named by Hon. A. M. Hanson, attorney general, yesterday afternoon as royal commissioners to investigate campaign fund contributions as recommended by the Odium committee. This commission will not touch the more recent Twigg charges in connection with which an announcement is expected shortly of the appointment of a Royal Commission of probably a single member.

ARTHUR LITTLE DIES IN EAST

DEATH COMES TO ONE OF CITY'S REAL PIONEERS WHO WAS WIDELY KNOWN AND GENERALLY ESTEEMED

With deep regret the community of Prince Rupert, more especially its real old time residents, learn of the death at Thiel, New York, yesterday morning of Arthur C. Little, pioneer news vendor of the city. Last fall he went there with his brother, Dr. Charles Little, and, although it was known that he was in hospital there, cheering letters had been received from time to time and there was no idea that death was so near at hand. Thus, news of his demise came as a great shock to the deceased's friends who are legion not only in city and district but on the whole British Columbia coast.

COPS SEIZED PRIZE MONEY

GATE RECEIPTS OF DILLON-BELANGER BATTLE TAKEN TO PAY JACK ALLEN'S BILL

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—While Harry Dillon and Charlie Belanger were battling on Monday night for the light heavy-weight championship of Canada at the Arena, Deputy Sheriff Robertson and three assistants swooped down on the building and seized the gate receipts totalling more than \$2,000 to satisfy an unpaid judgment held by Grace Travers against Jack Allen, promoter of the bout. Meanwhile, the fighters were not aware that their prize money had vanished.

EDWARD LIPSETT WINS ACTION IN VANCOUVER

Awarded Judgment For \$1,027 Against Alberta Boat Owner

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—Judgment for the plaintiff for \$1,027, the amount claimed, was handed down by Mr. Justice Morrison in the suit brought by Edward Lipsett Limited, Water Street, against Capt. J. A. Croll and his wife, Annie G. Croll and Estrella G. Croll of Alberni, for goods sold to the defendants for their fishing boat. A counter claim for \$12,881.26 was not allowed.

MOTOR LICENSE FEES AND AMUSEMENT TAX ARE CUT IN ONTARIO

TORONTO, Feb. 23.—Delivering his first budget speech in the Ontario legislature, Hon. Dr. J. D. Monteith, provincial treasurer, announced motor license fees reductions totalling more than \$800,000 and a \$600,000 reduction in amusement taxes.

Lease of Elevator to Wheat Pool Will Involve Provision of More Facilities in South

VANCOUVER, February 23.—Reports from Ottawa, the Vancouver Daily Province states, indicate that the leasing of No. 2 elevator to the Alberta Wheat Pool may be contingent upon more facilities for ships being provided. This would probably mean the expenditure of about \$1,000,000 for No. 2 jetty which was planned and designed by the former Board of Harbor Commissioners and which would have to be built on property just east of Ballantyne Pier. The construction costs were in the Harbor Board estimates but were never passed by Parliament. Chairman Russell of the board is now en route home from Ottawa where he has been negotiating for the lease of No. 1 elevator to the James Stewart Inter-

VANDERHOOF ENDORSES PRINCE RUPERT ROAD

Declines However, to Set Any Date for Commencement of Work

A letter was received at a recent meeting of the Vanderhoof Board of Trade from the Prince George to Prince Rupert Highway Association asking for endorsement of a resolution favoring immediate start being made on road from Prince Rupert east. After much discussion it was decided to endorse the resolution, if found feasible, but leaving out any date for commencement of work.

CASHIER ARRESTED

NEW WESTMINSTER, Feb. 23.—Charles P. Latham, cashier in the land registry office, was arrested on Tuesday charged with theft of seven thousand dollars over a period of three years, it is alleged. He appeared in the police court this morning and was remanded until tomorrow. He was released on \$10,000 bail.

FISH ARRIVALS

PRESIDENT OF FAIR BOARD SETS EXAMPLE.

Frank Dibb set a good example for the despatch of Exhibition affairs when he had his committees for the year named and announced within twenty-four hours of his election as president of the Fair Board. Mr. Dibb, like practically all the directors of the Fair Board around him this year, is a business man and energetic worker. If all follow his example in settling down to the task in hand there should be no delay and little trouble in getting things adjusted.

WHAT MAY BE EXPECTED OF TORIES.

Should the Conservatives ever get into power again in this province, the people will, at least, have some idea of what they may expect from them. The party that goes to such lengths to malign its political opponents as the Tories are going now and at the same time has not a single suggestion to make in the way of constructive legislation may be expected, if it ever should attain to power, to continue the same tactics of wasting people's time and the people's money.

Departing from the campaign of chicanery and villification that the Conservatives are now waging, forgetting the dross and reverting to facts, what is the result when the merits of the two parties are compared? The thoughtful people can reach their own conclusions and they will choose accordingly. They will adjudicate in favor of the party that has carried on during the past ten years, when conditions have often worked against them, and brought to the province much valuable legislation for its material and social betterment. They will disregard those who, jealous of what has been accomplished, can only hope for success by trying, through slander and insinuation, to paint the other fellow blacker than they are themselves.

RIDICULOUS PIECE OF POLITICAL ROT.

Another rotten political statement that has been circulating around Prince Rupert lately has been that it was Mr. Brady who was responsible for the vote for the fishermen's floats here, that it was he who forced the government to place provision for such in the estimates. Such a statement has been actually forthcoming from Conservative mouths. It is, of course, ridiculous though, under the circumstances, it might be better if such a thing could be possible for we will have to endure Mr. Brady for the next five years. If he proves up he will really be able to do such things for Skeena and it will not be necessary for his party to credit him with things that somebody else accomplished.

MORE GOOD THAN EVIL IN WORLD.

Do not be distressed overmuch by news of evil. This is a wide, wide world. It contains much that is bad, but more that is good. Righteousness is slowly, but surely, triumphing over sin.

If you do not believe that, or merely have not realized it, turn for a moment to contemplation of happier things. Turn your tired eyes from the day's record of evil to the day's golden roll of honor. There is more of good news than of bad news today, every day. There is more to see on the sunny side, and it is more worth seeing.

There are only two reasons for gazing at ugly things: either that we may more fully know evil when we meet, even in gilded robes; or that we may grapple with it and blot it out.

Broad highroads of honor lead to every worthy goal of life. The mud roads are in the lowlands, leading only to dissolution and corruption. If we travel the mud road it is at our own volition.

Sin is not the harvest of life. It is the chaff threshed from the wholesome grain and will be swept from the threshing floor. Why look upon the chaff when the grain is there?

If some days the volume of chaff seems greater than others, know that the threshing has been more thorough.

This is a wide, wide world, and full of sweetness for those who would find it.

REVOLT AGAINST WILD LIFE, JAZZ

PENNSYLVANIA PURITANS ARE BEING LED BY 19 YEAR OLD STENOGRAPHER

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 23.—Led by a 19-year-old stenographer with the euphonious name of Rose Marie Carney, hundreds of young people in Pennsylvania and New Jersey are in revolt against "the wild parties of this jazz mad age." They are organizing "slow clubs" to carry out their ideas.

More than 25,000 have enlisted for the campaign in charters that already number well above 50, organized to give entertainments in harmony with the clubs' name and professed ideals. More than 60,000 have shown interest by attending meetings.

The first "slow club" was organized here only two months ago, in consequence of a letter to the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin from a young man who signed himself "Dusty." He wanted to know why he was not popular. Rose Marie answered saying that she admired his type as he described it and suggested that clubs be organized to facilitate introduction of similarly minded young persons.

The idea caught and spread. A flood of letters poured into the offices of the newspaper. One young man called for an organization meeting at the Haddington Public Library, and at the appointed hour the auditorium was jammed with enthusiasts. At present there is an average of nine meetings a night in Philadelphia alone.

SUBSTITUTES DEvised
The clubs substitute for "nerve wracking parties, necking and flask toting" are dramatics, debating, athletics, hiking, and dances at which extremes, among which the black bottom is listed, are barred.

The clubs are organized and controlled by the young people themselves, but cooperate with organizations of older persons. The Women's clubs supply chaperons.
Rose Marie, who is rarely called Miss Carney by her followers, makes her appearance at nearly every organization meeting and makes it a point to introduce the apparently shy ones at the "Get Acquainted dances" that follow.

COBHAM'S VISIT BEARS RESULTS

STRONG COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO INVESTIGATE MANITOBA'S AVIATION POSSIBILITIES

WINNIPEG, Feb. 23.—The mission of Sir Alan Cobham, famous British airman, to Winnipeg, has already borne definite results. Following a meeting at which Sir Alan relating his experiences in flying from Great Britain to Australia and back, a committee of leading Winnipeg citizens was formed for the furtherance of commercial and civil aviation in Manitoba.

The committee will investigate the possibilities of aviation in the province and co-operate with other provincial bodies that are working for the organization of a dominion-wide aerial league.

Among those which are included on the Manitoba committee are Hon. W. R. Clubb, minister of public works in the Bracken government, Mayor R. Webb, D. C. Coleman, A. W. McLint, H. R. Drummond Hay, Col. W. G. Bell, Major G. Northwood, W. McCurdy, C. S. Riley and C. Heubach.

In urging the formation of light plane clubs, Sir Alan offered to supply any needed statistics relative to aviation.

LABOR COUNCIL HAS MEETING RE ELECTION

Fitting Reference Made to Death of Charlie Hunter at Gathering Last Night


A special meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was held last evening in the Carpenters' Hall at which arrangements were perfected to take care of the election on Friday in which Delegate James Black is receiving the support of the council. Brief addresses were delivered by several delegates and headquarters were selected for election day.

The president, in the opening stages of the meeting, made fitting reference to the death of Charlie Hunter, an old-timer in the city and an active worker who had been associated with the labor movement for the past eighteen years. The meeting, which lasted about an hour was well attended and the principal business transacted had to do with plans for the civic by-election.

ALBERTA POOL TO OWN FACILITIES

The Alberta Wheat Pool is following in the path of the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool in deciding to acquire its own elevator facilities. The Alberta pool has already leased the government terminal elevator in Prince Rupert, and is negotiating with the government for a lease of the Vancouver terminal, and has recently announced officially that it will build or acquire, in 1927, a line of 100 country elevators at a cost of approximately \$1,250,000.—Farm and Home.

SIX OUT OF TEN IN U.S. DO NO WORK

Percentage of People Gainfully Employed is Becoming Less

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—A smaller percentage of the population works for pay in the United States than in Great Britain and Ireland, Germany, France and Italy, according to a statistical survey of "gainfully occupied persons" made public by the National Industrial Conference Board. The report said:

"Less than four out of every ten persons in the United States in 1925 were working for a living. The other six were living on the returns of their investments or were being supported by others or at public expense. Whereas the gainfully occupied in 1910 numbered 38,167,396 persons, or 41.5 per cent out of a total population of 91,972,266, there were 41,614,248 out of a total of 105,710,820, or 39.4 per cent so occupied in 1920. But for 1925 the gainfully occupied are estimated at 42,910,000, constituting only 37.2 per cent of the census-estimated total population of 115,378,000.

"The Netherlands and Denmark recorded a lower proportion of gainfully employed than the United States for 1920, their number constituting 37.7 per cent of the total population."

The decrease since 1910 in the number of "gainfully employed" persons in proportion to the total population was attributed to relatively larger school and college attendance and restriction of immigration.

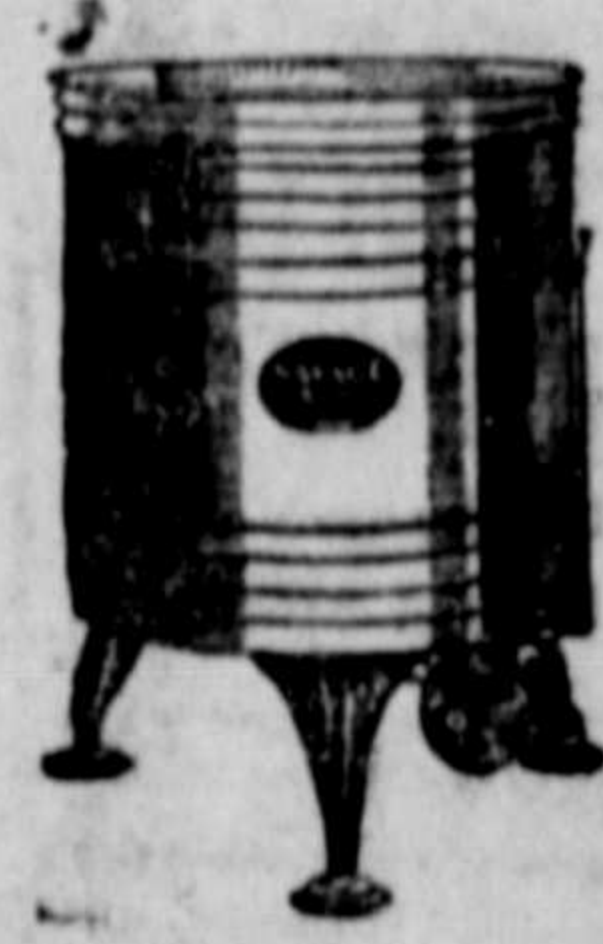

VERSAILLE PALACE OF KINGS IS CRUMBLING

Due to Mushroom Growths That Science Cannot Conquer

PARIS, Feb. 23.—The Versailles Palace of Kings is threatened by the crumbling of its woodwork due to the various mushroom growths that science has not yet conquered. A modest old priest, the Abbe Bourdot in the village of Saint-Priest-en-Murat after 42 years of study, has learned why the Versailles timbers and panels are turning to dust. Other scientists are seeking methods to kill the parasite and protect the wood. So far they have not succeeded. It cost more than 12,000,000 francs recently to replace destroyed wood and make other repairs. The expenditure was made possible by the aid of John D. Rockefeller, Jr.

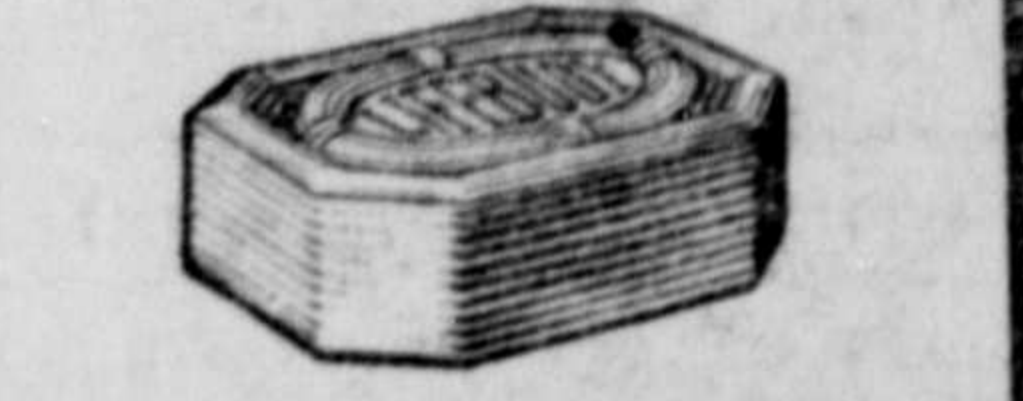

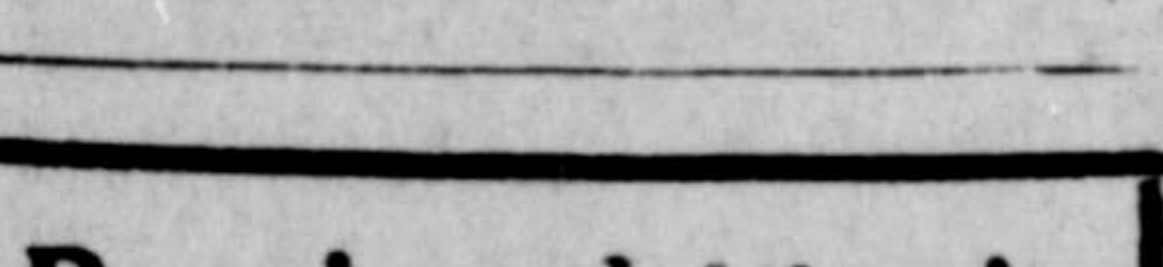

DISCUSSION ON PEACE RIVER

MINISTER OF RAILWAYS SETS FORTH PRINCE RUPERT'S ADVANTAGES AS OUTLET

MR. BRADY SPEAKS

Prince Rupert was frequently mentioned as an advantageous outlet for the Peace River country at the debate in the House of Commons on the matter last week in Ottawa. In the course of the debate it was pointed out by Hon. C. A. Dunning, minister of railways, that the shortest and least costly route would be the one through the Monkman Pass which would have Prince Rupert as its terminus. Several Conservative members made enquiries as to the Brule cut-off route to the Vancouver outlet which they seemingly favored in spite of the minister's statements.

J. C. Brady, M.P. for Skeena, spoke as follows in the debate: "Before I deal with the subject under discussion, Mr. Speaker, I would like to disassociate from it the minister of railways (Mr. Dunning). I believe he has given us not his own opinion but what information he has obtained from a report made to him.

"Having done this, I would like to enumerate the various reasons advanced from the report, why the development of the Peace River district should not be commenced immediately. I think these reasons were very well emphasized, and are thoroughly understood even by those not directly interested. It was said that the president and engineers of the Canadian National Railways did not deem it an economic possibility; that it would not lower the present rates; that it would cost about \$13,000,000 and that the present volume of traffic does not permit the development of this district. I would like to ask the House if any one of these reasons has sufficient weight to prevent this necessary development of the greatest agricultural area in Canada. Without going into figures, Mr. Speaker, I think I could give four or five reasons which would make the government consider the necessity of immediately dealing with this question.

in overcoming the many handicaps in the way of an up-to-date immigration scheme, which is practically essential. This development is necessary to the interests of the Canadian National Railways, as well, because it would add to the present volume of trade running over this road to the Pacific coast, and is a sufficient warranty for this work. The hon. member for Peace River (Mr. Kennedy) said something with which I quite agree and which I think everyone appreciated, when he asked: 'Should we start with immigration first, put the people on the land and wait till they make good, or should we at the same time give those people opportunities to develop their land more quickly and bring returns to the railways?'

"I do not intend to speak further on this matter, Mr. Speaker, but there is one other reason which I think the government should consider carefully. In Prince Rupert we have an elevator which in the last four months has handled a little over 2,750,000 bushels of grain from Alberta; now that the elevator is there it must stay there, and it is the duty of the government to see that this elevator is able to continue to function.

IMPERATIVE DATA

"It is the imperative task and duty of the government to develop the western part of the Peace River district which, by every proof that can be and has been shown to be the most productive agricultural area in Canada. I have therefore great pleasure in supporting the resolution of the hon. member for Peace River, and I do so, not merely on behalf of the incoming immigrants, not merely because of an extra six million bushels of wheat that may come, but on behalf of the development of Canada and the natural resources which are there ready for the toiler if he be given but a chance. In the development of the Peace River country we have an opportunity of great moment. If we make an investment of \$13,000,000, in a few years we shall be rewarded beyond our most sanguine expectations. This is not a party question but it is a question that strikes deep at the root of the future development, growth and prosperity of Canada as a whole."

ARTHUR LITTLE DIES IN EAST

(continued from page one) had been ordered off the railway reserve, he erected the present Dominion Building on Second Street where he conducted his business for a number of years. Selling this property, he put up a small stand next to the post office then in the Federal Block and remained there until the post office was moved when he established himself in the place on Second Avenue near the Prince Rupert Hotel where he has been located since.

Of a genial and generous disposition, the late Mr. Little was generally esteemed and universally popular. There is probably not another Prince Rupert citizen whose private life has been enjoyed with the same respect and affection with which he was generally held. With his death, the city loses a figure who will be missed perhaps more than any other could be. Remembrance of his hale and hearty figure and his happy disposition will long remain.

The late Mr. Little, who was predeceased by his wife several years ago, sustaining a loss which since had visibly affected him, was born some sixty-three years ago in New Hampshire state. It is understood that interment will take place in the East. Deceased was a member of the Masonic Craft, having joined in Boston when he was proprietor of a livery stable many years ago. He is survived by his aged mother who lives in New Hampshire, and to whom he was greatly devoted. During his stay in Prince Rupert he never missed writing at least one letter a week to his devoted parent. There is also a brother, Sherman Little, at Webster, New Hampshire, where deceased was born and where interment will take place in the spring. The late Mr. Little came to Prince Rupert in April, 1909.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 8,990 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,990 feet per acre east of that range.

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 19, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 440 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers granted, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travelers, up to ten head.

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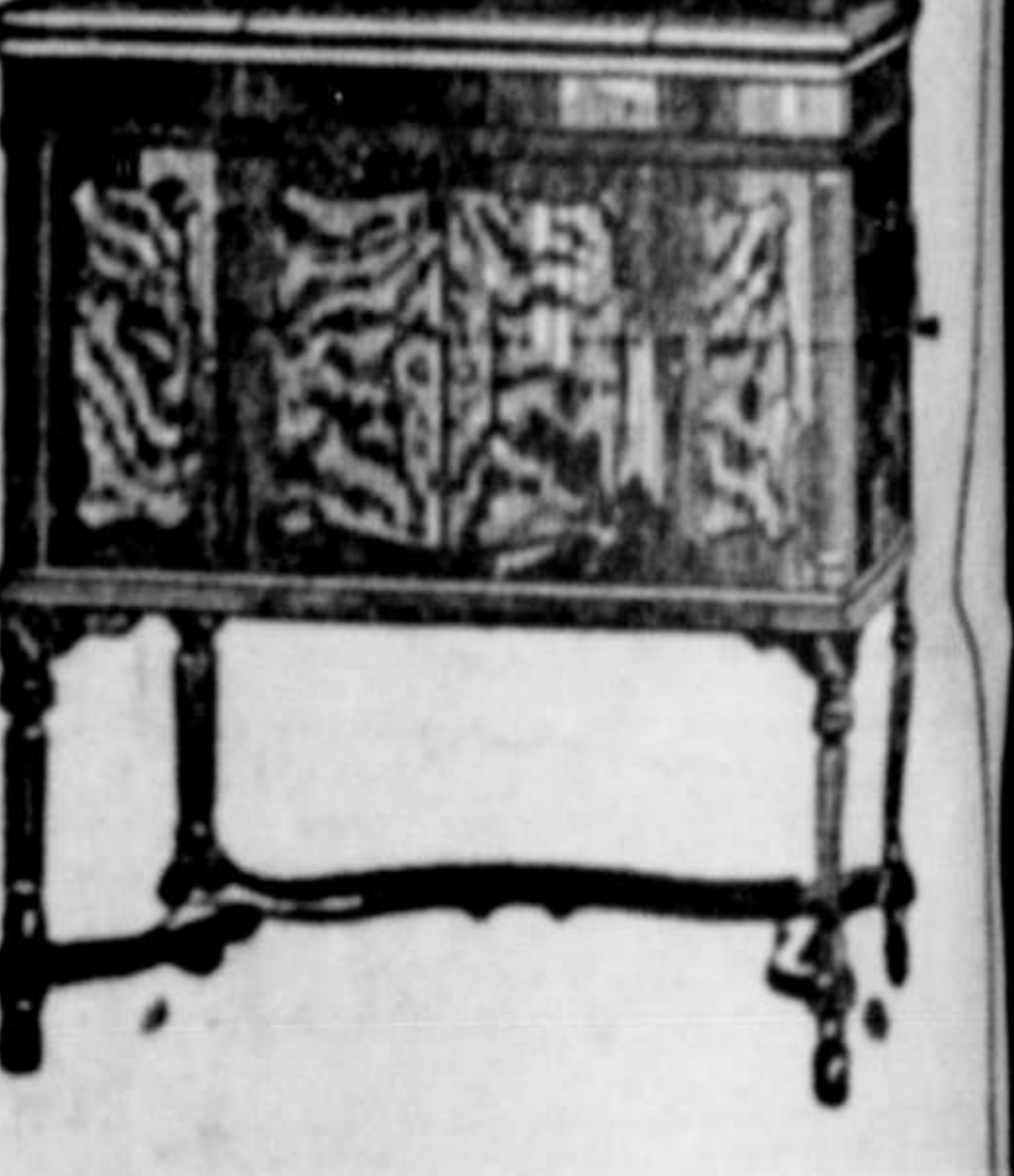

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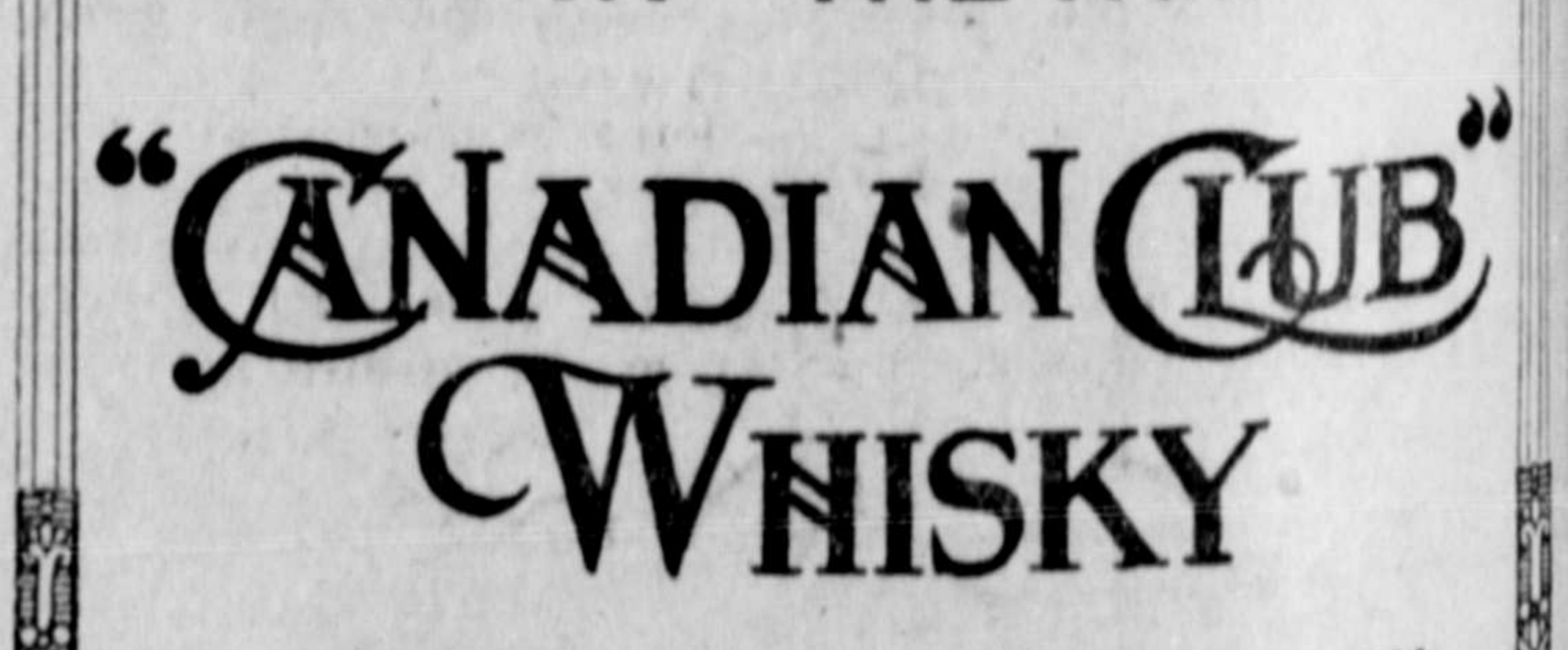
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
