





TERRACE, May 13.—The Tsimpshian Indian chiefs of the Kitselas canyon on the Skeena River yesterday invited the Dominion government totem pole committee to come to Kitselas canyon near Usk on the Canadian National Railway to preserve all their ancient monuments, which consist of at least four totem poles on the south side of the canyon and four on the north side between the rostroad and the river. All these may be seen from passing trains.

Chief Walter Wright of the Bear crest has one pole standing and one fallen on the south side and one standing on the north side of the gorge at Kitselas Chief Mark Mckay of the Eagle south side of the river and two that have fallen on the north side. His Tsimpshian name is Knusisgeedicks. Both these men are keen on having the work proceed.




