SAN PEDRO, Jan. 20 .- The British tanker Toco, which sailed from here on November 24 last with Capt. George Walker, his bride and crew of thirty-seven men for Tsurimi, Japan; is listed by Lloyds here as being missing. There has been no trace of the Toco since December 17 when, three days from her destination, she communicated with the tank steamer Channarow.

The Toco had on board six thousand barrets of oil and the entire crew was British. His bride accompanied Capt. Walker only after he had threatened to resign unless the operators of the steamer granted him special permission to take her.



Everyone of the four basic industries, lumbering, mining, agriculture and fishing, had shown phenomenal development and the credit of the province was the highest of any province in Canada.







WHEAT POOL ON PACIFIC COAST

-

OFFICIAL SAYS ORGANIZATION IS NOT DOMINATED BY EAST -WANTS TO SHIP ITS GRAIN THIS WAY

(Vancouver Province)

A feature of the address delivered by Charles O. Smith of Calgary before the Foreign Trade Bureau of the Board of Trade, which was of special interest to Vancouver at this time, was his reference to the Alberta Wheat Pool.

The Province asked Mr. Smith for a more detailed statement concerning the pool's attitude towards the port of Vancouver. He was a member of the original provincial committee that organized this pool in Alberta and he has been in close touch with its development ever since.

"At the banquet of the Foreign Trade Bureau," he said, "I gave the detailed figures of all shipments of the pool to date. These show that it has shipped 50 per cent of all its wheat to the markets of the world by way of Vancouver. This season it has shipped either end. 15,000,000 bushels to the Pacific-12,000. 000 bushels via Vancouver and 3,000,-000 via Prince Rupert-as against 3,500,-000 to the East.

"The allegation that the Alberta pool is under the domination of Eastern interests and is working against the interests of Vancouver is absolutely without foundation. When it has shipped wheat East, sound business reasons have compelled that action.

BUILD UP CANADIAN PORTS

"The pool has no desire whatever to build up American ports. Alberta regards Vancouver as its port. Its attitude towards Vancouver is that the port of this city is a great national trust to be administered and used for the greatest possible benefit of the people of this country. It should not be used to serve personal ends, and it should not be bedevilled by politics. The Alberta pool wants to co-operate with Vancouver to the fullest possible extent in building CINICCT CUADO up this port and as it is more profitable FIILDI DIIUI to ship through Vancouver, the wheat will come this way; when world conditions, or domestic conditions, make the Eastern route the most profitable it will move to the East. The coal strike in England last year affected the supply of ships. When it ended more bottoms were available on the Atlantic than on the Pacific Coast. These factors affected conditions at Vancouver.

"Another factor affecting shipments of wheat from this port is the decline 8 of the grain year of 1925-26, there was shipped to the Orient 9,006,996 bushels but up to the corresponding date in the grain year 1926-27 there was shipped to the Orient only 4,230,621 bushels. The total shortage of shipments to Europe and the Orient this year to but the decline of demand from the Orient is 4.776,375 bushels. The situation in China and the comparatively light buying of Japan accounts for this difference.

FAVOR THIS COAST

"I mention these facts to show that there have been good reasons for the falling off of shipments to date from Vancouver. A stronger demand from not only will all of Alberta's wheat come through Vancouver but also a large percentage of Western Saskatchewan's. That is what the Alberta Wheat Pool wants to see,

"The pool's attitude is directly the contrary of being antagonistic to Vancouver. It wants every difficulty making it serve the great public good of which it is capable.

"That less wheat from Alberta has passed through Vancouver this year than last is a fact. The pool's job is to market the wheat of the farmers to the best possible advantage. As long ironed out and permanent, smooth-running shipment of its wheat from the prairies to this port. Is it not desirable to have Vancouver working with the pool in the same spirit? This desire, I am certain, animates this city, as it does Alberta.

"Respecting the proposed leasing of the government elevator, the Alberta Pool feels that it can more satisfactorily and expeditiously give service to its members if it has control of an elevator In understand that Vancouver now has some 6,900,000 bushels of terminal elevator capacity. Montreal on the average, and in its short season. handles about ten times the total of its terminal capacity. Vancouver can do much, better than that in its yearlong season.

LEASE WOULD BE FAIR

"In view of this conditions, and having in mind the fact that Vancouver elevator capacity is ample at the present time for all demands that may be made upon it, the Alberta Pool authorities feel that they should not be compelled to build another elevator in order to care for their export business unhampered. The pool has not suggested leasing No. 1 Terminal at Vancouver except on a rental basis of a fair return on the investment, as well as depreciation. If it rented this elevator, in its opinion, there would be left ample elevator ac-
