CUSTOMS PROBE SITTING AGAIN

VANCOUVER BREWERY MAN TELLS OF MORE CAMPAIGN FUNDS PAID TO BOTH POLITICAL PARTIES

VANCOUVER, Jan. 20.—Robert Fiddes, director of the Consolidated Exporters Corporation and president of the Rainier Brewing Co., and the Westminster brewery, testifying before the customs probe, admitted to Hon. N. W. Rowell, commission counsel that his brewery had contributed to the campaign funds of both parties, amounts of \$4,800 and \$6,000 being mentioned in connection with the 1925 elections.

In reply to a question by Mr. Rowell as to why the contributions had been made, witness said: "We always give to campaign funds." Witness stated that he did not know it was an indictable offence under the Dominion Elections Act, adding: "I'm afraid you'll have to start to build jails because everyone will be in them."

MANY COUNTRIES HAVE INFLUENZA

LEAGUE OF NATIONS HEALTH EXPERTS STATE THAT EPIDEMIC HAS PROBABLY REACHED ITS WORST

GENEVA, Jan. 20.—Telegraphic reports collected by the League of Nations regarding the influenza epidemic in Europe, show the disease is prevalent in France, Spain, Scotland, Norway, Poland, Rumania, Jugo-Slavia, Greece, Bulgaria, Switzerland, Egypt and the Netherlands.

Fifty-two deaths from influenza during the past month are reported from Scotland. Egypt had 171 cases during December, with a high proportion of 38 deaths.

From the Netherlands the league received news of 13 deaths in Amsterdam alone for the week ending January 1.

Norway had 2754 cases of influenza during December in 21 towns.

Epidemics also have reached Warsaw, Lemberg and Cracow in Poland, but the mortality rate there is low.

Health experts attached to the league say despite the large number of cases reported the epidemic probably has reached its worst.

COMMITTEES OF COUNCIL TO BE NAMED TONIGHT

MAYOR NEWTON WILL ANNOUNCE HIS SELECTIONS AT FIRST MEETING OF NEW CITY FATHERS

The new city council will meet tonight for the first time. Chief interest, as usual, will centre in the mayor's announcement of his selection of standing committees for the year.

With the defeat of Ald. Casey, the chairman of the finance committee was made vacant. Ald. Stephens may be considered entitled to this post on account of his past experience on the committee, having been chairman of it once and a member for several years, but it is considered possible that His Worship may select Ald. Jos. Greer to take the mantle.

There is also a vacancy on the utilities committee to succeed Ald. McKeechie. If Ald. P. H. Linzey is named to this committee it may leave the Board of Works with the same personnel as last year.

The mayor may or may not name a fifth member to any of these committees of which he, ex-officio, is a member of each.

FISH TARIFF IS DISCUSSED

HALIBUT BOAT OWNERS TO MAKE ANOTHER ATTEMPT TO HAVE IMPOST REMOVED

The Halibut Boat Owners' Association decided last night to again communicate with Ottawa with respect to the American duty of 2 cents per pound on halibut as compared with the 1 cent per pound Canadian duty and the unfair disadvantage under which the Canadian fishermen were working.

It was suggested that probably, since Canada would have a representative at Washington, something might be accomplished through representation which he might be able to make.

Geo. W. Nickerson referred to the report of the Duncan Commission on the Maritime province situation and said that recommendations made in the report concerning the entry of Canadian fish to the United States would probably be taken up by Mr. Massey at Washington and as Canada was endeavoring to live up to her treaty with the United States in respect to the liquor smuggling possibly Canadians might obtain some consideration in respect to these grievances.

The whole matter will be taken up again with the Minister of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa in an endeavor to have the situation improved.

PIONEER BANKER DIES IN LONDON

CHARLES JONES WAS FOR MANY YEARS ASSOCIATED WITH BANK OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

VICTORIA, Jan. 20.—Charles Jones, retired, who managed the branch of the Bank of British Columbia at Cariboo in the gold rush days, died on Tuesday according to a cable message from London received by his brother, Col. T. W. Jones. The late Mr. Jones landed here from Edmonton in 1864 and, within a week, took charge of the New Westminster branch of the Bank of British Columbia which was later taken over by the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Later he went to the Cariboo and, when he retired in 1885, he was manager of the Victoria branch.

TWO INDIAN RAJAKS SOON TO ABDICATE

Administration Changes in Cochin and Baroda are Foreshadowed

LONDON, Jan. 20.—The impending abdication of the Rajah of Cochin Sir Rama Varma, is reported by the Bombay correspondent of the London Daily Express.

The correspondent also says the Maharajah of Baroda, Sir Sayaji Rao-gaekwar, who recently celebrated the jubilee of his reign, intends to abandon active participation in the government of his state.

The intentions of both are attributed to the recent British overhauling of the administration of the native states in India and the growing demands of their subjects. The correspondent adds that the administrations of many other states are in the melting pot.

Cochin, one of the Madras states, has an area of 1,418 square miles and a population of nearly 1,000,000. Sir Rama Varma, born in 1858, succeeded to the title in 1914.

Sir Sayaji Raogekwar was born in 1863 and succeeded to the title in 1975. This principality is much larger, with an area of 8,135 square miles and a population of more than 2,000,000. He is reported to be the richest man in India.

NONOGENARIAN GETS THIRD SET OF TEETH

LAPEER, Mich., Jan. 20.—John Hoffman, who celebrated his ninety-fifth birthday New Year's Day, reported he has four new teeth on his lower jaw as a starter for his third set. He has been the father of 16 children, 14 of whom are living, and has 22 grandchildren and 5 great-grandchildren.

Henry Reifel, Jr., and George Norgan Absent from Customs Hearing

VANCOUVER, January 20.—The customs commission on Wednesday found that one of the most important witnesses which it had travelled some thousands of miles to examine would be unavailable during the Vancouver session of the probe. The missing man is Henry Reifel Jr., of the Joseph Kennedy liquor exporting company, whose evidence was eagerly sought by the commission when last in Vancouver but who furnished a physician's certificate declaring that he was unfit to appear.

He is now travelling in the Orient for the benefit of his health and the certificate of the doctor who advised him to travel has been requested by the chief commissioner and must be produced.

When Robert Swanson, one of the managers of the Consolidated Exports Corporation, was being examined, it developed that George Norgan, another important witness, was also absent. Swanson said that he was absolutely ignorant of the whereabouts of Norgan who was another of the managers of the Consolidated.

SEINE MARU IS HERE FOR GRAIN

SUZUKI LINE VESSEL ARRIVES FROM MURORA AND WILL LOAD SOME 9,000 TONS FOR SHANGHAI

The Suzuki Line freighter, Seine Maru, reached port at 1:30 this morning after an uneventful and good passage from Muroran, Japan, which place she left on January 4. The vessel, which was met at Triple Island by Pilot Larry Thomson, after passing quarantine and customs inspection, moved into the ocean dock to commence lading today.

WHALEN PLANTS SHOWED PROFIT

DIVIDEND WILL BE PAID TO HOLDERS OF PREFERRED STOCK ON FEBRUARY 1

VANCOUVER, Jan. 20.—A profit was made through the operation of the plants of the defunct Whalen Pulp & Paper Mills Co. since they were taken over by the British Columbia Pulp & Paper Co. on November 1, 1925, and a dividend will be paid shareholders of \$8.75 per preference share on February 1 it was announced here yesterday. The company has three plants on the coast—Port Alice, Woodliffe and Swanson Bay. The first mentioned has been operated at full swing by the new company while the last has been entirely shut down.

COLD WAVE IS SWEEPING EAST

TEMPERATURE ON PRAIRIES RANGES FROM 16 BELOW AT CALGARY TO 46 BELOW AT THE PAS, MANITOBA

WINNIPEG, Jan. 20.—Sweeping across the prairies from the far north and working eastward, a cold wave sent the mercury to the season's lowest record this morning, ranging from 16 below at Calgary to 46 below at The Pas, Manitoba. Prince Albert reported 42 below; Saskatoon, 40; Regina, 38; and Edmonton, 30.

**PROPOSALS OF MAJOR GUS LYONS POPULAR.**

Major Gus Lyons, the Victoria Conservative member, makes some worthy suggestions when he urges that Canada assume her share in the matter of Imperial and self-defence and that the income tax in British Columbia be abolished.

The first suggestion, that in connection with Imperial defence, may be designed to embarrass the Federal authorities and one wonders if Major Lyons would submit it if it were a Conservative and not a Liberal government at Ottawa under the same circumstances. Apart from that, however, the idea is a good one and Canadians—Liberals as well as Conservatives—will approve the carrying out of the suggestion. In fact it is said that Premier King already has formulated plans in that direction. It will be interesting to watch the Conservative attitude with respect to those plans.

As for the abolition of the income tax, Major Lyons' idea, even though it is the ancient and usual political cry of the party in the opposition, will find general approbation. The financial position of the province may not permit of the impost being removed entirely but it does seem that it is time for at least a reduction. In that connection, it may be assumed that the government is fully alive to the desirability of such a reduction or abolition and the popularity or party advantage that would be gained by bringing either about.

in power in British Columbia, he said, industrial pay-rolls had increased from \$40,000,000 a year to \$115,000,000. Every one of the four basic industries, lumbering, mining, agriculture and fishing, had shown phenomenal development and the credit of the province was the highest of any province in Canada.

He said that while 10 years ago he had remarked to the late Premier Brewster that the P.G.E. would ruin any government, the Liberal government was not yet ruined, and prominent business men held the view that remarkable success had been achieved in carrying the railway burden as well as had been done. He admitted that problem was a difficult one to solve. The Dominion government, Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National; the C.P.R. railway, and the Alberta government were not interested; nor had it been possible to sell the line to private purchasers, even considering the fact that land grant of 16,000,000 acres had been provided for last session.

However, added the government leader, everything possible was being done to get settlers on to the lands along the railway, to construct roads, develop the mining areas contiguous to the line and to make a colonization road out of the railway. This seemed at present the only course to follow. The frank explanation of Hon. Mr. Oliver lost the government no friends.

**LIQUOR AND ROADS**

Another public issue which it is admitted is enough to wreck any administration, is the liquor question. This was freely discussed last week but every criticism was met by the suggestion that if the opposition would faithfully assist the government, there would be comparatively little difficulty. A demand by the opposition that there be a thorough investigation of the liquor problem is effectively countered by the government's proposal that liquor be divorced from politics, so that there may be no suspicion of governmental influence.

Hon. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works, was attacked for alleged favoritism in the letting of contracts. It was claimed that work was costing too much, that there should be no sub-contracts permitted and that all tenders should be opened in public. The minister retorted by stating that the most efficient engineers in the country marvel generally at the low cost of construction. He explained that through necessary re-location of routes at times construction might cost more than tendered prices, but he challenged the opposition to show where there had been unnecessary over-expenditure or extravagance.

**PATTULLO ATTACKED**

Another attack on the government which was turned back with little difficulty was that against Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, who was accused of selling timber on Graham Island, Queen Charlotte group, for too small a price. However, several Conservative members came to the rescue and stated their belief that the government had received a good price for the timber, and its sale would result in most valuable industrial development. This practically silenced the main opposition. Conservative members subsidizing by feebly demanding that in future longer notice be given of impending sales of timber.

The debate will probably occupy all of this week and by January 24 the House will get down to real business and discuss legislation to be introduced by the various departments and by private members. The session promises to be a momentous one.

George Nickerson, vice-president; Jack Bradbury, secretary; H. M. Daggett, managing secretary; and Dr. W. T. Kergin, George Fritz and M. F. Nickerson, as members of the executive, were all re-elected to their respective positions. President Dan Larsen presided and refused the honor which his associates wished to confer on him of re-electing him to the same office for the following year.

The report of the managing secretary was read for the past year and showed that the association was in good financial shape with over 35 members enrolled.

The association received tenders from W. H. McCallum, M. M. Stephens & Co., Theo. Collart Ltd., and McCaffery & Gibbons, Ltd., specifying the rates at which they were in a position to accept insurance on the boats of the association. After considerable discussion it was decided to have the secretary acquaint all the members with the terms of the tenders and have them ballot as to which tender should be accepted. A committee of three was appointed by the chair to assist the secretary in carrying out the ballot.

M. Sollows of the Ringler, R. Thompson of the N. & S., and C. Campbell of the Joe Baker were unanimously elected members.

**OPPOSE HERRING FERTILIZER**  
President Dan Larsen informed the association that the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union had taken action this week to prevent the use of herring for making fertilizer and asked if they desired to take any action in the matter. It soon developed that the various members considered this practice would prove harmful to the fishing industry and they decided to appoint a committee to co-operate with the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union in making representations to the Fisheries department to have the regulations changed so that no herring could be used as fertilizer. President Dan Larsen, Jack Bradbury and George Nickerson were appointed as the committee.

**BEAR HUNTERS TO COME NORTH**  
OAKLAND YACHT WILL GO TO ALASKA WITH WOMEN IN PARTY IN SPRING

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—The new yacht Northern Light, which will breast Arctic seas to collect kodiak and polar bear and other zoological specimens for the Field Museum, is ready to take the water. She will be launched Wednesday at Oakland.

Present at the launching will be John Borden, Chicagoan, who is financing the expedition and has had the vessel especially built for what will be his third sortie into the Arctic.

The Northern Light is due to leave San Francisco on May 1, proceeding to Victoria on the first leg of an 8,000-mile journey to well beyond the Arctic Circle. The expedition plans to reach Alaska early in June, hunt the giant kodiak bear there, move on to hunt polar bear and walrus and spend September collecting moose and mountain sheep in Kenai Peninsula. A two-masted auxiliary type wooden schooner, the Northern Light is 123 feet over all and of 300 tons, powered by semi-Diesel engines and manned by a crew of fifteen. She will be under the command of Mr. Borden, who will be accompanied by Mrs. Borden and five friends.

### SALARIED MEN PAY BIG BULK OF INCOME TAX

Only 3,648 Farmers in Whole Dominion Paid in Year 1925-1926

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—In the fiscal year of 1925-26 income tax to the federal government was paid by 215,277 Canadians to the amount of \$58,571,961.57. Of this total, it was shown in figures made public yesterday, 3,648 farmers paid income tax and of this number 3,077 were located in the three prairie provinces, Saskatchewan leading with 1,037 income-taxed farmers.

**SERMON DEALT ON CRUCIFIXION**  
**STORMS AND CLOUDS BRING BRIGHT SKIES—BITTER MAKES SWEET**

(Sermon of the Rev. J. R. Frizell, B.A., L.L.B., Presbyterian Church, Prince Rupert, morning service, January 16, reported by A. E. McArthur.)

Were there no storms or clouds in the heavens then the sun would never shine so brightly nor the birds sing so sweetly. It is the bitter which makes the sweet and the sweet which makes the bitter. When one end of the cloud is dark the other is roseate and glistening, and the deep blue sky grows bright and brighter and is filled with the golden hue.

In the 33rd verse of the chapter which we read you will find these words: And when they came to the place which was called Calvary there they crucified him with the malefactors, one on the right hand and the other upon the left. This scene, my friends, represents to us three great contrasts—three distinct types of character—three crosses. For each is as far from each other as the poles are apart. Two of them were brigands from the mountains—they belonged to a band of outlaws from the border line of Syria. The other as you may see was the great outstanding figure of history. Our subject then this morning is these three

men—these three crosses. Let us look first at the cross of the outlaw to the right of Jesus, who refused him; the second the bandit on the left hand of Jesus, who accepts him, and lastly, the central figure, the great outstanding figure of history.

**PIETOUS TRAGEDY**  
First, the bandit to the right of Jesus. When the traveller enters the Mammoth Cave he discovers that the subterranean lakes are filled with fish—at first sight the eyes of the fish seem perfect, but flashing his lantern before them the scientist discovers the eye is blind—disease has destroyed the optic nerve. And here is a man of piteous tragedy. In whose soul the fountains of divine light have dried up so that there is no response to spiritual things. Music there is but he has no ear to hear; beauty there is but he has no eye to see; mercy and pity and compassion are offered to him, but he has no heart and no conscience to dis-

cern his need. But what, my friends, if this outlaw to the right of Jesus was brought up in the midst of sin and immorality? What if his father himself were an outlaw, if his mother were a thief, and as a little boy he ran up and down the streets of some great city making his home under the packing box and living from the garbage? Do you think that there would be as much interest for him as there would be from a man brought up in Christian surroundings and in a Christian community, and who in the end closes the door of his heart to the deep appeals of the loving Christ.

But there is a cross, my friends, on the left of Jesus. On this cross hangs a human, for days he has been meditating the end. He cannot bear to die and leave his black history behind him. Once lingering upon the outskirts of the multitude in Galilee he heard a stranger speak; what music is there in that man's voice! What love and mercy and pity in his eyes! But who is this man? Suddenly it dawns upon him that this speaker which he heard in Galilee is the one hanging beside him upon the cross. And with compunction in his heart and sorrow for his sin he turns to the great teacher and cries: Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy Kingdom.

**MASTER OF ALL**  
But there is a cross, my friends, between the other two. On this cross hangs the great central figure of history. Time has been reared from his birth. On this cross hangs a wonderful man; on this cross hangs the greatest teacher; the greatest philosopher, yea the master mind of all generations and of all history and of all lives. On this cross hangs the friend of the sinner—this is a truthful saying and worthy of all acceptance that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners. On this cross hangs the friend of the one who has lost a friend—the one who longs for the touch of a vanished hand or the sound of a voice that is still!

On this cross hangs your friend, my friends; on this cross also hangs the friend of the old man, the old woman whose steps have grown unsteady and whose heart has grown weary. Listen, let not your heart be troubled. Ye believe in God believe also in me; in my father's house are many mansions—I go to prepare a place for you, and if I go to prepare a place for you I will come again and take you into it, that where I am ye may be also. On this cross hangs your friend—on this cross hangs one who has passed through every trial and every struggle and every condition and every test to which human soul or which the human body may bear.


**INDIAN MUTINY**  
During the Indian mutiny the guardian of the wall of one of the forts saw a man—a rider upon the horizon, ever struggling forward to reach the fort; his horse is so weary that its head is drooped almost to the sand; its eyes are bloodshot; a crimson gash is in its shoulder. But the soldier, the soldier boy—his hair is matted with his own blood; his wounded hands are tied to the horn of his saddle. A crimson cough is about the voice. Unconscious and muttering strange sounds as he rides. The army, the army. What news of the army, asked the officer, shaking the boy from his stupor. The army, the army, replied the boy. Awakening from his dream and brushing his matted locks from his forehead he said: Why, I am the army, all the rest are dead.

And so Christian you may suffer the sting of the wound, the prick of the thorn, the remorse of the fallen, but he that endureth to the end the same shall be saved.

And when they came to a place which was called Calvary there they crucified him with the malefactors, the one on the right hand and the other on the left. The one on the right hand rejected him, but the one on the left hand accepted him. Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy Kingdom, and Jesus replied, Today, today, shall thou be with me in Paradise. Don't you wish you were? Don't you wish you were?
