AMERICAN ATTITUDE TOWARD CHINA LIBERALS VERY CONFIDENT OF FUTURE PROSPECTS HERE

Japan Expresses Its Opinion on Movement United States Makes

TOKYO, Japan, February 10.—Both the north and south factions of China intend to reject the suggestion of the United States that the foreign concessions in Shanghai be made a neutral zone it has said here today on the basis of official information from China, the Japanese Foreign Office. It is said the United States did not consult Japan before the proposal of Secretary of State Kellogg was made and, therefore, Japan regards the suggestion for a neutral zone as an independent move on the part of the United States.

COMMISSION ON B.C. CLAIMS

PROPOSED BY LEON LADNER IN
LEGISLATIVE HOUSE—WOULD INVESTIGATE VARIOUS MATTERS

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—The establishment of a Royal Commission by the federal government to report upon the claims of British Columbia is advocated by Leon Ladner, Conservative member for Vancouver South, in a resolution placed before the House of Commons yesterday. The member suggests that the proposed commission investigate and report upon the province's claims with respect to the Dominion railway belt, the Skeena River Block, the Indian lands claims and the annual subsidy now paid to the province.

FURTHER MOVE DISARMAMENT

SUGGESTION MADE TO BRITAIN,
FRANCE, ITALY AND JAPAN
BY COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—In a further attempt to reduce armaments, President Coolidge has suggested to Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan that they empower their delegates to the Geneva preparatory commission for disarmament to negotiate and conclude an early date an agreement further reducing naval armaments. The president is made that an agreement be reached supplementing the naval limitation treaty of Washington and covering classes of vessels not included in that treaty.

NEW YORK NAVY YARD HAS FIRE

DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT BETWEEN
MILLION AND HALF DONE IN CON-
FLAGRATION LAST NIGHT

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Damage estimated at from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000 was caused by fire last night in the New York navy yard at Brooklyn. Three warehouses and five anti-aircraft guns were destroyed.

IDAHO TEAM WINS BANFF DOG DERBY

Driving Cordingly, Driving for Charles Trude, won 85 Miles in 11 Hours and 14 Minutes yesterday

BANFF, Feb. 1.—Warren Cordingly, driving for Charles Trude, of Ashton, Idaho, won the 85-mile Calgary-Banff dog derby yesterday. Cordingly made the distance in eleven hours and forty minutes. George Knight of Banff was second, twenty-one minutes later.

FORMER INSTRUCTOR KINGSTON MILITARY COLLEGE HAS PASSED

LONDON, Feb. 10.—Brigadier-General Edward Raban, former instructor at the Royal Military College at Kingston, Ont., is dead here at the age of 77.

CONCESSIONS IN CHINA ARE PART TROUBLE CAUSE

FRANCE, GREAT BRITAIN, UNITED STATES, JAPAN AND OTHER NATIONS HAVE THESE HOLDINGS THERE

Concessions, or territories reserved for foreign residence or business, are one of the roots of trouble in China today. There are in China two sorts of such territories: (1) leased territories on a 99-year lease and (2) concessions granted for an indefinite time.

The leased territories are:
Hong Kong, leased to Great Britain in 1841. It now has a population of 625,000.
Wei-Hai-Wei, leased to Great Britain in 1898. It has a population of 150,000. At the Washington conference in 1921 it was promised that this territory would be restored to China.
Kwang-Chow-Wang, leased by France in 1893.
Port Arthur, formerly leased by Russia, but taken by Japan after the Russian war.

France—Shanghai, Canton, Hankow, Chinkiang, Tientsin.
Great Britain—Amoy, Canton, Hankow, Kiu-kiang, Chinkiang, Tientsin, New-chang.
Japan—Amoy, Hankow, Chungking, Tientsin, Hangchow, Soochow.
United States—Amoy.
There are international concessions in Italy and Belgium—Tientsin.

FLU NOT CAUSING DEATH OF INDIANS

Tribes in West are Increasing in Numbers—Death Rate is Less

WINNIPEG, Feb. 10.—(By Canadian Press).—Throughout the West epidemics of a mild form of influenza have caused a considerable amount of sickness on the Indian reservation, but there have been no deaths as the result of the malady to date, according to Indian Commissioner W. M. Graham, of Regina, Sask.

The conditions prevalent generally among the Indians of the prairie provinces are very satisfactory, the commissioner said, although they have fallen prey to influenza epidemics that have assailed the whites.

On the majority of the reserves in the West the Indian tribes have increased in numbers. The death rate among the younger generation particularly has decreased.

AGREEMENT MADE ON HANKOW CONCESSION

LONDON, Feb. 10.—Resumed negotiations between the British representative and the Cantonese foreign minister at Hankow resulted in an agreement regarding the British concession there. Foreign Secretary Chamberlain today announced to Parliament.

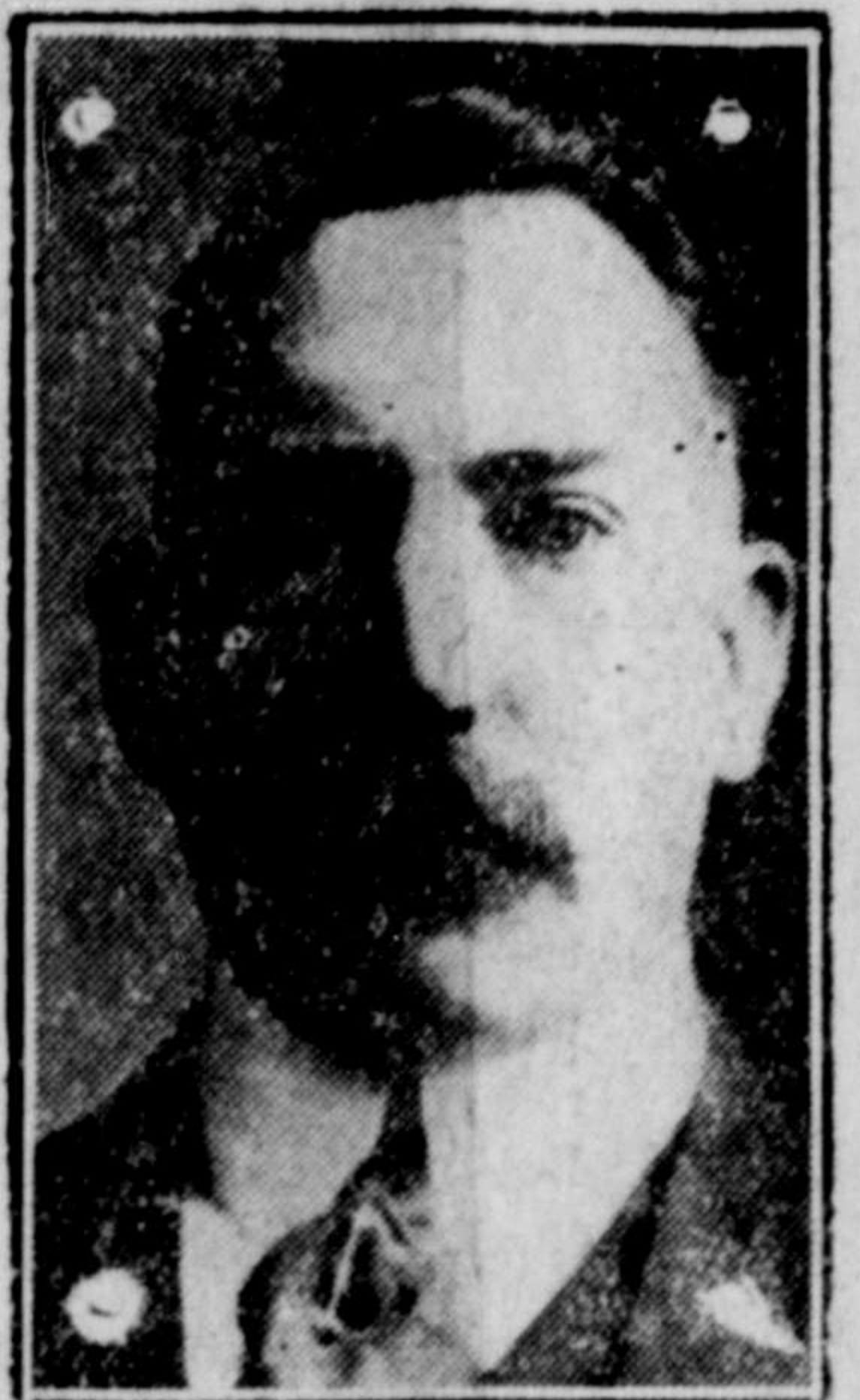
CANADIAN NATIONAL DEBT IS DECREASED

LLOYD GEORGE GIVES PRAISE

COMPLIMENTS CHAMBERLAIN ON CHINESE POLICY—MOVEMENT THERE, HE SAYS, NOT BOLSHEVIST

LONDON, Feb. 10.—Ex-Premier Lloyd George, Liberal leader, in debate in the House of Commons yesterday, paid tribute to Foreign Secretary Chamberlain's Chinese policy and said that he hoped it would be possible to avoid landing troops at Shanghai although the government must act if there was any real peril there. He asserted that the Chinese movement was not a Bolshevist one but was essentially nationalist. The equipment for the different factions came not from Russia but from American and British merchants in Shanghai.

SMOKED FISH HIS SUBJECT

D. B. FINN, DIRECTOR OF FISHERIES EXPERIMENTAL STATION, DELIVERS INTERESTING ADDRESS BEFORE ROTARY CLUB

"The smoked fish industry" was the subject of an interesting and enlightening address delivered before the Rotary Club today by D. B. Finn, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station.

Mr. Finn outlined existing methods of smoking fish and traced the progress of the industry from primitive times when the fish was held over an open fire down through the time of treating with fire in the bottom of a barrel which in turn evolved the modern smokehouse. The principle had not changed in one hundred years although many improvements had been developed. Mr. Finn told of the products of various kinds of smoked fish and mentioned the work that the Biological Board of Canada is carrying on with the object of ascertaining best conditions and processes and determining what factors are responsible in producing the best color, flavor, and surface texture. The speaker also referred to experiments now being made by the board on the Atlantic coast with various kinds of woods to determine the smoke of which is most suitable.

C. H. Orme, president of the club, who was in the chair, thanked Mr. Finn for his interesting talk.

Premier Oliver Moves for Probe into Allegation Made in Regard to Money Disappearing; Merville

VICTORIA, February 10.—The provincial legislature has a new investigation on its hands. Notice was given by Premier Oliver yesterday afternoon of a resolution to appoint five members of the House to inquire into the accuracy of a statement made by W. A. McKenzie, Conservative member for Similkameen, that Thomas Menzies, former member of the legislature for Comox, after investigating the soldiers' settlement at Merville, made a report alleging that, in the course of land clearing operations, \$167,000 had disappeared and had not been accounted for. Documentary evidence to the effect that the report was never made and the public moneys of British Columbia or any other amount of public money disappeared or is unaccounted for as alleged by the statement made by the member for Similkameen supported by the member for South Okanagan and the member for Esquimalt.

The budget debate was continued by Charles Woodward, Liberal, Vancouver; Thomas Uphill, Labor, Fernie; and A. McCreery, Provincial, Vancouver.

Correspondence During Crisis at Ottawa Last Summer May Be Made Public if King Consents

OTTAWA, February 10.—Correspondence between Governor-General Byng and the government during the political crisis last July will be made public if Premier King accedes to a request made by Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Conservative House leader, in the House of Commons yesterday. Correspondence between Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader at the time, Premier King and the Governor-General when the government changed and the House dissolved, and further correspondence between Mr. Meighen and Lord Byng in regard to the resignation of Mr. Meighen last fall was also asked for. In the absence of the Premier, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice and senior cabinet member, promised to refer the matter to the government.

Recent Defeat Will Be Spur for Continuation of Efforts to Success

Many enthusiastic speeches delivered at largely attended annual meeting last night—organization starts at once

That the defeat in the federal field last September would serve to spur the party on to greater efforts which would be crowned with success in regaining what had been lost and retaining what was already held until Skeena county again reverted to the Liberal fold was freely predicted at the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Liberal Association which was held last night in the Metropole Hall. With a Liberal regime firmly established for many years as far as the Dominion was concerned and with prospects bright for the return of the Oliver government by a larger mandate than ever before at the next provincial election, there was unanimity of feeling that the Liberal party would have little if any difficulty in again achieving success both federally and provincially when the next contests should take place. It was generally admitted that the Liberal defeat in Skeena last year had been due to over confidence and the necessity of making an early start on the reviving of the party's organization was stressed. It was one of the most largely attended Liberal annual meetings in recent years, some fifty or more persons being present. Ald. W. J. Greer, president of the Association, occupied the chair and among those who spoke were Fred Stork, L. W. Patmore, Thomas McClymont, Ald. W. M. Brown, David Thomson, Theo. Collart and Harvey Fraser. The addresses were hopeful and stirring and filled with confidence as to the future of the party in the district and throughout the country.

J. K. FLEMMING IS DEAD TODAY

FORMER PREMIER OF NEW BRUNSWICK AND PRESENT M.P. PASSES AWAY IN CITY OF HIS BIRTH

WOODSTOCK, New Brunswick, Feb. 10.—Hon. James Kidd Flemming, L.L.D., M.P., former premier of New Brunswick and member of parliament for Carleton-Victoria, died this afternoon.

The late Mr. Flemming was born in this city on April 27, 1868. He was educated in the common schools, Provincial Normal school and New Brunswick University. He taught in the provincial schools for two years and later engaged in mercantile pursuits. He has been a manufacturer and dealer in lumber for many years. First elected to the provincial legislature in 1895, he retained his seat of Carleton continuously and in 1908, he entered the J. D. Hazen administration as provincial secretary and receiver general. On retirement of Mr. Hazen in 1911 to join the Borden federal cabinet, Mr. Flemming was elevated to the position of Premier and minister of lands and mines. He was Premier for several years until his government went down to defeat at the polls. He was elected member for Victoria-Carleton in the federal house in 1925 and re-elected in September last.

INSURRECTION IN PORTUGAL

ONE REPORT SAYS TWO HUNDRED KILLED BY GOVERNMENT STATEMENT SAYS CONDITIONS QUIET

LONDON, Feb. 10.—Two hundred persons were killed in fighting at Oporto says a Daily Mail despatch from Vigo quoting a newly arrived traveller from the centre of the Portuguese revolt. The Portuguese embassy has issued a statement reporting that the insurrection at Oporto has been put down and that the Lisbon outbreak is being dealt with by local troops. At Lisbon, a naval arsenal in the hands of insurgents, is under attack by government troops but, otherwise, the country is quiet.

ESTIMATES FOR RAILWAY TABLED

TOTAL \$21,000,000 FOR FISCAL YEAR—C.G.M.M. ESTIMATES ARE \$400,000

OTTAWA, Feb. 1.—Hon. James A. Robb, minister of finance, yesterday afternoon tabled estimates of \$21,000,000 for the Canadian National Railways during the present fiscal year. These estimates total the same sum as brought down last year. An estimate for \$400,000 for the Canadian Government Merchant Marine was also tabled. Both appropriations are classified as loans.

Aid. W. J. Greer was unanimously re-elected president at the annual meeting last evening of the Prince Rupert Liberal Association. Thus the association paid token of appreciation for his splendid work of last year. His re-election was moved by David Thomson and seconded by Duncan Kennedy. Aid. Greer expressed his unwillingness to monopolize the office and called for further nominations, himself nominating David Thomson. J. A. Lindsay was nominated by Thomas McClymont but Mr. Lindsay said he would not have the time to devote to the work and Mr. Thomson desired to withdraw, so Aid. Greer's election was made unanimous.

LIFE LONG LIBERAL
 In thanking the meeting for the honor again conferred upon him, Aid. Greer said he would continue the endeavour to do his best in the interests of Liberalism. He had been a member of the party all his life and expected always to be. He referred to the fact that he had attended the first Liberal meeting ever held in the city. That was in 1908 in the Old Knox Hotel. Little did he expect then that it would ever be his privilege to head the association.

In contests for the first and second vice-presidency, Duncan Kennedy and Aid. W. M. Brown were respectively elected. The re-election of Col. S. P. McMordie as treasurer and of G. W. Johnstone as secretary were both unanimous. H. F. Glassey acted as secretary of the meeting last night, owing to Mr. Johnstone's illness. He (Mr. Glassey) declined to accept nomination as secretary of the association.

There were twenty-four nominations for the executive, the elective membership of which is nine. Ballots were spread and those chosen were L. W. Patmore, Jack Judge, James McNulty, J. A. Lindsay, Dr. W. T. Kerwin, H. J. Bradbury, John Currie, Harvey Fraser and Thomas McClymont. Three further members of the executive are to be appointed.

OTTAWA VOTE CONFIRMS FIGURES OF ASSESSOR?

The valuation placed on the waterfront elevator site in the vote made by the House of Commons to reimburse the Grand Trunk Pacific bondholders in compliance with agreement may prove of some assistance to the civic court of revision now wrestling with the appeals from the 1927 assessment roll. The city has this particular elevator site assessed at \$100 per front foot or \$150,000 for the total 1,500 feet. The vote to the G.T.P. bond holders was \$165,000. This would appear to sustain the assessor's valuations not only on the elevator site but on various other waterfront valuations from \$30 or \$40 in the vicinity of the Cold Storage plant to \$110 for choice frontage adjoining the business section. There are many aspects to the matter of assessment but, on the face of such an accepted valuation, it would seem to the ordinary observer that the assessor has not erred on the excessive side in his figures at least.

CAPABLE MEN ON LIQUOR COMMISSION.

While it is obvious that his selections were along political lines, Hon. George H. Ferguson has at least chosen to the new Ontario Liquor Board men of prominence, each of whom have demonstrated their administrative abilities in the past in other spheres. D. B. Hanna, the chairman, is a canny Scot and, if he follows the right course, will, undoubtedly make a success of the job. He possesses the necessary practical and cold business attributes that the board must require. Stewart McLennaghan will be able to take care of the legal end, while Dr. R. J. Manion's experience as a minister of the crown should stand him in good stead for his new work. The members of the new board are all adequately capable and experienced to administer Ontario's liquor laws if they follow the straight and narrow path.

PRINCE RUPERT'S NEW FAIR BOARD.

The Northern British Columbia Agricultural & Industrial Association has made some happy choices in its selection of directors to conduct the 1927 exhibition. Business men are well represented on the board and every member has the experience and energy necessary for the work. The Exhibition is, it is true, in a rather bad hole but, with good management, there should be little difficulty in pulling it out. An early start should be taken in effecting organization and making plans.

An important thing to remember is that the board must work hard and that the public must give it general support and assist in various ways when called upon. Only in that way will success be achieved and it is essential that the Fair should be a success this year. Another blow, like last year would probably kill it and the majority of people in Prince Rupert, now realizing that the Fair is distinctly beneficial to the city and district, do not want to see that.

NEW PHASE IN BRITISH DIPLOMATIC SERVICE.

By the appointment of Miss Asta Crowe as private secretary to Sir Colville Barclay, British Minister to Budapest, a brand new phase has been opened in the British diplomatic service. Miss Crowe, eldest daughter of the late Sir Eyre Crowe, permanent under secretary of state at the foreign office, is the first woman to conquer in the field of diplomacy and her appointment has caused a stir and brought about much speculation. Miss Crowe has already taken up her duties. Among other notable women diplomats who have served in London, Miss Crowe's appointment recalls the name of Madame Olga de Vovkoff, who was ambassador from Russia during the prime ministry of Gladstone.

In The Letter Box

TARIFF OR NO TARIFF?

Editor, Daily News:
 Sir—"How can Rupert be pushed ahead?" is not so important a question as "How can Rupert be freed so that it can go ahead?"

The prosperity of all seaport towns depends largely on overseas trade. In countries that choke down this trade with import tariffs the exports are also thereby choked down, because tariffs send up prices and this sends up cost of production. If cost of production goes up the producers of all goods for export (including wheat in the case of Canada) are by this much held back in their trade with foreign countries.

Every day thousands of ingenious people in different parts of the wide world are making improvements in tools, in machinery, in materials, in methods of production. To say that you will not have these things is to say that you are going to commit suicide as a commercial nation. Avoidable delay in having them is commercial sickness. In a free trade country or a low tariff one, the producers can select the best and cheapest materials or tools from any part of the world and use them almost as soon as the person who is living in the country where the improvement was started can. But those who live inside a tariff palladium have to wait until the foreign improvement has been duplicated at a higher cost of production probably, inside the tariff enclosure that they happen to live in, or else pay a handicapping tariff which people in the free trade or low tariff countries are not held back with. In either case, the people in the high tariff country are held back. A wealthy highly differentiated country like the United States (differentiated in races, and in the commercial ideas) products can stand this tariff hindrance to its access to the specialised manufacturers of the outside world, but this is a heavy loss to them all the same, both financially and intellectually. The export trade of the United States has always within recent tariff years been small compared to her wealth (except when the last European war gave her a lift) and her shipping trade is remarkably small. The intellectual aspect influences the financial. Restricting our trade relations with the outside world may satisfy the primitive tribal instinct of exclusive clannishness and pride of many of us but it does not tend to progress. The people who increase the lines of traffic about the world are the ones



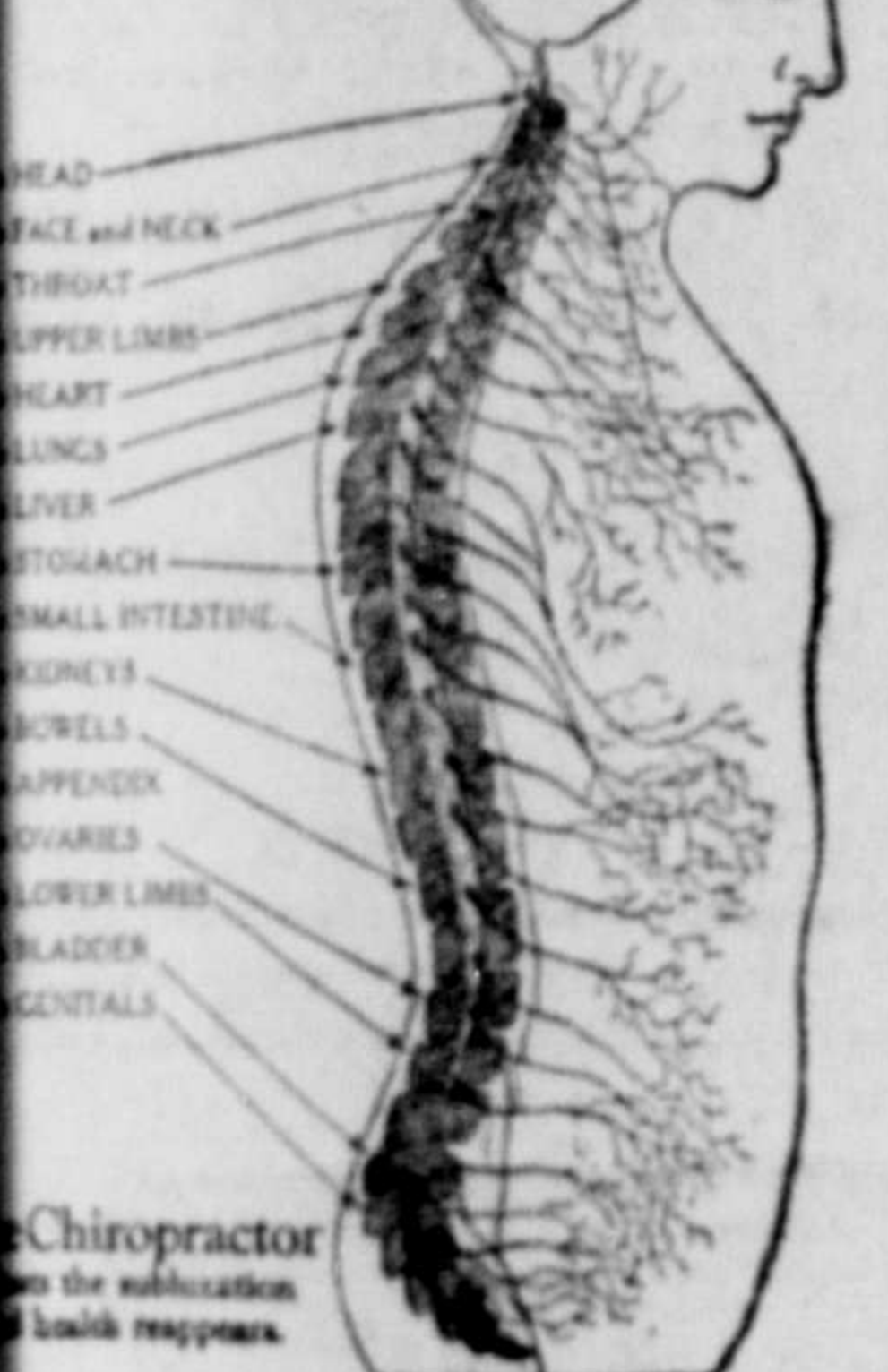

MAYOR AND CHIEF RUM RUNNERS

N.J. OFFICIALS GUILTY OF LIQUOR VIOLATIONS; OTHERS ARE IN PLOT

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Mayor Henry Weissel, of Edgewater, N.J., his chief of police, James A. Dinan, and two Edgewater detectives, Alexander P. Flannery and Edward Pickering, and four others, today face possible penitentiary sentences for their part in the \$2,000,000 rum-running conspiracy of the steamship Eker. They will be sentenced this week.

They were among the fourteen persons found guilty of conspiracy to dispose of smuggled merchandise. The maximum penalty is two years' imprisonment and \$10,000 fine.

Ten fellow conspirators were already sentenced.

Edward A. Ritz, customs inspector, of Union City, N.J., one year and one day at the federal penitentiary, Atlanta, Ga.

Paul Demontreux and James Baldwin, of the Edgewater boat repair shop, a year and a day in Atlanta.

Eustace R. Smith, also of the boat repair shop, \$1,000 fine.

Six members of the Eker's crew were given a sentence of one year and one day in Atlanta, provided they are in the country June 1, when their sentences begin.

The steamship Eker was seized in the Hudson River off Yonkers, N.Y., last April, and a memorandum book said to contain the names of Edgewater officials was found on board. Investigation revealed that \$43,000 in bribes had been paid for the privilege of landing liquor in an Edgewater boat repair yard.

Dewitt Turner, of Chicago, one of four men who turned state's evidence, testified he paid Mayor Weissel \$22,500, four hundred cases of whiskey and five cases of alcohol.

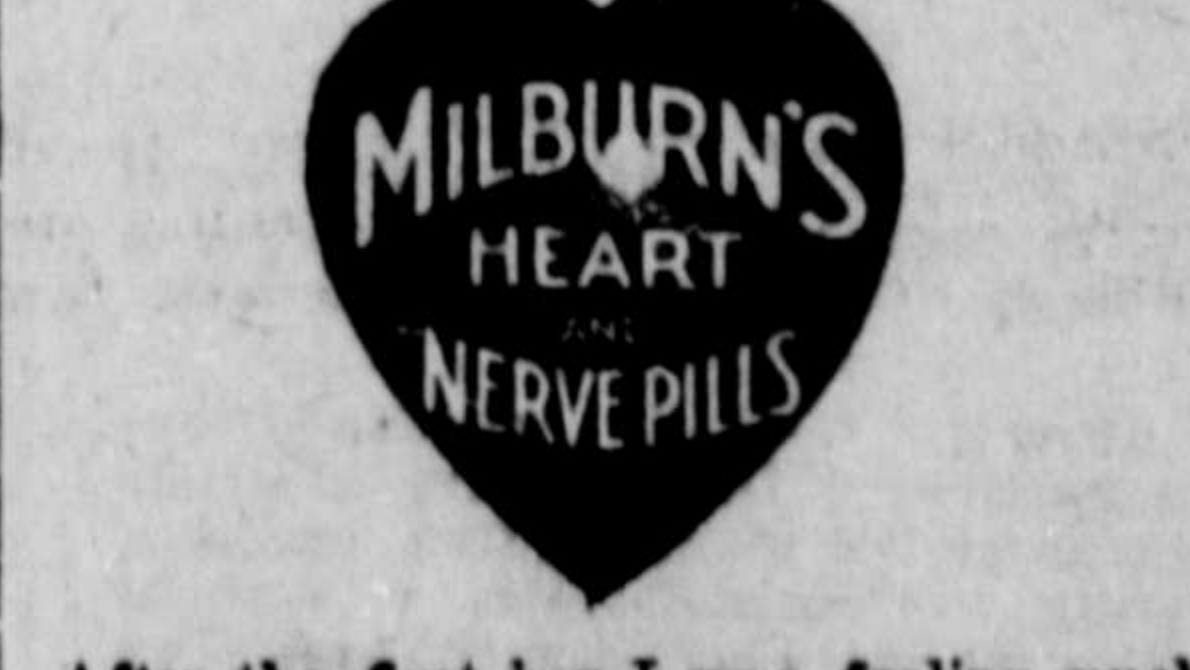

CAMPAIGN IS WARMING UP

AGRICULTURAL QUESTION TO INFLUENCE SELECTION OF U.S. PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES

CONVENTIONS IN WEST? Republicans and Democrats Both Doing Spade Work

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Things are beginning to stir with reference to the presidential campaign next year. While it seems but a little time since the campaign of 1924, the fact is the presidential campaign of 1928 will be well under way a year hence and the first presidential primaries will be held only a little more than a year from now. Of course, the presidential candidates and aspirants, and they are numerous, are not letting any grass grow under their feet in such circumstances.

Practically all of them are busy in a quiet way laying lines in the direction of votes for their nomination in national convention.

One of the interesting questions is where the democrats will hold their convention. New York, since the debacle of 1924, is out of the zone of consideration. No other eastern city is seriously considered, though Baltimore, where Woodrow Wilson was nominated in 1912, might have a chance if it put in a formal invitation.

Indications are the 1928 campaign will resolve itself, in part at least, to a great fight for the control of the agricultural middle west and north-west. That region may hold the balance of power as to nomination and election. That being the case, the democratic convention is quite likely to go to some of the middle western cities and a number of them, including Des Moines, Chicago, Kansas City, St. Louis, Cleveland, Detroit, Louisville and Denver are seeking it. Others may get into the race and probably will.

WOULD LIKE FRISCO Many democrats would like — for reasons of entertainment—to go to San Francisco. It will have support in the national committee. Atlanta wants the democratic convention and there is a possibility that "Al" Smith vote will support that city because of a desire to be "solid" with the south. On the whole, however, it looks like the democrats would choose a middle west city.

By the same token, it is probable the republicans, out of a desire to control the agricultural west, will choose a middle western city.

President Coolidge is opposed to the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill, wanted by the corn belt. But he is said to be anxious to compromise with the corn belt and have some bill passed, less radical than the McNary-Haugen bill, which will allay the farm agitation. It is generally felt here — though denied by some of his friends — that the President is an active candidate for another term. If so, he will want and seek the support of the middle west. So will any of the republican aspirants opposed to him, such as Lowden, Watson, Borah, Willis and Capper.

Thus the indications are now that both the great national conventions will go to the middle west and that locating of the conventions there will presage a great struggle for the political support of the middle west, with especial reference to the agricultural vote.

TRAPPERS' WAR CAUSES FIRES

Rangers Give Reasons for Making These Serious Allegations in Alberta

EDMONTON, Feb. 10.—Ugly rumors that "a trappers' war" has been responsible for the many serious forest fires in the north during past seasons, were confirmed by a number of trappers in the city, in to dispose of the first part of their season's catch of fur.

The men, all of whom are old timers in the Alberta wilderness, are frankly pessimistic. With large numbers of "greenhorn" trappers crowding into the woods every fall with a "stake" made in the harvest fields, the old timers say that fire is the only way to get rid of the claim jumpers who are pressing in on their reserves.

Crowded as Jasper

"These fellows make \$100 or so in the fall; get a few traps, a gun and some shells and groceries and crowd into the woods for a holiday. The result is that the woods are getting about as crowded as Jasper Avenue during a rush hour," said a grizzled veteran of the trails bitterly condemning the present system. "Any man who has \$2 to pay for a license is able to come in on our lines, and we have no legal redress," he added.

He pointed out these drifters have no interest in the woods. They are the men who are responsible for the destruction of the beaver—the best fire rangers the government ever had. When every creek was dammed at frequent intervals by these busy forest engineers, there were many lakes and ponds, all of which acted as natural fireguards. The new kind of trapper doesn't care about what will be there next year. He just comes along and blows up or breaks open the beaver houses, and kills off the whole colony. This was the gist of the trappers' complaints.

PAN-AMERICAN ROAD PLANNED

SENATOR CAMERON INTRODUCES BILL IN U.S. SENATE—PROPOSES TO LINK NINETEEN AMERICAN CAPITALS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9. — (By John Snure, Canadian Press Correspondent.)—Senator Cameron of Arizona has introduced in the Senate a bill to provide for the creation of a great highway commission for the Pan-American peoples. In offering the bill, Senator Cameron gave an explanation of it and said it was of vital importance to the United States "as well as to our good Canadian friends to the north and to our good friends, the Spanish and Portuguese people, to the south." He said the purpose of the measure, which provides for a highway commission headed by the Secretary of State, was to bring about construction of a highway linking the capitals of the nineteen countries of Pan-America.

Senator Cameron pointed out that as a matter of fact the project is not a new one and that more than a hundred years ago President John Quincy Adams and his secretary of state, Henry Clay, advocated a great highway through to South America. In South America, General Bolivar advocated a similar proposition and various presidents in this country have done so, including McKinley, Roosevelt and Harding. President Coolidge, Senator Cameron, said, is also much interested.

It was held by the Arizona senator that to link up all the capitals of the New World countries, from Ottawa and Washington to Buenos Aires, would do more to bring the western nations into accord than anything that could be done. He pointed out that the late E. H. Harriman had a project to extend the Southern Pacific Railroad to South America and had the plan well advanced when he died.

According to Senator Cameron, engineers have studied the matter and hold it feasible. It is held that it would give a tremendous impetus to travel by automobile. It was pointed out that many links of the proposed chain are already completed and that the mileage would not be so great as imagined.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 440 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
