

California Has Plague of House Mice Which Destroy Foods, Clothing and Grain

BERKELEY, California, January 19 .- Kern County is alive with mice and, according to Raymond Hall, assistant director of the University of California museum, it is the strangest occurrence of its kind in the history of the United States. The pests are not field mice but house mice which makes the invasion all the more strange he says. Their breeding place is the bed of the reclaimed Buena Vista Lake, now a vast grain field. The roads and highways are carpeted with the tiny pests and they swarm into houses and barns, destroying in their path, foodstuffs, clothing, bad coverings and grain. Hall estimates that one pair of mice is responsible for the birth of more than sixteen thousand in a year's time.

WELL KNOWN LOCAL FISHERMAN RECEIVES MEDAL FROM * SPANISH SOCIETY

Reward for signal bravery displayed on January 4, 1922, came last night to Hilmar Mork, well known local balibut fisherman, in the form of a bronze medal with diploma from the Spanish life saving society through the Norwegian consul general at Montreal. The presentation was made by John Dybhavn, local Norwegian vice-consul, at the annual meeting of St. Paul's Lutheran Church.

On the date mentioned, Mr. Mork was a member of the crew of the Norwegian freight steamer Randsfjord, which was anchored off the city of Gandia in the Gulf of Valencia on the coast of Spain when a terrific storm came up and a Spanish fishing vessel. Manuela Garceran, running for the harbor, capsized, eight members of the crew being thrown into the sea. Mr. Mork was one of the crew from the steamer sent out in a lifeboat to attempt the rescue of the drowning men. Swimming around in the turbulent waters for several hours, Mr. Mork was successful in saving all but one of the fishing vessel's dis-

It was one of the most energetic campaigns ever waged in the province, the Liberals being successful in their effort to regain a seat which has been almost traditionally in the Grit column until C. F. McIsaac was defeated by the

BRUSSELS, January 19 .- Marie Charlotte, widow of the Emperor Maximilian of Mexico, died this morning at the age of 85 years. She was suffering from pneumonia and it was realized a few days ago that, owing to her advanced age, she could not recover.

and as a girl was not only noted for her beauty but for her rare gifts, being possessed of quite remarkable artistic and literary talent. In her seventeenth year she married the archduke Maximilian of Hapsburg, a brother of the Emperor Francis Joseph and her early married life gave promise of much happiness.

Maximilian was then chief of the Austrian navy and soon afterward, as governor of Milan, took up his residence at the charming castle of Miramar near Trieste where the young couple for a time led an almost ideal existence. The archduke was a man of liberal views and attracted the Italian people to him but the bureaucracy managed to undo the good impression Application for Grazing Permits for th which he created. During the negotiations at Villafranca Napoleon III. offered to create the Kingdom of Venetia for the archduke but Francis Joseph refused.
