

Japanese Ships Collide During Manoeuvres and **Over Hundred Lives Lost**

LONDON, August 25 .- One hundred and twenty lives it is ared were lost in a collision between two warships during manuvres off the Japanese navy port of Maizuru, says a Tokio despatch Reuters.

The cruiser Jintsu collided with the destroyer Waraba in the rkness and the destroyer sank in fifteen minutes, with a loss of men and petty officers and twelve officers, there being but 22 arvivors of the whole ship's company.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 25 .- Examination of the Canadian National stcamer Prince Rupert was completed today and it was estimated that the .vessel .had sustained damage of nearly \$30,000 in the crish up the coast last week-end. Tenders are being called for repairs and it is likely the vessel will not be ready to resume service until September 15.

According to the story the Soviet Professional Union of Artists sent a representative to Paris to collect from him the equivalent of \$100,000, which they estimated to be the amount due as a pro rata contribution to the Union out of his earnings abroad since 1921, when the title of "People's Artist" was then onferred on him.
