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CHANCELLOR OF THE DUCHY OF LANCASTER

Yesterday the despatches told of the appointment of Ronald F. McNeil, M.P., to the cabinet position in Britain of Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, recently vacated by Viscount Cecil.

Viscount Cecil and Sir Austen Chamberlain, British Foreign Minister, represented Great Britain at the conference.



BANKERS MADE ADVANCES

These bank loans were legitimate advances made in the course of legitimate transactions designed to put the Bulian Petroleum Corporation on a stable basis.
