Abbe Lamy before a temporary altar in the grounds of the Stillman summer home in the presence of the country people for miles around who mingled with hundreds of New York guests.

Mrs. James Stillman, mother of the groom, however, objected vehemently to the presence of a group of motion picture cameramen "shooting" as the bride was about to cut the cake. "This is for my friends and not for photographers," shouted Mrs. Stillman, whereupon she laid down a barrage of plates and dishes which forced their retirement after one had been struck in the face by a missile.

Irish Dail Passes the Public Safety Act on Receiving Assurances

DUBLIN, July 27.—President Cosgrave's declaration before the Dail yesterday fixing the murder of Vice-president Kevin O'Higgins on the extreme wing of the irregular army, secured the passage of his drastic Public Safety Act.

Some of the members, believing the murder was due to private vengeance, hesitated to accord the government the exceptional powers the new measure provided for. The question was asked where the deported persons would go, as it was assumed they would be unable to secure passports.

Vice-president Blythe said the persons aimed at were dangerous to Ireland only. Passports would be given them to go anywhere else.

The bill gives the government the following powers:

1. To declare a state of emergency at any time, to establish military courts to try certain offenses.
2. To deport any citizen belonging to an illegal organization.
3. To suppress any unconstitutional publications.
4. To suppress illegal organizations.
5. To extend the death penalty to persons convicted of concealing arms.

BRITISH MINISTER SEEKS WORLD ACTION TO KILL COMMUNISM

LONDON, July 27.—(Canadian Press).—The government had been asked to get rid of communism altogether. Sir William Joynson-Hicks, home secretary remarked in an address recently. That was not so easy, he went on, but he thought the time was approaching when many of the nations of the world would come to the conclusion that communism in its extreme form was an enemy of mankind.

"You will all have to take into consideration," the home secretary went on. "The fact that there is emanating from or engineered by Moscow in nearly every country of the world a section of the community who are perfectly hostile to the country of their birth—men who are trying to undermine the constitutions of the various civilized countries throughout the world.

"I am not sure but that all nations in the world in the near future will have to combine to stamp out the form of belief and propaganda which is anti-socialist, anti-civilization and anti-religious."

HAD TO USE DYNAMITE IN KILLING WHALE IN WRANGELL FISH TRAP

WRANGELL, Alaska, July 27.—An unfortunate 40-foot hump-back whale, caught in a salmon trap at Point Colpoys, Prince of Wales Island, was destined for the oil refineries today.

The whale was jammed in the trap where he lived for five days despite a trap watchman's efforts to kill it with a rifle.

"Poor marksmanship and ignorance of the whale's anatomy kept him alive five days," the watchman notified his offices here. "I finally had to use dynamite," he added.

It is believed the whale was lost from tow by small boats going to the fertilizer plant at Petersburg. This is the first time on record that a whale has been caught in such a trap, veteran salmon men said.

SIX THOUSAND MEN NEEDED ON PRAIRIE FOR THIS HARVEST

VANCOUVER, July 27.—Six thousand men are required from British Columbia for the prairie harvest. The parties leave August 15 and fifty days work is guaranteed at \$3.50 a day at stooking and \$4.50 a day for threshing. Harvesters must supply their own blankets.

DIED AS RESULT OF SCALDING WITH WATER

MAIL SERVICE ON RAILWAY

The decision of the post office department not to give a railway baggage car service daily to Prince Rupert is much to be regretted. While it is getting a little late for the commencing of a service this year it is to be hoped sufficient influence will be brought to bear before another season to have the daily service established.

The letter of the deputy minister is a very lame one, especially that part in which he says he cannot give the service here because other places would ask for it. It might be well to draw the attention of the deputy postmaster general to the fact that this is the biggest city west of Edmonton and north of Vancouver and because it is granted a privilege is no argument in favor of granting the same privilege to Shames or Hagwilget.

PLENTY OF FALSE PROPHETS

There are plenty of false prophets in the world today just as there were half a century ago. It was rather less than that when the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was formed and they asked for money to enable them to build the road. Naturally the scheme was much discussed in London at the time and one London paper, a weekly which bore the significant title of "Truth," published the following:

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company has begun to launch its bonds. This railway, if it be ever finished, will run through a country frost-bound for seven or eight months of the year, and will connect with the eastern part of the Dominion a province which embraces about as forbidding country as any on the face of the earth. British Columbia is a barren, cold mountain country, that is not worth keeping. It would never have been inhabited at all unless by trappers of the Hudson Bay Company, had the "gold-fever" not taken a party of mining adventurers there. Fifty railroads would not galvanize it into prosperity. The much-touted Manitoba settlement will not hold out many years. The people who have gone there cannot stand the coldness of the winters. Men and cattle are frozen to death in numbers that would astonish the intending settler if he knew; and those who are not killed outright are often maimed for life by frost-bites.

INTOLERANCE EVERYWHERE

The value of tolerance is implied in an editorial article written by a Jewish editor recently in the "Toronto Daily Hebrew Journal" in part as follows:

The whole of the American, as well as the Canadian press, is now talking about Henry Ford's recantation. But what about the other big and little Henry Fords that are so plentiful everywhere, the other prominent and obscure men of his calibre who harbor prejudices and enmity toward all who are different from them? One is a Jew, hence they have no use for him. Another likes spaghetti—that is an unpardonable vice. A third man speaks French, it being his mother tongue—that cherished habit is hurtful to his communal standing. Here and there lone voices are raised in behalf of tolerance. But throughout the land there nevertheless reigns animosity to men of different speech, religion and culture—an animosity which gains expression in so many different ways.

AIR FORCE OF BRITAIN SEEN

Defence of London and Rescue Party is Illustrated in Manoeuvres

GREAT GUN POWER SHOWN

Features of Strength Developed by Various Kings of Flying Machines

LONDON, July 27.—The eighth Royal Air Force display, the greatest of its kind in the world, approached this year an effective realism not hitherto attempted in its two set-pieces. Just as each preceding display has been notable for the emphasis laid on some aspect of air power, so this year the outstanding pictures were those of Home Defence and Empire Protection.

This year, under the guidance of Air-Marshal Sir John Salmond, the two set-pieces, while maintaining and even accentuating the spectacular note, had a definite lesson for the people of the Empire. The guarding of the heart of the Empire from hostile air attack and the power to watch over and, if necessary, protect the scattered hands of Britons working on the frontiers of Empire are matters of vital concern, and the two short spectacles which showed the defeat of a bombing raid on London and the rescue by aircraft of a white population from the fury of a barbarian mob sum up in their swift progress of manoeuvre and counter-manoeuve practically all the highly skilled and more serious military flying.

SWIFT CLIMBING

The air battle for the safety of London took place at an altitude within the view of the spectator on the ground, but an earlier event, in which four single-seater fighters attempted to out-climb each other in the space of 15 minutes, was an epitome of one essential of the defending air-craft. Every one of the fighter squadrons, which, with the yearly growth of the Royal Air Force, are ringing London with their protective power, must be able in that 15 minutes to climb three miles and more into the sky. The air battle itself demonstrated how valuable are ascendancy in speed and rate of climb, and how necessary are quickness of manoeuvre and ease of control if a determined enemy in close formation is to be forced to relinquish its purpose.

GREAT GUN POWER

Equally the other side of the picture was seen, in the efforts of twin-engined and single-engined machines, each in their respective formations, to maintain themselves as a close-knit mass and by combined gunfire beat off the faster fighters while forcing their way on to the objective for their bombs. The heavy twin-engined bombers, weighing seven tons, are not so defenceless as their bulk and comparative slowness of movement may suggest; keen observers with glasses were able to note that a forward gunner sweeps the whole air ahead and at an angle of 90 degrees of each side of the centre line of the machine; another gunner at the rear covers the sky above and all round behind the main planes; and when glasses are focused just underneath the fuselage in rear of the wings a third gun will be seen fired by a man lying prone and able to ward off aircraft seeking to rise under the tail of the machine and pump lead into the pilot's cockpit. Thus the lack of speed of manoeuvre of the big bomber is balanced by multiplicity of gun-power.

Further, when it is realized that, with two objects flying at over 100 miles an hour on divergent courses, effective range is limited to about 500 yards, and the available time in which to get a fixed gun single-seater fighter into position to take aim at the relatively small vital spots, to fire, and to swing away again before crashing into the object aimed at is a matter of four seconds, the magnitude of the problem of utilizing the aeroplane as a weapon will be appreciated.

OBJECT OF FORMATION

The object of the attacking formation was to remain a closely knit force. The fighters, on the other hand, by repeatedly diving in formations hope to break the regularity of the enemy's grouping, chase a machine to comparative isolation, and then shoot it down by sheer superiority of machine-guns directed from different angles.

After the clash of battle to save "London" the rescue of a white population from a savage race unprovided with aircraft may seem a simple matter, but, if the need for high performance and quick manoeuvre sinks into relative insignificance, other qualities of long endurance, extreme reliability, and ability to fly for considerable periods hundreds of miles from any organized base assume the greatest importance. Therefore a new type, of which a few examples were seen in the parade of experimental aircraft, is being evolved. It has been called the general purpose machine, and robust construction, simplicity of engine design, and the reduction of every possible source of trouble to the minimum are the first requirements; rather than extreme speed. It must be greyhound and cart-horse combined, able to fly off with guns and bombs, to nip in the bud the raids of a turbulent border tribe, and equally able to lead itself with spares and equipment.

This type is as yet only under trial and has not been supplied to overseas units. Its need was illustrated in one of the pageant's episodes. Gun fire and bombing from the air set up a barrage between the hostile tribe and the white man fleeing for safety to the open country; food, water and ammunition was

OBJECTION TO SEX FILMS IN INDIA TODAY

LONDON, July 27.—Indian women in bright-hued saris, women with tanned faces from the South African veldt and the country districts of Australia helped to make a picturesque assembly at the Royal Society of Arts, Adelphi, where women from all parts of the Empire have attended the conference of the British Commonwealth League.

The conference has been chiefly concerned with the social and industrial condition of women other than those of British race under the British flag, and problems of government relating to the franchise and women and nationality.

Resolutions passed under the chairmanship of Mrs. Corbett Ashby, included a call to the Government of India and the Colonial Office to take action to prohibit the circulation within the Empire of dramatic cinematograph films unsuited to native races owing to their misinterpretation of western conditions, which tend to give a false impression of sanctioning lax standard of sex conduct.

The attention of the government was specially drawn to the problems of women with regard to the care and protection of half-castes; the appointment of women as protectors of the native women; the sums of money set aside for health and welfare purposes, especially maternity welfare; the choice of competent women to act on commissions and committees dealing with local problems.

EUROPEAN CLASSED - WORLD'S GREATEST MALE TENNIS PLAYER

LONDON, Eng., July 27.—The greatest male lawn tennis player in the world, is C. B. Cochran's description of Karel Kozeluh, professional tennis player from Prague. Spectators who have seen Kozeluh in action in London this summer do not treat Mr. Cochran's description lightly. Kozeluh is not a spectacular player. He has a quiet method and therefore does not impress the casual onlooker with any particular sense of brilliancy. But his control of the ball, both in pace and direction, is so complete, and he accomplishes his shots with so little effort that an opponent whom he is beating easily, often appears to out-shine him. This was the case in many of Kozeluh's games with Howard Kinsey. Anybody entering Holland Park, where Kozeluh beat Kinsey 7-5, 7-5, would at a quick glance take the American to be the better player. Kinsey is known as one of the hardest hitters in America and from a court of canvas-covered wood, which is extremely fast, his smashes were rebounding like cannonballs. But the way Kozeluh took the pace out of these smashes was brilliant in the extreme.

PHYSICAL TRAINING IN BRITISH ARMY

LONDON, July 26.—The standard of physical efficiency required of the British army today is set out in a paper of amendments to the official Manual of Physical Training issued by the Army Council.

If a soldier is to gain maximum marks in the tests he must be able to do the following: Run 100 yards in 11 3-5 seconds. Run one mile in 5 min. 20 secs. Make high jump of 5 feet. Make broad jump of 18 feet. Put a 16 lb. shot 32 feet. Heave a 17 lb. shot 32 feet. A soldier who makes 85 per cent or more in the tests is marked "special," 75 per cent or more "first class," 60 per cent or more, "second class," and 50 per cent or more "standard."

PARIS, July 26.—Training machines for tennis players have been installed at a Parisian sports club.

AN ENGLISH GIRL ASPIRES TO SWIM CHANNEL IN AUGUST

DOVER, Eng., July 27.—Miss Millie Hudson, young Hammersmith girl who hopes to swim from Cape Grisnez to the English coast in August has been training steadily for some time, first in London's open-air baths and now at Dover. She is built for long-distance swimming and her chances are considered favorably.

"She does not claim to be a sprinter," her adviser, Rob Derbyshire, says, "but she can keep going for hours at a steady pace without tiring." In trials Miss Hudson appears slow compared with, say, Miss Gertrude Ederie, but spectators are impressed by her ability to maintain a powerful, steady stroke without showing the least distress.

AT 76 YEARS OF AGE LORD HARRIS RETAINS CRICKET ENTHUSIASM

LONDON, July 27.—Lord Harris, although rapidly approaching the octogenarian stage—he was born in the West Indies in 1851—has not yet given up an active part in cricket, while he is one of the most alert members of the Marlybone Cricket Club committee. He may often be seen at Lord's having a spell at batting. He still opens his shoulders to the bowling and thoroughly enjoys his practice. It is more than half a century since Lord Harris was a member of the Eton Eleven against Harrow, but he still preserves the straight bat, times the ball in his forward play and makes the cut and leg glance as certainly as in those far-off days.

The machine looks like a blackboard on a wooden horse. There are nets above and below to capture wild shots. The board has a white line to represent the net, above which are arcs and horizontal lines. Beginners try to get the ball over the net, while advanced players perfect their accuracy by shooting at certain arcs or between two upright lines. The board returns all well hit balls. The practice ground requires only a ninth of the space of a tennis court.

A number of leading tennis players, among them Suzanne Lenglen and Rene Lacoste and Henri Cochet, have used the board and approved of it.

TUNGSTEN AT HYDER MINE

Plans Made by Owners of the Riverside to Produce it in Commercial Quantities

Production of tungsten on a commercial scale will soon be an accomplished fact in the Portland Canal district, says the Portland Canal News. Recent developments at the Riverside mine have disclosed the presence of scheelite, the commercial ore of tungsten, in such quantities that the managing engineer, R. G. Mellin, has announced his intention of providing facilities in the concentrating mill for saving it.

WAS A NUISANCE
Under the old regime, some scheelite was encountered and proved to be somewhat of a nuisance in the mill, as it gathers with the galena on the tables and reduces the grade of the silver-lead concentrates, which are shipped to a smelter on the coast having no facilities for saving the tungsten values. In fact there are only two places in the United States (and none in Canada) that are prepared to treat tungsten ores. These are in New Jersey and Niagara Falls.

But when there is enough tungsten in the ore mined to make the saving of it worth while, it becomes a valuable asset. Latest quotations for western scheelite are \$11 per unit, or about 60¢ per pound, nearly ten times the amount received for the lead content of the ore treated. The amount of scheelite ore now in sight is enough to warrant such changes in mill practice as will be necessary for its recovery.

ON ALASKAN SIDE
Fortunately for the Riverside mine, it is situated in the Alaskan portion of the Portland Canal mineral belt, and will escape the 60 per cent duty imposed by the U.S.A. against imported tungsten ores.

The principal uses of tungsten are in toughening high-speed tool steel and making filaments for electric light globes. The ore has been considered as being strictly a southern product, and its occurrence this far north is somewhat of an oddity, according to mining men. However, the scope of this dis-

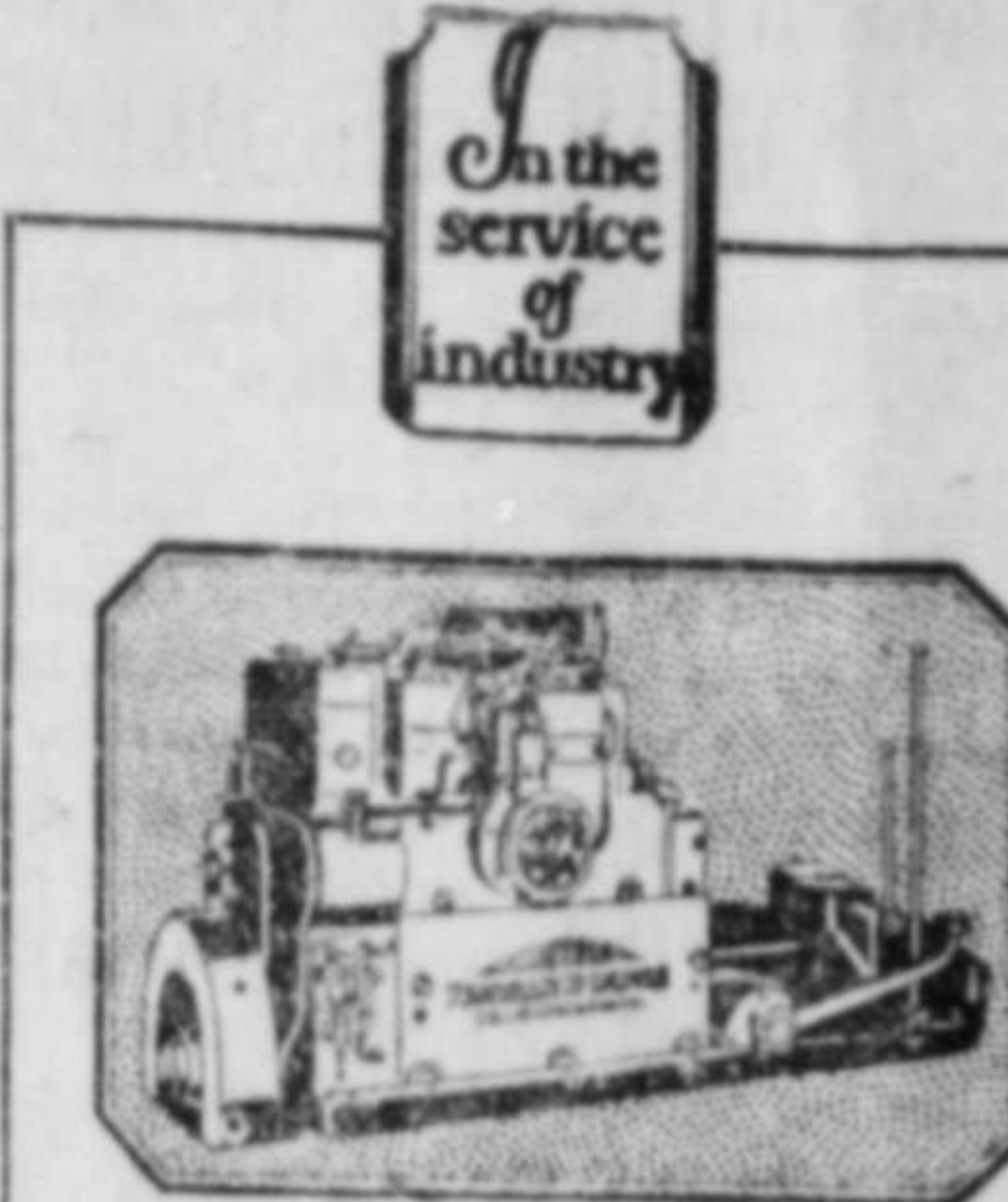

NEW TURKISH CAPITAL GROWS

Angora Developing Rapidly as Centre of Government of Republic

ANGORA, Turkey, July 27.—The new Turkish capital here is springing up with great rapidity, and Angora is now the most modern and up-to-date city in Turkey.

A water system for 120,000 inhabitants has been installed, gangs working on it day and night. Since March five furlongs of the four-mile "Grand Boulevard Ghazi" have been built. It runs toward Tbankaya, where the residences of the president and ministers, embassies and legations are. It is a double highway 40 yards wide with trees planted down the centre, and even on Fridays, the Mohammedan Sabbath, work is pushed along it.

QUARTER MILLION TREES

A quarter of a million trees have been planted to provide the new districts with shade from the fierce summer sun and the recurrent dust storms.

Nearly 1,000 residential villas, each with its own square of ground, have been built, partly by the prefecture and partly by private persons. Huge buildings to house the Agricultural Bank, the Ottoman Bank, the Ministries of Justice and Health and the Customs Direction are almost ready to be handed over.

Cheap and continuous one-deck motor omnibus services link up all the parts of the new town. The hotels are improving fast and even a number of night cabarets have opened. An automatic telephone system has been installed, and a 3,000 kilowatt electric light station is being erected to augment the present supply. A gas concession has been granted.

There is a continual influx of representatives of foreign business groups. About \$15,000,000 is to be spent on a ten-year town planning program. The improvements now being made are

CURB BRITISH MONEY LENDERS

Legal Rate of Interest to be Defined and Other Restrictions on Restrictions

LONDON, July 27.—The Money-lenders Bill which has passed the House of Commons and is now before the House of Lords, is practically certain of a safe passage to the Statute Book. The Bill is expected to come into force next New Year's Day. Its provisions are:

- (1) Every moneylender must take out an annual license costing £15, in respect of each of his offices; (2) Money-lender's circulars are declared illegal, unless asked for; (3) Moneylenders may not employ canvassers (touts) or agents.

(5) Memoranda of contracts must be signed by borrowers and copies supplied to borrowers within seven days; (6)

CONSERVATIVE SPEAKER WOULD CLUB QUEBEC

Leader Should be Warm Bird Not a Cold Clammy Fish

TORONTO, July 27.—"The prosperity as intimated by the party now in power in Canada is a myth," declared Dave Spence, M.P., last night at a meeting of the Ward 6 Conservative Association. "We overflow with empty houses and idle factories. We may be prosperous to a degree, but we are not as prosperous as we should be, as prosperous as we would be were the Conservative party in power at this time." Developing this statement, the speaker outlined what should be done to develop Canada and to put the Conservative party in power. Quebec, he stated, should be "clubbed on the head, for it will never agree with the policy of Conservatism." There should be no more pandering to Quebec. The St. Lawrence waterway should be developed, and Canadian wheat should be shipped to the Old Country from the Maritime Provinces all the year round—not from Quebec and Montreal in the summer.

Joseph Harris, M.P., urged the people to see that the leader chosen for the party in October be "a nice warm bird, not a cold, clammy fish," on the ground that a bird is pleasanter to meet than a fish, and therefore able to get more votes. Speaking of Quebec, he took exception to the statement that a "club should be used." "Rather let us teach the masses there what the intelligent people of the province already know—that the policy of the Conservative party is in their best interests."
