PATROL BOAT EXPLODES--KETCHIKAN

LIBERAL CAUCUS THE CHIEF SUBJECT OF CONVERSATION

Patrol Boat Exploded Lying Ketchikan Dock and Sank Immediately

KETCHIKAN, July 16.—The United States patrol boat Iowa sank to the bottom of the harbor here yesterday following an explosion. She went down so quickly that fire fighters on the wharf did not know that any vessel had been there.

Charles Anderson, who was on the deck at the time of the blast, narrowly escaped death.

The fire which resulted from the explosion for a time threatened the adjacent Standard Oil and General Petroleum properties.

POSSIBLY FELL INTO CANYON

Alice Arm Man Missing and Parcel he was Carrying Found on River Bank

WALKED ALONG KITSALUT

Arthur Stratford of Toric Mine Thought to Have Been Victim of Accident

ALICE ARM, July 16.—With the lapse of a day and a night since he was last seen, it is taken for granted that Arthur Stratford, an employee of the Toric mine, accidentally met his death at the mine yesterday morning.

Stratford was last seen carrying a bag of nails from the Toric mine towards the power house, a distance of something like a mile and a half. The road here runs along the side of the Kitsault canyon for the greater part of the distance.

Later in the morning, when suspicions were aroused by his absence an investigation was made and the bag of nails was found on the bank near the edge of the canyon. It is thought that Stratford stumbled and fell from the side of the road into the canyon.

The depth of the canyon with the present high water makes the recovery of the body doubtful.

The man, who is a native of Brantford, Ontario, is about forty years of age and has a wife residing at Victoria.

NARCOTICS ARE TAKEN IN RAID

Mounties Expect to Make Important Disclosures in Connection With Business

VANCOUVER, July 16.—Fifty thousand dollars worth of narcotics were taken by the police yesterday in a raid on the Sherman Hotel by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police who expect to make disclosures in connection with the smuggling activities. Lore Tip and Wong Yuen have been allowed out on bail.

TWO AVIATORS AT HONOLULU

HONOLULU, July 16.—The two aviators Smith and Bronte were brought here last night by army airplanes from Moikaki where they were forced to land owing to the gasoline supply being exhausted. They landed on Wheeler field yesterday afternoon and came on here later.

Smith's plane crashed on the island at 9:45 yesterday, Honolulu time, but the flyers were unhurt.

McRAE ORGANIZER OF CONSERVATIVE PARTY CONVENTION OCTOBER

OTTAWA, July 16.—Major-General McRae of Vancouver is chairman of a Dominion-wide committee selected to organize the Conservative convention at Winnipeg in October, it is announced.

C.N.R. EMPLOYEES WILL NOT STRIKE SETTLEMENT NEAR

KENORA, July 16.—Minister of Labor Heenan announced at his home here today that a basis of settlement had been arrived at involving the management of the C.N.R. and the freight handlers, clerks and checkers on that line and that "all danger of a strike was past."

MISSED PRIZE BY ONE POINT

Englishman Won and Canadian Came Second in Biggest Event at Bisley

BISLEY, July 16.—Captain Vernon, late of the R.A.M.C. in England, won the King's prize today with an aggregate of 292.

Lieutenant Desmond Burke of Ottawa came second with 291.

Burke might have repeated his victory of 1924 had he scored just one more point in the second of the two distances in the final. It was this distance, the thousand yards, the longest of the whole shoot which cost him the highest honors for marksmanship which the empire can bestow. In it he scored seventy out of seventy-five.

WRCKAGE PROBABLY THAT OF AVIATORS CROSSING ATLANTIC

RIO JANEIRO, July 16.—The wreckage of airplane found some time ago by fishermen in the Amazon estuary and taken to Para has been identified by an engineer entrusted with the task of examining it, as that of a Goliath, thus strengthening the belief that it was the plain flown by Captain St. Roman who with a companion left for Senegal on May 5 on a flight across the South Atlantic and has not been heard of since.

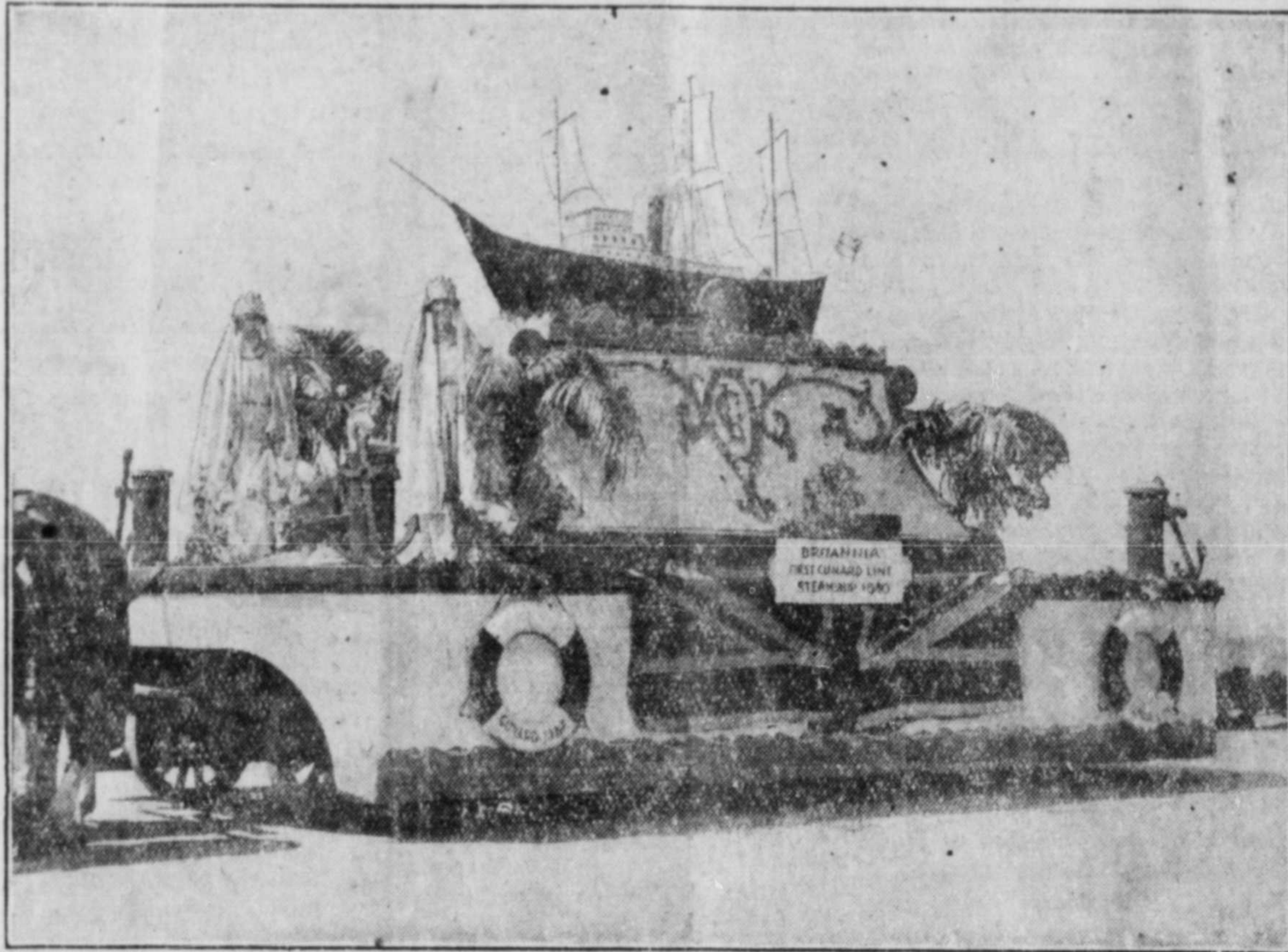
COLOMBO COMING AUGUST 24 IS NOW ON WAY FROM BERMUDA

LOS ANGELES WATER SUPPLY WAS INJURED

Dynamite Used in Attempts to Cut Flow into the City at Two Points

LOS-ANGELES, July 16.—The city aqueduct early today was dynamited for a second time within a few hours. The explosion north of Independence wrecked the water gate and made necessary the cutting off of the flow of water.

The dynamiting last night was two miles south of Lone Pine and little damage resulted.

MARKET DAY BURNS LAKE

Scheme for Weekly Event is Planned at Lakes Country Centre

BURNS LAKE, July 16.—A weekly district market day is to be instituted at Burns Lake if the plans of the citizens are carried out as a result of a suggestion made at a meeting of the Board of Trade. A day is being selected and the Board of Trade is loaning sufficient money for advertising purposes.

The matter will be further discussed at a future meeting when, if there is no change of sentiment in the meantime, the experiment will be tried, the Board of Trade and the town council co-operating.

City Health Dept.

Minister of Public Works Tells People of Victoria About the Improvements Planned for North

VICTORIA, July 16.—The minister of public works made several announcements here of interest to people of Prince Rupert and the interior districts. He stated that plans were under consideration for a modern highway bridge over the Bulkley River at Hagwilget for use in connection with the building of the highway from Prince Rupert to Prince George and that surveys were being undertaken for the road from Prince Rupert to Terrace.

The minister also spoke of the possible use of an automobile ferry on the Skeena River to connect up the ends of the road until they meet. This would be a temporary measure of relief and would give connection for Prince Rupert with the interior at an early date and thus enable car owners at the northern port to reach outside points without incurring the present high cost of railway transportation of cars.

In connection with the Hagwilget bridge it was announced that no decision has yet been arrived at in regard to its location. It may be a suspension bridge or it may be a small span on a new site, everything depending upon the report of the engineers.

Dr. Sutherland sees a great future for automobile tourist travel in northern and central British Columbia and states that this department is spending a lot of money and using a great deal of effort to make the roads there as good as possible, in view of the developments that are coming.

ARMISTICE CHINA TODAY

Leaders of North and South Arrange Temporary Peace

LONDON, July 16.—An armistice between General Chang Kai Shek, commander-in-chief of the Nationalist forces, and General Cheng Tsung Chang, northern commander at Shanghai, has been arranged, says a Reuter's despatch from Peking, based on Chinese reports received there.

Speculation at Vancouver as to Political Developments at Monday's Gathering of Liberals

VANCOUVER, July 16.—The chief topic of conversation here is the Liberal caucus to be held in Victoria Monday and the possibilities arising therefrom. What appears certain is that Premier Oliver will at once tender his resignation to the Lieutenant-Governor and will make a recommendation as to his successor, following the gathering of Liberal members.

Mr. Oliver, who is seventy years of age and suffering from an incurable disease which may prove fatal at any time, is taking steps for the proper carrying on of the government and for the continuance of the policies which he has been advocating. It is expected that Hon. J. D. McLean will be his successor but until after the gathering Monday nothing definite will be known.

The subject on which no one seems to be informed is whether a general election will be held now or postponed indefinitely. While a good many think the government will carry on under the new premier and that W. J. Whiteside of New Westminster will be taken into the cabinet as attorney general, contesting the vacant seat there, everything is speculative so far. The new premier will have the chief say in the matter but he will undoubtedly be advised by the Liberal members and especially by his colleagues in the cabinet after they are chosen.

Manson Says Strong Liberal Government Possible at Victoria

VANCOUVER, July 16.—Liberal members of the Legislature are gathering here and in Victoria in preparation for the party caucus at the capital Monday. The sole topic of discussion among them is the condition of Premier Oliver and the plans of the Government for the immediate future.

The Sun today in a news story says: "It is generally conceded that the Liberal chief will announce his retirement and will advise his followers of the course which he thinks the party should follow in its reorganization. Whether or not he will recommend a general election this fall or advise the appointment of a successor who will lead the party through another session of the Legislature is absolutely unknown."

At a meeting here last night of Vancouver Liberals, Attorney General Manson was present and declared that "Premier Oliver's place cannot be filled but we have material on the Government benches at Victoria from which can be selected as good and strong a government as has been known in the past fourteen years."

REBELLION SUPPRESSED IN AUSTRIA

Law Courts Ruined by Fire Started by the Mob

OTHER DAMAGE DONE

All Workmen in Vienna Idle Result of Strike Orders Issued

VIENNA, July 16.—An official communique issued at the office of Chancellor Seipel today said that yesterday's rebellion has been suppressed. Twelve persons were killed and 119 injured.

Material damage from yesterday's rioting in Vienna is reported to have been extensive. The law courts building was ruined by a fire started by the mob and it is reported that the ministry of ports was also set on fire. The Parliament House, Opera House and several other buildings were more or less seriously damaged.

Measures are being taken to prevent a recurrence of the trouble. Practically all the workers in Vienna are idle today as the result of a strike order of the Socialist Party and the executive of the Austrian Trade Unions. It has been obeyed nearly 100 per cent.

Troops are guarding the legations today.

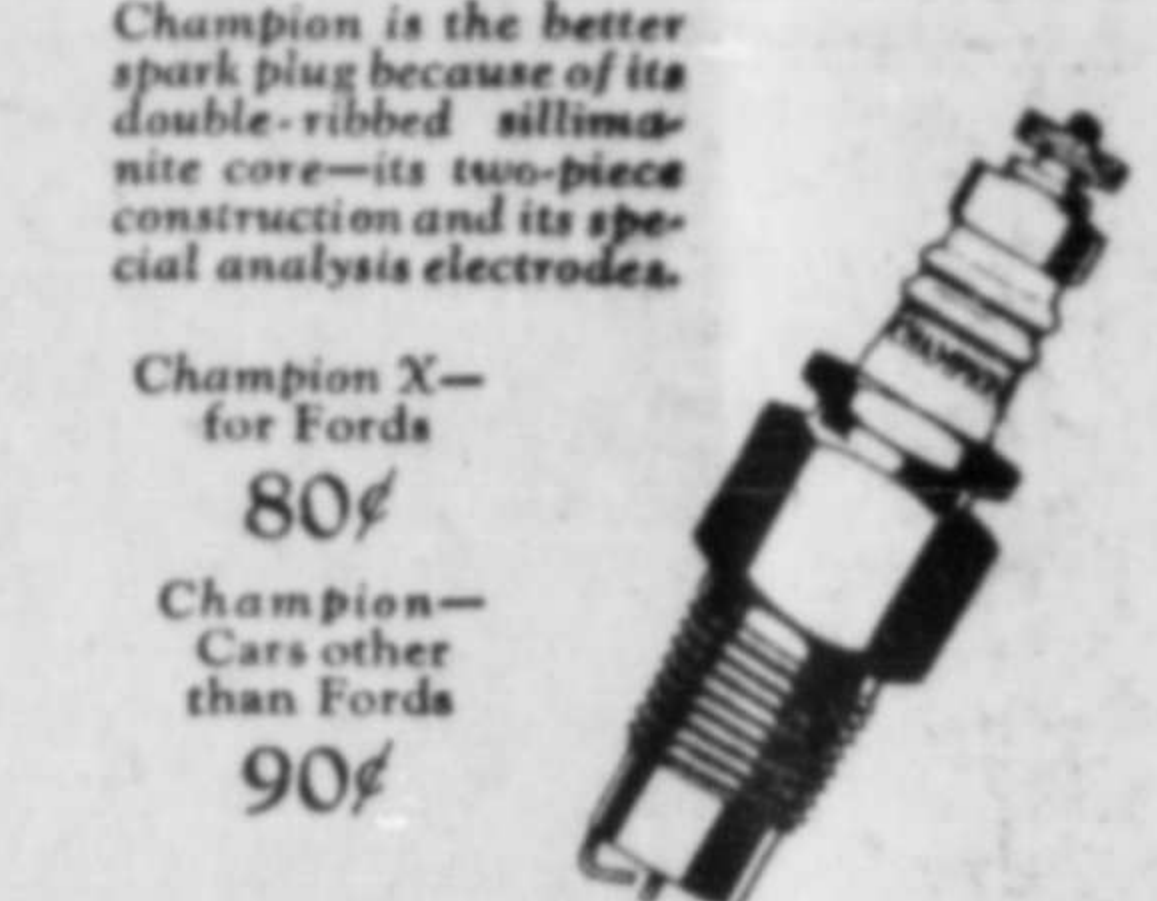

more plentiful on Vancouver Island people the next day but avoided capture. There have been several reports that the cougar has been recently in Beacon Hill Park which could be tracked by a wild animal only after prowling through a thickly populated district.

It is said that the gradual extermination of wolves and the late spring on Vancouver Island have been mainly responsible for the presence of cougars this year in increasing numbers. Wolves were formerly abundant on the outskirts of Victoria and they sought practically the same prey as the cougars. The wolves have now disappeared save for a few isolated packs in the wilderness near the west coast of the island.

USING EGGS WITH ARTISTS' COLORS

Pictures Painted on Wood Instead of Canvas in Process

LONDON, July 16.—Six dozen newly-laid eggs were mixed with the colors Francis Taylor used in his painting "East India Docks," now exhibited at the Royal Academy.

Eggs, Taylor maintains, preserve the colors against the ravages of time. The process, professionally called "egg-tempera," was first used by the early Egyptians. Botticelli used eggs instead of oil, but the process has not been used for centuries.

"Egg-tempera" pictures are painted on specially prepared wood, and Taylor works on oak. The colors are not mixed in the ordinary way, but are put on the wood separately.

RUSSIA WANTS 1,000 HORSES

Alberta Will Probably Supply That Number But Stampede is on

EDMONTON, July 16.—A thousand horses from Alberta are wanted by the purchasing commission now gathering up live horseflesh in the west for the Russian government, according to a statement made to Hon. George Hoadley, minister of agriculture, by one of the members of the commission whom he met in Calgary. The first of three shipments of horses to be made on the Russian order is being secured at the present time, and while most of the animals on this initial shipload are being bought in British Columbia, 1,000 from this province will be wanted to fill out the quota.

No difficulty in getting the desired number is anticipated, except that the buying and selling process is being interfered with somewhat, at the moment by the Calgary stampede. There is an abundant supply, however, as there are said to be 50,000 horses in Alberta of the type wanted by the Russians. From \$25 to \$50 is being paid per head.

NEW YORK, July 16.—The fatalities resulting from the heat which has blanketed the eastern states for the past four days stood today at 62.

DOGS DECREASE

EDMONTON, July 16.—Edmonton's dog population is dwindling, judging by the number of tags issued by the license department as compared with this time last year. At the same time, this city can boast of at least 3,058 licensed canines, a decrease of 150 on a year ago.

MAKING CHANGES GAME OF BRIDGE

LONDON, July 16.—The Portland Club, famed cradle of bridge playing, is trying to regain its lost prestige as a world authority on all question pertaining to the game by adopting some of the new American rules.

A score of leading bridge players from ten London clubs are framing a new code of laws of the game under the auspices of the Portland Club. They are guided in their work by written views from more than 450 noted clubs all over England.

The existing Portland Code has been displaced in nearly every country of the world except England. Even in London many players prefer to play under the American rules, which recognize majority calling, and indications are that the new Portland Club code will contain this American rule!
