



FLAT RACING STARTS AGAIN

BETTING ON LINCOLN AND NATION-AL IN WEEK OF MARCH 21 IS LIGHT

LIVERPOOL, March 15. - Canadian Press Despatch)-Following the tradimany years the old National Hunt season closes and the new flat racing season opens, in a week of great races. This year it is the week of March 21. The Lincolnshire Handicap on Wednesday, the 23rd, and the Grand National steeplechase on Friday, the 25th, are outstanding races not only of the week but of the whole year.

CLINTON, March 15 .- For years fur buyers here have marvelled at the fine pelts brought in by Edward Rioux from his trap lines in the Bridge Lake country, and now the secret is out.

At the close of each trapping season 000 to \$5,000. His line extends over mow. 150 miles and he works as hard during the summer as in winter, for he says that the preparations he makes in warm weather are responsible for his bountiful catch after the snow flies.

The lakes and streams of the Bridge Lake country are teeming with fish and all the fish he can catch during the summer he takes out along the trapline and scatters near the spots where a few months hence he plans to place his steel-jawed traps. In this way the furbearing animals in Rioux's territory become accustomed to obtaining their food along the trapline route. After the traps are set in the winter and whenever the fur bearers are hungry instinct takes them to the places where they found food during the summer and eventually they find their place among Rioux's glossy pelts. He boards the animals in the summer time and skins them in the winter.







LONDON, Mar. 15 .- (Canadian Press). -Sir Samuel / Hoare, | air minister, and | Lady Maud Hoare returned from their flight to India "in better health" for their long and interesting journey, Sir Samuel said on his return a few days Lady Hoare travelled with her husband 10,000 miles in the air, while the air minister in addition flew 2,500 miles in inspection of the air force on the Indian Northwest Frontier.

"Speaking generally," said Sir Samuel

Hoare, "we not only carried out the program we had arranged, but we carried it out absolutely to time the whole way hrough. More than that, we carried it out without the need of any spare part or any repair either to the machine or the engine. I think that is a very remarkable feat on a flight of more than 12,000 miles. We accomplished 10,000 miles in the City of Delhi and about 2,500 miles in the military machine D.H.9. During the whole of the tour we never had a forced landing or a breakdown of any kind. That is a very remarkable testimony to British enterprise and efficiency. It is no credit to me at all, personally. I simply sat comfortably in a civil or military machine making copious notes of the interesting places over which we flew.
